Sydney, N. S., Dec. 1.—Over three million tons of coal has been produced by the Dominion Coal Company for the eleven months ending yesterday, according to figures obtained last night. The output for November was 205,658 tons, which is the smallest month's tonnage since April 1922 when a strike-on-the-job policy resulted in curtailing the monthly output to 162,085 tons.

The actual figures for the first eleven months of this year are 3,071,159 tons, compared with 2,558,293 tons for the same period in 1922, an increase in 1923 of over half a million tons.



SAYS CODE TOO FREE WITH SILKS

Four Pairs a Year Ample for \$20 Week Girl, Declares Expert.

Boston, Dec. 1. — "A \$20-a-week working girl should spend \$4 a week for clothes, not more, and maybe a little less," said Harriett Ainsworth, a prominent Boston budget expert, who claims that 22 per cent. budget recommended by the Plymouth Church Institute of Brooklyn is excessively high. The girl, she says, is spending \$20.80 too much.

Too Many Silk Stockings.

Four pairs of silk stockings is all she says a girl earning \$20 a week ought to buy each year against the eight pairs allowed by the church budget of Mrs. Newell Dwight Hilles, the expert who planned the church budget. These four pairs of stockings allowed annually by Miss Ainsworth should not be purchased separately, but at least two pairs at a time should be bought.

Ainsworth declared.

"If a girl buys four pairs of good silk home at one time during the year, she can make them last for 12 months. She must wash them after every wearing, and when she notices the slightest break or hole she should immediately mend them herself, or where the tear is treacherous take them to a professional mender.



His maternal grandfather was the late Sir Samuel Cunard, founder of the Cunard Line. Mrs. Peters, who died four years where liquor can be purchased in Montreal than there were in 1919. 

There are 1,906 licensed places, such as taverns, grocery places, hotels, restaurants, clubs and breweries, in all 1,988 places where liquor can be purchased according to law, nearly 1,600 more than in 1919, or an increase of 400 per cent.

Dr. Hart went on to say that under Government control young men were being tempted as never before in the bold bar regime, that in addition to the places of temptation under Government control, there was added temptation in 1919, or an increase of 400 per cent.

Nor does Dr. Hart agree with the figures of the commission as regards crimes in the different provinces of the Dominion. As to the comparison or intoxication between Montreal and different American cities, used by the Liquor Commission, Dr. Hart sought to explain this also by a difference in the standards of law enforcement between Montreal and these cities. According to the American Prison Association, the greatest authority on the subject in the United States, he said, crime there was decreasing.

"We cannot expect any better condition of affairs in Montreal or in the province—in fact we must be prepared to expect worse as long as we continue as a people, through our Government, to carry on the accursed liquor business," he concluded.

"Government control wherever it has been tried has been a pronounced failure. They will tell you that in South Carolina where they had it for 23 years. Within eight years of its inauguration crime had increased 350 per cent, while

smallpox epidemic of 22 years ago. In December, 1901, and January, 1902, an epidemic of smallpox struck St John having already attacked many centres along the Eastern coasts fo the United States and Canada. Boston, Montreal, Hailfax and St. John were all afflicted at the same time. In St. John the dread disease was introduced by a salior who was suffering from it when he landed at this port. In all there were 90 cases of smallpox in St. John and 22 deaths during the outbreak.

Of the work of Archdeacon Raymond in the epidemic the St. John Globe of that date had the following account:

"Rev. W. O. Raymond has been more than a month engaged in a noble work among the smallpox infected homes and for two weeks and over has been practically isolated. There was no church building yet at Bernard Harbor, and one room of the mission house was used as a school room and church. The people were quick to learn. They had taken very readily to trading and to wearing the white man's clothing and adopting his manners.

New Brunswick Mother.

There was only one other white man at the Harbor, the factor of the Hudson Bay Company, which had a store located there. Asked about the weather there Mr. Merritt said the summer was very short and last year the ice did not go out at all. His stores were landed at Herschell Island and were still there. Fortunately he had quite a supply on hand and had been able to get some from the company's store. Mr. Merritt said he was well acquainted with the two Eskimo charged with the killing of Corporal Doak and saw them at Herschell Island on the way out. He expressed the opinion that the right thing was being done in executing them as their gullt was well established and he believed this was the only way to establish a respect for law and order in the district. The other Eskimo were eagerly waiting to see if these men were allowed to go and should they be given their liberty it would certainly make it harder to prevent crime in the future.

The field on which Mr. Merritt labors is the MacKenzie River Diocese, formerly Bishop Bompas Land, of which Bishop Lucas is the present head.
