The employers have not as yet met to consider the matter, but it is understood that the strike will not seriously effect their trade just now, as building material is very scarce in the city.





Clarke Wallace, for the service he has rendered it in connection with the International Commission, appointed to adjust matters in dispute between Canada and the United States, and to procure, if possible, closer trade relations between the two countries. In rendering this service Mr. Wallace gave much valuable time, in attendance upon the Commission, both at the city of Quebec and at the city of Washington, freely and without reward, save the sense of having performed a patriotic duty; and it is pleasing to know that the intimate knowledge of tariff details, and of the manufacturing industries of Canada possessed by Mr. Wallace, was freely availed by manufacturers and others, who found occasion to state their cases to the Canadian members of the Commission. 
