TROTZKY SATISFIED WITH SITUATION

Says Holding Up of Troops

Alter Conditions.

Alter Conditi Bolshevik war minister, in an address here today. The speech was delivered at a meging of the Moscow soviet.

Discussing the military situation,
Trotzky declared that on the front have fulfilled the fundamental part of their task. The holding up of our ad-vanced troops before Warsaw in no way alters the state of affairs, all the more as the Polish front is now di-vided into two parts, military and diplomatic, and possesses two centres, one in Warsaw and the other in

"The peace negotiations at Minsk are of exceptional importance," con-tinued the war minister, "because they are developing on the unstable foundation of a stormy movement among the workers. Great Britain also is passing thru an unheard of display of excitement among her workers in connection with the peace negotiations between Russia and Poland.

"On General Wrangel's front," he added, "we are opening the gate to our enemies, but we shall assault them in the flank and rear. The fate of the revolution will be decided on the concentrated our forces on the west and are only leaving posts on the southern front in order to hold up

FOUR AMENDMENTS TO THE COVENANT

Scandinavia Proposes Changes For Consideration at First League Meeting.

London, Aug. 18.-Headquarters of the League of Nations announced to-day that four important amendments by Denmark, Norway and Sweden for consideration at the first meeting of

consideration at the first meeting of the league assembly on Novebber 15. The four proposed amendments were announced as follows:

(1) Providing for a fixed annual meeting of the assembly and propos-ing that ten members of the league can demand and secure a special meeting at any time at the seat of the

(2) Seeking to regularize the method of selecting the four non-permanent members of the council. It is proposed to accomplish this by providing that the assembly, after making the first selections of four to serve respectively three, four, five and six years, shall name a new state yearly after the third year to serve four years, and not subject to re-election for the following period. It is suggested that this method would secure sucof a large number of states and w maintain continuity in the composition .

(3) Making the obligation for arbitration more absolute by omitting the word "generally" from Article XIII in the paragraph beginning "disputed" and ending "submission to arbitra-

(4) Permitting the council to authorize a state in the vicinity of a state against which an economic blockade is in force, to maintain a degree of intercourse with the latter, providstate from atacking its neighbor.

FAILED TO AGREE ON MINERS' WAGES



Increase in Cost of Hydro Service

The great advance in the cost of labor and material during recent years has made it a difficult problem for the Toronto Electric Commissioners to maintain the low rates for electric service reached by the successive reductions of 1915 and 1916. By the strictest economy, aided by phenomenal extension of the System's business and consequent relative decrease of overhead charges this has so far been possible, but now, due to the power shortage, such a method of meeting the difficulty is no longer feasible, and an increase in rates has become inevitable.

The legally constituted authority in regard to rates is the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario, and in response to the application of the Commissioners the following revised rates for certain classes of service have been authorized by the Commission, to take effect as from the first of August, 1920, so that September bills will be on the new schedule:
