## GREAT BRITAIN'S

## ALLEGED VIOLATION

Evening Papers Severe in Their Com-

ments Against Government.

Official Statement Indicates That Negotia-

tions are Proceeding—The Times Edi-

torially Indicates That There is Some-

thing More to Make Known—A Gracious

of Trade Interests is Peace.

London, Feb. 2.—The afternoon newspa-

pers to-day comment in the most severe

terms upon the alleged withdrawal of Great

Britain's demand for the opening of the

port of Tientsin. Some of them refuse

to credit the report.

The Globe says: "No wonder if the op-

ponents of the Ministry regard it as an

unpleasant surprise when its supporters are

unable to find a reasonable excuse for it.

The public was led to believe that Sir Mich-

ael Hicks-Beach and other Cabinet Minis-

ters meant what they said, so the Ministry

have only themselves to thank if they lose

prestige at home and abroad through the

withdrawal of the Tientsin demand. Many

English, with her vast naval strength and

common resources, has the game in her

own hands if she chooses to play it with

the necessary spirit.

An official statement as the subject, just

issued, is as follows: "No communication

can be published concerning the negotia-

tions as a whole. The negotiations have

been absolutely confidential. Many com-

plaints have been received from the govern-

ment, but in some instances, quite at

variance with known facts."

The Times' Tientsin announcement

created much surprise and excitement

among politicians and was eagerly discus-

sed at the clubs. The Liberals vigorously

demanded the reported withdrawal of the

British Government, while the Conservatives

members of the House of Commons

conceded the withdrawal of the demand

as a concession to Russia and a severe

blow to British interests and prestige.

Collector Davis Makes a Second Re-

mittance From Dawson City.

Eighty-Five Thousand Dollars Has Been

Received in Toll From Gold Diggers

Ottawa, Feb. 2.—(Special.)—The De-

partment of Customs to-day received a

remittance from Collector Davis, from

Dawson, to the amount of \$47,000,

which had accrued from customs duties.

This was the second remittance.

Frank Slavin on the Mother Lode.

Mr. Frank Slavin, the well-known

Australian explorer and miner, who

spent a great portion of the last year

in the Klondike district, arrived here

to-day to interview the Government

regarding to certain claims he has located.

Slavin made the trip from Dawson

to the coast in 20 days. He had six dogs

and made no effort to break the record.

Speaking of his discovery of what is

termed the Mother Lode of the Klondi-

ke, Slavin said to-night: "It is the

mother lode I am no doubt the dis-

covery. On Aug. 27, last I started to

prospect for a quartz mine, and struck

a very rich ledge, which seemed inter-

esting in length and very wide. From

gold showed everywhere in the spec-

imens I got. I did not remain out long,

however, but returned to the place."
