





## DUST MULCH.

The surface of the ground in your war garden should never be allowed to become so hard that a crust is formed. Regular stirring of the top soil creates a perfect dust mulch which is invaluable if you want successful growth. Ordinary dust mulch may be supplemented by the mulch of manure or lawn clippings which serves to keep down the small weeds and retain the soil moisture. It is doubtful if the heavier mulch is always beneficial to plants in cool locations. It keeps the ground rather cold, with the result that the invigorating influence of the sun's rays is excluded from the surface roots, and growth is retarded.

The condition of your mulch depends very largely on how you water your garden. Before the ground is entirely dried out after rain the soil should be stirred and during periods of drought it should be gone over at least once a week. Perhaps the thirstiest of all the plants is the cabbage, which needs continual watering.


