To Cali in the Greenbacks. Washington, March 27.-Mr. Walker (Rep., Mass.), by request, to day intro-duced in the House a' bill, directing the Secretary of the Treasury to call in and cancel the paper money "now injuring the prosperity of the coun-try." The notes to be cancelled in-clude all the legal tenders, Treasury notes and silver certificates. In order to accomplish the retirement, bonds bearing interest at 2 1-2 per cent, per annum are to be issued. The bill also authorizes the Secretary of the Treas-ury to dispose of, as buillon, at its market value, all the silver buillon in the Treasury. He also introduced, by request, a bill modifying the banking from depositing bonds to secure cir-culation, provides for the issue to banks of circulating notes, not exceed-ing the paid-up capital of the banks, and requires reserves to be kept in specie, one-half to be in gold.
