

OUR STEAMSHIP ROUTES aluable Information For Marin-

ers on the Currents of the Bay It is seldom that such an important ad

ance has been made in assistance to nav vance has been made in assistance to navigation, as will result from a publication just issued by the Tidal and Current Survey of the Marine Department. It consists of concise and clearly printed tables, which show the direction and set of the currents at every hour of the tide, along the whole extent of the Atlantic steamship route from Cape Sable to St. John. These tables are accompanied by a chart of the Bay of Fundy and its approaches, which gives a summary of the information in graphic form, for ready reference.

Such tables as these, which show the tidal streams, hour by hour, can be had for some European waters, such as the English Channel, where they prove invaluable to the seaman. But this is the first time that such complete information has ever been published for any North American waters of extended area. The harbor of St. John is to be congratulated in benefitting so largely from this important advance in the interest of navigation. It is safe to say that these tables will largely compensate for any disadvantage which results from foggy weather that vessels may meet within this region.

The information which these Current Tables afford, may also be accepted as thoroughly reliable; as it is based on obervations throughout two seasons, in 1904 and 1907. These observations were carried out under the personal supervision of Dr. W. B. Dawson, the director of the Survey of Tides and Currents, who has had long experience in such work. The surveying steamer "Gulnare" was employed for the purpose, and by anchoring at selected points or stations, it served as a fixed point from which to ascertain correctly the direction and speed of the current. The observations were continued day and night to make them complete; and the most modern methods were used, including improved current meters and the latest electrical appliances. But this need not be enlarged upon, as a glance at a table appended to the publication will show the large amount of work that the results are based upon.

Another valuable table gives the time of slack water at all points, which will be specially useful to fishermen.

This publication supplements the Tide Tables, which are issued annually by the Tidal Survey. Together they afford the most complete information that can be given regarding the movements of the water in the Bay of Fundy and its approaches. The Tide Tables for St. John are now based on eight years of continuous obse
