Report of Engineer Swan On St. Croix Possibilities

L'ETANG FOR SMALLER STEAMERS

The St. Andrew's Beacon publishes a copy of Engineer A. D. Swan's report on the River St. Croix as a possible ocean port and says it bears out all that the advocates of the port have claimed for it.

The St. Croix River is navigable for the largest class of vessels for about 95 miles in a northerly direction from Campbell Island and the Bay of Fundy.

At its narrowest part between Deer Point and Dog Island, near Eastport, the river is about 200 feet wide.

It has an average approximate depth at low water the whole way up to Oak Point, varying from about 40 feet to 80 feet.

For about thirty miles of its course, vessels would pass through Passamaquoddy Bay, which is approximately twelve miles long by six wide, and which, having deep water, would afford magnificent anchorage if desired.

The river and bay are at all seasons of the year free from ice, and there is a variation in the tide of about twenty-four feet between high and low water.

The approach for vessels entering the St. Croix river from the Bay of Fundy would be from Grand Manan channel between Grand Manan Island and Campbell Island, thence by Head Harbor Passage, and I understand the Grand Manan or North channel is looked upon more favorably by navigators than is the channel to the south of Grand Manan.

The heaviest storms in the Bay of Fundy are generally from the southeast, so that as soon as a vessel rounded Head Harbor Point she would be perfectly protected.

SENT UP FOR TRIAL TORREON HOLDS OUT BUT NEW SHELLS ARE MAKING GREAT HAVOC

Federal Leader so Reports to Huerta—Vila Did Not Make Good His Boast

Mexico City, Mex., March 25—The Mexican office did not conceal its concern for the fate of Torreón today when it was officially learned that General Villa's rebels were using a new and unfamiliar shell of most deadly variety.

The rebels have displayed excellent marksmanship, Villa declared, and their new shells have created havoc in his ranks.

El Paso, Texas, March 25—Torreón has not yet fallen, according to a belief expressed here by careful observers of the situation.

General Villa did not take lunch at noon yesterday, with General Venustiano Carranza, as he had promised, nor did he dine there.

Early today it was doubtful whether he would get into the city today at all.

Hammering away at Torreón, was the only information that could be obtained.

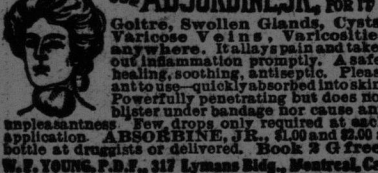

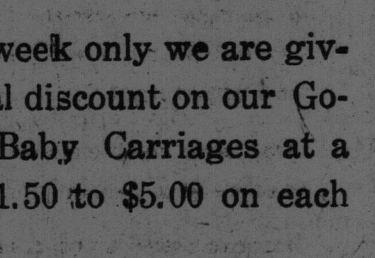

FURTHER AID FOR VALLEY RAILWAY

Provincial Government Admits Request Has Been Made For Additional Bond Guarantees—Questions by Opposition Member Are Evaded

Fredrickton, March 24.—The statement that the St. John and Quebec Railway Company is seeking additional aid from the provincial government in the form of an extra guarantee of bonds to the amount of \$10,000 per mile was officially confirmed for the first time in the House today in reply to queries by Mr. Dugal.

The government's replies contained the information that this request had been made; that statements had been submitted monthly by inspecting engineers; that the expenditures have been checked by a chartered accountant, up to December 31, 1913; that bonds have been sold covering 170 miles; that three sections from Gagetown to Centerville are under construction; that \$225,000 has been retained by the government as an interest fund to protect the province against any shortage after the road is in operation and that security has been provided by the company for the bonds during the period of construction.

The government did not tell what estimates the engineers have furnished or what amount has been paid the contracting company on account of work done.

No detailed survey has been made of the route between the Mistake and Westfield or between Westfield and St. John or for a bridge crossing the St. John harbor or for a right of way.

