

OF THE

BRITISH COLUMBIA CONFERENCE

OF

THE METHODIST CHURCH,

HELD IN THE CITY OF VICTORIA, B.C., FROM MAY 15TH TO 20TH, 1889.

The Conference begar its THIRD SESSION on Wednesday, May 15th, 1889, at 9 o'clock a.m., in Wesley Church, Victoria, Rev. EBENEZER ROBSON, President of the Conference, in the chair.

After singing, the Secret .ry, Rev. JOSEPH HALL, read 1 Peter i., and the Rev. T. W. HALL and T. G. RAYNER, Esq., led the Conference in prayer.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your Committee regret that so little substantial advancement in the better observance of the Sabbath has been made in this Province since the close of the last Conference. There is still wide-spread descration of the Holy Day. Passenger, freight, and excursion trains continue to run. There are excursions by steam-boats and stages; saloons, cigar and fruit stands, and confectionery shops are open; various games are played; newspapers are published; freight is landed; fishing and hunting parties are organized—all regardless of the claims of the Word of God, or tha feelings of the Christian people in the land.

We deeply deplore the fact that our Legislature has not passed any effective laws by which this open and continuous profanation of the Sabbath-day may be prevented, and we hereby submit for adoption by this

Conference the following resolutions:

1. That a committee, consisting of the ministers of Vancouver, East Vancouver, and New Westminister, be appointed, to draft a petition for circulation among our people throughout the Province, setting forth our views as a Church in reference to the nature and observance of the day, and petitioning for direct legislation on the matter at the next session of the Local Legislature.

2. That a sermon be preached on this subject by all our ministers in this Conference during the month of June.

3. That special attention be given to the training of our children in the proper observance of the day, and that we supply them with sound religious literature, bearing on this important subject.

4. That as the social visiting practised in many places on the Lord's Day is a great evil, we recommed that a clause be inserted in the Pastoral Addresses calling the attention of our people to it.

5. That the holding of public funerals on this day, so seriously interfering with the stated means of grace, be discouraged among us, except in cases where interment cannot be postponed.

6. That we bear in mind the Divine injunction, "Remember the Sabbath-day, to keep it holy;" and that we seek to secure united action on the part of all the Churches of this Province in securing the better observance of the Lord's Day.

THE REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Missions report as follows :-

I. Indian Missions.

 Bro. Tate having applied for an assistant, to labor between Popcum and Hope, we recommend that the application be referred to the Chairman of the District, and Bro. Tate to arrange the same with the Missionary Committee.

2. Simpson District.—Having considered the resolutions of the Simpson District Meeting, re The Boys' Industrial Institute, we regret that owing to the inelliciency of the Principal of the Boys' Industrial Institute, and to his misunderstanding certain letters received from the Ex-President and General Secretary of the Central Board of Missions, the erection of the Boys' Industrial iTome has not been proceeded with, and we would recommend that the name of Rev. G. F. Hopkins be substituted for that of Rev. D. Jennings, as one of the Board of Managers; and that the erection of the Boys' Industrial Institute be proceeded with on the terms of the report adopted at our last Conference.

3. Re the Application for a Medical Missionary.—We recommend the Conference to urge the Missionary Committee to take this matter into its earnest consideration.

4. Re Steamer "Glad-Tidings."—Whereas, the legal transfer of the Glad-Tidings to the Methodist Church has been at length completed; and whereas, in the past this steam-boat has been running short-handed, necessitating the Chairman of the Simpson District taking the place of a common sailor; therefore, we ask the Conference to recommend the General Board of Missions to make provision for meeting the expenses of providing a captain and a crew of three men to manage the Mission steamer.

5. Re Girls' Home, Port Simpson—An encouraging report was received from the Girls' Home at Port Simpson, and, from representations made, we recommend to the Woman's Missionary Society, the erection of a new building for this Institution at as early a date as possible.

6. Te Indian Title.—In response to a resolution from the Simpson District Meeting, representing the neglect of the Government to arrange an equitable settlement with the Indians, or to carry and the promises made by the Commissioners in October, 1887. We regret the fact of such neglect, and recommend that this Conference re-aftirm the position taken last year, and pledge itself in every legitimate way to help the Indians of the Province of British Columbia, to secure their just rights and the redress of their grievances.

In connection with the above, we recommend that a committee be appointed, consisting of the President of the Conference, the Secretary of the Conference, with the Rev. J. E. Starr, and Messrs. J. E. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee recognize the grave position of the emperance cause at the present time, and the importance of a clear, strong, and emphatic deliverance on this question, and of earnest effort in every part of our work for its advancement and success.

