The outstanding speech of the day was made by W. F. Nickle, of Kingston. Both of his sons served with distinction at the front, one in the Royal Flying Corps and the other in the infantry, and were severely wounded in encounters with the enemy. He, of course, said nothing about that, but spoke as a man representing Kingston constituency, which had sent 2,000 men to the war. Mr. Nickle read from reports of Mr. Cannon's speeches in the Dorchester by-election of 1917 to show that "he was not only against conscription but against the war from its inception. Cannon had asked: "Are we to ruin our country for England? No, it is not Canada's war."

Mr. Nickle vigorously denied the charge that the conscription measure was an election dodge and dramatically declared that he would rather have gone down to defeat a thousand times and to political oblivion forever than be a traitor to the men at the front—the "thin khaki line which stretched from the North Sea to the boundaries of Switzerland, who were standing between Canada and the modern barbarians."



Paris, April 9-The responsibility of the German Emperor for the war and means for bringing him to trial by one of the allied governments has been definitely determined upon by the council of four. This follows the definite decision on the terms of reparations for war damages, whereby five billion dollars must be paid within the next two years, and an interallied commission assess the remaining damage for a period of thirty years, beginning May 1, 1921.

# Death of Joe Hall, A Noted

By E. W. Ferguson in Montreal Herald The tragic death in Seattle of Joe Hall removes from professional hockey one

Died in Harness.

Hall died in harness, as he probably would have chosen had he been given a choice in the matter.

There is little doubt but that his devotion to hockey was the direct cause of the illness which caused his death Saturday night. After the hard season in the east, Hall went west with the champion Canadiens to defend the Stanley Cup. He participated in all the games in Seattle, and not too strong at any time. Hall's vitality and resistance were undoubtedly impaired by the bitterly-contested, nerve-wracking games which marked the cup series.

That Hall finished out the season at all was a notable tribute to his gameness. Late in January Hall developed a bad case of varicose veins, and collapsed just before a match at the Jubilee rink. It was thought at that time that his playing days were over, but after recovering, he insisted on resuming play, and finished out the season. Possibly this course of action cost him his life.

Was Gritty Player.

Hall was far from being the vicious player that he has frequently been painted. He played hockey as a man's game,

The famous Hall-Lalonde duel of the 1913-14 season is still fresh in the memory of those who have followed the game here. Hall and Lalonde during that season swapped checks, hooks and blows on every occasion they met, and Hall came out a winner at the end, laying Lalonde out in a match here so badly that "Newsy" was out of the game for several weeks. It was an odd coincidence that the two afterwards became not only teammates, but warm personal friends with all their former enmity forgotten.

Hall, thirty-seven years old and of English birth, was a remarkable figure in hockey if only for the number of years he had been in service. He started as an amateur on the Brandon intermediates in 1900, and in 1902 he went to the Winnipegs and was on their team for two years while they struggled to down the Rat Portage team, holders of the Stanley Cup. After that Hall had some experience in the old International League, where with Pitre and Laviolette, later with the Canadiens, and the famous Hod Stuart, he played in the fierce contests which hockey always produced in the copper country. From Houghton, Hall returned to Winnipeg, and afterwards came to Montreal to play for the team of the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association. From the M. A. A. A. team he went to Shamrocks and played with them for one season. with them for one season.

With Many Champions.

He joined the Quebec Hockey Club on the formation of the National Hockey Association in 1910 and played on the team when they won the championship in 1912 and 1913, his efforts playing a large part in aiding "The Bulldogs" to
