Paris, Dec. 1—"Partisans and adversaries of the government came to blows at the opening session of the Roumanian parliament," telegraphs the Berne correspondent of the Matin.

"King Ferdinand had hardly begun to read his speech, when he was in-terrupted with cries of Down with the government,' from M. Mille, leader of the interventionists, and his adherents.

"The supporters of the government replied with cheers for the king. The latter's speech was punctuated throughout by shouts from the opposition. "No sooner had the king departed than a general fight began between the


The import orders for French Ivory did not come to hand this year on account of the war. Very few stores were able to get their orders for Ivory filled on this account.



Plan to Prevent Evasion The preliminary bill has been drafted so as to prevent any evasion on the part of companies and corporations by concealing their profits through book-keeping or distribution. Before the law goes into effect those companies seeking to evade its provisions will be compelled to take from their surplus profits in succeeding years to bring the reserve up to the required figure. The measure prescribes as "war years" the business year wherein January 10, 1914, falls and the two succeeding years. The normal profits of a company or corporation is figured on the basis of the average profits of the thre years preced-ing the war and half of all profits above that must go in the special reserve fund. Foreign companies, including Americ-an corporations doing business in Ger-many, come within the operation of the law, but only to the extent of their profits made on German business. P.: Dear Sir,—I am today in receipt of your letter of the 27th inst. written from Fredericton, in reply to my open letter to the farmers of this constituency re the hay situation, which I have read with a great deal of interest, especially as you give me 46 hours in which to decide whether or not I will enter into a con-tract with you involving a \$270,000 transaction.

If this letter were being read by peo-ke who knew neither you nor the busi-ness, possibly somebody might be de-elved but fortunately the farmers of this constituency know both you and the hay wasiness. In order to figure up your nost remarkable totals, in the first place you are compelled to admit that you hould pay the farmer \$18 a ton. in his marn, whereas before my letter was writ-en, it was only \$12. Fifteen thousand dollars to the farm-ra in one day is not a bad stroke of

that you are compressing, including every possible item of expense, for less than \$3 per ton. Last year Messrs. Phillips Estey & Co., of this town, pressed over 8,000 tons of hay for the British government under the same specifications as yourself. They brought a press from Montreal with men to manage it, paid transportation of both press and men from and to Montreal, paid 20 cents per ton rental for the press, paid the rent of buildings, wages, power and all expenses in connection with the business at a little less than \$8 a ton on an average, and what they can do with one press surely you ought to be able to do with five. That leaves you \$4 per ton profit on a basis of \$12 to the farmer. You have seen fit to make /reference to the fact that during the South Afri-can war I was interested in the New Brunswick hay company which had a contract for compressing hay, and inti-mated that you wanted to discuss the matter. Well, I will give you all the facts without bothering your head about it, and I want to say to you that the books of that company are in my office in the town of Woodstock today and are open to the inspection of you, your agents, accountants, newspaper editors, or any other person whom you wish, therefore please inform yourself before you enter into a discussion. Our company received no lump sum contract such as you have, but a con-tract from month to month beginning in November of 1901 for 2,000 tons which we were unable to fill; we got 2,000 tons in December, 2,000 tons in January, 2,000 in February, and 1,500 in March. We bought no hay whatever from the farm-ers, but we did buy 1,000 tong from you, for which we paid you \$10.25 in the loose pressed bale, loaded on the cars, and we also bought hay from Messrs. Bohan Bros, C. E. Gallagher & Sons, C. H. Taylor, C. W.
