Mr. Gordon contended that as the property is being used solely as a right-of-way for the company's power transmission lines, no benefit would be derived from the construction of a sewer. The city's assessment department argued, however, that there should be no exemption from taxes in such a case.

Judgment was reserved. There is a fine tangle over the proposed paving of Dufferin-street, owing to petitions and cross-petitions, and the court adjourned the hearing until June 29.

IMPOSING STRUCTURE FOR BIG CORPORATION

Toronto General Trust Company Will Erect Eight-Story Building on Bay Street.

Architect George M. Miller is drawing plans for an eight-story office structure which the Toronto General Trust Corporation will erect at the corner of Bay and Melinda-streets, on a lot which they recently purchased from the Manufacturers' Life Association.

The site, which comprises the north-east corner of Bay and Melinda, has a frontage of 70 feet of Bay and 130 feet on Melinda. The building will front on Bay and extend back 90 feet, and will be of iron, granite, stone and brick exterior and the other stories will be constructed of brick.

The basement and two lower stories will be retained by the corporation for their own quarters and the other stories will be rented to tenants. The entrance to the main building will be from the Melinda side and two elevators will be provided for the use of the public.

While the trust corporation will have an interior elevator for their own use, the architect, Mr. Miller, has just returned to the city from a tour of inspection of up-to-date buildings in the States. He was accompanied by his architect, Mr. Cameron, and several excellent ideas were secured, which will be incorporated in the new structure. The building will cost about a quarter of a million dollars.

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Suggested Duty on Pulp. WASHINGTON, June 15.—The senate finance committee to-day practically decided to place a duty of one-twelfth of a cent per pound on pulp, and to exempt from that duty all pulp imported into those countries from the United States. The duty is a free exportation of their wood products to the United States.

SAYS WOMEN WOULD VOTE AS HUSBANDS VIGILANTE

Would Walk to Poles Like Automata, View of Delegate to Friends' Meeting.

"Crime is a disease," said William G. Brown, at the meeting of the Society of Friends in Zion Church yesterday afternoon. "Sometimes it is inherited," he continued, "the society is really not a cause of most crime. Society does not correct or improve the criminal but punishes him."

"The jail question is of growing importance," he said. "The prisoners have been long neglected. The greatest introduction of the subject of votes for women, Joel Borton of New York said: 'The home is the fountain head of all the very first part in all instruction and discipline. How is the public stream to be purified without her voice and influence? Had she vote she would use it for purifying public affairs and politics.'"

"How many women are there in Canada who would vote as they thought best and against their husbands' wishes?" asked Dr. Ezra Glascock. "They would not vote as they wished for fear of offending their husbands and getting their heads punched. They would walk to the polls and vote like automata. My opinion is that four-fifths of the women would vote contrary to their husbands'."

Felix Belcher spoke in favor of votes for women. In illustrating the great things that would be done had they voted, he said: "The greatest service rendered from the pulpit were written by the ministers' wives."

"This question has taken hold of the United States with unusual force," said O. Edward Janny of Baltimore, in speaking on the suffrage movement. "There hardly seem to be any arguments against it," he continued, "there are prejudices. It is a matter of intellect and conscience. What we need in government affairs now is good house-cleaners." Women are good house-cleaners.

GOWGANDA WAGON ROAD TO BE TWENTY-FIVE MILES

Government Engineer Reports Good Route and Easy Grades—No Difficulties to Be Met

C. S. Fullerton, engineer of the department of public works, who has been making a survey of the proposed wagon road to Gowganda, for which \$50,000 was appropriated by the legislature last session, has made his report to the government.

According to Mr. Fullerton's survey the road will be approximately 25 miles long, running for the most part thru wooded country. Few hills will be encountered. The grades will be light, the heaviest being 3 per cent, and running for a short distance only.

To the World yesterday Mr. Fullerton stated that the new line would utilize about three miles of the present road at Elk Lake, and would traverse James Township to the southwest corner of the Township of Mickle, thence cross Lawson Township and the southern shore of Lake Simcoe, and would traverse the Township of Lawson Township. The road will then be run between Callan and Gowganda Lakes, over Hautain Township to Gowganda Lake.

