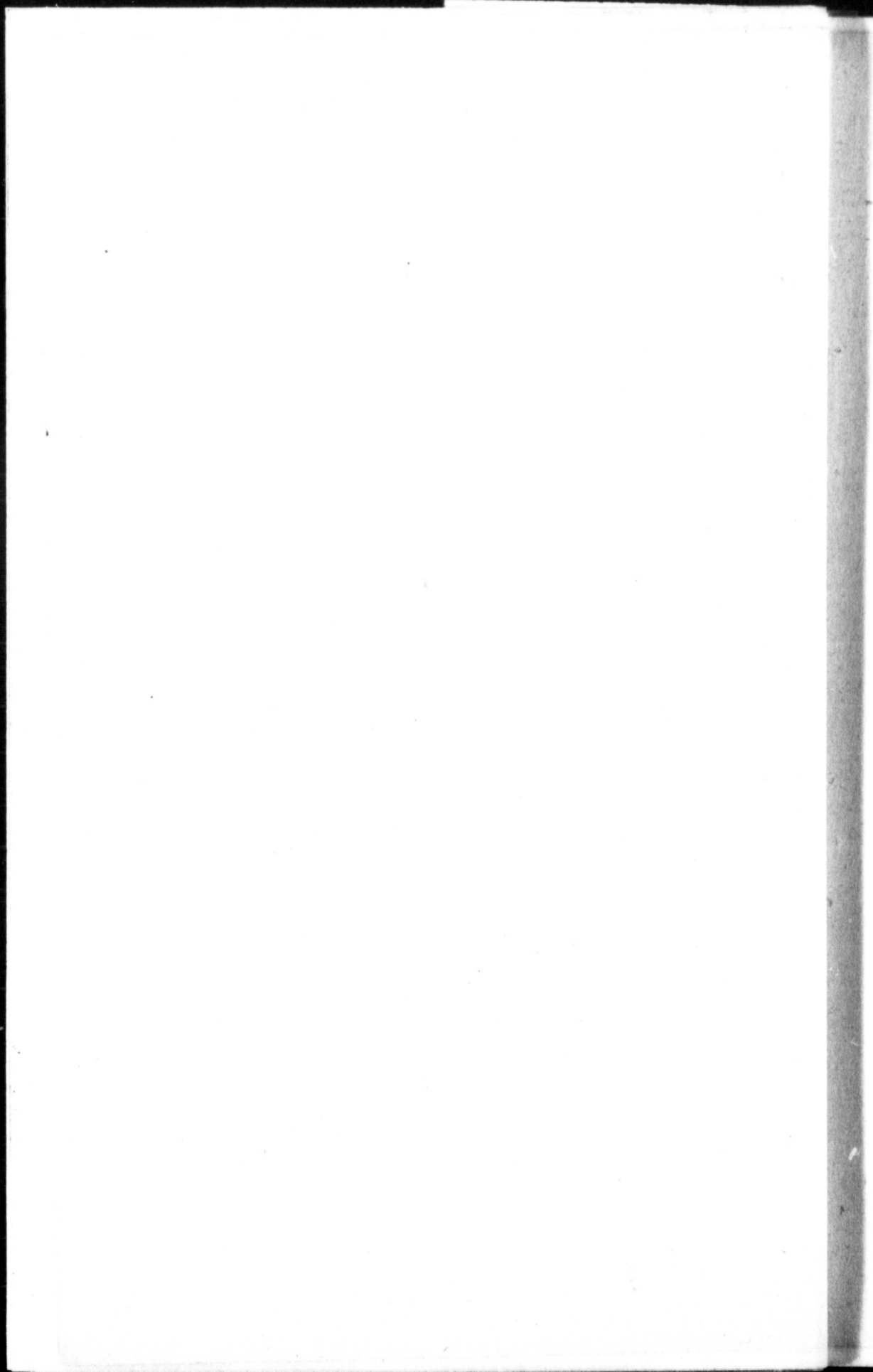

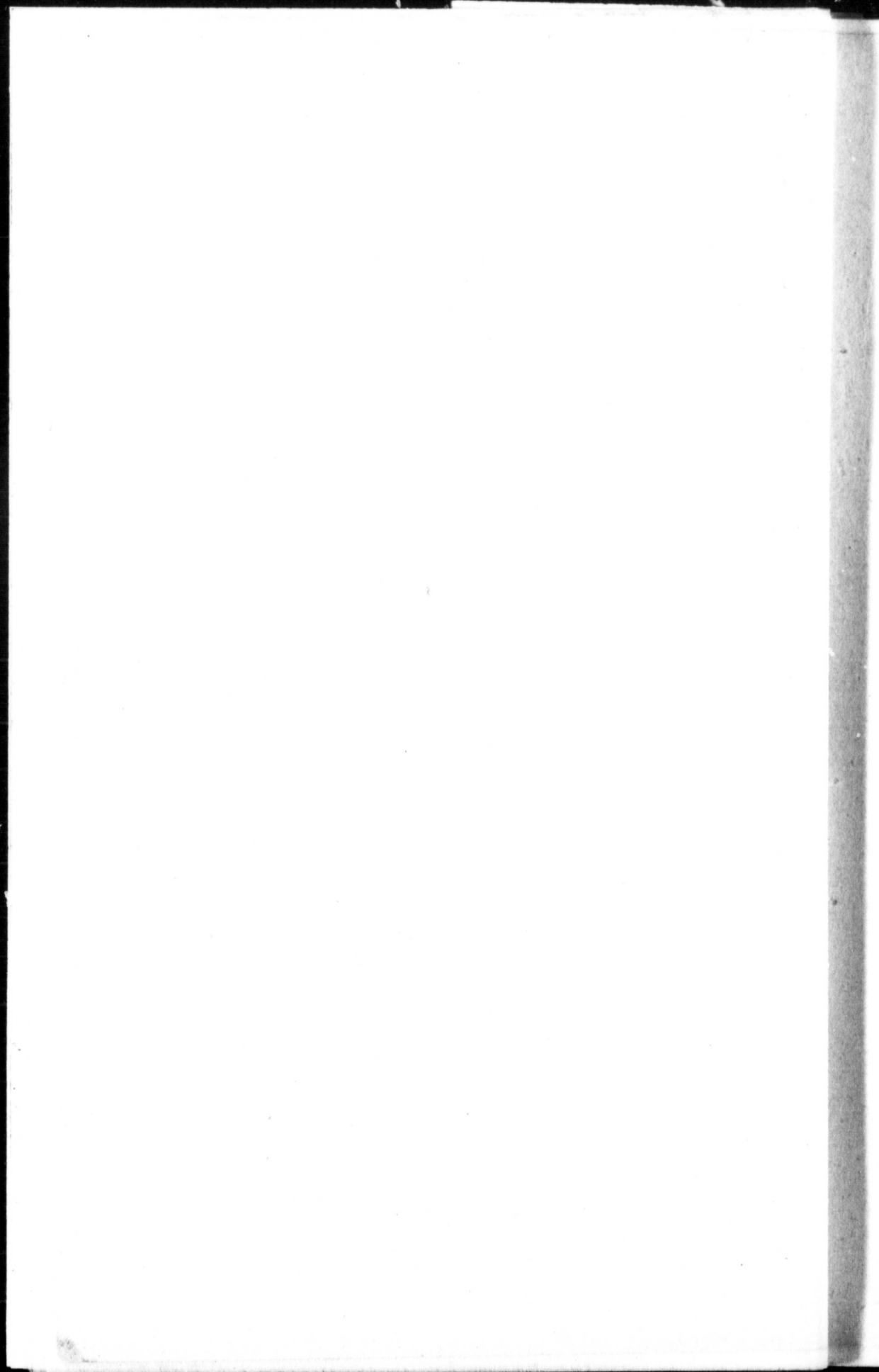

MINUTES OF CONFERENCE

HELD IN THE

DOMINION METHODIST CHURCH, OTTAWA, ONTARIO.

