ANNUAL REPORT.

The Managers of the House of Industry present their Report for the last twelve months.

The Report for 1879 drew attention to the gradual increase of demands upon their resources for the two preceding years, and expressed a hope that the year just then closed, showing, as it did, a still further increase, would bring those demands to their culminating point. The Managers are happy to state that the hope then conceived has been to a certain extent justified : as compared with the three previous years, the year just passed shows a marked diminution in the number of applicants.

The Managers trust that this fact may be accepted as an indication that no very serious distress now exists among the poor of this city.

In distributing the funds placed at their disposal, the Managers have always endeavoured to avoid *pauperising* the recipients ; but notwithstanding the care thus exercised, it is to be feared that many persons depend too exclusively upon relief furnished by the House, and are not sufficiently careful to economise their own means. This may be inferred from the yearly appearance of a number of applicants whose claims are to a great extent based upon the fact that they have for a long time been pensioners of the House. Whether or

no such applicants unless aged and infirm persons should receive further encouragement, is a matter deserving of serious consideration.

With regard to the ward for casuals, which, as its name shows, was opened for the relief of transitory poor, it may also be observed that of some five thousand individuals who last year were furnished with temporary board and lodging, there were scarcely one hundred new faces, the great majority being old customers who disappear every spring to reappear the following winter. As a check to this abuse, the Managers contemplate the introduction of some kind of manual labour, making it a condition that every applicant shall do a certain amount of work before receiving relief.

With a view to secure combined action among the various charitable organizations of the city, a number of meetings of representatives of those organizations have been recently held, resulting in a consent on the part of the Managers to increase, if necessary, the number of their visitors, and to afford to the officers of other charities such information as may conduce to the detection of imposture and the better distribution of relief.

In the hope of diminishing the evil of street begging, citizens are earnestly invited to increase their subscriptions to existing charitable institutions, so that they in turn may be enabled to meet all additional claims. Mr. Wm. K. North is now collecting on behalf of the House, and the Managers confidently trust that his appeal on their behalf will meet with a liberal response.

The Managers may refer also to the resignation by Mr. Henry Rowsell, (in consequence of age and infirmity), of the office of Treasurer. With one exception, Mr. Rowsell is the only surviving representative of a meeting held on the 15th of November, 1837, on which occasion was established the corporation now known as the "House of Industry."

The usual returns from the Treasurer, Medical Officer, and Superintendent are herewith submitted.

The Managers have much pleasure in acknowledging the faithful and efficient services of the Superintendent and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. Duckett.

FOR THE YEAR 1880.

The Report of the General Superintendent is so full that I need only call attention to the high age attained by all who have died in the House during the past year. The youngest was 49, and the oldest 89 years of age; the average of the whole twelve being $71\frac{1}{2}$ years. Only two were under 68 years. The general health of the inmates has been fairly good; and although a great many have required medical attendance, no serious epidemic has prevailed.