Few engineering difficulties will be met with, said Mr. Fullerton. The road for the most part will be gravel and sand. There are very few swamps and no muskeg. Only a little rock cutting will be necessary.

The line touches a very rich country. Not only is there an abundance of timber, but in Lawson Township a number of promising discoveries have been made.

No estimate has yet been given as to the probable cost, but the road can easily be completed into Gowganda this summer.

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EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT

The Sao Paulo Tramway Light and Power Co., Limited OF SAO PAULO, BRAZIL

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT AND DIRECTORS FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1908.

Submitted at the Eighth Annual Meeting of the Shareholders, Held on Tuesday, the 15th day of June, 1909.

Your directors take pleasure in submitting their Eighth Annual Report, with financial statements for the year ended 31st December, 1908.

Notwithstanding the fact that business conditions throughout the year were depressed as a result of the decrease in value of coffee, owing to the over-production of that article, causing a period of tight money throughout the State and City of Sao Paulo, the increase in Gross and Net Earnings of the Company is most satisfactory.

The Gross Earnings, \$2,287,410.56, show an increase over the previous year of \$175,887.42 or 8.53 per cent, while the Net Earnings, \$1,504,359.78, show an increase of \$108,486.28, or 7.77 per cent.

Renovals. The Company's plant has throughout been maintained in excellent condition, and in addition the sum of \$92,065.48, which has been charged to the contingent account referred to in our last year's report, was expended for renewals and replacements.

Tramway Department. During the year track mileage has been increased 47 1/2 miles, and extensions to existing lines. The increase in residences of the better class during the past few years has necessitated the building and opening of additional lines, from which it is expected the revenue will be very materially increased within the next year or two.

The Santa Anna Railway, which was acquired last year, has been entirely replaced by an electric line, and was opened for traffic on the 8th day of October last.

Lighting Department. A very gratifying increase in the number of lamps is shown in this department, the records showing an installation at the end of the year of \$1,229 incandescent lamps, compared with 7001; while the Arc Lamps have increased from 1251 to 1468.

The number of power customers continues to increase, there being on record at the end of this year 361, compared with 310 at the end of the year 1907; while the connected load shows an increase of 3553 H. P. Contracts have been entered into whereby 1350 H. P. will be installed during the early months of this year, and it is expected from present enquiries that contracts for over 1500 H. P. additional will shortly be received.

During the year there were only three shut-downs at the Power House, aggregating seven minutes, in all. The Manager claims that the car bodies built of native wood will have a much longer life than imported car bodies.

The plant throughout was maintained in the highest state of efficiency. Capital Expenditure. The expenditure on Capital Account during the year amounted to \$1,017,147.22. Improvements were made to the Hydraulic Plant at Parahyba, an extension being made to the Power House for the accommodation of Units 6, 7, and 8, and the foundation for the seventh Unit, now being installed, was completed.

The Tail Race was enlarged to meet the future requirements of the plant. The Dam was increased in height about twenty-four inches, resulting in a marked increase in the storage capacity of the reservoir.

On the Transmission Line a number of steel poles were erected in place of wood poles, and freight cars will be about one-quarter of the poles still to be changed. When these changes have been completed our transmission line can be classed as one of the best power transmission lines in operation.

The Rolling stock was increased by twenty-five passenger cars, and a number of passenger and freight cars were constructed, all of which were built in the shops of the Company. Additions were made to the Main Sub-station in the City of Sao Paulo.

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La Rose made another new high record to-day with a closing bid at \$7.84. The speculation and manipulation of traders during the past few weeks has undoubtedly upset the market, and has caused the appearance of many conservative brokers are decried the manipulation of the stocks and with the restoration of public confidence, more reasonable and steady conditions may be looked for.

Market Settles Down. Wallace & Eastwood in their letter say: A quiet note pervaded the whole of the market to-day. Fluctuations were not nearly so wide and the "water" tone was manifest throughout the entire list. La Rose was again very strong, registering a new high record and closing at \$7.84 bid, some 13 points higher than the previous day's closing. The market has the appearance of having settled down to steady business again.

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EXTENSIVE MOVEMENT TO MAPLE MOUNTAIN

Country is Flooded With Prospectors and Many Good Showings Have Been Uncovered.