CONFERENCE ORGANIZED JUNE 4TH, 1890.

The SEVENTH SESSION of the MONTREAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Church assembled, according to appointment, in the Dominion Methodist Church, Ottawa, Ontario, on Wednesday, 4th June, 1890, at ten o'clock a.m. The Rev. A. CARMAN, D.D., General Superintendent, in the chair.

The Conference Prayer-meeting had been previously held, from nine to ten o'clock, conducted by the President of the Conference.

The Rev. Dr. CARMAN, General Superintendent, gave out hymn No. 1, and the Rev. JAMES KINES, President of the Conference, led in prayer.

The roll being called by the Secretary, 126 ministers and 22 laymen answered to their names.

OBITUARIES.

REV. A. C. CHAMBERS.

Alexander Carson Chambers was born near Enniskillen, Ireland, in the year 1844. The precise date of his birth has not been ascertained. When but a lad his father immigrated to Canada, and settled in Toronto, where our brother received his earlier education. He was converted to God in early manhood. During the Conference year 1868-9, he travelled under the Chairman, laboring on the Whitby Circuit. He was received on trial at the Conference of 1869, and in 1873, having completed his probation, he was received into full connexion and ordained. In 1877 he was transferred from the London into the Montreal Conference, and since then has labored on the Portsmouth, Morven and Gosport, Wolford, Carleton Place, Inkerman, and Ashton Circuits, with a fair degree of success. He was a genial, warm-hearted brother, a true friend and good preacher. His last illness, caused by a malignant tumor, was very severe and protracted; yet, through it all, he was wonderfully sustained by the power of that Gospel he had preached to others. His end was peace. He died at Napanee, Ont., at the residence of his brother, the Rev. A. B. Chambers, LL.B., Chairman of the Napanee District, on the 16th of September, 1889, aged forty-five years and six months, leaving one child, King, the fruit of his first marriage, to mourn his loss.

REV. ANDREW SHIELDS.

Brother Andrew Shields was born in the township of Huntley, county of Carleton, Ont., on 28th June, 1865, and died at his home, Westmeath township, on July 11th, 1890. In early life he was the subject of religious training, both his parents being members of the Methodist Church. When about fourteen years old he was converted to God in meetings held in Lee's school-house by Rev. Mr. Peck, then stationed on the Alice Mission. Some years afterwards, when attending school at the village of Front Westmeath, he received license as a local preacher, and commenced taking public work under the direction of Rev. Mr. Tennant, then Superintendent of Westmeath Circuit. He was appointed to the Lake Talon Mission in 1884, and labored on that Mission earnestly and successfully for two years, enduring hardships for Christ as "a good soldier of the Cross."

Being appointed by Conference to attend college, he prosecuted his studies there for one year and a half, when his health failed, and he returned to his home in the hope that with rest and care he would soon recover. Slowly but surely, however, consumption, no doubt induced by exposure on the mission field, did its fatal work, and after bearing with Christian patience and fortitude his affliction, he passed peacefully and triumphantly home to his reward. His was a beautiful character, exhibiting in a marked degree the simplicity, sincerity and earnestness of the true Christian, making his influence for good to be felt by all with whom he came in contact, our own Dr. Elliott testifying that "his countenance was a benediction." He led many to Christ, both in the vicinity of his own home and in the mission field, and manifested his deep interest in the salvation of souls by earnest labor on Bryson and other missions during college vacation, and even when his physical strength was failing. He longed to live and work for Christ, but was resigned to the will of God, and when the summons came he passed away gloriously, exclaiming, "I can't express it! I can't express it!" In his death we lose an earnest worker in the vineyard, but "He being dead, yet speaketh."

REV. JOHN C. OSBORNE.

John C. Osborne died on Wednesday, August 14th, 1889, at his late residence, 161 Cambridge Street, Ottawa. The deceased minister was born in the township of Sophiasburg, Prince Edward county, on October 16th, 1819. In 1846 he joined the Wesleyan Methodist Conference, and for forty one continuous years performed the arduous duties of a Methodist preacher, thirty of which were spent on Circuits to which he was appointed, including Bowmanville, Brighton, Lindsay, Sydney, Clarendon, Onslow, Wakefield, etc. For eleven years he labored in a supernumerary and a located relation. In 1887, on account of failing health, he was superannuated, and selected Ottawa as a place of retirement. For the last two years he failed gradually, but surely, and in spite of medical and domestic care, he gradually sank down to infantile weakness, and quietly passed away. He leaves a widow, six sons and a daughter. He has secured for his boys commercial, collegiate and university advantages; one has entered the Methodist ministry, and his daughter is married to a useful minister in the United States. As a man and a minister he was cautious, conscientious and careful of the interests of others, truly brotherly to men alike in the lay and ministerial ranks. He was what people called a Methodist preacher of the old stamp; thoughtful, earnest, laborious, a preacher of the plain Gospel. On the premises, 161 Cambridge Street, Ottawa, his late residence, is that which should be of interest to many an old Methodist, namely, the well-worn saddle on which the tired veteran preacher rode through the Canadian woods to minister to the spiritual wants of the new settlers. He used it forty-one years. A memorial service was held at his late residence Friday afternoon, just prior to the removal of the body. Ten brother ministers were present. The service was conducted by the Rev. Geo. McRitchie, Chairman of the District. He was buried at Shawville, which was one of his last fields of labor.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF STANSTEAD WESLEYAN COLLEGE.

The Trustees of the Stanstead Wesleyan College most respectfully submit to the Conference the following report for the year 1889-90:

The attendance during the year has been as follows:—Lady boarders, 13; gentlemen boarders, 8; lady day students, 33; gentlemen day students, 53; total enrolment, 107.

At the close of the scholastic year the degrees of Mistress in Liberal Arts will be conferred upon two young ladies. Four young ladies will take the degree of Mistress of Music.

In the Commercial Department five young men will take their diplomas, two will write for the Associate in Arts, three will write for Teachers' Certificates, thirty-four candidates take the examinations for the Government grade work. The educational work of the year will be best indicated by the success of the students in the final examinations. Throughout the year, we are pleased to state, there has been a healthy religious interest in the College, and the means of grace have resulted in much good to the students.

It is also very gratifying to record that the year has been marked by an almost entire freedom from sickness, a fact which speaks well for the healthfulness of the College surroundings. Some changes will occur in the staff of teachers: Rev. L. M. England, B.A., who has very efficiently served the College during the year, returns to the regular work of the ministry. The services of Prof. H. W. Townsend, B.A., a man of great professional reputation, have been secured for the coming year as classical and mathematical teacher. As to the financial results, we are pleased to report that the income for the year has been \$4,602.62, an amount fully equal to the legitimate expenditure of the year.

We are also pleased to report that during the year the College has been affiliated with the McGill University, Montreal.

The Conference will be glad to know that the educational work of the College has thus been recognized by the leading university of the Province.

With a thoroughly efficient staff, and in the new relation of affiliation with McGill University, the College will now be in a position to do more in the matter of superior education than ever before, and we bespeak for it the sympathy and liberal patronage of the Methodism of this Conference.

The Trustees avail themselves of this opportunity of placing on record their high appreciation of the valuable services gratuitously rendered to them and to the Institution by the Rev. C. A. Hanson, in the capacity of Secretary-Treasurer during past years. His removal to England, and therefore his necessary severance from the College Board, is to the Trustees and Conference an occasion of most sincere regret, and we acknowledge with gratitude the most earnest efforts and large-hearted liberality of our esteemed Brother Hanson. We have, however, assurance of his continued sympathy with the friends of the Stanstead Wesleyan College, and we trust that under the Providence of God, his future may be directed so as to contribute to the welfare, happiness and prosperity of himself and family.

