Old Provisions for Compulsory Arbitration and the Consequent Penalties Now Dropped.

MINISTER TO NAME ARBITRATORS

Expected that Public Opinion Will Do Much to Bring About Peace.

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The main provision of the bill as amended sets forth that where a difference exists between railway employers and railway employees, and by reason of failure to readjust such difference a railway lockout or strike has been or is likely to be caused, or the regular and safe transportation of passengers or freight has been or may be interrupted, the Minister of Labor may, either on the application of the railway employer or on the application of any municipal corporation directly affected, cause inquiry to be made into the cause of the dispute.

For this purpose a board of arbitrators is to be established by the minister, to be composed of three persons, of whom the parties to the dispute are to name one each. The third arbitrator is to be named by the Minister of Labor, and falling a choice by the Minister, the Minister may appoint the arbitrator.

The board is to have the power of summoning witnesses and requiring them to give evidence on oath, and calling for the production of such documents and things as are deemed requisite to the full investigation. After making full and careful inquiry into the facts and circumstances of any dispute the board will make a written report thereon to the Minister, and such report will embody the board's findings and recommendations. Each arbitrator will be paid his actual traveling expenses, and, excluding the chairman, in addition \$10 for each day that he shall attend a meeting of the board or be traveling to and from his home.

The chairman of the board will be appointed by the Minister, and the Minister in Council deems reasonable. Witnesses summoned by the board are to be entitled to free transportation to and from their homes.

It will be seen that in place of a permanent board of arbitration in the Dominion on each railway province, an special board is to be constituted to investigate each dispute as it may arise. The purpose of the bill is to enable both parties to a difference and the public as well to ascertain the facts and arrive at a reasonable basis of settlement. It is expected that public opinion will have an important influence in bringing about a settlement.

PRESERVE ALASKA FUR SEALS

U.S. to Resume Negotiations With Britain in This Matter.

Washington, Feb. 2.—The house to-day passed about 40 bills under suspension of the rules. The most important of them was a bill to authorize a resumption of the negotiations with Great Britain for the preservation of the Alaska fur seals, and to give the Secretary of the Treasury authority, if necessary, to conclude the negotiations prior to the opening of the pelagic sealing season this year, to exterminate the seal herds on the Pribilof Islands, except 10,000 females and 100 males.

When the matter came up, Mr. McMillan (New York) opposed the passage of the bill. Mr. Tamm (Miss.) who made the motion for its passage, said that the pelagic sealing season was rapidly approaching, and that the seal herds were being exterminated. He said that the alternative of the adoption of the bill in the event of the failure to negotiate a new treaty was a real contingency.

Mr. McMillan called attention to the fact that the minority report on the pending bill was signed by the late Representative Russell (Conn.) and that it was a bill to authorize a resumption of the negotiations with Great Britain for the preservation of the Alaska fur seals, and to give the Secretary of the Treasury authority, if necessary, to conclude the negotiations prior to the opening of the pelagic sealing season this year, to exterminate the seal herds on the Pribilof Islands, except 10,000 females and 100 males.

ANOTHER CAMPAIGN IN SOUDAN

Fanatical Tribes of Sahara Moving Toward Preparing Khartoum. London, Feb. 2.—From the constant reports coming in from Egypt, it seems certain that England will have a bleak campaign in putting down the uprising of the fanatical tribes of the Eastern Sudan, who are now advancing toward the Nile.

The tribes are those of the order of Sidj Mahomed Senussi. It is uncertain whether the fanatics will first strike the French or the British. The movement is toward the Nile at Khartoum.

It began last year when the Sheikh Senussi, son of the dead founder of the sect, died last August and left a child and in the Sudan.

It was reported that he had recommenced under his successor. The rallying cry of the Senussi is "In the name of Allah, the Most Gracious, the Most Merciful."

Owing to the chances of danger arising, the garrison of Khartoum has been strengthened, and more black battalions are to go down to show the tribesmen that the power of the Khedive is still full and in arms.