With a strong conviction that public interest will soon be centred in the Maple Mountain district three well-known prospectors, George A. Clark, John E. Clark and Melville J. Nixon, returned from the north yesterday.

During their trip they located seven promising claims in Maple Mountain, and also worked in Gowganda and Corkhill.

"At Maple Mountain," said George A. Clark, "there are seven or eight claims within a radius of one mile which have silver showings on the surface. The Le Roy and MacGregor are in this group. There is an extensive movement into this section and there is very little territory left unworked.

Brewster, Trethewey and Corkhill townships are flooded with prospectors. There are some splendid showings in Roadhouse. Mr. Foley has a splendid lead up there of cobalt bloom and silver.

"We visited Gowganda, but found everything staked in that district and work going on busily on a great many properties.

"Business is booming at Elk City and everyone seems to be busy. Elk is the heart of very extensive mining exploration.

"Forest fires have been breaking out in a number of localities and it looks as tho a great deal of timber will be destroyed this season. The prospectors as a whole are exercising great care in guarding their fires and extinguishing them after they strike camp."

GOWGANDA'S FIRST ORE SHIPMENT AT ELK CITY

Consigned to Vaults of One of Toronto Banks—World Man Sees Some of It.

ELK LAKE, June 12.—(From the Mail Up There.)—The Union Mining and Transport Company, doing business between here and Gowganda, now have their canoe route ready for traffic and are carrying passengers and freight to and from Gowganda. On Monday last three thousand pounds of high-grade ore was shipped from the Bartlett mine. This ore, which is said to have a total silver value of about \$50,000 and of which the Bartlett mine is the largest producer in the world, is consigned to a Toronto bank, and is a sample of what the Bartlett people have on their property.

Alexander McLaren, the well-known cheese manufacturer, passed thru here today on his way to Gowganda. Mr. McLaren is interested in properties in the Montreal River district and at Gowganda and it is to be noted that he is up in this north country.

I yesterday visited the Silver Lake district in Middle, taking in the Otisse, the Otisse-Curie, and the Silver Lake Mining Co. The work of development of all these properties is progressing very favorably. The big air plants at the two Otisses are giving no trouble, and extensive hand-mining and prospecting work is being done at the Silver Lake mine. Mr. Willis, the new manager, has taken some good native silver samples from the property and he is of the opinion that the outlook for something good is favorable.

At the Otisse and the Otisse-Curie ore is being bagged right along. Last week the Otisse-Curie people bagged thirty-five sacks.

Modern Financing and Silver. NEW YORK, June 15.—The announcement made last week that a group of banking houses, including J. P. Morgan & Co., Kuhn, Loeb & Co., the First National Bank and the National City Bank, will do some modern financing in China, has led to the question as to the result this will have on the silver market. Experts declare that the price of silver would undoubtedly increase about ten cents an ounce, and some predict that the high price obtained for silver during the time of construction of the trans-Siberian railway by the Russian Government would prevail if China continued the development of railroad system. A large increase in the use of silver by China would also greatly benefit the mine owners and those interested directly in taking the ore out of the ground. Predictions of 45 to 70 cents per ounce for silver are made by experts if the commercial development of China is carried out as planned.

Weakness the Feature of New York Market—Steel the Only Speculation at Toronto Market.

World Office. Tuesday Evening, June 15. The Toronto stock market had a somewhat gloomy tone to-day and speculation, with the exception of Dominion Steel, which was traded in heavily, and advanced above yesterday's prices, was quiet.

The Steel stock is still tipped for a very much higher figure from Montreal, and free buying of the shares is coming from local speculators.

The only incident of the day was the annual statement of the Sao Paulo, which was presented and was constructed as satisfactory, but notwithstanding the stock sold down a point and a quarter at the close of the market from the opening prices. The earnings of the Sao Paulo were 12.2 per cent, compared with 12.4 per cent, the previous year. Small liquidation of the stock occurred in the afternoon, presumably on the announcement of the death of the President of Brazil.

In most of the speculative stocks the market was quite narrow; there was an over-throw of securities, but this support under the conditions was none too aggressive. A few investment purchases represented most of the transactions in the average list dealt in.