2. We rejoice that the work in this Conference is steadily advancing, that the membership of the different Temperance organizations is increasing all along the line, and never has the Temperance outlook been as bright as at the present. We cannot allow this opportunity to pass without recording our appreciation of the good work which is being done by the 1. O. G. T., and the W. C. T. U., in reaching the children and training them in Christian principles.

3. We deplore the defeat of the Scott Act in so many places in the Eastern Provinces, yet we are firmly of the opinion, that there is not a real weakening of the Temperance movement, but a conviction manifested that the non-enforcement of the Act makes necessary a general effort for the Total Prohibition of the liquor traffic throughout the Dominion.

4. Resolved,—That we, the ministers and laity of the Conference, solemnly pledge ourselves to oppose, by all constitutional methods, any government, political party, or individual member of Parliament, who shall, directly or indirectly, oppose prohibitiory legislation.

5. Resolved,—That, as the ultimate power of the people to influence the Legislature, is found in the ballot box, we declare our purpose by the pulpit, by the press, and by every legitimate means, to inculcate the responsibility of all Christian men and good citizens, to subordinate political party alliances, to the great work of securing the abolition of the accursed liquor traffic.

6. Your Committee deplore the way in which the Sabbath is desecrated through the drink traffic, and would urge upon the licensing commissioners and city councils, that action be taken to close the saloons from seven o'clock on Saturday night, to six o'clock on Monday morning, as well as all other places of business.

7. We would also call the attention of the proper authorities to the way the law is violated by the steam-boats, for liquor is sold at the landings, for which they have no license, and great trouble and annoyance is the consequence, and we strongly urge upon those authorities, that more stringent means be taken to stop this evil.

We also lament the fact, that notwithstanding the stringent Indian liquor law now in force, the Indians are able to procure large quantities of

liquor, in various parts of the country, thus entailing much suffering and trouble in many ways.

8. Your Committee recommend that a strong prohibition paragraph be inserted in the pastoral address to our societies, and that our ministers be advised to keep this subject of prohibition prominently before their congregations.

9. God is on our side; right shall triumph over selfishness and party interests; the great incubus of this ungodly traffic must be removed from the commerce of our nation, and thus the stream of social and national life be purified.

We pledge ourselves to this end, and must wage this great conflict until the monster vice of intemperance is consigned to eternal oblivion.

paid, with eived their I am sorry, however, to say that quite a number of our most poorly paid ministers have been compelled to make up deficiences which should have been paid by their Circuits; but so willingly has this been done, in obedience to the law of the Church, that in very few instances have I heard any complaint.

The estimates for the coming year have been very carefully made, and I venture, with some hesitation, to recommend that the percentage be no higher than 6%, the same as last year, although that may leave a small

deficiency against the Fund.

The coming year will be a trying one, arising from several causes. The amount of assessable income has not materially increased. The number of additional claimants is greater than usual, and their claims exceptionally heavy. There will probably be a falling off in the Interest account, as we will have to make a change in the securities of a considerable amount of our Investments, and the interest has been very closely collected.

The above is the Treasurer's Report, as adopted by the Board.

OBITUARY.

REV. R. B. HEMLAW.

Rev. Robert Bruce Hemlaw was born at Liscombe Harbor. Nova Scotia, on

March 11, 1855, and died at Chilliwhack, B.C., on May 1st, 1889.
He was converted to God at St. Johns, N.B., from which place he went to Newfoundland, and was engaged for some time as school teacher in Bona There he entered upon the work of the Christian ministry, in response to the call of the Master, and was appointed to a mission in Bona Vista Bay. On this, his first field of labor, he was eminently successful in leading sinners to Christ, many of whom remain as the fruit of his labors. In the year 1882 he was transferred from the Newfoundland to the Toronto Conference, and was appointed to the Nicola and Kamloops Mission, in the British Columbia

District. Throughout that widespread field he was faithful in dealing with the individual, as well as in preaching Christ to the small congregation wherever a few could be got together, sometimes in private houses, at other times in the bar-rooms of hotels. The people learned to love him for his faithfulness, and to the present his name is as ointment poured forth. His next station was Langley, where he spent a year in faithful toil. At the close of the year he was united in marriage to Miss Wells, the daughter of A. C. Wells, Esq., of Chilliwhack, and was stationed at Maple Bay, I., where, with the assistance of his estimable wife, he labored faithfully for the Master for two years. His last appointment was Maple Ridge, on the Fraser. On this field he was in labors more abundant, preaching two or three times every Sabbath, and overexerting himself during the week in the erection of a new parsonage. His energy far exceeded the strength of his constitution and he undoubtedly hastened his end by excessive manual labor, coupled with anxiety for the welfare of his work. He was seized with an attack of pleurisy, which he considered of little importance, and kept on with his work until he was compelled to seek medical advice, when the doctor at once directed him to rest for at least six months. Courses of medicine, change of climate, and careful nursing were all tried, but in vain, although at times his case seemed more hopeful. He became unconscious six days before his death, and in that state passed away to the Father's house above. It seems hard to realize that a life which promised so much of usefulness in the cause of Christ should terminate e'er the zenith was reached. He had for some time been laying plans for the improvement of his mind, whereby he might become more useful in the work which he so dearly loved, but it was otherwise ordered, reminding us of the oft-repeated adage, "Man proposes, but God disposes." Brother Hemlaw was a man of earnest spirit, of deep piety, an able expounder of God's word, powerful in exhortation, zealous and successful in soul-saving, ready and forceful in debate. He was deeply interested in the cause of Temperance reform, among the workers of

which he occupied a foremost place. His funeral was largely attended by people of the neighborhood, together with several friends from a distance, and all but two of the ministerial brothren on the District were present, and took part in the service held in the Centreville Methodist church. His grave is in the Odd Fellows' cemetery, Chilliwhack, where all that is mortal of Brother Hemlaw sleeps till the resurrection morn.

Whereas the work of this Stationing Committee has been rendered more difficult than otherwise it would have been by the fact that the Quarterly Official Boards of some Circuits within the bounds of the Conference had entered into private negotiations with ministers belonging to other Conferences, with a view to securing their services for these particular Stations, without due consideration being given to the convenience or comfort of ministers and their families now in the field, or to such an arrangement of the Stations as would ensure the most efficient administration of District and Conference work; therefore,

Resolved,—That while we have, on this occasion, complied as far as possible with the expressed wishes of the Circuits concerned, we desire to kindly point out to the esteemed brethren composing the Quarterly Official Boards, that in so small a Conference as ours the pursuance of the course above referred to cannot fail to cause serious embarrassment to the Stationing Committee, lessen the efficiency of our Church as a whole, and disturb, to some extent, the present state of good feeling and mutual confidence so happily existing between ministers and people and among the various Circuits and Missions of our Conference. We would remind our pe ple that our churches are not independent congregations, but a Connexion, and that the principle of the itinerancy can be given its high est efficiency only when both people and pastors loyally surrender into the hands of the Stationing Committee, elected by the joint vote of laity and ministers, their right to choose—on the one hand what pastors they shall have, and on the other what congregations they shall serve.

The Union agreed to on the fifth day of September, 1883, by the four following Churches, viz:—The Methodist Church of Canada, the Primitive Methodist Church of Canada, the Methodist Episcopal Church of Canada, and the Bible Christian Church of Canada, was duly ratified, and the said Churches incorporated under the name of "The Methodist Church."

And whereas, at the second session of the fourth Parliament of the Province of British Columbia, an Act was passed, entitled "An Act respecting the Union of certain Methodist Churches in Canada," the purpose of the said Act being "to ratify and confirm the said Union, and to vest in the said Methodist Church, all the property in the Province of British Columbia aforesaid, now vested or held in trust for each of the said denominations or Churches, upon such trusts, or for such purposes as may be declared in the said Act of Incorporation, and to confer upon the said Church such further powers as may be requisite.

And whereas, the said Act passed by the Parliament of the Province of British Columbia, in some of its provisions comes into conflict with the powers conferred upon the Methodist Church by the said Act of Incorporation, and in particular enacts that all lands acquired or held under it "shall be subject to the provisions of the Religious Institutions Ordinance, 1869."

Resolved, therefore,—That the President of the Conference, the Secretary of the Conference, and the Ex-President of the Conference, be, and are hereby appointed a deputation to wait upon the Attorney General, and the Executive of the Government of the Province of British Columbia, for the purpose of representing to them the desirability of having the provision regarding the Religious Institutions Act eliminated, and the said Provincial Act made to harmonize in its provisions, with the Act passed by the Parliament of Canada, and contained in the Discipline of the Methodist Church.

RE JESUITS' ESTATE ACT.

