

The World has all along contended that it was perfectly legal to operate a street railway system on Sunday. It was legal at the time the agreement was entered into between the Toronto Railway Company and the city of Poronto, and it is legal to-day. The appeal against the Hamilton Street Toronto, and it is legal to-day. The appeal against the Hamilton Street Railway Company was yesterday dismissed by the Court of Appeal. This judgment confirms that company in their right to run their cars on Sunday for the public benefit. It confirms the right of every other street railway company in Ontario to do the same thing—Toronto alone excepted. This restriction was imposed on Toronto through the strategy and sharp practice of certain men who had a hand in the drafting of the agreement between the city and the railway company. Mr. Samuel Blake is principally responsible for the disability under which the citizens of Toronto labor when compared with the people of the other cities of the province. Mr. Blake was cute enough to observe that the law of the land as it stood at that time. ute enough to observe that the law of the land, as it stood at that time, ould not prohibit the operation of street cars on Sunday in Toronto, He, ecordingly, engineered a special clause in the agreement, whereby the citiens' hands became tied up in regard to a Sunday service. Why should Tornto be subjected to a restriction which it has been decided does not apply

to any other city in the province? It seems to us, from this decision, that the Toronto raisway could not be ested if it started its cars next Sunday. No criminal offence would be amitted if it ran the street cars for the benefit of the people. The pol would have no authority to arrest or summon motormen or conductors i they took charge of the system next Sunday. If any proceedings could be taken against the company at all, they would be purely of a civil character. If the Mayor applied for an injunction to stop the cars, we do not believe the courts would grant it. The courts would not interfere where the rights of the people were adversely affected. The action might end in an assessment of damages, but as no damage could be proved, as was the case in the Hamilton trial, the action would probably be dismissed. THE GREAT LIBERAL SCANDAL.

The Globe yesterday suggested that the charges made by The World in connection with the Crow's Nest Pass Railway should be investigated by the House of Commons. Such an investigation would naturally imply the appointment of a Parliamentary Committee. The idea is an excellent one, but we are afraid that such a committee would not have jurisdiction to enquire into the very facts that are of most importance to the public. The miltee could hear evidence as to the advantages and disadvantages of vernment control of the Crow's Nest Railway, of the cost of construction, and other details of that character, but it would have no authority whatever to investigate the charges that The World prefers against Mr. Jaffray, Senator Cox and The Toronto Globe. These charges do not directly mplicate any Cabinet Minister, nor is the charge against Senator Cox of ch a nature as would make him, as a member of the Senate, amenable to .5 Parliamentary enquiry. The charge is that certain leading Liberals, among them Mr. Robert Jaffray and Senator Cox, conspired with others to influence the Government to put through a scandalous deal for the benefit of the Canadian Pacific Railway and the members of the conspiracy. That is the charge that the public would like to see investigated. The public would like to learn more of the details of this conspiracy. The World has supplied the general outlines. We would prefer to see Mr. Jaffray fill in more of the particulars. We are sorry that a Parkamentary committee cannot supply them. them. As far as The Globe is concerned, it has nothing to fear from such an investigation, because its connection with the conspiracy does not come within the committee's jurisdiction. The Globe itself is quite safe in deanding parliamentary investigation.

The further this conspiracy is investigated the more scandalous does become. Not only has it drugged The Globe and Messrs. Jaffray and Cox into the mire, but the good name of the whole Liberal party is besmirched. At the risk of appearing tiresome, The World will repeat the outlines of the scandal. Messrs. Cox and Jaffray appear to have set the ball rolling. They acquired certain interests in British Columbia coal fields, as well as an terest in the sale of the charter of the British Columbia Southern Rail-.25 way Company. Their interests were largely conditional upon the Canadian Pacific's obtaining an exclusive right to operate the Crow's Nest Railway It became, therefore, the principal concern of the conspirators to secure this monopoly for the C.P.R. To accomplish their purpose the conspirators et to work to control The Globe, and they appeared personally before the .5 Government from time to time and brought all the pressure at their command to induce the Government to agree to the principle of C.P.R. mono .20 poly. As far as The Globe is concerned the conspirators were eminently successful. Mr. Jaffray's connection with that paper enabled him to dictate its policy. For some months back The Globe has been hammering away at the Crow's Nest Railway. Its articles on this subject were all carefully pr .5 pared and insidiously placed before the public. The editorials all led up to the principle of C.P.R. monopoly. The Globe was utilized to chloroform public opinion so that the Government would have less hesitation in accept .10 ing the principle of C.P.R. monopoly. But the conspirators found the task of committing the Government to this retrograde and scandalous principle nuch more difficult than their manipulation of The Globe. The Globe editor carried out the policy laid down by Mr. Jaffray to the letter. He even went so far as to repudiate sound Liberal principles that had been advocated by The Globe for a generation, in order that Mr. Jaffray's chloroforming process might be the more effective. When Mr. Jaffray laid his scheme before the Government, however, he encountered opposition. More than three-fourths of the Cabinet were prepared to accept his principle of C.P.R. onopoly, but fortunately for the country there were two or three Ministers who were independent enough to withstand the influence of the C.P.R. and the conspirators. One of these Ministers particularly denounced Mr. Jaffray's proposal as scandalous. He pointed out that the granting of further monopolies to the C.P.R. by a Liberal Government would result in the disintegration of that Government. He grew frantic at the very idea. He threatened to resign, and he stated plainly that he would resign if the game was carried any further. The affair became so acute in the Cabinet that an explosion was momentarily imminent. The World's exposure of the .50 facts has had the effect of arresting negotiations for the time being. A truce has been declared. The Ministers have found that public opinion, and principally that reflected by the Liberal party, is so diametrically opposed to the idea of C.P.R. monopoly that they have had to call a sudden halt. They perceive that the chloroforming process of The Globe has not had the desired effect. On the contrary, the exposure of the plot-has acted like a boomerang and the whole country is now opposed to the policy that has been so adroitly advanced by the party's chief organ. Such is the situation at the present

First, we have Messrs, Cox and Jaffray as the exciting causes of it. Then we have The Globe, the principal organ of the party, undertaking o blindfold the people while the job is being put through. Furthermore, The Globe is supported by The Sentinel Review, The London Advertiser and

Finally, we connect nearly the whole of the Cabinet with the scandal. The very fact that The Globe was permitted to advocate the monopoly from day to day shows that Mr. Laurier was prepared to accept it under certain conditions, if he had not actually agreed to do so unconditionally. As far as we can learn, there was only one member of the Cabinet who rose equal to the occasion and denounced the proposed deal as the death-knell of the Liberal party.

The Crow's Nest episode discloses the fact that the Liberal party is rotten and corrupt, not the rank and file so much as the very heads and front of it. Only one Cato in the whole Cabinet! A corrupt and weak-backed press The policy of the party dictated by monopolists and speculators on the outside! Such is the condition of the Liberal party within a few months after its acceptance of the responsibilities of office.

If that act is vetoed, then the British Columbia Southern Railway Company will be limited to whatever rights rights under that act it would not be in a position to proceed with the eastern section, as the time for completing that lapsed on Dec. 31, last. It would, however, have the remainder of this year for completing the central section, and till Dec. 31, 1898, to complete the Western section. As defined in the Act of 1894, the eastern section consists of "that portion of the said railway commencing at the junction of Summit Creek with Michael Creek, thence by way of Michael Crek to Elk River and the Upper Kootenay River." The central section consists "of that portion of the said railway, com-

mencing at a point on Elk River, near the junction of the Elk River with

the Kootenay River; thence in a northerly direction to a point at or nec Cranbrook; thence by the Moyee Pass to the Lower Kootenay River, or by the alternative route from Cranbrook by way of St. Mary's River on Phot Bay and Kootenay Lake, or to the Lardo River."

The western section consists "of that portion of the railway, commencing from the western terminus of the central section to the coast, by the most onvenient route, to a favorable place for crossing the Fraser River to the City of New Westminster.

The eastern section is the part of the line that runs through the Crow's Nest Pass and that taps the much-talked-of coal fields. If the Act of 1896 were disallowed, the British Columbia Southern would be out of court, as far as that part of the road at least is concerned. We notice The Globe of yesterday has a despatch from Vancouver, in which it is stated the period for vetoing the Act of 1894 by the Federal Government has expired. But the vetoing the Act of 1896 has not yet expired, and will not expire for six or seven weeks. Will The Globe recommend the Government to dis-allow that Act, and thereby break up the monopoly that controls the valuable coal fields of British Columbia? This is one method by which the corrupt politicians and placemen of British Columbia could be despoiled of the valuable franchises they acquired from a corrupt Legislature. This is one method by which the assignees of these men, to wit, Messrs, Jaffray and Cox and the C.P.R., could be made to give up the 260.000 acres of coal fields that rightly belong to the people, but which are now controlled by a monopoly. Will The Globe urge the Government to disallow the Act of 1896, or take such other steps as will put the People in possession of the lands that have been virtually stolen from them?



The stock market was dull this afternoon and steady to firm in tone. There was no feature and no material changes. The advance in Lake Shore is now explained by the announcement that a syndicate has been formed to take \$50,000,000 of the company's new 3½ per cent. first mortgage gold bonds at 102½ to replace the old outstanding mortgages, which mature during the next five years. This proposition has already been accepted on behalf of some \$8,000,000 of the old bonds. The general holders of the latter are to have an option to exchange them for the new bonds before maturity. The transaction, of course, involves an enormous saving of interest to the company, and the expectation is that the dividend rate on the stock will be advanced to 7 or 8 per cent. Loans on foreign exchange, it is said, are being renewed. Foreign exchange is quoted at 4.87 to 4.87% for demand sterling. The President has vetoed the Immigration Bill. The Manhattan directors met to-day, but did nothing important. President-elect McKinley has arrived in Washington. In the closing transactions stocks were steady at slight reactions.

There was a brisk trade in all speculative markets at opening, and better feeling was noticeable in all the pits. The cables, consols, the foreign prospect and statistics were all helpful to wheat, and the advance would have been less surprising, had it been four times as great. The wheat trade had enough bull news to-day to send wheat considerably higher. The Liverpool cables were very strong, showing id advance for the day. The European political muddle looks more serious than at any time previous. Bradstreet's showed a decrease of 4,000,000 bush. Cables reported heavy rains over France, and conditions such as may easily result in further crop injury. Minneapolis reported an advance of 10c in flour and sale of 15,000 barrels. The Northwest cars were 359, against 319 last year. The clearances were equal to 214,000 bush. St. Louis wires that the crop reports coming in from the field are the worst ever heard of for this time of the year. These reports are coming from the most reliable millers and grain dealers in the trade, who are backing their reports by buying wheat in large quantities. We see nothing in the situation to change our opinion regarding the advance in wheat.
