Commercial Summary.

THE FREIGHT business of the Intercolonial Railway is steadily increasing.

PATTER & Co., boots and shoes, Yarmouth, N.S., who about three years ago compromised at 33c. on the dollar, payable within two years, have at last closed up shop.

IT IS ANNOUNCED that the Treasury Department at Washington have rescinded the exemption from the tonnage tax at American ports hitherto enjoyed by Ganadian-built lake vessels owned by citizens of the United States.

Ir is reported that a scheme is on foot to build a short railway from Gooksville, Ont., on the line of the Credit Valley, to Port Credit, and to make the latter place the shipping port and entrepot for the traffic of the Gredit Valley.

The stock of J. N. Matthews, storekeeper, Huntsville, Muskoka, has been disposed of, for the benefit of his creditors.

Parkdale, a two or three year old suburb of Toronto, is making rapid progress. The village fire brigade held a business meeting last Monday evening, and it is proposed by the town to acquire a chemical fire engine at a cost of \$1,700. A prevalent misfortune of the day is the unexplained apathy of small towns on the question of fire protection. Nearly all small towns are so built that without fire appliances the entire business section must become the victim of any full developed fire.

The homanon of real life is aptly illustrated in the strange story telegraphed from New York of the downward career of a Belgium Baron, "whose family reside at Brussels, and are known throughout Europe for their wealth and high connections." Baron Hermann de Reiffenberg emigrated to the United States lifteen years ago, dissipated his fortune, dropped his title and family name, and wound up as a convict on Blackwell's Island, where he died three months after being sentenced. This story is calculated to read a lesson to many young men of wealth and position in America to-day.

Tonoxto business men of all classes are jubiliant over the impetus given to general trade there by the large influx of visitors to the recent Industrial Exhibition. The Globe says "it would be difficult to compute or even guess at the amount of money left behind by visitors to the Exhibition, as \$20,000 per day would probably be as far astray as \$500,000." Although we have not yet had time to count up, there is every reason to believe that the results in Montreal from the same cause will be likewise satisfactory, only on a larger scale. We trust that similar verdicts will be given in Hamilton

and other Canadian cities holding Full Exhibitions this year.

LISTOWELL is seeking the honor of a match factory; it is also aspiring to be lighted with gas.

E. D. LAWRENCE, one of the leading merchants of Waterloo, P.Q., is retiring from business on account of ill health, and offers his business stand and stock for sale.

A company are making arrangements with the Municipal authorities of Waterloo, Que., to construct works necessary to supply the village with water.

J. W. TURNER, confectioner and fruit dealer, London, Ont., whose stock was, recently sold by the sheriff to another dealer in the same line, Mr. Mountjoy, has left for the United States.

MITCHELL is becoming more and more exercised over its system of water works. The town fathers are negotiating for the purchase of an engine house, engine, &c., for the working of the present system.

THE NEW Midland Railway Elevator at Port Hope is rapidly approaching completion, and will have a capacity of 104,000 bush, and facilities for loading six cars at the same time. From all accounts the new Elevator is greatly needed. as the Midland is said to be doing a larger business this season than ever, an average of 130 car loads of freight, about half of which is grain, being received at Port Hope per day. The barley movement in that vicinity has opened two weeks earlier than last year, and the quantity held along the line of the Midland is said to be unprecedented. Trains are kept running day and night, and the work of unloading into vessels is carried on all night. The present freight rate to Oswego is 2c. per bush,

Massas. Brooks & Colounous, Mitchell, Ont, have imported three heavy draught stallions from Scotland. This enterprising firm deserve the support of the farmers in Western Outario.

Mr. William Moffar, of Pembroke, Ont., who owns a fine quarry at Hazeley's Bay near that town, has struck a stratum of beautiful brown freestone, which promises to yield a satisfactory

MESSUS. J. & J. HEGAN & Co., of St. John, N.B., dry goods merchants, who compromised with their creditors two years ago at 40 cents in the dollar, payable in instalments, have failed to meet the last payment of ten cents, balance due on the composition.

There are 30 paper mills in Canada, 15 in Ontario, 14 in Quebec, and 1 in New Brunswick. They are capable of producing 52 tons every twenty-four hours, the manufacture being chiefly wrapping, manilla, news, and book papers.

Large quantities of fall wheat are being sown in Perth County, Ontario. The farmers are so intent on sowing fall grain that they cannot take time to visit the market towns. The result is that grain has not yet arrived in very great quantities.

SHEFFOND COUNTY, Que., has not suffered much from drouth, and in consequence the farmers are blessed with good crops. Money is said to be abundant, and everything that a farmer grows is bringing good prices. Surely the bucolic heart should rejoice.

ROBERT ANDERSON, who began business sometime ago as general storekeeper at Newbury, Ont., with capital supplied by his mother, has obtained a compromise with his creditors at 45c on the dollar. Extravagant habits are assigned as the cause of his failure.

King Street east, some time in June last, are reported to be missing, and as they appear to have commenced business without any capital, the landlord and creditors may wait a while longer for their claims.

A company is shortly to be organized for the manufacture at Ottawa of white brick and terracotta building and decorating material. The same patent, owned by Mr. T. M. Clark, is being worked by a company at Glen Falls, N. Y. Specimens of these bricks and tiles were on exhibition here in the Industrial hall during the past week.

ALFRED WALLACE OWEN, Georgetown, P. E. I., offers, on condition of a discharge, to pay a composition of 2c. on the dollar to all his individual creditors, as well as to the creditors of Macdonald and Owen, and Morrow & Co., demanding till the 1st August next to pay it. By this arrangement Mr. Owen would get relieved of four-lifths of his liabilities, therefore we think the consent of the creditors is very unlikely.

The people of Walkerton are looking for bonus hunters, unheeding or forgetful of the fate of similarly inaugurated enterprises all over the country. Five thousand dollars are proposed to be given to a concern that will not pay at Galt, a town which has been called the Birmingham of Ontario; and a similar amount to some other persons whom it may concern. The great need in such enterprises generally throughout the west is sufficient capital.

It has been said that all great speculators were born such, and that other men should be content with the mastery of some one line of business, if success is to be gained. The truth of this has doubtless been realized by Edward Allain, general storekeeper, Batiscan, Que., who it is stated, owing to outside speculations and a want of steady application to business, has been obliged to yield up his estate to his creditors. He owes about \$9,000, and shows nominal assets of \$13,000, but subject to material shrinkage.

During the past week Toronto has lost another of its oldest citizens, and one of the leading publishers of that city. For many years William Warwick has been known as the proprietor of a large book binding and stationery establishment on Wellington street; a little over a fortnight ago, while proceeding to the Exhibition in Toronto, he was thrown out of a buggy and sustained injuries from the effects of which, we regret to state, he died on Monday night last. Mr. Warwick had reached the age of 58, and will be mournfully missed by many of his fellow citizens.

