Mr. George Reid, the new federal premier, is the distinction of being the most widely known of all Australian politicians. He will sleep thru a long and important debate, waking only at odd moments to make a comic interjection, and then relaxing into slumber. RAILWAY CO. MUST SELL TICKETS

BREACH OF AGREEMENT IS HELD

Deal with by Mr. Justice Meredith in the city against the company to recover the city's share of the receipts.

The City of Hamilton has won the first round in its battle with the Hamilton Street Railway Co. for specific performance of the agreement in regard to the sale of workingmen's tickets.

Does Not Affect the Remedy. "Apart from whatever aid it may give in interpreting the agreement and the intentions of the parties to it and apart from such considerations as it may give rise to as to the convenience or inconvenience of any order that may be made, the conduct of the company as far as the workingmen's tickets is concerned, is not affected by the stipulations of the agreement."

Live Up to Agreement. The decision is preceded by the following reasons: "The company's act of incorporation empowered them to construct and operate their railway upon the city streets, and under and subject to any agreement to be made between the city and the company."

Reading the agreement it is difficult to come to any other conclusion than that the parties intended that all classes of tickets should be sold for the public. The tickets which are to be sold upon the cars are clearly those of a special character.

What City May Say. "The city, as an entity, is not to say that with mere pecuniary benefit to the corporation's coffers in view, the city made this express stipulation."

Committee a Breach. "In that view I have to deal with the company as committing a breach of its agreement to sell tickets for sale in the cars and I have to apply the same remedy as would be applicable to the company if it refused to sell tickets as if they were refusing to sell tickets at any place or on any car."

**PETITION AGAINST DUNLOP IT MAY BE PREESSED**

It is Claimed That an Effort Has Been Made to Consummate a Saw-Off.

A Conservative who knows what is going on in the political world informed The World yesterday that he would not be surprised if the petition against E. A. Dunlop was not pressed. So far no particulars have been filed, the Liberals securing the consent of the court to an extension of time. The apparent reason for the delay is that the Liberal lawyers are not exactly sure whether it would be advisable to push this case into court for the reason that it would reveal something that would place men high up in their own party in a not too favorable light. The lawyers have been very busy for some time trying to arrange a saw-off with the Conservatives, and the suggestion was carried to the Conservative lawyers that if Dunlop would resign, or agree to his unseating in the light of a fair one in North Norfolk would likewise. The Liberals attempted to place this proposition in the light of a fair one, but it did not appeal to the Conservatives that way, and all question of a saw-off was dropped. Dunlop's unseating without any evidence being presented to court. If the Liberals fail to push the North Norfolk trial results in the unseating of E. A. Little, the government will find itself in a minority. The question then is being discussed "What will they do about it?" It is regarded as a very probable outcome of the situation that Premier Ross will decide to dissolve the house and make a fresh appeal to the people. He has been expected to recover his position in the by-elections if the Conservatives lose no seats by the pending provincial trial. The Conservatives will stand to gain and not lose. So that it would be Mr. Ross' only chance to move a general appeal to the whole electorate. Many of the friends of the government advise this course. They are getting weary of the revelations of corruption, and think it would be wise to give the people an opportunity to vote on opposition for a period. If Ross takes this course there is no doubt that a reconstruction of the cabinet will be announced within a short time, and one of the first of the ministers to go would be Hon. Eilhu J. Davis, who, Liberals declare, has been a load to carry. The revelations of the public accounts committee of the legislature over a year ago, Mr. Davis' unseating on a Thursday night, strengthened him with his colleagues in the cabinet or tried to leave the cabinet. He has been heard to say that the party would be stronger with Davis out and besides Mr. Davis' unseating was very convenient now to get out of the cabinet and legislature, and attend to his rapidly growing private interests. Moving out of the cabinet would give Premier Ross a splendid opportunity of carrying some general appeal to the people. He has been desirous of reconstructing, but has not discovered a way of dropping anybody. Another cabinet minister who is likely to be removed from the arena of active provincial politics is Hon. Frank Latchford. His removal would open the door for the entrance of Hon. E. A. Aventure, who has a promise long overdue of cabinet placement. The situation is a most perplexing one for Premier Ross. To Prove Theory That Disease Can Be Traced.