Moved by the Rev. J. E. Starr, seconded by Rev. T. Crosby,

Whereas the members of the British Columbia Conference of the Methodist Church have the conviction that the Order known as The Society of Jesus is an alien, secret, and politico-religious body, the existence of which is totally at variance with the institutions of a free State, be it therefore

Resolved,—That we protest against and condemn the incorporation of the Order known as The Society of Jesus by the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, in 1887, as being subversive of national life, and opposed to civil and religious liberty and equality, the heritage of every British subject.

2. That we emphatically conden the Act passed at the recent session of the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, entitled "An Act respecting the settlement of the Jesuits' Estates."

First, because it endows from public funds a religious organization, thereby violating the undoubted constitutional principle of the complete separation of Church and State.

Second, because it recognizes the usurpation of a right by a foreign authority, viz., His Holiness the Pope, to become an arbiter in matters pertaining to provincial legislation; and

Third, because the endowment of the said Society of Jesus, the expulsion of which from every civilized country wherein it has found a foothold, has been necessitated by its intolerant and mischievous intermeddling with the functions of civil government, is fraught with danger to the civil and religious liberties of the people of Canada.

3. That we indignantly resent the action of the said Legislature of the Province of Quebec, in recognizing the usurpation of the right of the Pope of Rome to interfere in the administration of our internal and civil affairs. regarding such action as derogatory to our system of government, and an

insult to our Sovereign Lady the Queen.

4. That we unhesitatingly condemn the Federal Government, not only for the unseemly haste which they displayed in advising His Excellency the Governor General to allow the Bill respecting the settlement of the Jesuits' Estates, thereby thwarting the people's right to petition, but also for not advising His Excellency, on the grounds of public polity, to disallow the said Bill.

5. That while we desire to place on record our hearty appreciation of the stand taken by the Toronto Mail and Montreal Witness, and also of the course pursued by the thirteen members who, rising superior to party allegiance, manfully announced themselves as being on the side of principle, at the same time, we deprecate the spectacle presented upon the floor of the House of Commons, where a majority in the two great political parties of Canada acknowledged their subserviency to party, to Jesuitical influence, and to the Roman hierarcy, and we hereby express the opinion that the 188 members of Parliament who voted against the amendment offered by Col. O'Brien are unworthy of the confidence of the Canadian Electorate.

TO THE

SOCIETIES WITHIN ITS BOUNDS.

DEARLY BELOVED, -- Assembled in our Annual Conference after the toils and triumph of another year, we send you our greetings and counsels, trusting you may receive such as a renewed assurance of the unfeigned love which we cherish for your souls, and the earnest solicitude that you may abound yet more and more in the knowledge and love of God and of our Lord Jesus Christ. Showers of blessings have been experienced on nearly all our Circuits and Missions, and we gratefully record to the honor and praise of Him whose we are and whom we serve, an increase of 449 to the membership of our Church during the past year. We are also glad to note an increase of \$784 in the Missionary contributions of the Church, as well as a very gratifying advance in all other Connexional Funds.

Death has entered our ranks since we last met in Conference Session, and the Rev. R. B. Hemlaw, a brother greatly beloved and highly esteemed for his work's sake, has passed to rest and r vard. In the midst of our sorrow we cannot but rejoice in the contemplation of his faithful life, carnest toil, and peaceful death. To his sorrowing widow we extend our heart-felt sympathies. We are glad to learn that every department of our Sabbath-school work is in a prosperous condition, and heartily commend to your prayers and practical sympathy these nurseries of the Church. Our Sustentation Fund which we had hoped would have afforded material relief to some of our brethren laboring on domestic Mission fields has not fully met our expectations, and as a consequence, many of our ministers with their families still suffer serious financial emburrasment. We again commend this very important Fund to your Christian liberality.

In connection with our Missionary interests, we desire to call your attention to the noble work being done by the Woman's Missionary Society. During the past year these consecrated women have, by their self-sacrifice and devotion, added thousands of dollars to the missionary resources of the Church. At present, only one auxiliary, that of Victoria, exists within the bounds of the Conference. We strongly advise that wherever it is at all possible, auxiliaries be organized.

As a Church, we are strongly pledged to the cause of Temperance reform, and we earnestly desire that in this, as well as in all other movements affecting the social and moral well-being of the people, you will always use your influence and cast your vote upon the side of truth and right.

All d-partments of our work have received our earnest consideration, and we are looking forward to a year of great opportunities and rich results. Remember, brethren, that cur claim to be disciples of Christ, and followers of them who through faith and patience inherit the promises, rests upon the manner in which we live. Personal piety, whole-hearted consecration to the service of the Master, are what we need. While some are living without hope and without God in the world, and others living with the form of Godliness but without the power, we are called to be living epistles read and known of all men.