A REPORT of a case of failure similar to one noticed in last week's Journal comes from Brockville. C. H. Lewis, haberdasher, of that town, failed some two years ago, but with his father's assistance, which it is understood has been rendered him from time to time since, he was enabled to start again. It was all to no purpose, however, as Mr. Lewis could not make money, and his stock has lately been seized by

Pike & Richardson of Chatham, Ont., have contracted with an English firm for the manufacture of five million sugar barrel staves, two million barrel hoops and an unlimited number of barrel heads. Already nearly 300 car loads of this order have gone forward. This firm also manufacture largely for the American market. This is a trade of great importance to the country, as a great deal of timber, such as elm, black ash, &c., which is of little use for other purposes, is employed for the manufacture of these goods.

The Sheriff is in possession of the stock of Wilson & Sanborne, grocers, of London, Ont., under an execution at suit of Moses Wilson, father of one of the partners, for between \$2,500 and \$3,000. The stock will not likely sell for that amount, leaving the other creditors in the lurch. The sale is advertised for the 27th inst. The want of some substitute for an insolvent law is felt in this as in many other cases which have come to light in the West lately. It is understood that the plaintiff in the suit was a member of the firm about April or May last.

THE ROYAL AGRICULTURAL COM-MISSION.

The report of Messrs. Clare S. Read and Albert Pell, M.P., assistant commissioners to inquire into the agriculture of the United States, has been published. Beyond a week's stay in Manitoba, the whole of their time was spent in inquiries in the United States, but their report has as much interest for this country as for our southern neighbors. If the basin of the Mississippi contains, exclusive of inland seas, 800,000,000 of acres, our "fertile belt" in the North-West covers 600,000 square miles of the finest wheat land on the American continent; and the advantages accruing to the American farmers as well as the disadvantages which they have to contend with are equally common to us. The report is consequently of much importance to settlers in our North-Western prairie lands.

The difficulties in the way of American farmers are stated by the commissioners with commendable detail. They may be briefly summed up as follows: (1) The cost of growing; (2) The cost of freight to Chicago; (3) The cost of freight to New York and thence to Liverpool. To this, the commissioners add for the future, (1) an increased compensation to the farmer for his present excessive labor; (2) the cost of renewing the perishable farm machinery; (3) the exhaustion of the soil and the cost of annual manuring. The cost of production of a quarter of wheat and its delivery to Liverpool are estimated by the commissioners at 47s. 91d. The details of the various items

entering into their calculation will show the care taken to make it accurate.

The price paid per acre of prairie land, the cultivation required, the cost of manual labor, horse and steam power are set at a sum of \$10 per acre, including rates and cost of conveying the crops six miles to the local railroad depot or elevator. The yield of wheat in the United States over a long series of years appears to have just exceeded 12 bushels per acre. With that yield, the western farmer can deliver from his waggon at the depot without loss at 3s 6d a bushel of 60 pounds, or a quarter of 480 lbs. at 28s. The transportation of the crop from the local depot or elevator to a shipping port on the lakes, Chicago for instance, is estimated by the conmissioners at 6s. 8d. on an average per quarter. Coming next to freight, account has been taken of the terms on which grain can be moved inland by lake and canal or by "all rail." The difference between these two modes of transportation is considerable, being, on an average of five years. 3s. 5d. by water, lake and canal, and 6s. 10d. by rail, for a quarter of 480 lbs. The water route being closed by ice from November to April, about 5s. 2d. is the average of the two rates. The difference between the cost of transportation by sail or steam has been on the average of the last five years inconsiderable, and may be placed at 4s. 91d. In addition to the above charges, those for handling and weighing have to be taken into account, as well as the lake insurance, dock and town dues, and porterage at Liverpool, shortage, marine insurance, commission, and interest on money. The sum of all these particulars is as follows:

According to the commissioners' report, the difficulties in the way of American competition with European markets may be said to be insuperable if wheat cannot be landed in Liverpool at less than 48 shillings per quarter, yet last year 15,000,000 quarters of wheat were shipped to England, and the average of their sale was much below 48 shillings. The difficulties in the future are not discouraging. The increased compensation to the farmer for his present excessive

labor will be found in the enhanced value of his land when new population settles around him. The cost of renewing the perishable farm machinery is not peculiar to the United States; English farmers have similar expense to incur. The exhaustion of the soil and the cost of annual manuring will of course increase the expenses of growing wheat; but, as the commissioners themselves say, it cannot come immediately. The accumulated vegetable deposits of centuries, and the untold number of grass crops that burn or rot upon the prairies, are not to be exhausted in a few years.

Of the cost given in the report as to landing wheat at Liverpool, more than half is put down for transportation. The supposition on which this cost rests is that the figures given are to remain permanent, if not to be increased. When we compare the actual cost of transportation with what it was fifteen years ago, we find an indication of what the cost will be in the future, becoming always cheaper in consequence of new improvements in labor-saving machinery, &c.

Ten years ago, before the introduction of steel rails, the cost of transporting grain by rail from Chicago to New York was 30 cents per 100 pounds, that being the expenditure made by the railroad company for that service on roads laid with iron rails. At that time the cars could not be loaded with more than ten tons of grain each. In the meantime the steel rails, of which the cost is no greater now than was the cost of the iron rail ten years ago, have come into general use, and the railroad company can move on steel rails cars containing a greatly increased weight of grain 1000 miles at an actual cost of from 15 cents to 20 cents per 100 pounds. The railroad company, therefore, can now carry 100 pounds of grain at a profit of 50 per cent., and charge no more per 100 pounds than it cost them to perform the same service ten years ago.

At the close of 1881 the Welland Canal will be completed, and propellors will be launched adapted to the transportation of cattle from Chicago to Montreal, thence to be transported to ocean vessels. In like manner for six months in the year the same great water route will be open for the transportation of breadstuffs and grain delivered alongside the ocean steamer at a rate not exceeding 8 to 10 cents per 100 pounds. Whatever may be the rate to which the lake and canal navigators will lower their freight, the great railroad interest will not hesitate to perform the same service at the same rate. The cost of internal transportation,

which within ten years has been reduced fully one half, will with successive years be still further reduced, each reduction serving to increase production and rendering more imperious an exportation at prices low enough to meet the foreign demand.

#### COLLECTION OF DEBTS.

Judging from complaints that we have received from time to time of the want of facility for the collection of debts by country merchants, we should infer that the Act passed in the last session of the Ontario Legislature, entitled, " An Act to " extend the jurisdiction and to regulate "the offices of Division Courts," is by no means generally known. There has been always considerable opposition to the legislation intended to protect the interests of creditors, mainly on the ground that it is unwise to encourage merchants to grant credit, and that, if obstacles were placed in the way of recovering their debts, they would be more cautious than they are at present. Such was substantially the view taken by Mr. J. G. Worts of Toronto, in a paper read before the Toronto Board of Trade, towards the end of 1878. Mr. Worts seems to have attributed the numerous insolvencies which had taken place chiefly to injudicious credits. Mr. Worts advocated, if we are not mistaken, a restriction on suits in Division Courts to debts of \$100 or over. There is no doubt that there is a great deal of truth in the statement that the credit system has been pushed to an extent that has caused great inconvenience, but the chief cause of the insolvencies from which the country has suffered has been the depreciation in the value of the stocks in trade of the retail merchants, which took place to an extent that was ruinous to merchants with small capitals. Mr. Worts' lecture led to a good deal of discussion at the time, but we have no doubt that the Act of the Ontario Legislature, which was subsequently passed, and the object of which was to grant increased facilities to the creditor class, was in accordance with public opinion.