New York, Sept. 23.—Dr. George S. Conant, aged 51, who died here to-day of diabetes, is said to have willed his brain to the medical faculty of Cornell University, that further investigation may be made of a theory that his disease could be traced to the brain. He suffered for many years, and after having consulted many specialists without obtaining any promise of relief or hope of a cure, Conant took to his study of diabetes, using himself as a subject for his experiments. After an exhaustive study he came to the conclusion that the trouble had its seat in the brain, which he believed to be affected. Believing also that an investigation of the matter might prove invaluable to science, Dr. Conant made a will, disposing of his brain.

**NINE CHILDREN DIED**

Outhouse of a School Turned into a Vault.

Cincinnati, Oct. 23.—During the morning recess to-day of the public school at Pleasant Ridge, about 2 miles west of this city, 9 pupils and their teacher died. When school recessed there was a playful rush into the outhouse which gave way, precipitating about 20 children into it. Nine dead bodies have been recovered. After these had been removed and 12 children had been rescued, the vault was thoroughly drenched and all the children were killed. The oldest being 12 years of age. The vault into which they fell was four feet deep and was used for the purpose of holding coal. The other 12 were rescued covered with the soil of the vault. It is reported that one-half of them will die of pneumonia. Several of the rescued have limbs broken.

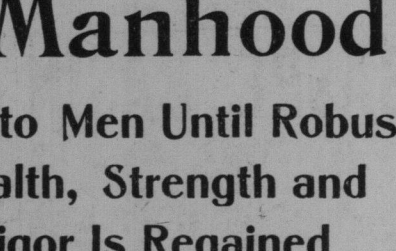

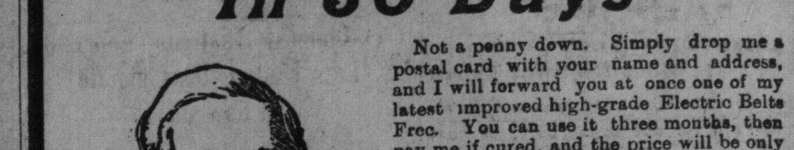

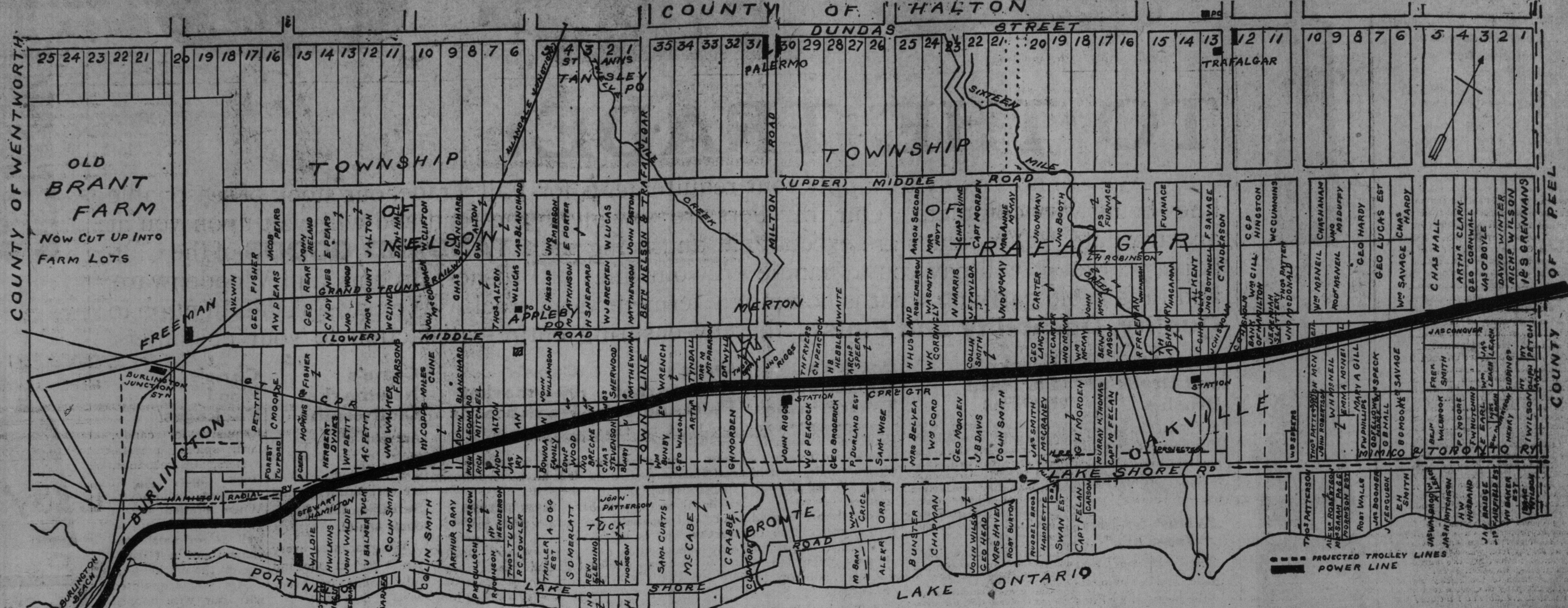

GREAT NAVAL DESIGNER IN TORONTO TO-MORROW

Sir William White Coming With Delegation of British Civil Engineers. Toronto will entertain for two days a large delegation from the Institution of Civil Engineers of Great Britain, who arrive to-morrow afternoon from Montreal after visits to that city, Quebec and Ottawa. The British society is one of the greatest and most learned bodies of scientists in the world, is a century old and has a most illustrious history. This is the first time, however, since its incorporation that the engineers as a body have journeyed from their ancient headquarters in Great George-street, Westminster, London. Now, headed by Sir William White, their president and former chief constructor of the British navy, they are touring in America, en route to St. Louis. In the party, which numbers about 100, are included Cuthbert Brereton, member of council and associate with Sir John Wolfe Barry in the construction of the Barry docks and the Tower Bridge; Alexander Ross, member of council and chief engineer of the Great Northern Railway Company; Professor W. C. Unwin, member of council, head of the engineering department of the Central Technical College, and a well-known authority on questions of hydraulics, thermo-dynamics and strength of materials; J. H. F. Tudbury is secretary of the institution; H. E. Jones, president of the Institution of Gas Engineers; J. A. F. Apinwall, vice-president of the Institution of Mechanical Engineers; W. H. Finner, chief engineer of the Manchester Ship Canal; J. A. Brodie, city engineer of Liverpool; H. H. Wake, city engineer of the Sunderland Harbor Board; W. Barrington, chief engineer for the construction of several railways and public works in Ireland, and P. W. Welk, Joseph Lobley, A. C. Huxley, J. G. Hudson, W. H. Winstone, W. Rowley, H. T. Ashton, W. J. Turnbull, H. O. Baldry, C. E. Botley, A. H. Case, R. Thompson, W. A. T. Pail, J. Thomas, L. Robertson, H. D. Pearsall, W. Col-

Program in Toronto.

