THE CZAR'S PEACE PROPOSALS

Nicholas Wants a General Reduction of Armaments and an Understanding Among the Nations—Can the Tricky Russian Diplomats Be Trusted?—Text of the Note.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 28.—By order of Emperor Nicholas, Count Muraviev, the Foreign Minister, on the 24th instant, handed to the foreign diplomats at St. Petersburg a note declaring that the maintenance of peace and the reduction of the excessive armament, now crushing all nations, is the ideal for which all governments ought to strive.

PRODUCED A SENSATION... London and Other Capitals Receive the Proposal With Astonishment... Text of the Note.

Text of the Note is as follows: "The maintenance of general peace and the possible reduction of the excessive armaments, which weigh upon all nations, present themselves in existing conditions to the whole world as an ideal toward which the endeavors of all governments should be directed.

WALSH GLAD IT'S ABOUT OVER

The Major Says He Didn't Want the Position, but Thinks His Yukon Administration Has Been the Best That Could Be Under the Circumstances—Did His Duty Conscientiously.

Vancouver, Aug. 28.—(C.P.R. Press Dispatch)—Just now, when indignation is so high against the mainline traffic for the Yukon, all news of interviews with Major Walsh, who will have to bear the brunt of the battle, are of interest. He was at Skagway on Aug. 18 on his way down, and is reported to have said to his interviewer: "I am glad that my future office is so near the end of the line, and I did not want the position in the first place, and my very glad that the time is about up; but I can say this—that I leave my duties on the Yukon with a serene knowledge that I have done the best that I could; and, furthermore, I believe that in most instances anyway I have been right. I have not cared what the government thought of me, and have not equaled or been concerned as to what the people thought. I weighed the conditions as I found them and administered the laws as I thought right and proper. I was given a great latitude under the laws, and was empowered to amend them as I saw fit, and in some instances I did change their operation somewhat."

TECH COLLECTION OF ROYALTIES... "It is said, Major Walsh, that the enforcement of the collection of royalty has been optional with you?" "Yes," said the Major, "that is true. And I saw fit to collect the royalty. I wanted to say that every dollar I have collected in royalty came from men who could afford to pay the royalty many times over, and never felt it materially. The royalty only affected the rich claims, anyway; the middle-class claims were not affected by the operation of the law on that point. I have heard a good deal of complaint about our Gold Commissioner at Dawson. I think he is all right. He is overworked, however, and sometimes loses his temper, but he is an honest man and is a good man for the position. With the number of people coming in there, and the immediate attention, himself and his 10 or 20 clerks have been compelled to work from early morning until late at night, and after leaving his office he would be buttonholled by half a dozen men, who would fire questions upon him. CURIOUS CHINESE CUSTOM.

City Followers of Confucius Perform Peculiar Ceremonies Over Cremated Graves.

Yesterday morning before many of the citizens of Toronto were astir, a contingent of Chinese were busily employed in caring for the souls of their departed brethren.

The scene of this antique performance was the Necropolis Cemetery, where lie the remains of those Chinese who died in the city nearly four years ago.

An Odd Practice. It was a practice among these people to visit the remains of deceased friends and offer up prayers and also bring food and meats for the spirits to eat.

The Chinese Come. The caretaker of the cemetery was awakened by the noise of carriages, and coming out from his residence, saw two men, each with four Chinese inside, besides several bundles and packages.

A Hog Was There. A large hog, which was well cooked, was taken out of one of the baskets and placed upon the tray. The pig was neatly cut in two, lengthwise, and was so big that it completely covered the tray.

Two Bonfires. While several of the Chinese were busy arranging this spread, the others made preparations for two bonfires. The places selected for the fires were near the foot of the graves, and the purpose was to frighten all evil spirits away from which, they believe, are hovering over the bones of the dead.

The next event was the placing of a white napkin at the foot of the graves, and on this each one in rotation fell on his knees and slowly raised his hands three times.

They Also Ate and Smoked. When the celebration was at its height the Chinese sat down to the feast and ate. After this had been done to the breakfast, another treat was given in the shape of cigars.

The party proceeded to the northern end of the cemetery, where the other two resting-places were located. The ceremony was there repeated, but in a shorter time, and after a few minutes more, their duty done, the faithful ones made their retreat as quickly and as softly as they came.

Peculiar Actions. The apostles of Confucius were dressed in their native costume of flowing robes, and all wore white straw hats with their bristles carefully drawn up on the back of their heads.

After a certain length of time the bones are returned, washed, wrapped in rice paper and cotton, and then in silk, and afterwards placed in a new trunk and shipped home to China for burial.

Curiosity Aroused. All day long crowds of people viewed the graves and food, and wondered what it all meant.

THE PEACE COMMISSION SETTLED.

Three of the Five Commissioners Favor Territorial Expansion and May Claim the Philippines.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 27.—The Peace Commission is settled.—The commissioners have all accepted. The last acceptance was from Associate Justice White of the Supreme Court, Friday afternoon. The commission is as follows:

William R. Day, present Secretary of State, chairman.

Senator Sherman K. Davis of Minnesota, chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee of the Senate.

Associate Justice E. D. White of the United States Supreme Court, president.

Whitlaw Reid, editor of the New York Tribune, and former Minister to France.

It is regarded as an exceedingly strong commission, and one that will satisfy the American people regarding the Philippines.

There are at least three members of the commission who are in favor of holding the most important part of the Philippines and not afraid of claiming the whole group.

These are Senators Davis and Frye and Whitlaw Reid. Both Senators Davis and Frye expressed themselves as in favor of expansion of territory before they were named as commissioners.

The New York Tribune has in its editorial columns insisted that this Government should retain the Philippines. President McKinley knew all the views of these men when he selected them, and his selecting a majority of the commission who hold this view is regarded as an evidence that he is not averse to keeping the whole archipelago.

The position of Secretary Day has been conservative, but he will not oppose the wishes of the President.

What position Justice White will take no one knows, unless it be the President, who knows. He has been very reticent and has not discussed this question.

The commission will sail about Sept. 15 and both Senators Frye and Davis expect that it will be able to complete its work in time to present a treaty to the Senate before the adjournment, March 4.

HON. WILLIAM MULOCK HOME.

Returned on Saturday Morning—Is Pleased With His Efforts at Reduction of Postal Rates.

The Hon. William Mulock, "Penny Postage" William, as he has been called, returned from England on Saturday morning. The result of his efforts towards imperial penny postage are appreciated on both sides of the water.

"The Executive Committee views with great gratification the success which has attended the efforts of the Hon. William Mulock in securing an imperial penny postage, and expresses its warmest thanks to him for having made an important step towards the consolidation of the Empire."