The principal feature of the new Act is the extension of the jurisdiction of the Division Courts from \$100 to \$200 in cases where "the amount or the original "amount of the claim is ascertained by "the signature of the defendant, or of "the person whom, as executor or "administrator, the defendant represents." The jurisdiction thus extended to ascertained debts has likewise been extended from \$40 to \$60, in cases of claims for damages. Provision has been made for change of venue on the

defendant obtaining an order to that effect from the judge of the County in which the action is brought. There are very important provisions in the new Act for securing the competency of clerks and bailiffs, and for enquiring into complaints against them, which were very numerous under the old system of appointment. The provision made for the inspection of the books and Court papers will, it may be hoped, secure uniformity in the system. It will likewise be the duty of the inspector to see that lawful fees only are taxed and allowed as costs. The Act of last session is certainly a great! improvement on the former one, and throws a great responsibility on the executive. We think, however, that it is far from improbable that before very long the District Courts will be abolished, which, as an appeal is provided for the Division Courts in all cases of \$100 and upwards, can hardly be considered neces-

#### GRAPHIC COMPANY:

The adjourned meeting of the shareholders of the Graphic Company was held on Tuesday, the 21st instant, at the office of the Company, to consider the expediency of accepting the Act passed by the Quebec Legislature at its last session, the object of which was to reduce the capital stock, and to capitalize the arrears of interest due to the preferential shareholders. It will be recollected that a day or two prior to the former meeting called for the same purpose, early in August, it was announced in the papers that actions had been instituted both against the Company and the directors by a Mr. Russell of New York, who holds in trust certain shares of first preference stock formerly owned by Mr. Dugald J. Bannatyne, one of the original directors of the Company, and who continued on the Board until he transfer red his stock to a trustee. The directors had already determined to propose an adjournment of the meeting in accordance with the desire of several shareholders, but it was evident from the attendance of Mr. Macmaster at the meeting, he having obtained a qualification a few days previously, that the object was to obstruct the proceedings. It was stated in Mr. Macmaster's presence that there was no intention to proceed with the actions, but this, of course, was denied. It was, naturally anticipated that declarations would be served without unnecessary delay, but until the very day before the meeting no step was taken by the plaintiff. On that day a letter was sent to the

secretary, announcing that an injunction would be applied for that day to restrain the shareholders from accepting the Act of the Legislature, and accordingly such application was made to Judge Rainville on the ground that the act interfered with the vested rights of the petitioner. Mr. Bethune, Q.C., appeared for the Graphic Company, and showed that the B. N. A. Act gave the local Legislatures exclusive jurisdiction over all cases affecting property and civil rights in the Province, and that the Court had no jurisdiction to adjudicate on the provisions of the Act, the power of the Legislature being supreme. The petition was dismissed, Judge Rainville stating that his brother judges whom he had consulted concurred in his decision. At the meeting on Tuesday the President, Sir Francis Hincks having stated its object, two resolutions were proposed, one for the reduction of the capital stock from 7500 shares to 5000, the other for the capitalization of the arrears of interest. The first was moved by George Stephen, Esq., and seconded by J. L. Morris, Esq., and the second was moved by C. Geddes, Esq. and seconded by D. R. Stodart, Esq. On a ballot beingtaken, there were more than two-thirds of the aggregate votes in favor of the resolutions and not one in the nega-

The Pacific Railway.—We observe that the Pacific Railway is still likely to be a bone of contention between the rival political parties. There is as yet insufficient information in possession of the public to justify any positive expression of opinion as to the merits of the scheme. We confess that we are not surprised that the syndicate that has been formed consists chiefly of persons connected with Canada and the United States, and that the management will be in their hands. We shall take an early opportunity of noticing the chief points in controversy by the political journals.

#### THE BANK STATEMENTS.

The usual monthly returns of the assets and liabilities of the Chartered Banks have been published unusually early this month, but we regret to have again to complain of the very reprehensible delay in furnishing the Dominion note returns, which are much more simple, and have to be furnished by only five agencies, all of which should be able to render them at Ottawa by the 5th or 6th of the month. These returns ought to be furnished concurrently with those of the Banks. The Bank returns show an increase both in circulation and in deposits. The amount

due by agencies in foreign countries has been reduced by nearly 24 millions, while the discounts have been increased by about 14 millions. Money continues abundant, and the rate of interest low. The Government has been advised to reduce its rate of interest, but that would be a questionable policy. It is the interest of the Government to obtain all the money it can at 4 per cent., and if it was to drive its depositors away it might be difficult to induce them to come back. 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#### THE DOMINION EXHIBITION.

"Canada's Greatest Exhibition," which has been open to the public in the spacious grounds in Mount Royal Park during the past ten days, will be closed this (Friday) evening. The Dominion Exhibition has been held at Montreal this year for the first time, and notwithstanding many disadvantages our citizens have admirably succeeded in their indefatigable efforts to render it a most unusual success. For obvious reasons the daily attendance of sight seers during the first week was not very large; the Toronto Industrial show was still open, and active preparations were in progress for the approaching Provincial Exhibition at Hamilton, and other Western Fall Fairs, besides the public announcement that the agricultural and live stock exhibit would not be complete until the formal opening of the Exhibition by His Excellency the Governor General. This took place on Tuesday afternoon last, when the magnificent buildings and spacious fair grounds pre-sented a scene not easily effaced from the memory. The number of people of all sorts and conditions, from all parts of this continent, there packed together, has been variously estimated at from 30,000 to 100,000, but facts go to show that these are extreme figures, and that the truth lay half way between. The Governor General having replied to a suitable address, visited the different departments of the Great Exvisited the dimerent departments of the Great Estibition, but, not unlike everybody else, found it impossible to satisfy himself that day, and has made two visits since. Although doubtless the largest number of strangers in the city at one time was on Taesday, extraordinary crowds have flocked to the Dominion show every day since and many citizens who address the since, and many citizens who delayed their visit until after the uncomfortable "jam," were forced to despair. Herein may be traced the wisdom of the energetic citizens' committee in providing an almost endless programme of outside attractions, all of which were carried out with remarkable success. These included a fine art gallery exhibition in Phillips sq., horticultural and fruit show, dog and pet stock show, concerts, national society games and amusements, horse races, lacrosse tournament, electric light excursions, magnificent torpedo display (illustrating the modern system of wardisplay (diffestrating the mouern system of war-fare), illuminating the mountain by Bengal lights, and the harbor by variegated colored lights, unequalled displays of fireworks, mili-tary torch light procession, fire brigade review, daily balloon ascensions, by Prof. Grimley, New York, piano recitals, band music in public