While here they will be the guests of the Civil Engineers' Association. On arriving to-morrow at 5 o'clock carriages will be provided to take the visitors to their hotels. On Monday they will be driven around the city and shown the various public buildings, being received by the mayor at 10:30 at the city hall and by Premier Ross at the parliament buildings at 11, calling later at the residence of the German consul, S. Nordheim. In the afternoon, weather permitting, a sail on the lake in private steam yachts will be enjoyed. At 4:30 the lieutenant-governor will hold a reception at government house. On Tuesday the party continues its travels, going to Niagara Falls. Designer of Britain's Navy. Sir William Henry White, K.C.B., D.S.C., LL.D., F.R.S., late director of naval construction, and assistant controller of the navy, president of the institution of civil engineers, was born at Devonport, Feb. 2, 1846, and educated at the Royal School of Naval Architecture, South Kensington, where the school was under the direction of the lords of the council, admiralty supporting it. He graduated at the head of the list of students in 1867, and held that position until 1870, when he was appointed to the office of naval architect (fleet) of the Royal School of Naval Architecture, was at once appointed to the charge of the department of the admiralty, where he remained until 1883, rising through the various grades to the rank of chief constructor. He was appointed professor of naval architecture at the royal school in 1870, and held that position there and at the royal naval college concurrently with his admiralty appointment until 1881. He resigned his position in the admiralty in March, 1883, receiving a special letter of thanks from the lords commissioners for past services. From March, 1883, to Oct. 1885, he was engaged in the organization and direction of the shipbuilding department of the Elswick works of Sir William Armstrong & Co. He was invited by the admiralty in 1885 to assume the office of director of naval construction in conjunction with that of assistant controller of the navy. Sir William White has been responsible for the designs and supervision of the construction of all the ships laid down for the royal navy from 1885 to 1902. This great feat included various special programs of new construction. The shipbuilding expenditure of 1880,000 on eight vessels built for service in Australian waters, funded by the grants made by the colonies. The Naval Defence Act in

1889 provided for the construction of 70 ships at a cost of £22,500,000. These were practically finished in five years and represented the greatest feat in new construction accomplished up to that date. The average annual rate of expenditure on new construction was more than trebled during the period Sir William White held office. Amongst the vessels designed by Sir William White are some of the largest, swiftest and most powerful battleships and cruisers existing in modern war fleets. His services in connection with the Naval Defence Act were recognized by his appointment as C. B. in 1899. In 1901 His Majesty the King of Denmark has conferred the distinction of Knight Commander of the Dannebrog on him. The University of Cambridge has given him the honorary degree of doctor of science, and the University of Glasgow that of doctor of laws. He is also a fellow of the Royal Society of London and Edinburgh; past president of the Institution of Mechanical Engineers; vice-president of the Institution of Marine Engineers; member of the royal commission for the Paris Exhibition of 1900; honorary member of the Institution of Engineers and Shipbuilders in Scotland, the North Coast Institution of Engineers and Shipbuilders, the Liverpool Engineering Society, and the Society of Engineers; member of the Association of Technical Maritime of France, the Royal United Kingdom of Engineers, the Institution of Naval Architects, and of the Imperial Institute. He is the author of "Manual of Naval Architecture," which has become a standard work, has been translated into Russian, German and Italian and other navies; also of a "Treatise on Shipbuilding," and numerous memoirs and papers on the science and practice of shipbuilding.

Noted Railway Engineer.

Cuthbert Arthur Brereton, Lieut.-Col. Engineer and Railway Volunteer Staff Corps, associate of the Institution of Naval Architects, entered the profession of a civil engineer in 1888. He was resident engineer of the Lynton and Osmore Railway and Portmouth dock at South Wales, 1878-79; executive engineer of the Waterford, Duncannon and Limerick Railway, 1878-79; he entered into partnership with Sir John Wolfe Barry, K.C.B., 1883, and has since been engaged in the construction of the Barry docks and railway, of Middlesbrough docks, Surrey commercial docks, Grangemouth docks, Calandar and Oban railway extension, the Avonmouth docks and Kew Bridge, also in various works for the Natal

Oil on the Manitoulin.