It will be remembered that last year the Trustees experienced considerable difficulty in regard to the selection and appointment of the Principal. For various reasons Dr. Henderson retired from that position, and at the time of Conference, negotiations with reference to the Principalship were incomplete. Subsequently a selection was made in the person of Rev. F. McAmmond, and the Board of Trustees congratulate the Conference and the friends of the College on the appointment of Principal McAmmond, whose zealous devotion to his responsible duties, and whose eminent qualifications have demonstrated the wisdom of the choice made, being fully persuaded that we are indebted to Principal McAmmond for the continued integrity of the Institution.

The Trustees are, however, strongly of opinion that the Principal has been greatly overworked in the endeavor to maintain and advance the interests of the Institution, and should be relieved, to some extent, of the responsibilities of teaching. As principal and moral governor, Principal McAmmond should have charge of the general management of the College, and devote as much time as practicable in visiting the relations

and circuits within the bounds of the Conference and elsewhere, if need be, with a view to urge the heads of families to allow their sons and daughters the facilities for superior education offered to them in Stanstead Wesleyan College. For this important service Principal McAmmond is eminently qualified, and his efforts would undoubtedly result in the enlarged usefulness of the College. This proposal, taken in connection with the appointment of professor and teacher of the highest reputation for the several departments, the Trustees consider entitling the Institution to public confidence and support, and authorizes the assurance of a large measure of success for the future.

We recommend that the names of Revs. Dr. Antliff and James Henderson be added to the list of Trustees.

REPORT OF THE STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

The Statistical Committee has been laboring under great disadvantages in consequence of the incompleteness of the returns. If the Districts could arrange to have their schedules complete before Conference it would greatly facilitate the work of the Committee.

Your Committee is glad to report that though there has been the somewhat large number of 961 dropped and expelled, there has been an increase in membership as the result of the year's operations of 1,188.

The present membership of this Conference is as follows:—On trial, 1,849; full members, 32,307; total, 34,156.

The number of baptisms during the year:—Infants, 2,537; adults, 230; total, 2,767. Marriages, 951; burials, 1,549.

The number of Churches within the bounds of the Conference is 451; other preaching places, 193; value of our churches \$1,793,726; number of parsonages, 150—value, \$234,115; value of furniture, \$35,765, making a total value of church property of \$2,072,188.

Our explanation of this is in the fact that quite a number of schools are not represented in the report. We, therefore, urge that in every District careful attention be given to this matter, in order that the annual report be as accurate as possible. Notwithstanding this, we are pleased to notice an increase in the contributions to the Missionary Society.

It is hardly necessary for your Committee to again recommend our excellent Sabbath-school literature for use in all our schools, but your Committee recommend the Conference to memorialize the General Conference to take the necessary steps for the publication of a French Sabbath-school paper.

Your Committee also recommend this Conference to memorialize the General Conference to request the Book Committee to publish a suitable Sabbath-school register.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION FUND.

1st. Your Committee respectfully recommend the Conference to exercise the utmost caution in carrying out the provisions of the Discipline (see 431, page 162), and request the General Conference to so alter the phraseology of the said section as to render commutation in such cases compulsory, provided that such claimants shall have the opportunity, if dissatisfied with the sum offered by the Board, of appealing to the Annual Conference to which he belongs, whose decision shall be final.

2nd. Your Committee has carefully and prayerfully considered the present mode of raising the assessment.

Your Committee beg to recommend as follows :

Whereas, in the judgment of your Committee, the Superannuation Fund never was in so healthy a condition as at the present time ; all the claims of the superannuated brethren being fully met ;

And whereas, in the judgment of your Committee, no scheme can be devised out of which some exceptional instances of hardship will not arise ;

And whereas the keeping of this Fund in a healthy condition is of supreme importance to every ministerial member of this Conference ;

And whereas, in the judgment of your Committee, the present law of the Church, providing for the stronger circuits helping the weak, by the readjustment of the assessment made by the Superannuation Board at the Financial District Meeting, is about the best and most equitable method of meeting these exceptional cases ;

Therefore your Committee cannot see its way clear to recommend any change in this important subject

3rd. *Re* the recommendation of the Pembroke District, relating to the personal tax of ministers, which reads as follows :—

Moved by C. Allum, seconded by J. D. Ellis, B.A.,—“ That inasmuch as the present system of taxing ministers for the Superannuation Fund is inequitable, be it resolved, that instead of the present system, the salary, board and fuel be taxed at the rate of two per cent., and we hereby request the Annual Conference to memorialize General Conference to so change the law.”

In the judgment of your Committee it is not wise to recommend any change.

GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND REPORT, 1890.

To the Officers and Members of the several Annual Conferences of the Methodist Church:—

DEAR BRETHREN,—At a meeting of the Advisory Committee of the above Fund the Chairman and Treasurer were instructed to prepare a circular to be sent to the several Annual Conferences, setting forth the present state of the Fund, and the necessity for using prompt, general and vigorous measures, so to increase the income of the Fund as to enable the Treasurer to meet the necessary expenses.

The Committee also decided that accounts should be closed on the 15th day of August, in order to allow time for the Audit, and preparation of the report for the General Conference. All sums therefore intended to be embraced in our regular Quadrennial Report must be in the Treasurer's hands at that date.

As the month of July is the time for taking up the collection for this Fund, there will be ample time to forward the collections of July, 1890, before the 15th August of that year, if prompt measures are adopted for that purpose, but there will be no time to spare. Promptness and punctuality will be absolutely necessary.

The following was the financial condition of the Fund as found on the 31st May, 1890:—

The indebtedness of the Fund at the present date is about \$10,333.41, and there are still heavy claims to be met before the close of the year. If the money due be not paid before the close of the quadrennial term, the Treasurer will be unable to pay the expenses of the delegates to the General Conference.

The Advisory Committee of the Fund at its late meeting, in view of the doubts entertained as to the meaning of clause 127, page 50, in the Discipline, and for other reasons, unanimously passed the following resolution, viz.: *Resolved*—"That no delegate to the General Conference be paid any sum until the Conference itself give the meaning of the fore-

mentioned clause, and direction as to the course to be pursued in relation to said payments."

The Treasurer has kept the several Conferences posted from year to year, both in the press and otherwise, as to the embarrassed condition of the Fund, and has urged the necessity of increased payments, but so far, apparently, without much effect. He can do no more, and now begs to notify all concerned that the Conference law will have to take its course. He can "disburse only the amount on hand for General Conference expenses, leaving each delegate deficient in his expenses by an equal amount." The General Conference will have to explain what this clause means, and provide for its enforcement, and the Conferences will have themselves to blame if they have to pay in whole, or in part, for the expenses of their delegates.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your Committee on Sabbath Observance beg leave to make the following recommendations to the Conference:—

Whereas, It is painfully true that continued and persistent efforts are being made on the part of the unchristian world to destroy the sacredness of the Sabbath-day by carrying on various kinds of business, such as running railway trains, steamboats and street cars, and by seeking pleasure and recreation in picnicing and boating on the Lord's Day;

Whereas, There is a bill, known as Charlton's bill, now before the Dominion Parliament, to secure the better observance of the Lord's Day, and that said bill received its first and second reading during the last session of Parliament;

And whereas, The provisions of said bill are such as will greatly strengthen the hands of all Christian workers, and tend to preserve the sacredness of the Lord's Day;

And whereas, The moral support of the Christian Church is absolutely necessary in order that the said bill may be carried through Parliament and become the law of the Dominion of Canada;

Resolved,—1. That this Conference most heartily approves of said bill, believing that it will, if passed, supply a felt want in dealing with Sabbath desecration.