etc. These uncommon attractions doubtless influenced the stay in the city of thousands of visitors, to the financial advantage of our merchants and other business men. But it is with the more practical features of the show that the JOURNAL OF COMMERCE has to do. The weather during the greater part of the time was delightful. Our limited amount of time was designful. Our limited amount of space prevents our giving an extended account of the numerous exhibits, or the prize list; our chief aim is merely to notice briefly some of the leading features of the colossal exhibition which evince the progress made in the quality and variety of Canadian manufactures, or which may suggest improvements for the fature. Those who also attended the Tor-onto show state that the exhibit of live stock here, while creditable as regards quality, was comparatively small. This may be ac-counted for, probably, by the fact of the two exhibitions being held at the same time; had this been avoided, doubtless many more exhibitors at the western fair would have come here also. The arrangement of the different classes arso. The arrangement of the dinerent classes of horses here in stalls was bad, occasioning a great deal of confusion. The display of agricultural implements for steam or horse power, in the centre of the grounds, was a highly creditable one, and included various machines emittable one, and included various machines embodying unmistakeable improvements, but the whole exhibit contained such a variety of articles useful and interesting in the main only to cles useful and interesting in the main only to husbandmen, that the average visitor passed on up to the Crystal Palace or Industrial Hall, without stopping to examine. The erection of a shed over the implements, which should also be in motion by steam power, to keep pace

with the times, is a needed improvement.

On entering the main building, the eye is confronted with a scene of varied attractions, which is bewildering. Attention, however, is almost irresistibly drawn to the piano platform, a handsomely carpeted square to the left. The New York Company made a fine exhibit, including the property of the peak o ding the square and upright Weber Grands, linte's square and upright makes, another manufactured by a German, and one by themselves. L. E. N. Pratte, of this city, was the only exhibitor of European, American and Canadian organs and pianos, has carried off no fewer than nine prizes: Hazelton Square Piano, 1st Extra prize; Kramich & Bach, Square Piano, 2nd Exra prize; Herz, of Paris, Upright Piano 1st Exra prize; Herz, of Paris, Upright Piano 1st Extra prize; Hazelton Upright Piano, 1st diploma. Among the other piano exhibitors were lleiatzman, Toronto, Thomas, Hamilton, and Wm. Bell & Co., Guelph. Lomas & Son, Sherbrooke, Que., were awarded silver medals as first prizes for line wool, white and colored, and fancy flannels. The gold medal awarded in Toronto for the best six pieces of fine Canadian tweed, spring and full weights, was also taken by Cautlie, Ewan & Co., with the goods of the Rosamond Wootlen-Company. Here they also show a fine collection of Canadian cottons manufactured by the Coaticook Company, Que.
The Paton Manufacturing Company, Sherbrooke, made a full display of their superior

high-class Tweeds, and carried off also several

first prizes in Toronto.

The Dundas Cotton Company, represented by Messrs. F. McElderry & Co., received first

prize for grey cottons, denims and Oxford shirtings; and their 72 inch grey sheeting was

specially recommended.

The Strathroy Knitting Co. of Hamilton, represented in Montreal by John S. Shearer & Co., made a successful exhibibit, being awarded the first prize here for knitted goods, and a first prize here for knitted goods, and a bronze medal at Toronto for assortment of power-made shirts and drawers.

Messrs Walter Wilson & Co. make a fine display of "Clark's Thread," for which they are the agents here. The column made of are the agents here. The column made of spools of thread of all colors is very attractive, but strange to say there were no judges for this article, and no prize was awarded, where a special one would seem to be merited.

Turner Bros., this city, received 1st prize and diploma for their exhibit of the popular athletic suspenders, of which they are the patentees, manufacturers in Canada, England, and

the United States.

Emil Poliwka & Co., this city, obtained first prize for glue, while their kaoka was highly recommended. This article was awarded a certificate of high merit at the New York State Fair, held at Albany last year, and a bronze medal at Toronto.

Chas. E. Pearson, of Iberville, Que., shows a varied assortment of Rockingham and Yellow Ware, for which he obtained a diploma and first

prize.

In the Western transept D. Morrice & Co. have a remarkably fine exhibit of Canadian manufactured goods from the following mills :-Hudon, Montreal, and Stormont Cotton Mills, the Auburn, Almonte, John Baird & Co., Almonte, and James Wattie, Valleyfield, Woollen Mills, St. Hyacinthe Manufacturing Co., John Penman's hosiery, and others. Several prizes, first and second, were awarded to this firm.

Turnbull & Co., Craig street, for whom D. Morrice & Go. are agents, exhibit a full line of hosiery, cotton and wool, ladies' and misses' plain ribbed and fancy assorted, and men's and boys' ball hose. In Toronto this hosiery exhibit was awarded two silver and one bronze mbit was awarded two silver and one bronze medal, but the judges here ticketed the goods of the Victorin Hose Co., St. Johns, Que., with "first prize." A protest, however, has been entered. On this floor are also to be seen the various exhibits of Canadian tweeds; for the best assortment of fancy, the 1st prize was at once awarded to Gault Bros., this city, the judges remarking that they had never seen anything to again the greats shown by this firm thing to equal the goods shown by this firm. Messrs. Mals & Hutchinson, make a highly creditable display of Canadian woollens.

Messrs. Jno. McArthur & Son, this city, show a large collection of superior white lead and

paints of their own manufacture.

The well-known New Brunswick firm of Wm. Park & Son make a fine show of their cotton, yarns and warps, of various kinds and colors. Their goods were awarded first prizes in each department of the Toronto exhibition, and likewise merited first prizes here.

In the lower corner of the Eastern transent is situate the fine stand of Winning & Burch, who display in pyramid form all kinds of fruits, syrips, cordials, old Tom gin, ginger wines, bitters, brandies, etc. This firm sell the "veritable John Bitters," having changed the style of the label from that of "John Ball Bitters" to that above named, as for the past few years a spurious article labelled "John Bull Bitters" has been placed in the market. In this corner, on the same stand, Messrs. Gallagher & Gauthier exhibit their celebrated Benconsfield grapes growing on the vines; the progress by the fruit made during the time of the Exhibition was simply wonderful. No prize being given for this class, the judges found it necessary to label the exhibit "highly commanded". commended."

The display in the annexe of all kinds of brooms, brushes, &c., by H. A. Nelson & Sons, this city, attract constant attention, and call forth many commendatory remarks. A. J. Utley, this city, has here also a large glass case filled with factory and machine brushes of all kimis.

The Dominion Bolt Co. had a tastefully arranged exhibit of useful articles in the unnexe. Messrs. Frothingham & Workman exhibit an interesting variety of spades of every kind, from their factory, which for durability and utility would be difficult to excel. Crathern & Caverbill make a display in the main building also of all kinds of naits from their Union Nail

Morton, Phillips & Bulmer, Montreal, had an excellent display of book-binding, stationery, and specimens of printing.

Geo. Bishop & Co., of this city, excited the curiosity of numerous visitors by their fine execution of engraving, lithographing and plate-printing, for specimens of which they received 1st prizes.

