

This will be done under section 1015 of the new criminal code which says that where a stated case has been refused by the trial judge, the prisoner shall appeal to the court of appeal under section 1028 of the new code, which declares that where an appeal is entered the penalties must be stayed in all cases of whipping or death until the appeal is heard by the court of appeal.





CONDEMNS BETTING EVIL

Bishop Williams of Huron Also Endorses Three-Fifths Clause.

LONDON, Ont., June 15.—(Special.) Endorsation of the three-fifths clause and of compensation for hotelmen put out of business, with a strong condemnation of the betting evil, were features of the charge delivered by Bishop Williams this afternoon to the Synod of Huron in session hard.

The bishop made himself particularly clear in his references to gambling. "Betting and gambling, however widely practiced and however called, and morally wrong and degrading to character," he said. "We need a public opinion sufficiently strong to brand opinion sufficiently strong to brand with infamy the betting man or the betting woman as a parasite who thrives upon other people's labor. There is injustice in it, there is rob-

There is injustice in it, there is robbery, no matter by what name we call it, and therefore it is morally wrong.

"The principle of the three-fifths vote is altogether right," he said, in referring to that matter. "It may seem to eager advocates to delay the advent of the ideal trut it is the superadvent of the ideal, but it is the surer way and will not have the demoraliz-ing effects which follow the adoption of the law by bare majority."