Resolved,—2. That we pledge ourselves as a Conference and as individuals to co-operate with those who are endeavoring to carry the afore-said bill through Parliament, by obtaining signatures to petitions which will be presented to the Senate and House of Commons; the petition

which the Lord's Day Alliance of the Dominion of Canada will provide, for the purpose of securing the passage of the aforesaid bill through Parliament.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee beg to submit the following report :—

During the year a circular was sent out for the purpose of securing a better knowledge of the sentiments of our people, throughout the bounds of the Montreal Conference, on the great question of temperance, and also to find out, as nearly as possible, the work which is being done to advance the interests of this good cause.

The questions submitted were :—

1. To what extent does the temperance sentiment prevail in your congregation or Circuit ?

2. Are you aware of any families suffering in your charge from the effects of intoxicants, either through the indulgence of the parents or the young people ? How many ?

3. What temperance organizations are there within the bounds of your charge ?

4. Do your Sunday-school workers take any interest in temperance work ?

5. What laws exist in your locality for the restriction of the liquor traffic, and are they fairly well enforced ?

6. Were temperance sermons preached during the year ? And were any steps taken to instruct the Sunday-school children respecting the evil effects of alcohol ?

The responses from the Circuits have been very satisfactory. A few brethren have not made any returns. We hope next year to hear from all, as these data are most important to your Committee in making their annual report.

From the returns sent in, we observe that the average number of families injured by the use of alcoholic beverages, on each Circuit, is about four.

Some congregations are entirely free. Others suffer very greatly. It is sad to contemplate that right under our eyes, in the congregations to which we minister, there are from 500 to 600 families where intoxicants are doing their dreadful work of destruction.

From some of the neighborhoods the reports are so lamentable, as regards the prevalence of drunkenness, that your Committee would respectfully urge the Chairmen of Districts, if possible, to arrange for extra efforts in such localities. Many of our active laymen might be enlisted in such work if their attention was called to it.

It is encouraging to find that on many of the Circuits there has been a creditable amount of practical work done during the past year.

In fully seven-eighths of the Circuits reported temperance sermons have been preached, and lectures and addresses given, and in many of the Sabbath schools the children have been instructed respecting the evil effects of alcohol on the human system.

It is very gratifying to find that several Circuits report the existence over their territory of prohibitory laws, such as the Scott Act, the Dunkin Act, and Municipal Acts, upon the whole fairly well enforced. The smallness of the number of families affected by drink in these Circuits is particularly noticeable, as compared with others where such laws do not exist.

From all the Circuits comes the cry for total prohibition, and your Committee respectfully asks the Conference to confirm the following special resolution, viz.: "That the liquor traffic is contrary to the Word of God and the spirit of the Christian religion. That there can be no satisfactory cure for it short of its total prohibition, and that the General Conference be requested to take such steps as shall secure the co-operation of the whole Methodist Church with other Christian bodies for bringing about, as speedily as possible, such legislation."

Until then, and perhaps even for years afterward, we must not relax our effort to instruct and persuade, that our children and childrens' children may be fully fortified, not by legal enactments merely, but by a larger intelligence and deeper moral conviction against this dreadful foe of mankind.

In response to a request from the Dominion Alliance, that the Conference appoint four delegates to attend a convention to be held in the city of Montreal, in August next, the following brethren were named and appointed to attend as representatives the said convention: Rev. T. G. Williams, D.D., Rev. S. D. Chown, W. H. Lambley, Esq., and S. J. Carter, Esq.

By resolution of the Conference, the President and Secretary were authorized to sign on behalf of the Conference petitions to be presented by the Dominion Alliance to the Governor-General, the Senate and the House of Commons, asking for a law totally prohibiting the liquor traffic.

A request emanating from the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada asking for co-operation, having been presented to the Conference, the following resolutions were proposed and adopted:

Whereas, The traffic in intoxicating liquors is a recognized evil, producing a large proportion of the poverty, suffering, taxation, disorder and crime in our Dominion; *and whereas*, We believe that a law enacted by the Dominion Parliament prohibiting the importation, manufacture, and sale of all alcoholic liquors, except for use in mechanical, medicinal, and sacramental purposes, and containing ample provisions for its strict enforcement by the proper authorities, will greatly diminish these and other evils, and largely increase the wealth, prosperity, comfort, health, and peace of our country;

It is therefore resolved—That, in the opinion of this Montreal Conference, it is now the duty of the Dominion Parliament to enact such a prohibitory law.

3. That a form of petition to the Dominion Parliament, asking for the enactment of such a prohibitory law be agreed upon by the Committee on Temperance of the different Churches, and that each committee attend to the work, and bear the expense of circulating such petitions among its own people.

4. That such petition be signed by members and adherents of the Churches, who are not less than sixteen years of age.

5. That the arranging and carrying out of all necessary details be entrusted to a joint committee, to be composed of one member of the committee of each church co-operating in this movement.

In view of the fact that in 1889 the Dominion Parliament declared that it will give the country a prohibitory law when the people are ready for it, we believe the Christian people of the land should not let this opportunity pass without letting their voices be heard. We, therefore, earnestly hope that you will do all in your power to aid in presenting to Parliament at its session of 1891, such a petition so largely signed that it cannot fail to command the favorable attention of our rulers.

The following proposals were adopted unanimously:—

Proposals to be submitted to Quarterly Boards, Annual District Meetings, and Annual Conferences, with the request that each of these courts adopt, and forward the scheme embodied therein, to the next Superior Court; accompanying this action with the expressed desire that such Superior Court shall sanction said scheme and take such steps as it shall deem expedient to secure the authorization of such scheme or modification of it, by the General Conference at its approaching session in September, 1890.

1. That the Superintendent of each Circuit or Mission be and is hereby requested to secure the circulation of the following declaration, and solicit signatures thereto, for the purpose of securing the co-operation of as large a number as possible.

2. That the canvass be made as soon after the acceptance of this scheme by the General Conference as circumstances will permit.

3. That immediately after the canvass is completed the Superintendent shall make a return of the result to the Financial Secretary.

4. That the Financial Secretary of each District prepare a schedule of such returns, for the benefit of the temperance work.

DECLARATION.

We, whose names are appended to this declaration, in view of the supreme importance to our country of a prohibitory law in relation to the liquor traffic, hereby agree to give our political influence and vote, irrespective of party ties, only to such candidates for parliamentary honors as shall satisfy us that they will use all proper means to secure the adoption of a prohibitory law at the earliest possible date.

Explanatory Note.—It is understood that in case all the candidates satisfy the signers of this declaration that they fulfil all the conditions required, or if none of the candidates meet the conditions, then the obligation of this Declaration is null and void.

Your Committee beg to express its strong disapproval of the use of fermented wine at the sacrament of the Lord's Supper, and would respectfully urge upon our brethren to take all necessary precautions to prevent the same.

The name of the Rev. D. V. Lucas was recommended to the General Conference to co-operate in the plan proposed by our brethren of the Presbyterian General Assembly for securing total prohibition of the liquor traffic.

The Committee respectfully acknowledge the receipt of a communica-

tion from the Grand Councillor of the Royal Templars of Temperance, asking for co-operation in the formation of a prohibition political party, but beg to decline taking any action, regarding the same as inexpedient.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY

The Committee on Church Property beg leave to report :—

MONTREAL DISTRICT.

Lachute.—That we recommend the Conference to grant the Trustee Board of Lachute Church permission to sell piece of land, 39 x 41 feet, connected with burying ground, and building thereon, proceeds to be applied to the reduction of debt on said church.

Longueuil.—Also, that the Conference grant to the Trustees of Longueuil property permission to sell said property, proceeds to be placed at the disposal of the General Board of Missions.

KINGSTON DISTRICT.

Eatonville.—That we recommend Conference to grant the Trustees of Eatonville Church, Seeley's Bay Circuit, permission to sell said Church property.

BROCKVILLE DISTRICT.