Messrs. Ogilvy & Co., this city, make an elegant display of liquors, including the popular Encore whisky, in the Eastern transept. They received the 1st prize for distilled liquors. Immediately opposite, Chas. Gard & Co., this city, have a nicely arranged exhibit of temperance beverages.

Cooper, Fairman & Co., of this city, who are agents for the Dominion Barb Wire Fencing Co., exhibit their corrugated slove elbows, and have their enclosure fenced in by the Lyman Barb, the superior advantages of which are apparent to the most casual observer. It is intended to supersede the ordinary fences because of its imperishable and uninflammable nature, easy creetion and neat appearance. It is also a great protection. The Canadian Wire Co., represented by H. R. Ives, this city, also show the Burnell four-pointed barb steel wire fencing, claimed to be the best ann cheapest for farm and railway. Mr. Ives also exhibits Patt's patent smoothing irons.

Ascending the staircase in the south-west corner of the building, the first stall encountered is that occupied by the Williams' Sewing Machine Co. of Montreal. They exhibit the four different kinds of machines manufactured by them, viz., Improved half-cabinet, hand ma-chine, family, and medium. The next exhibit is that of Belding, Paul & Co., silk manufacturers, who present a splendid display of spool silk, silk fringes and tassels of every color and every degree of fineness. An object of curiosity to many is the collection of

cocoons which is exhibited.

At the mouth of the Eastern transept is Lyman, Sons & Co.'s exhibit of druggists' goods, chemicals, glassware, perfunes, etc., the whole of which makes up a splendid display. The special attraction, perhaps, is a Japanese temple, with a perfume fountain, from which a recumbent dragon scatters a delightful odour of the new Japanese scent "Fusi Yama"; another similar figure emits a fragrant stream of Florida water.

For want of space we are compelled to hold over further references for next week's issue. We hope to be able then to give more definite information regarding various prizes, against which so many protests have been entered, and to explain if possible the cause of numerous complaints of the want of efficiency and fair treatment on the part of the judges in several departments.

#### THE FAULKNER GUARANTEE CLAIM.

In the Court of Queen's Bench, this city, last Friday, judgment was rendered in the prolonged case of the Citizens Insurance Co., appellants, and the Grand Trunk Railway Co., respondents.

The case as cited was stated to be "an action by the Grand Trunk Railway Co. on a guarantee policy of insurance." The condition of the policy as claimed is that one Faulkner should honestly, diligently and faithfully discharge and transact the duties devolving upon him in his employment by the said company, plaintiffs; "and that he, the said David Faulkner, should faithfully account for and pay over to the said railway company all such money," &c., "he should receive for or from the said company." The breach is that Faulkner had received \$22,-489.65 of the money of the company, and that he had not faithfully accounted for or paid over any portion of said sum except \$412.65. The facts are that Faulkner drew the money from the Bank of Moutreal on the 22nd June, 1877, a little before 12 o'clock; that he carried the money in two bags to his office in Jacques Cartier Square, in a building used by plaintiff, and having occasion to go out to his lunch, he placed the two bags under his desk, locked the door of his room, and went out. When he re-turned in twenty minutes or half an hour after, he found the door unlocked; that the bag with the notes in it had been opened, and all the money, except a \$10 bill, which had fallen on the floor, had been carried off. The bag with the silver was untouched."

"The insurance company, appellants, contend that Faulkner has faithfully accounted for the whole money which was stolen in his absence, and that if there was any negligence it was on the party of the railway company, which did not provide him with the proper means of pre-serving the money entrusted to his care, and, consequently, that company defendant is not liable. It may at once be said that the company plaintiff has never alleged, and does not con-tend that Faulkner is guilty of dishonesty in the matter. His antecedents and his conduct at the time of the transaction repel any suspicion of the sort. But the policy warrants his diligence and fidelity. Did he use all the care a man dealing with so large a sum of money ought to have used? Could he have taken greater presentions under the circumstances? It seems to us he did not exercise common prudence in leaving this large sum of money under the table, in what may almost be called an open room, for it was a badly fastened door on a common stair without any guardian, and leaving the building. Again, we find and leaving the building. Again, we find nothing to show that the Grand Trunk Railway Company, by its arrangements, either ordered or sanctioned such a proceeding. It evidently was not necessary. He could have evidently was not necessary. He could have placed the money in the vanit down stairs, if he had liked,—he could easily have placed it in the galvanized from box,—he need not have drawn it from the Bank till after his lunch, and above all he might have sent out for his lunch, or done without it. He was, therefore, guilty of negligence, and we think the judgment should be confirmed." This was the unanimous judgment of the Court.

The Citizens Insurance Co. intend appealing

the case to the Privy Council.

THE Rev. Adirondack Murray, of Buck Board celebrity, has been keeping away from his creditors for some time, but he has not been altogether idle, as the following remarks applicable to Canada as well as the United States will show. Speaking of Liverpool and London he says: "The milling interest ought to send a trustworthy and intelligent agent there to con-fer with large buyers and bakers, not with brokers. Then let American millers ship flour in bags of such a size as the English bakers want. Let them no longer ship grain. Let the milling be done in America. English bakers concede the fact that our flour is equal to that concede the fact that our flour is equal to that from Trieste, their favorite. Now, England has to buy our grain. If we ship it in the family flour, and have agents in England to attend to the sale, our own millers will at once have a market for double the capacity of their wheat. This is not exclusively my discovery. Some millers are shipping flour there, and English millers, foreseeing the inevitable, are emigrating to America to seek their fortune here. As to meats, what's the reason we should export green hams that are sold after they are cured in England for double the price the American exporter gres? Why give England a profit that is rightfully our own? Why sell for a mere song meats that have a slight mint when chemistry will restore the sweetness? An English chemist imparted that secret to me, and I learned also the English secret of curing hams. England has come to understand that the American apple is the best fruit that she imports, and now all that is needed is an American connection through which the producers may reach the consumer without the intervention of English brokers, and our producers may realize vast profits from their apples." Mr. Murray also speaks of the necessity for an international law requiring perfect ventification in cattle-ships, and of the fitting of the Great Eastern and another leviathan for the American cattle trade,

AN IMPORTANT SUIT, involving a claim of several millions of dollars' worth of stock in the St. Paul, Minneapolis & Manitoba Railway Company, was decided by the Supreme Court recently. More than a year ago J. P. Farley, Receiver of the St. Paul & Pacific Road, brought sectors of the St. Panl, Minneapolis & Manitoha Company, J. J. Hill and N. W. Kittson, Directors, for the possession of one-lifth of the Company. The St. Paul, Minneapolis & Manitoba is successor to the St. Paul & Pacific, and was reorganized by Hill and Kittson, in company with Messrs. Geo. Stephen, R. B. Angus and other Montreal capitalists, who furnished the money. The enterprise has been enormously prolitable. Before the Canadian plan was conceived Farley, Hill and Kittson contrived a plan for the reor and and kittson contrived a plan for the reorganization of a road similar to that afterward carried out. There was difficulty in obtaining money for the execution of this plan, however, and while it was pending, Hill and Kittson found the Canadian party who would put money in the scheme, only on condition of their the Farley plun was dropped, and he with it, and the Company formed and organized the road with the money of the Montreal party. Farley then sued for one-fifth of the stock in the new company on the ground that he was one of the originators of the plan which made the stock valuable. The Supreme Court now decides, that, though Farley had a right to a share in the fruits of the original scheme, Hill and Kittson could not justly abandon him and place themselves in competition with that scheme so long as there was a reasonable chance of its success; yet that its abolition through the failure to borrow money for its execution of any of the parties to the contract left them free to enter an arrangement with any one else. This is what Hill and Kittson did with Stephen and Smith. The Court decided that this act was proven and legal, and that Furley had no right to object to it, and no claim of interest in the profits of the arrangement. This takes a serious embarrassment out of the path of the