Syndicate Formed to Develop Fields—Rich Wells Struck. Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Sept. 23.—(Special.)—W. P. Bullard, a Chicago man, who is in the Soo this week, en route to his home city, reports that a syndicate of which he is one of the leading members has found petroleum in paying quantities on the Manitoulin Island. It is the intention of the company, he says, to develop the fields on an extensive scale. Indications of oil having been obtained in the past, Bullard's company some time ago secured a lease of five thousand acres of land on an Indian reservation in the eastern end of the island for two years and commenced drilling holes. So far four holes have been drilled and in each of them oil has been struck at a depth of about 400 feet in paying quantities. The last one filled with oil nearly to the surface of the ground and shows indications of being a gusher. It was intended upon the completion of the hole that it should be shot, but nitro-glycerine was unobtainable because of the transportation companies refusing to carry high explosives. It was therefore postponed while the syndicate decided upon the nature of the explosive. The erection of the factory of which the company is in the meantime the boring of more holes is being continued, and it is expected that there will be a dozen wells ready to shoot by the time the factory is in operation. Mr. Bullard believes the oil indications point to successful operations and expresses the hope that his company will be shipping the product next year. That there is oil on Manitoulin Island is not exactly news, of recent years practically nothing has been done to develop the fields. Indications of petroleum have always been apparent, and there is in one place a drossen well spring. Some forty years ago a company began shipments from there, but trouble arose with the Indians and the industry was abandoned. A Past Run. G. F. Shepley, K.C., was retained in the appeal against the judgment in favor of the electric light companies.

The report of the assessors of the fifth ward shows an increase in the assessment similar to that made in the other wards.

There are 3125 dwellings in the ward occupied by their owners and 4054 by tenants.

There are twenty-six churches in the ward assessed for \$276,000, which are exempt from taxation, as well as 100 missions valued at \$25,000.

The total exemptions are \$37,770, less than last year. Five churches were torn down and the Bathurst-street school, \$15,750, was moved into a factory.

Port Arthur, Sept. 23.—(Special.)—Last night shortly after eight, while the last of the Midland King's cargo of coal was being taken from the hold at the C.P.R. coal dock, Port William, about a ton of coal dropped from the top of the derrick, striking full upon the head of Mitro Gregolinaky, killing him instantly.

Death Sat at Banquet. Frontenac, N.Y., Sept. 23.—Death at the banquet of members of the Western Union of Fire Underwriters last night, H. M. Magill of Cincinnati, while responding to a toast celebrating the 25th anniversary of the organization, fell forward and died soon afterward.

NONE OF PARTY INJURED

East Brookfield, Mass., Sept. 23.—A special train conveying the Archbishop of Canterbury from Bar Harbor, Maine, to Washington, was wrecked on the Boston and Albany Division of the New York Central Railroad near the station here this morning.

The archbishop's train struck the North Brookfield engine with a terrific crash and demolished the locomotive.

With the archbishop, besides Mrs. Davidson, Mr. Morgan, were Rev. Hyla Holden and Rev. J. Ellison and attendants. It was rumored that a maid was hurt, but her injuries were not held to be serious.

On to Washington. The Archbishop of Canterbury's special train, with a new engine, resumed its trip to Washington just before 10 o'clock.

None of the occupants had left their berths except Mr. Morgan, who was at the breakfast table when the crash came. Large plate glass mirrors in the cars were broken, as were also several of the breakfast tables.

CANADA'S PEACE ATTITUDE BY SIR THOMAS BARCLAY

Proposition to Settle Difference With America by Arbitration Meets With Favor.

Edinburgh, Sept. 23.—The Institute of International Law to-day discussed Sir Thomas Barclay's proposal that a permanent committee of the institute be appointed for the purpose of dealing with questions arising out of practice before the Hague Court.

In the course of his speech Sir Thomas Barclay referred to considerable length to the agitation regarding a treaty of arbitration between Great Britain and America. He said that he hoped as soon as the election in the latter country was over, substantial progress would be made in this direction, irrespective of which party was victorious.

Sir Thomas said there had been doubt regarding the attitude of Canada on this subject, as he had addressed meetings through the Dominion and found the proposition to settle differences with America by arbitration was warmly welcomed.

Sir Thomas said the peace of the world now depended upon the power of neutrals and instanced the fact that the United States in the Venezuelan affair sent Great Britain, Italy and Germany to The Hague in order to settle their claims.

A committee was appointed to study treaties of international arbitration.