Prescott.—That we recommend that the Union Church Relief Fund Committee foreclose the mortgage on the late Methodist Episcopal Church at Prescott, in harmony with the Brockville District Meeting recommendation ; and further, that they be requested to assume the indebtedness of the Trustees, as represented by the statement made before your Committee, amounting to \$1,755.46.

Rockfield.—That the Rockfield Church, Mallorytown Circuit, be permitted by Conference to sell the old site ; proceeds to be applied to a new site.

St. Lawrence Central Camp-Ground.—Moved by Rev. F. Chisholm, seconded by Rev. W. H. Emsley, and

Resolved,—That whereas the Trustees of the St. Lawrence Central Camp-Ground (situate six miles west of Brockville) are at the present time under heavy financial embarrassment, which, if aid is not presently rendered, will bring financial disaster upon said Trustees, we therefore respectfully request the Conference to give its moral support to and endorsement of the appointment of Rev. ——— as Agent for securing stock for said ground.

PEMBROKE DISTRICT.

Beachburg.—That we recommend Conference to grant to the Trustees of the late Methodist Church of Canada church and parsonage at Beachburg, permission to sell said property ; proceeds to be applied to the erection of a new church in that village.

OTTAWA DISTRICT.

Mount Sherwood.—That we recommend Conference to grant to the Trustees of the Mount Sherwood Church permission to sell the same ; proceeds to be applied to the Building Fund of a new church now in course of erection.

STANSTEAD DISTRICT.

Beebe Plain.—That we recommend Conference to grant to the Trustees of Beebe Plain Church permission to sell said church; proceeds to be applied to the erection of a new church.

WATERLOO DISTRICT.

Farnham.—That we recommend the Conference to grant permission to the Trustee Board to sell part of the old church lot at Farnham; proceeds to be applied to the debt on the church. That the Conference grant permission to the Trustees of the parsonage at Farnham to sell said property; proceeds to be applied to a new parsonage adjoining the church.

HUNTINGDON DISTRICT.

Hemmingford.—That we recommend Conference to grant permission to the Trustees of Hemmingford church and parsonage to sell about one acre of land of the east end of the parsonage lot, and apply the proceeds to the benefit of the Hemmingford Church.

Your Committee, being profoundly impressed with the necessity of devising some means to meet certain Church debts which have rested upon the Connexion since the union (for example, the indebtedness of the late Methodist Episcopal Church at Prescott, and the Jubilee Church at Kingston), most urgently recommend that a Centennial Fund be raised for this purpose, and that the General Conference be memorialized to give the matter earnest and favorable consideration.

MODE OF EXAMINATION FOR THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE.

Candidates for our Ministry and Probationers shall be examined by means of papers prepared by the respective Examiners.

There shall also be an oral examination if required.

In addition to the usual thorough Theological Examination of Candidates before the District Meeting, the Chairman shall examine each Candidate as to his studies and general reading for the year, with a view to giving advice as to his course and method of study. No Candidate shall be allowed the year of probation until the studies for that year are completed.

The examination of Candidates shall be held in each District, under the supervision of the Chairman and the Examiners resident on the District, on the third Wednesday in April in each year, and at such place as the Chairman shall appoint. All papers shall be sent by the Examiners to the Chairman not later than the second Wednesday in April in each year. The answers to the papers shall be sent by the Chairman to the respective Examiners, who shall forward to the Secretary of the Board the valuation. The Secretary shall prepare the certificates, and forward them to the Chairman of the District, to be presented by him to the May District Meeting. The Secretary of the Board shall send the Chairman of each District the name of any Candidate or Probationer who may have taken part of the subjects in any given course, and the standing he

has attained, but shall not issue the certificate in any year's course until the Candidate or Probationer has completed it; and further, the standard qualification for young men recommended to be received into our Conference as Probationers shall not be lower than fifty per cent. of the marks on the preliminary course of study in the aggregate, and thirty-three and one-third per cent. in each subject. Also a standing of thirty-three and one-third per cent. shall be required in order to pass in each subject of the subsequent course, and the Conference directs that existing regulations relating to the time and manner of examinations be imperatively observed, and more especially that it be deemed absolutely peremptory that the examinations be held on the same day throughout the whole Conference, and that all the young men in any District writing on any given subject, write at the same hour. The maximum time for each paper shall be two hours. No supplementary examination shall be allowed between the regular time of Examinations and the close of Conference. Each Examiner is expected to send at least one copy of each examination paper to the Chairman of Districts.

REPORT OF THE FRENCH METHODIST INSTITUTE,
MONTREAL, TENTH SESSION.

On the 22nd of October, 1888, the corner-stone of the new French Methodist Institute, on Greene Avenue, Côte St. Antoine, was laid with appropriate exercises, and on that day twelve months, the 22nd of October, 1889, the inaugural services were held in the completed and commodious structure. Students had already gathered, the session having commenced on the first of the month, but the formal opening was deferred until the date mentioned, when added interest was given to the proceedings by the presence of a large number of lady delegates to the annual meeting of the Woman's Missionary Society, then being held in the St. James' Church, that Society having shown its hearty co-operation by the contribution of \$10,000 towards the cost of the building, also \$1,000 towards furnishing, and having agreed to bear their full proportion of the running expenses of the Institute.

We have received, during the session, twenty-five male and eighteen female students. The average attendance has been thirty-three, ranging in age from ten to twenty-six years. The teaching staff has included the Principal, Mr. Paiement de la Rivière, Miss Masten, Miss Pomeroy, Miss Hall and Mr. L. E. Rivard, the two last giving instruction in instrumental and vocal music. Lessons in sewing and drawing have been kindly given by young ladies of the Douglas Mission Band.

Outside of school and study hours, the students have assisted in the various departments of household work.

The course of study embraces the Bible, Catechism and controversial doctrine, Reading and Dictation, Grammar, History, Geography, Latin, Arithmetic, Algebra, Euclid, Book-keeping and Hygiene. These subjects, by the necessity of the case, require to be taught in both languages. This difficulty has been further complicated by the very different stages of development of the pupils, which makes their classification a matter of extreme difficulty. Some, when they came, could scarcely read words of one syllable. Some knew French only, some had a slight knowledge of both languages, while others were fairly advanced in a common school education.

Marked and gratifying progress was made by some of the apparently least-promising pupils. Several boys of sixteen and seventeen years who came to the school scarcely knowing their alphabet, were able at the final examination to read simple lessons in both languages, to write a legible hand, as well as to add, multiply and divide with comparative ease.

A still greater cause for satisfaction has been the undoubted change of heart experienced by a number of the students, which was clearly and satisfactorily evidenced to those about them by their daily life as well as by their public profession.

Valuable and gratuitous medical assistance has, as in the past, been rendered by Dr. J. B. McConnell, and we desire to record our obligation to John A. Hutchinson, Esq., M.D., who, in cases of emergency came to our help, and generously declined any remuneration.

We regard the work of the Woman's Missionary Society in establishing mission day-schools—two of them in the city, taught by former pupils

of Actonvale, and others elsewhere,—as most important, and likely to be very serviceable auxiliaries to the Institute.

A reference to the Treasurer's statement will show how large a space the Institute already occupies in the sympathy and liberality of the Church, and affords a guarantee of proper maintenance and extension of our missionary educational work in the future.

Before closing it should be stated that an illuminated address, referring to the noble service rendered to this work by the Rev. C. A. Hanson, was presented by his co-directors to that gentleman on his leaving for England, and that the office of Treasurer has been kindly accepted by Mr. Edwin Hanson, and that of secretary by the Rev. John B. Clarkson, M.A.

REPORT OF MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

1. Memorial respecting Prison Reform. Your Committee recommend the Conference to join with the Prisoners' Aid Association in thanking the Ontario Government for its promise to appoint a commission to investigate and report upon our penal institutions, and to express its hope that the Government will appoint such a commission as will have the necessary powers to make a most searching and thorough investigation. Adopted.