A Petenbord' correspondent writes: The quiet of summer is being succeeded by considerable activity in business circles. The harvest in this section has been fair, if not bountful, and the prices obtained are good. Grain is being brought to market in considerable quantities, and as money is becoming more plentiful the effect is being felt by the merchants. The dry goods and clothing houses are in full swing, and groceries and hardware are also doing a good business. A new firm of young men opened out in groceries and crockery in the early part of this month. Cameron & McBain, also young men, open out on Saturday next with a stock of dry goods and clothing, with good prospects, Cameron having been for some years cutter for T. Dolan & Co., and a practical

business man. Great improvements have been made in the business part of the town by the introduction of an almost continuous line of plate glass windows in the shops on George street, which give a fine appearance to the street, and enable merchants to display their waters to advantage. Several buildings have had handsome mansard roofs put on, adding greatly to the general appearance of the street. The lumber trade is likely to be active the coming senson as the result of the re-entincrease in prices. The repeal of the lusoivent Law seems to produce little effect here beyond making merchants more careful. Lamour's case was about the only one in which pressure was employed, and he appears, notwithstanding all, to be doing a flourishing business. There is less heard now than in the spring of the exotus to Manitoba. A favorable summer has had the effect of causing greater contentment.

A Pembroke, Ont., correspondent states that the best proof of improved times for the lumber trade that has yet been afforded is the sale by Messrs. McAllister & McLean, of that town, of their timber limit on the Petewawa River. This limit was bought two years ago from William Mohr for \$45,000; and in the seasons of 1870 and 1880 netted the owners upwards of \$160,000, from sales of saw logs and square timber ent thereon. It has now been sold to James McLaren, McClymont & Co., of Ottawa for \$132,500. The sale includes some \$12,000 worth of plant, leaving the price of the limit at \$120,000 and over. The license covers about 120 sq. miles, a considerable portion of which is burned over. Mr. McCean, one of the ventors, retains a one-third interest as a portion of his share of the purchase money, and will shortly open an office in Pembroke.

The council of the town of Chatham, Ont., is submitting a by-law to the ratepayers for the granting of a bonus for the building of vessels at that port. The bonus is a sort of sliding scale, being \$1 per ton for sailing scows over 50 tons, \$1.50 for sailing vessels, and \$2.50 per ton for steamers, if the machinery is built at Chatham Chatham is a port affording extra facilities for ship building, being in the midst of a good timber district, and a point where there is a first-class mill making a specialty of cutting ship timber.

The crops in Eastern Nova Scotia have been pretty well secured. Wheat is above the average; oats light; potatoes, on account of the recent long continued dry weather, will not turn out so well as was anticipated. On the other hand, the cod fishery on the Scuth-eastern Coast has been more than ordinarily successful. Considerable excitement has been occasioned in Gaysborough County on account of the discovery of silver mines, which are said to show some very rich specimens of ore, and a large number of prospecting and working licenses have been taken out in the western sections of that county.

The number of ocean vessels arriving at this port from the opening of navigation to date, is 514, against 424 for the corresponding period last year, showing an increase of 90 vessels. The departures during the same time were 458, against 379 last year—an increase of 79 vessels.

The Customs authorities in the United States have returned to Mrs. Harmburger the goods seized some time since from her at the frontier, and accepted the duty thereon, amounting to \$45, and not \$600 as stated in the despatches to the daily press. The duty was paid upon Seltzer Water, a few half bottles of liquors and unmade gods.

### Linearial and Commercial.

GENERAL MARKETS.
THURSDAY Sept. 23, 1880.

The Fall business is progressingisatisfactorily. and the experience in this market during the past week has in most instances been equal to expectations. The Dominion Exhibition attracted a larger crowd to the city than has been witnes, ed here at one time for many years. and trade, both wholesale and retail, more especially the latter, has derived considerable impulse from the presence of so many visitors. The business week was broken by the formal opening of the Great Exhibition by the Governor General on last Tuesday, which was observed as a holiday by many of the large business men, who closed up to allow their employees to witness the sights; the numerous attractions of the Citizens' Committee programme has also tended to interrupt business, but the general country store-keeper was here from every part of our glorious Dominion. Our reporter could trace him in nearly every warehouse he has entered during the past two days. His purchases were not large, but they spread over a great variety of branches of commerce. This sorting-up trade constitutes the leading feature, perhaps, of the week's business. The export movement of farm and dairy produce is slow as yet, but will likely become more active as the season advances, and the home and foreign markets work more harmoniously.

The local financial position has not undergone any noteworthy change during the week. There is an increased confidence in the future, but no materially increased demand as yet for accommodation, which is offered so freely and at such reasonable rates by the banks. The demand usual at this season for money to move the crops has not yet begun to make itself felt, and rates of discount, therefore, have not been affected, still ranging from 6 to 7 per cent. for commercial paper, as to name and date, an exception being made in favor of prime short Call and short dated loans on good collaterals are made at 3 to 4 and time loans at 4 to 5 per cent., as to circumstances Sterling Exchange rules dull at 81 to 81 prem. for round amounts, and 81 to 84 do cash over the counter. Drafts on New York are drawn at 1-16 to 1 prem. The share market has been developing more strength since our last reference, and an average advance of 2 per cent, has been gained for all the leading speculative securities. Among the minor class, we notice that the Cornwall Cotton Cos', stock is partaking of the general improvements; shares of the company which were offered last fall at 10 to 121 are now wanted at 90, and are still 'advancing'; 50 shares changed hands the other day at 90 per cent., and \$10,000 of the Company's bonds sold to-day at par. The opinion was expressed that after the immense rise of last month some reaction was inevitable; but with prosperity and cheap money during the coming winter, which are almost absolute certainties and with banks and loan societies reducing their rates of interest, the demand cannot fail to be sufficiently strong to sustain prices. During the present week only one session per day

