




# Winter Carnival

---

## PROGRAM

**T**HE SIXTEENTH ANNUAL ROSSLAND WINTER CARNIVAL commences on MONDAY EVENING, FEB. 3rd, 1913, with a GRAND MASQUERADE CARNIVAL in the Skating and Curling Rink, and ends on FRIDAY EVENING, FEB. 7th, with the presentation of prizes by His Worship, the Mayor.

The ANNUAL RE-UNION of the OLD-TIMERS' ASSOCIATION takes place on SATURDAY, the 8th of FEBRUARY, with a Matinee in the afternoon and a Smoking Concert in the evening, and all who can stay over should take advantage of the fine programme which will be put on.

The events are under the auspices of the Rossland Citizens' Carnival Committee.

The Rossland City Band, of twenty-three pieces, under Bandmaster C. J. Miles, will furnish music for the Masquerade and throughout the Carnival.

Wednesday and Friday Afternoons, February 5 and 7, have been declared Civic Half Holidays by His Worship, Mayor Deschamps. Tuesday afternoon, being Children's Day, the children will be relieved from school duties, and will be admitted to the rink free.

The Championship Events, for which the prizes are medals are: Ski Running and Ski Jumping for the Championship of Canada; Hockey—Senior and Intermediate for the Championship of British Columbia, as well as a Open Challenge Cup Tournament, in which teams representing British Columbia, Washington, U.S.A., and Western United States, can compete; Skating Race (one mile) for the Championship of British Columbia.

The Curling Bonspiel will consist of four competitions, and will be in charge of a bonspiel committee, who are members of the Rossland Curling Club.

## R U L E S

---

---

All Hockey Games are under the Manitoba Rules.

Referees and Judges of Play will be chosen by the teams competing, such choice to be made before 12 o'clock noon of the day on which afternoon games are to be played, and 4 p.m. for the evening games; otherwise the Carnival Committee will choose the same.

All teams to be on the ice five minutes before the advertised time of the game.

The drawings for Hockey Games will take place at Hunt & Patterson's Cigar Store, on Monday, February 3rd, on the arrival of the C.P.R. night train, which is due at 10:20, and a list of players on each team must be handed in before the drawing takes place.

Entries close for all Horse racing events at 11 p.m. on Monday, 3rd February.

Any horse winning a prize in the Free-for-all on Tuesday is not entitled to run in the Pony Race.

Ponies must be  $14\frac{1}{2}$  hands high or under.

The Entrance Fee in Horse and Pony Races is \$2.50.

In each Ski Event there must be two starters to each prize.

Only Accepted Fancy Costumes will be allowed on the rink at the Masquerade, between 8 and 9 p.m.

The decision of the President and officials in charge of the different events are binding and final in all cases.

Percy Hunt, of the Music Committee, has been placed in full charge of the band.





## **TROPHIES**

---

Many handsome and artistic trophies, emblematic of Provincial and Canadian Championships, presented by lovers of amateur sport, have been won outright by the prowess of the Hockey Players, Ski Runners and Jumpers, Snowshoers, Skaters and Experts at other winter sports during the fifteen Rossland Winter Carnivals, the first of which was held in 1898, and have been continued every year since without a break.

The Trophies offered for competition at the "Sixteenth Annual," which are supported by individual prizes that become the property of the winners, and for which the competition will be keener than ever this year, are shown below.

### **THE GIANT POWDER SHIELD.**

Presented by the Giant Powder Co., Com., is emblematic of the Hockey Championship of British Columbia, and is presented by the Giant Powder Co. to take the place of the Giant Powder Cup, won outright by the Rossland Hockey Team four years ago. It will be supported by individual Gold Medals each year. The Shield is now held by the Greenwood Hockey Team. According to terms of gift from the Giant Powder Co., this Shield must be played for in Rossland, and remains the property of the Rossland Carnival Association.

### **THE FRASER CUP.**

Presented by Mr. J. S. C. Fraser, the Manager of the Bank of Montreal, at Victoria, is for competition in the Open Hockey Tournament, and is emblematic of the Hockey Championship of the West. Any Senior Amateur Hockey team is allowed to compete. The cup remains the property of the Carnival Association, but is supported by individual Gold Medals each year. Greenwood holds the Cup at present.

### **THE JELDNESS CUP.**

Presented by Mr. Olaus Jeldness, of Spokane, a past Grand Master at Ski Running and Jumping, is emblematic of the Ski Jumping Championship of Canada. It is held by the winner one year, remaining the property of the Carnival Association, and is supported each year by gold and silver medals. This is one of the handsomest trophies ever offered for an amateur event.

## **SPECIALS FOR 1913**

---

---

The cash prizes for the Horse and Pony Races have been increased from **\$150** to **\$250**, the Consolation Race not being included.

For the first time a Professional Ski Jump has been instituted, with cash prizes of \$50.00 and \$20.00. Free for all. This is separate from the Championship of Canada Jump.

The Toboggan Slide has been elected on Columbia Avenue, starting at Butte Street, so that ladies and children may enjoy the sport without the danger of a steep slide, like the famous "Zip."