2 Memorials respecting the extension of the pastoral term to four or five years, the Committee recommended that no change be made.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Douglas, seconded by Dr. Lavell, and

Resolved,—That this Conference continue to recognize that three years is the appointed term of the pastorate, but we desire to memorialize the General Conference to empower the Stationing Committee in exceptional and necessary cases to extend the term to a period of four years, when the application is endorsed by a three-fourths' vote of a Quarterly Meeting, and a majority of the Annual Conference. Carried.

3. Memorial from Montreal Eighth Church, respecting the formation of a Connexional Fire Insurance Company. Your Committee recommend Conference to take no action in the matter.

Moved in amendment, by Rev. Dr. Antliff, seconded by Rev. J. T. Pitcher, and

Resolved,—That the General Conference be requested to take such steps as in its wisdom it may deem best to establish a Connexional Fire Insurance Company for Connexional property. Carried.

4. Memorial from the Quebec District Meeting, asking that the law respecting the abstinence from tobacco and intoxicating liquors on the part of candidates and probationers be applied to members in full connexion with the Conference. Owing to the change already made in the disciplinary questions put to candidates and probationers for the ministry, your Committee deem it unnecessary to recommend any change. Adopted.

5. Memorial from the Ottawa District, that this Conference memorialize the General Conference to provide means for registration of deaths and baptisms.

Your Committee strongly recommend this memorial to the favorable consideration of the General Conference, and that such provisions be made for registration as will apply to the whole Church.

6. Memorial from the Ottawa District, asking that in future all the ministerial and lay members of the Annual Conference requiring a billet shall pay the sum of three dollars to the Treasurer of the Billeting Committee.

Respecting this memorial, we recommend that no action be taken.

Moved in amendment, by Rev. Dr. Douglas, seconded by Mr. S. H. Carter, and

Resolved,—That every member of Conference, lay and clerical, accepting a billet at the session of Conference pay two dollars to the Billeting Committee, to enable them to make provision for entertaining the entire Conference. Carried.

7. Resolution asking the Committee on Memorials to prepare a memorial to the General Conference on the subject of Amendments to the Criminal Law Amendment Act.

Owing to the indefiniteness of this memorial, we are unable to make any recommendation, save and except that we recommend the General Conference to apply to Parliament to extend the age of protection of females, and place all females upon the same footing as heiresses. The report was amended to the following effect :

1. That the age of consent be raised to sixteen years.

2. That working girls in any employment whatever be afforded the same protection as is now afforded to girls employed in factories and workshops.

3. That all minors be put on the same footing as heiresses, and the State take the place of guardians for girls who at present are without guardians.

8. Memorial from the Quarterly Board of the Wall Street Church, Brockville, and recommended by the Brockville District Meeting, asking that meeting in class as a test of membership be abolished. The Committee recommend that no change be made.

9. Memorial asking this Conference to memorialize the General Conference to so change the mode of appointing the Chairmen of Districts that each shall be allowed to appoint its own Chairman. Your Committee recommend no change.

10. Memorial from the Quarterly Board of the Wall Street Church, Brockville, and recommended by the Brockville District Meeting, that this Conference memorialize the General Conference to reduce the number of Conferences in Ontario and Quebec, and also to enlarge the districts. No change is recommended by the Committee.

11. Memorial from the Quebec District, asking :

(1.) That the Conference pass a standing resolution that no French missionary be allowed to take up English work without first consulting the chairman of his own District and the minister of the Circuit or Mission affected.

(2.) That the formation of a new mission on the ground mentioned in the preamble be not allowed. Your Committee recommend that the matter be referred to the Stationing Committee.

12. Memorials respecting the General Superintendency. One from the Ottawa District, one from the Brockville District, and one from the Waterloo District, asking the Conference to memorialize the General Conference at its next meeting not to appoint a second General Superintendent. Inasmuch as the Conference has already expressed its opinion

in regard to the matter of these memorials, we deem it unnecessary to make any further recommendations in the case.

METHODIST SISTERHOOD.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Douglas, seconded by J. R. Alexander, M.D., Whereas, Christianity has ever held woman in honor and recognized her mission as a co-laborer in the Gospel ;

Whereas the New Testament gives evidence of the organization of an order of deaconesses for service in the Apostolic and Post-Apostolic Churches ;

Whereas, the mediæval ages supply noble examples of gifted, saintly and influential women, whose conservative power for good was far-reaching in the midst of abounding darkness ;

Whereas, the Presbyterian, Anglican, Baptist and Congregational Churches, jointly with English and American Methodism, recognizing the Scriptural authority and demands of the age, are organizing women for Christian service in the several departments of the Church work ;

Whereas we believe the time is opportune for the Methodist Church of Canada to inaugurate an agency which shall supply a felt want, and must be potential for good ; therefore

Resolved,—That this Conference memorialize the ensuing General Conference to legislate for the establishment of a Sisterhood, which shall efficiently aid the pastorate by visiting the rich and poor, by skilled nursing of the sick, by evangelizing the masses, by engaging in general mission work, and the manifold services which women alone can render the to Church of Christ.

REVISION OF SECTION 159 OF THE DISCIPLINE.

Moved by Paul M. Robins, seconded by Dr. Ryckman, To amend section 159 of the Discipline, so as to make provision for Lay representation in the District Meeting of Circuits and Missions, who have a Quarterly Board, but are supplied for ministerial service by hired local preachers.

TRAINING CLASSES FOR CLASS-LEADERS.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Douglas, seconded by Rev. W. W. Carson, Memorializing the General Conference to legislate for the appointment of training classes for leaders.

GENERAL RULES.

Moved by Rev. F. Delong, seconded by Rev. N. B. Topping, Memorializing the General Conference that the foot-note explanatory of the General Rules be incorporated in sub-section 31, of the Discipline.

DISTRIBUTION OF MISSIONARY MONEY.

Moved by Rev. J. B. Saunders, M.D., seconded by Paul M. Robins, Memorializing the General Conference with reference to the distribution of increase of income of the Missionary Society.

MISCELLANEOUS RESOLUTIONS.

AUDITORS OF CIRCUIT RETURNS.

Resolved,—That each District shall appoint at its Financial District Meeting two auditors of Circuit returns, whose duty it shall be to see that the extensions and additions of such returns be accurate.

FRENCH INSTITUTE.

Upon motion of Rev. Wm. Scott, the Conference expressed sympathy with the work of the French Methodist Institute, and gratification with its success during the past year.

Parent, since his superannuation, has given very efficient and valuable services to our Church, by preaching and lecturing on the subject of our French work, and thus helping financially many of our brethren in this Conference and elsewhere; this Conference desires to put on record its hearty appreciation of his labors, and to record its approval; and also to commend his work to the attention of the Connexion.

REMOVAL OF OKA INDIANS.

Moved by Rev. Wm. Scott, seconded by Rev. Dr. Shaw, and

Resolved,—That this Conference most sincerely regrets to learn that the Indians of Oka, during the year, have declined to adopt the proposals of the last Conference, to consider seriously the advantages offered them, by uniting with their Protestant brethren now situated in the township of Gibson, and who are enjoying the blessings of peace and prosperity in their new and healthy home.

The Conference, therefore, expresses the hope that the time is not distant when the Indians of Oka will favorably consider the advice of the Conference, and the great benefits offered by the Department of Indian Affairs.

That the resolution of the Conference in reference to the Oka Indians be forwarded to the chiefs of Oka, viz., Chief T. Arishon and Chief John Tiwisha, by the Secretary of the Conference, and to the Superintendent-General of Indian Affairs, Ottawa.

