

# Says 300,000 Are Out of Work in N. Y.

New York, Oct. 3—With 300,000 men and women out of employment in New York at the present time the city is facing a serious economic situation, according to John Suilivan, director of the New York City. Bureau of Industrial Ald. And what makes the situation even more significant, said Mr. Suilivan, is the fact that about 60 per cent. of the unemployed are union members. "Not since the fall of 1921, which preceded an unusually hard winter, have there been so many unemployed," he said. "In normal times our bureau places about 125 men daily. At present we are placing only about 60 or 65 men a day. These applications, it must be remembered, are mostly non-union men. The agencies maintained by the various unions also are being besleged by hundreds of seekers for work."



# VASHINGTON IS PUZZLED BY LIQUOR IN PHILLIPINES

No Way Has Been Found to Enforce Ban Placed on Shipments.

Washington, Oct. 8—Legal experts who have given close study to the law on the subject are convinced, it is understood here, that only direct action by Congress can prevent the proposed attempt to apply prohibition to the Philippine Islands from becoming a

There have been long exchanges of lews between State and War Department officials, and although it now apears that only Congress can modify he law, the authorities of the State he law, the authorities of the State pepartment do not feel that they can liter the instructions to American consuls to refuse clearances to vessels testined to Philippine ports with liquor argoes showing on their manifests. This view is based on the ruling by the Department of Justice that the Eigheenth Amendment to the Constitution loes apply to the Philippines, even though the Volstead act is not applicable.

As matters stand now, the captain of a vessel might apply to the American Consul at Hong Kong, for example, for a clearance to proceed to Manila. He might present his manifest, showing that he carried a general cargo, with no liquor, and the Consul under normal procedure would issue the celarance.

The vessel then could proceed to Manila and notify the local customs authorities that it had many thousand cases of liquor in addition to the cargo shown on the manifest. The local authorities could then impose a nomnal fine of a few pesos and permit anding of the liquor cargo, and the federal Government might find itself mable to interfere.

American offerings lack quality. The premium our fancy wheats carry in the home market is, of course, a boon to our wheat growers, but it does not strengthen the position of the United States as an exporter.

"Whether it is expedient for the United States, all things considered, to devote to the growing of wheat sufficient land, labor, and capital to produce a surplus for export is a pressing question. The farmers, of course, will decide it for themselves. The progressive reduction of the planted acreage from 76,683,000 acres in 1919 to 57,111,000 acres in 1924, suggests that many farmers may have come to to 57,111,000 acres in 1924, suggests that many farmers may have come to the conclusion that a reduction of production to the capacity of the home market is the safest policy. If so, the hasty review of competitive conditions given in the preceding paragraph would seem to support their judgment.

"Just now, at the beginning of the crop year 1924-25, trade reports indicate a smaller exportable surplus in Canada and the United States and a greater European demand than in 1923greater European demand than in 1923-24, a prospect for which allowance is being made in current prices. Only about one-sixth of the world's wheat crop usually enters into international trade, so a decrease of even five per cent. of the total production brings about a sharp reduction in exportable about a sharp reduction in exportable supplies.
