THE SITUATION REVIEWED

"All the heroism which has been shown, all the blood that has been sacrificed, will have been in vain unless we get the result that never again, for generations to come, will it be within the power of any man or any group of men to turn the world into the charnel house it has become."

In these words Mr. Bonar Law sets clearly before the people of the British Empire the task they must help to perform. That it will be performed he has no doubt, but he adds—

"I look for no specially good news for many months to come. And we may have had news long before we have good."

Mr. Bonar Law bases his confidence in final victory on the fact that the Allies have greater financial and other resources, and that economic pressure as well as the constant strain of warfare will wear out the enemy long before the allies are so hard pressed as to think of giving up the struggle.

Similar confidence is expressed by Gen. Gallieni, the French minister of war. In an interview this week he declared his unshakable confidence in victory and said—

"Our enemies have been powerless to attain the essential object of every war—the destruction of the adversary's forces. In September, 1914, when we arrested and repelled the German offensive, the game was lost by the enemy. That victory gave the allies the essential factor of time, which has enabled us to organize the offensive operations of our resources—resources that are very superior in men and money to those of the enemy and nearly unlimited in material, thanks to our mastery of the sea."

As to that tenacity, Gen. Gallieni entertains no doubts. All France is as one man, determined to fight until complete victory is won.

It is well, however, to look at the other side of the picture. In the German Reichstag yesterday the president boasted that the British and French had failed to break the German lines in the west; that in the east the Germans and Austrians also held the ground they had won; that Italy had not yet won as much territory as she was offered as an inducement to stay out of the war; and that in the Balkans Germany had won both diplomatic and military victories, while the Turks had prevented the success of the attack on the Dardanelles.

by the Allies when Germany has been beaten to her knees.

This war was inevitable. Sooner or later, for the good of humanity, Germany had to be crushed. Her whole conduct throughout the war has proved her to be a tiger-nation, with no human feelings and no regard whatever for the rules of war accepted by other nations.

Whatever stood in her way was to be annihilated. It was only her inability to carry out her plans that saved the people of other countries from suffering as Belgium and a part of France suffered, and as the Serbs are suffering, and the Armenians. The blood-lust is upon the German, and only by reducing his country to helplessness can the world be saved from further devastating wars.

They who prate of peace are doing humanity a great disservice. However great the sacrifice yet to be made, the war must be waged relentlessly, that later generations may walk the ways of peace. The neutrals and the peace advocates are pharisees or fools. To stand aside from this war and yet profess to have a regard for "human rights" is mockery or worse.

Human rights can only be vindicated by the utter defeat of Germany, and they who refuse to fight for the triumph of civilization over barbarism can but hang their heads in shame when history records that they selfishly profited by the sacrifice of others.

If any nation is either too proud or too selfish or too cowardly to fight in the cause of humanity, it should at least have the grace to be silent and let the fighting nations discuss terms of peace when it pleases them.

Lord Haldane predicts that "no peace negotiations would be considered by Great Britain or her Allies until Emperor William and the German war party had been thrown out of the saddle by the German democracy."

WIDOW FATALLY BURNED. Mrs. Sadie F. Moore of Brockton Leaves Two Children and Invalid Parents.

Brockton, Dec. 1.—Mrs. Sadie F. Moore, thirty-five, a widow living at 26 Grove street, is dead, as a result of burns received last Friday morning while start-

ing a fire in her kitchen stove. She was removing the ashes and placing them on a piece of paper. The ashes contained some live coals, which ignited the paper, the flames setting her light garments afire. She was burned about the lower part of the body before help arrived. Her parents, at home at the time, are invalids and could not assist her. Mrs. Moore is survived by two children.

NEW BRUNSWICK SOLDIER WRITES HOME OF THE DARDANELLES

"It is a long and hard row to hoe. But if you could only see the place you would not be surprised. To go up to the trenches and look back to the sea, you would wonder how men could ever land and finally arrive here. Taking it into consideration that we came in open boats nearly a mile and a half under heavy machine gun firing, and shrapnel flying about everywhere, I do not know how any of us ever lived."

This is an extract from a letter from Private Jack Turnbull, a former Stanley man, who has been fighting at the Dardanelles with one of the Australian regiments. He has been in the heaviest fighting at the Dardanelles for several months and his description of the fighting as contained in a letter to his brother, Alex. Turnbull, of Stanley, gives some idea of the task allotted to the British regiments on Gallipoli peninsula. Private Turnbull has gone through it all so far without getting a scratch and says the experience is well worth the while.

THE PERSIAN SITUATION

Petrograd, Dec. 1.—While officially the Persian government is endeavoring to defeat German intrigues, the Novo Vremya declares that, although Prince Henry of Reuss, the German minister to Teheran, is obviously generalissimo of an armed and hostile force in Teheran, the Persian authorities have not only failed to expel him from the country or arrest him, but have actually invited him to return to Teheran. At the last moment they have taken flight and partially retraced their steps.

defend the approaches from the Turkish frontier. Almost all the Persian armed forces are concentrated at Kum and Hamadan, where the Swedish and Turco-German officers are endeavoring to rupture the relations between Russia and England and plunge Persia into war with the Entente.