FLOUR AND GRAIN.-The imports of breadstuffs into the United Kingdom during the past week show a decrease of 20,000 quarters of wheat, 50,000 quarters of corn and 25,000 bbls. of flour. The amount of breadstuffs now on passage to the Continent is less than that of a week ago by 100,000 quarters of wheat and 40,000 quarters of corn. The receipts of wheat in Chicago have been gradually increasing during the week, until yesterlay 150,000 bushels was reported, and the market sold down to 92‡c. October, and 92%c. November, closing at 92%c. October and 93c. November. There is still an impression 93c. November. among the trade in the West that the famous Keene has gone into the wheat deal again this year. Corn is also reported lower in Chicago, year. Corn is also reported lower in Chicago, at about 40c. October, and 4ic. November. In the local grain market there seems to be no transactions of importance taking place. Yesterday a few cars of No. 2 Canada spring wheat changed hands at \$1.17 and \$1.10 was bid for a lot of No. 2 Canada red winter to arrive, but the seller refused to set a price upon it. A carro of No. 2 Toledo set a price upon it. A cargo of No. 2 Toledo red winter was offered at \$1.07\frac{1}{2}\$ and a cargo of No. 1 white Michigan at \$1.08. Corn is easier and lower, being offered to arrive at 52c. Pease are steady at 85c to 86c in cargo lots to arrive, but it is believed that prices will recede. A lot of 100,000 bushels was offered yesterday at 80c or 100,000 oushels was offered yesterday at 80c for delivery between October 5th and November 12th, sellers' option. Rye is quoted at 85c in cargo lots and 824c in cars. Barley is steady at 65c to 70c. In seeds there is no charge; Timothy is still quoted at \$2.80 to \$2.85, and clover at \$4.75 to \$5, as to size of lot. The demand for flour in this market is very quiet and prices rule steady and but very quiet, and prices rule steady, and but slightly changed, in buyers' favor, since the date of our last report. Superior Extra has sold in small lots at \$5.25, Extra at \$5.174, Strong Bakers' at \$6.25, and medium at \$5.60. Outmeat is rather easier; sales reported at \$4.30.

GROCERIES.—Sugars. Granulated is 4c lower, say 10c to 10½c. Yellow Refined Sugars are in active request and show little change. In Raw Sugars, there is a moderate business about previous figures. Market is, however, not active for such, and easier abrond. Teas.—Japanese Cables give for good medium grades at late date \$526 to \$27 the picul. We have had two auction sales since last report, one to-day and one Saturday last. About 1500 pkgs Teas sold at on the whole fair prices for the position of market and qualities offered. Young Hysons, Twankay and Imperial brought full values. Molasses.—A considerable operation on the way of concentrating Barbadoes is reported. The whole is held 47½c to 50c. Syrups steady. Rice, Caffees, quiet. Spices.—Quite tirm for Pepper, Pimento and Cloves. Fruits.—Opening prices for Malaga Fruitreported very high, and Valentias are

a little higher than at opening of market. Figs at Smyran were at extreme figures, and Sark at Malaga at late mail reports was then about nothing. Currants steady for good quality.

LUMBER.—There is no new feature in the lumber market. Immense quantities are being shipped from the mills, which is principally for the States. As this season's manufacture is almost all disposed of, there is no change of prices to note. Never before were such preparations made to get out logs and timber, which may result in an over production unless the season should be unfavorable. The cost of getting logs will be at least one-fifth more than lust season. Retail trade in this city is all upset, owing to the excitement of the Exhibition, &c. Advices from the Upper Ottawa report incusually heavy preparations for getting out logs the coming season, and high wages to shanty men consequently prevail. In St. John, N.B., the price of lumber has greatly advanced within the last two weeks. On Aug. 1st, deals, which were selling at S8.50 per thousand, were advanced by the middle of the month to S0.25, from which they have gradually increased in price till now they stand at \$11.

Ohs.—There is a much healthier tone in the market this week owing to the fact that all lots which have been offering are either bought up or held by good dealers who are not disposed to sell unless they obtain full prices. Linseed oil and cod oil have each advanced about 2½c in value during the week; raw linseed now quoted at 72c and boiled at 75c Imperial gal, and cod oil is worth 60c Imp. gal. Refined Petroleum has again advanced, and we quote to-day, subject to fluctuations of market, 25c per Imp. gal. F. O. B. at Petrolia. Car lots here, 29½c; small lots, 3½c to 3½c.

Boots and Shoes.—Dealers report a good many cal s from customers during the week, and some from the Lower Provinces who have never been in Montreal before have visited the warehouses within the last few days. The result is a fair sorting up trade, but business has not continued as active as at last reference, and expectations have scarcely been realized. The factories are all still very busy closing up back orders in hand. Fall parcels have been for the most part shipped, and as it is yet too early for repeat orders, no large sales are expected to be made until after the travellers stare out on their sorting up trip, during next month. Payments so far this month have been very fair, and show an improvement over several previous months in this respect. No change in prices expected until spring samples are sent out in December.

Cattle.—The market on Monday last was somewhat overcrowded, and consequently a number of animals remained unsold. Choice stock, however, was readily disposed of at prices ranging from 4½ to 5½ per 1b the decline being in those of an inferior grade, which were offered at from 2½ to 4c. Sheep and lambs were also numerous; the former is worth from S5 to S6 each, and the latter from \$2.75 to \$3 25. Prices of logs range from \$5.50 to \$6 per cwt. The Allan steamer Buenos Ayrean, for Glasgow, left port this morning with 450 head of cattle, and at Quebec she will take on board 132 more, making in all 582 head.

DARKY PRODUCE.—The local Butter market has remained quiet and flat all week, with scarcely any movement on export account. The stock offering here cost holders high prices, and they are loth to part with it at losing figures, which shippers' bids are considered to be. If the present dullness continues another week farmers will probably become anxious to sell, in which case lower prices would certainly follow. Exporters are now merely forwarding goods on consignment, and it is very difficult to quote reliable figures, as there is a wide differ-

ence even in the asking prices of holders. Within the past three weeks there has been a decline of 2c to 3c per lb. in this market, and it is not likely that over 23c would be paid for selected townships to-day. We hear of a lot of 350 packages of fine Morrisburg dairy having changed hands yesterday at 21c, and of another sale of 200 tubs of fine creamery at 26c. In our list of prices current, we endeavor to give the rates obtainable. In New York on Tuesday, the local demand exhausted all the gill-edge of-ferings. On the bulk of the stock, business is slow and price barely sustained. On State dairies entire, 27c is quoted by the majority of receivers, and the movement is by no means free at this. Western stock in little request. The held lots of June stock can be reached at The head fols of Jime stock can be reached at 20c, but are not in favor, and current make also drugs at the prices asked, though at 16 to 17c buyers might be found among packers and Continental shippers. Advices indicate that supplies are held very firmly. The cheese market rules called and stready at law world. market rules quiet and steady, at last week's quotations, and no transactions of any moment have been reported within the week. Factory men are still holding the first half of September make at 13c, and dealers here are asking 124 to 13e for finest, but 12te is the highest bid from shippers. The public Liverpool cable is now shippers. quoted at 64s.

Day Goods.—Trade has continued good on the whole, some houses being busier than others, but all report numerous country customers in the market, as the result of the cheap excursions and Dominion Exhibition. Purchases, however, have been uniformly small, as these retail dealers report that the full trade in the country has not yet been fully opened, owing chiefly to farmers not having marketed much of their grain. Several of our dealers state that they have already sold 25 per cent more goods this year than last, and meanwhile orders are merely for sorting-up parcels of fall and winter wear. Remittances continue satisfactory. The wincey question has been settled for the time being by a letter from the Department of Customs at Ottawa, returning the samples forwarded by the Dry Goods Association, and instructing the officers here to charge the additional duty of 7½ per lb only on Aberdeen winceys, or such goods as contain part wool.

