General Buller has sent to the War Office a list of the casualties at the battle of Gravelled, and the casualties among the various regiments engaged were: Killed 10, wounded 71, missing 9.

The story of the fight at Gravelled is now coming more in detail. It was an artillery duel, which lasted for three hours. When the artillery failed General Methuen resolved upon an infantry attack, and in the face of a withering fire, the British carried it after him.

Col. Kekewich reports from Kimberley that from Nov. 18 to Nov. 23 there had been some unimportant skirmishes with the Boers. The health of the garrison was good, and the water supply was plentiful.

General Gatacre, with the centre column advancing north, had occupied Bushman's Hoek with a battalion of infantry. His main body is at Putter's Kraal. The enemy have retired toward Mooten.

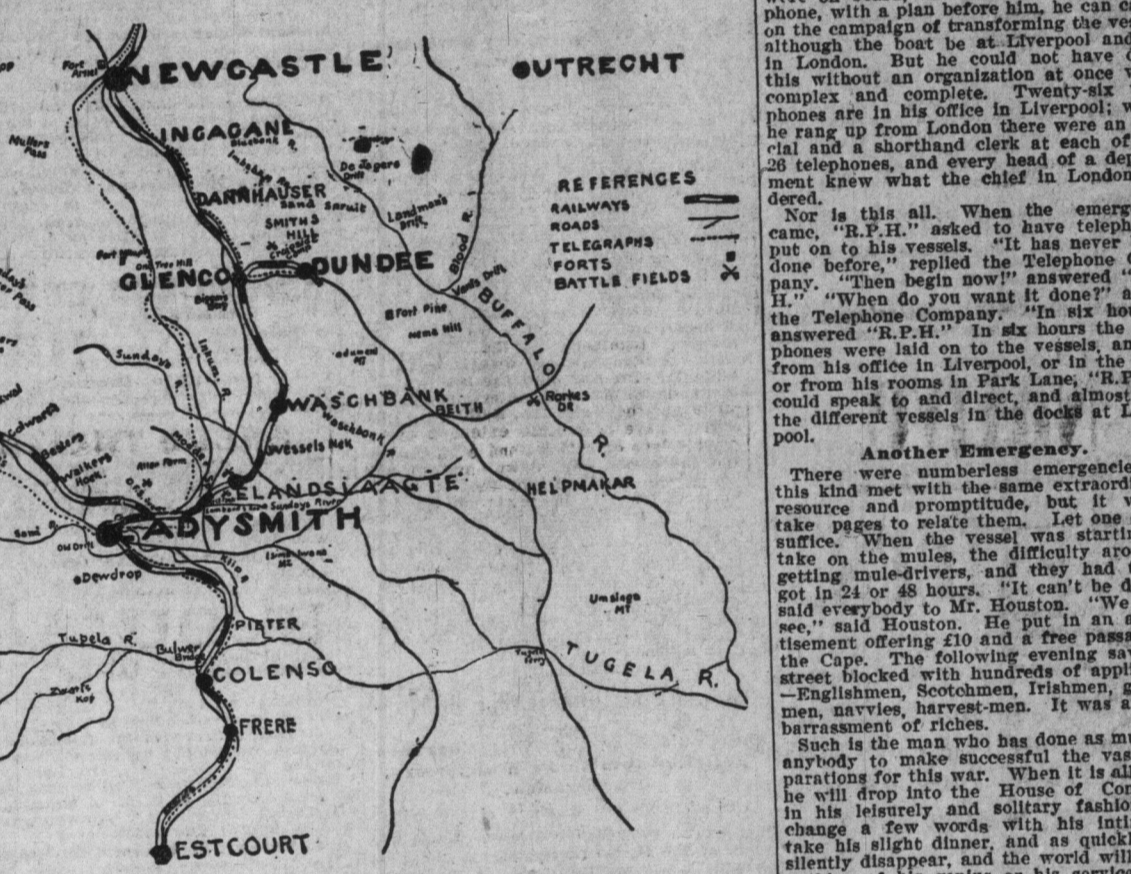