The Persian gendarmerie, under thirty-six Swedish officers, numbers about 6,000, of whom 2,000 are omitted. The gendarmerie is in charge of nearly 1,000 miles of roads.

The Russian foreign office says that Russian forces are gathering at Kavin, eighty-six miles northwest of Teheran, and that when the concentration is completed diplomacy will speak more decisively to the Persian government respecting the disorders southward of Teheran.

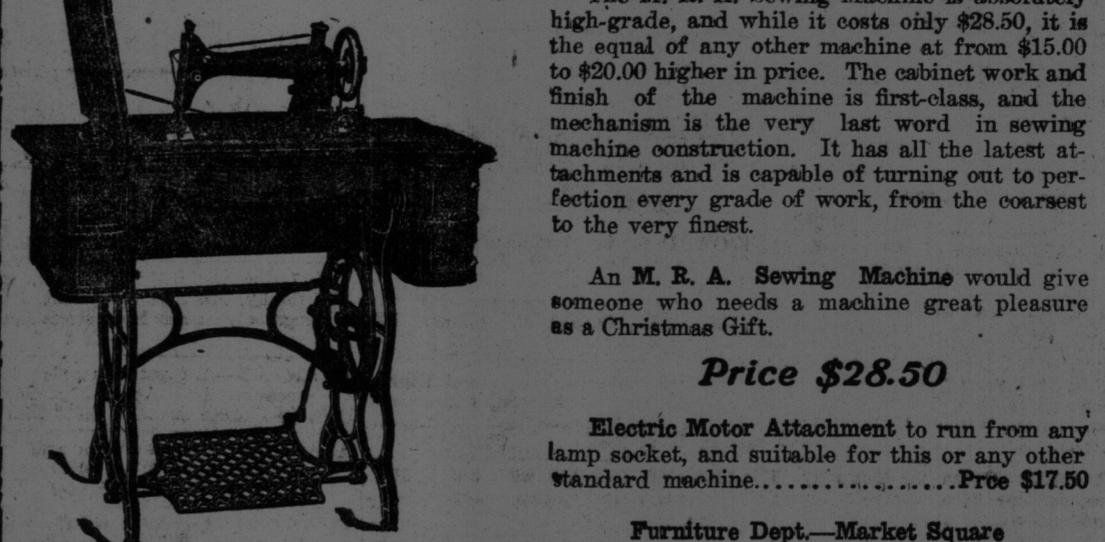

FURTHER PARTICULARS OF CORP. THOMAS' DEATH

Three of Lieut. Sturdee's Men in a Brave Act

Lieut. E. Alban Sturdee, writing further in regard to Corporal Thomas' death states that the barbed wire in front of the 20th trench needed repair and he called for men volunteers and went out early on a misty morning and all worked till daylight, when they were seen by the Germans who opened fire. However, the party continued at work till the mist lifted, when Lieut. Sturdee ordered a retirement to the trenches.
 Just as the party were going in, the corporal of left flank reported that Thomas had been instantly killed, shot through the heart and his body was about twenty-five yards from the British line, but though the firing continued it was brought in by Sergt. Rawlings, Pte. W. A. Dick and Pte. McAfee and carefully laid in the 20th trenches.
 Appended to the signature of Lieut. Sturdee's letter in last night's paper, referring to Corporal Thomas were the words "right fighting Canadian." These were inadvertently inserted and of course were not part of the officer's letter.

Letter Home from Ronald Morris, Who is With Army Service Corps

The following interesting letter comes to Mrs. M. T. Morris, Paradise row, from her son Ronald, who is with the Army Service Corps, under Col. A. E. Massie—
 Somewhere in France, No. 15, 1915.

Dear Mother—
 Your letter and Gertrude's received today and as per usual glad to hear from home; also glad to hear that everybody is fine and dandy.

You asked me in your letter if I have received all my parcels. Yes I have got them all also everyone of the pictures and have just received Sadie's today and, believe me, they are some class. I am glad that I have got all the pictures and I would not lose them for anything.

I am very glad that I will have some nice presents for Christmas. I am going to write Mrs. Gilmour, Aunt Jen, Beas, Gate, Grandma and Leo Callaghan to thank them for their kindness in remembering me.

You asked me in the letter to give you some news. Well, mother, there is not much to tell. The weather over here is very bad and it is very muddy; some times it is up to your knees, but we are all in excellent health and very happy. We are just like one large family; we have a splendid bunch of fellows in our company and our officers and every-thing that is kind and good always looking out for our comfort. We feed on the very best and we don't have to work too hard.

The 20th went into the trenches Friday night. They are in for six days. I guess they have had quite a few casualties. I have not seen Mac yet. When I was in Belgium I was looking for him but they told me he was down in a very small Belgium town with very few civilians, mostly all soldiers.

We are stationed in a small Flemish town. There are not very many houses here. Mother dear, the talk over here now is that the war won't be over for another year at least; there was a report around camp that Greece had gone in with the Germans. Mother, you would not think there was a war over here except for the roar of the big guns and the traffic that is going to the trenches, but if you ask me the Germans know that they are already beaten; they don't know what England has got.

Dear mother, I am sending you a little Christmas present that I bought last night for you and I hope you will be pleased with it. Give my love to brothers and sisters and Frank and father.