Fish—The influx of visitors to the city is reported to have stimulated trade in this commodity, and rather lively business has been done during the past few days; sales, however, comprising only small lots, at for No. 1 split herrings, \$5 per barret: Dry God Fish, \$4.25 to \$4.50; Salmon, \$19, \$18 and \$17 respectively for Nos 1, 2 and 3; Mackerel, \$6 and \$5 for Nos. 2 and 3 respectively. Green cod has advanced 56e within the last few days and may be quoted at \$4.56 for No. 1, and about \$3.00 for No. 2 with shading of these prices for large lots.

FREIGHTS—Continue rather dull; there is almost any amount of space available, and contracts for heavy grain may be made at 3s. 3d. to 3s. 9s. per quarter by steamer to direct ports in Great Britain, and at 4s. to 4s. 6d. to outports. Flour in sacks, 20s. to 22s. per ton to London, Liverpool and Glasgow.

FRUITS.—Receipts of Apples during the week have been heavy; about 1,000 brls arrived from the West yesterday, and the demand continues good at quotations, which are for choice Fall apples, \$1.50 to \$1.00, and for damaged fruit, from 75c to \$1. The bulk of the stock receives has been inferior, and sold at from \$1 to \$1.25 per barrel. Peaches.—Receipts yesterday were about 500 baskets; Cling Stones sold at 75c, and Free Stones at \$1.25. Pears are much more plentiful, and under a good demand are selling at \$5 to \$6 per brl; the offerings are quite large. The season is over for Bartletts. Grapes are very scarce during the past three days; Concords worth 5c; Delawares, 6c, and Rogers, 7c per 15

No plums in the market. Lemons very scarce at \$6 per box. The first shipment of sweet Havana Oranges are expected to arrive here on Saturday next.

Funs .- Trade for the past week is reported rather active; a large number of buyers, attracted to the city by the Dominion Exhibition and cheap excursions, have been selecting their fall and winter stocks of manufactured fors. hats, etc. A few bought largely, but purchases music generally light, sufficient to meet requirements until the visit of travellers on their sorting-up trip in November. The manufacturers here are all very busy filling the balance of fall orders for firs, the majority of which are usually shipped between the 15th September and 1st November. It is too early yet for any report of raw furs, as the skins are not expected to come forward until late in November, about the time of the commencement of cold weather. Remittances good.

HARDWARE AND IRON.-The wholesale houses have been very busy since our last reference. Visitors to the Exhibition have been purchasing small sorting-up parcels of all kinds of general hardware, and this, together with the orders now being received from travellers in the west, has imparted fresh life and activity for the moment; one or two houses actually reported that they were behind with their orders. No speculative sales, however, are to be noted, specimentee sates, however, are to be noted, the demand being fuir and legitimate, with remittances reported first-class. Prices are still maintained at hist week's quotations, but the fact of heavy goods being laid down in Western Canadian cities by the steamship and resilvers communic almost as adventions in railway companies almost as cheaply as in Montreal places importers here at a disadvantage in having to meet the western competition, consequently the upward movement in values is necessarily slower than it otherwise might be. Bar Iron is reported in active demand, as western manufacturers are now laying in their winter supplies, and one or two large lots have changed hands at quotations. In Pig Iron there is very little doing here as yet, but lower prices in New York have somewhat affected this market, and sales of round lots could not now be made except at a reduction.

HIDES AND SKINS .- Receipts of green hides in this market continue very fair, and prices are nominally unchanged. The demand continues fully equal to the supply, and the local tanner frequently referred to in these columns continues to offer 50c, per cwt. more to butchers continues to oner soc. per cwt. more to butchers than other dealers, and to a select few he pays even 11c. per lb.; yet he admits that he has had to relinquish a number of butchers, who have gone to other dealers, or pay 11c. all round, which he refuses to do. He complains that he will lose 50 to 75 hides this week, on account of the butchers preferring to sell to dealers who inspect their own hides instead of paying the Government Inspector, as prescribed by law. The offerings of sheepskins continue fairly large, but all are wanted, at firm prices, ranging from 85c. to \$1, according to size and

LEATHER .- Trade during the past week has been rather disappointing to dealers, who expected increased activity but found it not. The demand from shoe manufacturers has fallen off somewhat, and sales have been for the most part of a retail character. A good many country merchants have been in the market, but their purchases were confined to small lots of sole loather, culfskins and harness. It is believed that the shoe manufacturers are holding back until the sorting-up demand commences to be felt more effectually, when they will undoubtedly be compelled to stock Prices remain firm and unchanged. Remittances continue good.

PROVISIONS. - Business has been fairly active during the week. Mess Pork has been moving

off freely at former quotations, and the market rules very firm. Lard is quiet and steady at 12c to 12le for Fuirbanks'; two lots of 600 pails were sold yesterday at 12c. Eggs have been rather more active this week, and prices have advanced 12c to 2c, being now quoted at 13c to 14c; the market to-day rules steady. Hams.— Stocks held here very light indeed, and the demand is only small. Sales to the local trade are reported at 12½c to 13c, for Canada Smoked. American Canvassed are very scarce and high, quoted at 133c to 14c. The larger retail grocers sell at these prices, but they are regarded as being too high for consumers generally.

Salt-Has been in moderate request in this market during the week, but the season is now well advanced, consequently the amount of business done is not as large as for some previous weeks. Prices are somewhat lower, Livernool course being now quoted at 53c. and 55c. for elevens and tens, respectively; and factory falled at 90c. to \$1 per bag. Eureka still worth

Wines and Liquous .- The market at time of writing is quiet, although merchants have had a busy week filling small orders for numerous country store keepers. No large transactions have been heard of in this market for some time, and quotations remain unchanged. A trade sale held here to-day was well attended, and satisfactory prices were realized.

Woot.-The home market continues without animation, and the few sales that are made here are within a small compass and at unchanged quotations. Canada pulled is quoted at 30c to 32c. In foreign wools there is no movement whatever reported, but buyers claim to have the best of the situation, and a change in prices is expected to take effect shortly. A report of the New York market says: "Business has not been very active thus far this week, and the general market appears to have undergone little or no change, with few features worthy of note. The increased unimation at Boston last week is reflected here in a showing of somewhat greater firmness among holders, and possibly a more careful offering on the part of a few who were previously rather inclined to push business, the market showing a somewhat tendier tone than early in the month. Manufacturers, however, have scarcely been represented in sufficient numbers to infuse any great amount of animation, and the stronger hope of business to come is the principal gain made. It is likely that the want of a full assortment in the hands of our dealers may tend in a measure to keep buyers away to some extent, but whether the possibility of finding sale will bring in larger quantities remains to be seen. As for some time past, carpet wools rule quite strong, in view of the small supply here and small additions expected for some time to come. Country holders of all kinds of stock remain tirm and confident.