The Conference is also gratified with the promise of usefulness in the new Epworth League movement, and commends the movement to the attention and favorable consideration of our ministers and people throughout the whole Church.

ALBERT COLLEGE.

Moved by Rev. Jas. Henderson, seconded by Rev. John E. Mavety, and

Resolved,—That having heard the report of the work of Albert College for the year now closing, prepared by President Dyer, we hereby record our appreciation of the valuable services rendered in the past, and our hope in regard to the usefulness of the institution for the future.

We trust that it will continue to be, as it is, an important auxiliary of Victoria University, and with increased confidence would we again commend it to the sympathetic consideration and patronage of the public.

REV. JOHN A. WILLIAMS, D.D., GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT.

Resolved,—That we, the members, Lay and Clerical, of this Conference desire to record with submission and sorrow our deep sense of loss at the removal of one of our General Superintendents, the Rev. May it please your Royal Highness :

The members of the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church (one of the twelve Conferences, including the Japan Conference, which constitute the Methodist Church of Canada, now assembled in the City of Ottawa) beg leave most respectfully to approach your Royal Highness in this form of address, most sincerely regretting that unavoidable circumstances rendered impracticable the appointment of a deputation to wait upon your Royal Highness personally, to express our pleasure on the occasion of your visit to the capital of the Dominion; many of the members of the Conference however, both ministers and laymen, availed themselves of the opportunity of uniting with the citizens of Ottawa in the right royal welcome given to your Royal Highness and the Duchess of Connaught, and yet in Conference assembled we desire once again to manifest our undiminished loyalty to the beloved sovereign of the British Empire, and to express our firm determination by all lawful means to assist in maintaining the peace, unity and integrity of the Empire. We rejoice that your Royal Highness, accompanied by the Duchess of Connaught, has had an opportunity of visiting the many portions of this great Dominion, and that you resolved to return to your native land by the grand highway once deemed impossible of construction, and by which your Royal Highness and suite obtained knowledge not only of our magnificent scenery, but of the vast resources of wealth in the Dominion, and the possibility of providing for the maintenance of millions of the surplus population of Great Britain and Ireland.

Your Royal Highness will allow us to recall with pleasure your former residence in a military capacity, and that, during the intervening years, we have heard of the brilliancy of your successful career in other and distant lands. What afforded us a high degree of satisfaction is that your Royal Highness has had many opportunities of expressing your gratification in the extraordinary progress of the Dominion during the years of absence, and we assure your Royal Highness that, while we take pleasure in the material advancement of this country, it will be most pleasing to you to know that the Methodist Church, the largest Protestant denomination in Canada, together with other Christian Churches, are earnestly endeavoring to promote the religious and educational prosperity of our beloved country as the only sure foundation of national greatness.

The Conference sincerely trust that the remainder of your stay in Canada will afford still further pleasure to your Royal Highness and your estimable partner, the Duchess of Connaught, and most earnestly do we pray God that by His gracious providence you may continue to enjoy this protection in your further journeyings, and that you may arrive safely at your future home.

RESPECTING GENERAL SUPERINTENDENCY.

Moved by Rev. W. W. Carson, seconded by Dr. Lavell,

Whereas the experience of the quadrennium now closing has afforded sufficient evidence that the duties of a General Superintendency can be discharged by one person, without disadvantage or loss to the Connexion; and

Whereas our economy secures such ample provision for the government of the Church, through its Annual Conferences and ordinary courts, as to render the counsel and action of the General Superintendent necessary only in occasional and exceptional instances; and

Whereas the objects proposed to be served by the appointment of two General Superintendents, who were to travel through the Connexion to promote connexional interests and to augment connexional funds, have not been realized to any appreciable extent; and

Whereas the failure of our people to support the funds from which the General Superintendency is maintained, has involved the Connexion in serious financial embarrassment; and

Whereas the provisions of the Basis of Union do not require more than one General Superintendent; therefore,

Resolved,—That it be an urgent recommendation from this Annual Conference, now assembled in the City of Ottawa, to the next approaching General Conference, that a second General Superintendent be not appointed for the ensuing quadrennium.

Moved by Rev. G. G. Huxtable, seconded by Rev. W. J. Crothers, and

Resolved,—That this Conference deeply sympathizes with our venerable brother, the Rev. Jas. Elliott, D.D., in the protracted affliction through which he is being called to pass, and prays that he may abundantly realize in the closing years of his life the sustaining power of that Gospel which he has so long and faithfully preached to others.

Moved by Rev. Wm. Philp, B.A., seconded by Rev. E. M. Taylor, M.A., and

Resolved,—That the District Secretaries of next year shall constitute the Conference Statistical Committee.

Moved by Rev. Wm. Jackson, seconded by Wm. Tees, Esq., and

Resolved,—That whereas there exists throughout our Church, both among the ministry and laity, a great diversity of opinion on the future educational policy of our Church; *Whereas* a change of circumstances since the last General Conference has tended to increase the perplexity of many in reference to this important part of our Church work; *Whereas*, in the judgment of this Conference, it is of supreme importance that on a subject of such momentous consequence as this the entire Church should act as a unit; be it therefore

Resolved,—That this Conference most earnestly and respectfully requests the General Conference to reconsider this question, with a view to united and harmonious action.

Moved by Rev. W. G. Henderson, seconded by Rev. D. C. Sanderson, and

Resolved,—That each District shall appoint at its Financial District Meeting two auditors of Circuit returns, whose duty it shall be to see that the extensions and additions of such returns be accurate.

Moved by Rev. W. Blair, B.A., seconded by Rev. R. Whiting, and
Resolved,—That having heard the report of Alma College, we rejoice in its continued prosperity. We welcome its esteemed Principal to our Conference, and have been delighted with his excellent address, and we hereby pledge our continued prayers and practical sympathy and support to the Institution that he represents.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Douglas, seconded by Rev. W. Jackson, and
Resolved,—That no portion of the amount appropriated by the Jesuits' Estates Settlement Act for superior education shall be accepted by this Conference on behalf of any of our educational institutions.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Douglas, seconded by Dr. Lavell, and
Resolved,—That this Conference continues to recognize that three years is the appointed term of the pastorate, but we desire to memorialize the General Conference to empower in exceptional and necessary cases, the Stationing Committee to extend the term to a period of four years, when the application is endorsed by a three-fourths vote of a Quarterly Meeting and a majority of the Annual Conference.

Moved by Paul M. Robins, Esq., seconded by T. A. Howard, B.A., and
Resolved,—That we memorialize the General Conference to enact that, immediately after the Annual District Meeting, each District Secretary shall forward to the Secretary of the Annual Conferences a list of the laymen elected to the Conference, the list to be attested by the signatures of the Chairman and Secretary of the elective body, and by the signatures of the Chairman and Secretary of the District, and that these lists shall form the roll of laymen entitled to sit in the Annual Conferences.

Moved by Rev. James Lawson, seconded by Rev. D. T. Cummings, and
Resolved,—That the price be ten cents, and that the cost of publication over and above that amount be paid from the Contingent Fund.

Moved by Rev. James Lawson, seconded by Rev. John Scanlon, and
Resolved,—That 2,500 copies of the Minutes be printed, and that ten copies be sent to the Superintendent of each Circuit and Mission, except the French Missions.

Moved by Rev. Wm. Jackson, seconded by Dr. Lavell, and
Resolved,—This Conference cannot allow the Rev. W. Hansford, D.D., to pass out of the ranks of the active ministry, even for a limited period, without expressing to our beloved brother its profound sympathy with him in his serious and protracted illness, and desires to place on record its high appreciation of the varied and arduous service he has rendered the Church, especially as Missionary Treasurer of Conference for fifteen years, as well as to assure him of our earnest prayers that the Great Head of the Church may be with him, and so ordain events that he may be able in a short time to return to his loved employ.

As the Conference authorized a copy of the resolutions to be forwarded to the Chiefs at Oka, I trust they will listen to the present counsel of your Church, whose authorities, I am led to believe (as well as the Government), are embarrassed in carrying out any project for their improvement while they remain at Oka, instead of availing themselves of the advantages of settlement with their prosperous brethren in Gibson. Again thanking the Conference for a copy of the resolutions.

Resolved,—That each minister moving shall be responsible for the work on the Circuit he is leaving for two Sabbaths after the rise of Conference.

CLOSE OF CONFERENCE.

A hymn was sung, a brief prayer offered by the Rev. Richard Whiting, and the Conference of 1890 was brought to a close.

PASTORAL ADDRESS

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE METHODIST CHURCH WITHIN THE
BOUNDS OF THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE.

"Grace be unto you and peace from Him which is and which was and which is to come, and from the seven spirits which are before the throne, and from Jesus Christ who is the faithful witness and first-begotten of the dead, and the Prince of the kings of the earth, unto Him that loved us and washed us from our sins in His own blood, and which made us kings and priests unto God and His Father, to Him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen."

Assembled once more in our Annual Conference, in the fair capital of our Dominion, we send you our most cordial Christian greeting. We take this opportunity of joining with you in thanking the Great Head of the Church for all that is past, and in united expressions of trust for all that is to come. As a Church we increasingly feel the magnetic touch of Christian sympathy, and the unifying power of the bond of our Christian faith. It is our hearts' desire that in all that touches the doctrines of our holy Christianity, the essential principles of our church polity, and the upbuilding of our common Methodism in this Dominion, we continue to be in aims and aspirations, in mind and methods, one.

We rejoice to be able to report progress in the various departments of Church work. During the year great things have been aimed at and great things have been accomplished by the power of Christ, through human instrumentality. We thank God for many rich seasons of spiritual refreshing, for many blessings vouchsafed, for many victories achieved and souls saved.

Our prayer is, that great grace may continue to rest upon us as a Church, and that in view of our approaching General Conference, in which so many subjects touching the well-being of our Zion will be discussed, that a spirit of wisdom and love may inspire all hearts. We pray that as pastors and people "our love may abound more and more in all knowledge and in all judgment, that you may approve the things that are excellent, that we may be sincere and without offence until the day of Christ, being filled by the fruits of righteousness, which are by Jesus Christ unto the glory and praise of God."

We praise God for the increased interest manifest in the work of Sunday-schools. God is touching the eyes of His people to see as never before the relation in which the children already stand to Christ and His redeemed church. And we pray that it will continue to be the supreme endeavor of all our families and congregations to keep the children safe, and that they will never by our carelessness be allowed to forfeit that moral and spiritual standing which is theirs in virtue of that free gift which is come upon all men unto justification of life. Let the Sabbath-school prove more than ever the spiritual nursery of the Church.

We would again suggest that our discipline as regards the teaching of our catechism in our Sunday-schools be as far as practicable observed, so

that the minds of our youth, being deeply imbued with the distinctive doctrines of our Church, will be able to render every man a reason for the hope that is in them.

The schools within the limits of our Conference are 437, having in attendance 27,758. We notice with gratitude conversions to the number of 1,354 scholars.

The great temperance question lies heavily on the heart of our Church. We have still great cause to deplore the ravages of the demon drink throughout our land. Is it not the greatest obstacle that opposes the progress of the Gospel? Drink, indeed, is the "echo of the dungeon's wall, the blight of each abandoned home, the dirge that leads many a sad procession to an early grave. It is the felon's fortitude, the gambler's goad, the harlot's hardihood, the coward's courage, and the assassin's inspiration." This is the huge tombstone beneath which many a Lazarus, bound hand and foot and dead in trespasses and sins, lies buried. Listen to the words of Christ addressed to you as a Church to-day, "Take ye away the stone."

Notwithstanding the defeat of such tentative measures as the Scott Act throughout the country, we believe that the principles of temperance are taking a deeper hold of the Canadian mind, and that prohibition is a coming certainty. Let this be our motto and our goal. Let every member of our Church wield his power of franchise in the direction of the total extinction of this evil. The crisis is coming, it has come, and Methodism expects every man to do his duty.

We hail with joy the practical evidence of increased interest in the missionary work of the Church. The past year has been one of expansion and extension in all the fields we occupy. Domestic missions are being rapidly multiplied, not only in Manitoba and the North-West Territories, but also in the Montreal Conference, and their importance, though without much of the romance attaching to other fields, is not second to that of any other missions. The Indian work throughout the Dominion is still receiving the faithful attention which was initiated by Canadian Methodism more than half a century ago. In the French work the agency of education is being more vigorously employed; and in Japan our missionaries and teachers are faithfully toiling, and by the divine blessing are able to report very marked progress. We are confident our Canadian Methodist Church will keep pace with the other Churches of the world in the march of missionary advancement by prayer and liberality, and an intelligent interest in all that pertains to human welfare.

The educational work of the Church is one which in this age of such rapidly increasing enlightenment, demands earnest and liberal consideration. We hope that the difficulties which seem to give some uncertainty to the future of our University at Cobourg will be removed. We note with satisfaction the official statement that the number of students was never so large, and the equipment of the University never so great as at present. The Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal, we are happy to report, is doing a most thorough and valuable work in the training of candidates for the ministry, both in the ordinary Theological curriculum, and in the higher course leading to degrees in Divinity. There is urgent need of enlarged accommodation. The influence of this College must be reckoned as one of the most important factors in our Church. Increased attention

is asked to the claims of the Wesleyan College, Stanstead, which, during the past year has been affiliated with McGill University. Self-interest if nothing higher, should prompt the Churches of the Conference to earnest effort for this institution, as it belongs exclusively to us, and its success, with the divine blessing, depends upon ourselves. Rev. Principal McAmmond, B.A., has entered upon his duties greatly to the satisfaction of the trustees, the students and the public, and has had a year of very encouraging success. The many institutions of our Church outside of the bounds of our Conference are all, without exception, reporting decided growth. Methodism has reached a point of numbers and wealth, and of corresponding responsibility where it cannot afford to ignore its duty in relation to education. While living piety is still in the forefront of all the forces which give us success, yet if we are indifferent about education, we will only gather people into our fold speedily to lose them. We can retain the rising generations which come from our excellent Provincial schools, and we can retain educated men only by a type of piety which is intelligent as well as fervent, which continues education with religious earnestness.

It is unnecessary to address you at length, dear brethren, on the temporalities of the Church. It is gratifying, however, to be able to report increase in our various Connexional Funds. If it is not invidious to do so, we may select as specially worthy of your generous consideration, the Superannuated Ministers' Fund. You have given liberally heretofore to this object, and we trust you will still come up to the amounts indicated for the various Circuits, in order to reach what is required to pay the claimants in full the limited allowance to which they are certainly entitled for many years of faithful service.

Our Book Room and Publishing interests in Toronto and Montreal are still giving evidence of progress, and we trust that they will receive your loyal patronage, both as regards our Church periodicals and general Christian literature.

The approach of the Quadrennial session of the General Conference, which is to convene in Montreal on the first Wednesday of September next, will naturally excite much attention throughout the country. Be earnest in prayer that its deliberations and decisions may tend to the best interests of the Church, and that while in the spirit of progress our polity may safely be adapted to the varying exigencies of the times, it may also conserve all that is essential to spiritual growth and practical efficiency in saving the world.

And now brethren, we "commend you to God and to the word of His grace which is able to build you up and to give you an inheritance among all them that are sanctified." Again we exhort you to fidelity; be upright in character, clear in experience, reverential to all that is sacred—God, His name, His word, His house, His day; be faithful to the means of grace, the Lord's supper, the class-meeting, the preaching of the Word and social worship, "and the very God of peace sanctify you wholly, and we pray God, your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ."