The government ignored Mr. Dugal's question whether the members were aware of the statement made by Hon. H. F. McLeod, a former colleague, in the House of Commons, that the items which entered into the construction of the Southampton railway "bumped" items and not true or correct, saying that the items were not furnished to the government and that they had no information regarding the details.

The question as to whether the government proposed to investigate the serious charges by Mr. McLeod in the House of Commons was evaded by saying it was answered by the above statement.

Further information gleaned from Mr. Dugal's inquiries was that the most serious general had been paid \$2,955.18 for collecting succession duties between the date of the fiscal year to the date of his retirement. He was paid \$3,030.28 during the fiscal year for similar work.

THE RAILWAY CRISIS

At a conference of the city council and the council of the board of trade yesterday it was decided to send a committee to Ottawa to ask for additional aid for the construction of bridges across the St. John and Kennebec rivers, in order to bring the St. John Valley Railway into St. John by the Rethesay route.

This, then, is the situation. The people of St. John and of the province had hoped and had been led to believe that the St. John Valley Railway would be connected with the Grand Trunk Pacific, and would thus secure a large measure of Transcontinental traffic, without which, as Mr. Foster pointed out yesterday, it would not pay the interest on cost of construction.

The citizens are watching the movements of their representatives with a great deal of interest. Any attempt to get on the fence, or to secure the interests of a great railway corporation, or even to save the credit of a government at the expense of the province will be carefully noted and kept in mind when the day of reckoning comes.

What was done at yesterday's conference is but a beginning. The real centre of the trouble is not Ottawa but Fredericton, and the question of an additional bond guarantee is to be fought out there. The people are still without full information regarding the finances of the St. John Valley Railway, and certainly no consideration whatever should be given to any request for additional assistance until full information has been placed before the people's representatives, and the two questions of the route from Gagetown to St. John and that of connection with the Grand Trunk Pacific have been definitely answered.

The government gets an advance from the banks, then it floats bonds for money to repay the banks, and the public debt is not increased! The discoverer of this great plan of borrowing without getting into debt is sure to become finance minister of Canada some day."

Hon. George P. Graham in his speech in parliament yesterday riddled the Guelius-Staunton report on the Transcontinental Railway and exposed in the clearest manner its purely partisan character and the gross inaccuracies which it contained. At the very outset of his speech he was able to convict the acting minister of railways of making a misstatement to the house and the country of \$41,000,000 as to the amount of capital cost upon which the Grand Trunk Pacific will pay rental after the year 1928.

Mr. Graham charged that the Guelius report was not only utterly misleading, but injurious to the country and to the Grand Trunk Pacific, which is a great national enterprise. From the time Mr. Guelius, formerly of the C. P. R., became the chief advisor of the minister of railways, the policy of degrading and discrediting the Grand Trunk Pacific as planned and constructed by the Laurier government became the policy of the Borden government.

CAPE GOD CANAL IS MORE THAN THREE QUARTERS COMPLETED

Boston, March 25.—The Cape God canal is about 75 per cent completed. For four miles inland from the Cape God Bay, or eastern, end of the canal the full depth of twenty-five feet at low tide has been dredged. On the Buzzards Bay end the full depth has been dredged inland as far as three-quarters of a mile east of the Bourne highway bridge. Then for a half mile further east a depth of 15 feet has been reached. From that point to the completed part of the Cape God Bay end a depth of 10 feet has been reached. From bay to bay the canal is about eight miles long. Its bottom width at the narrowest point will be 100 feet. It will be 25 feet deep at low water and more than 80 feet at high tide—enough to float most coast-wise craft.

PROFESSOR KILLS HIMSELF

Stanford, Conn., March 25.—Harry Thurston Peck, formerly a professor at Columbia University, and an author who wrote magazine articles under several names, committed suicide at a rooming house here by shooting in the head with a revolver.

Mr. Peck had been in ill health. A year ago he was in hospital in Rhinecliff, N. Y., in dire straits from mental breakdown, and his first wife, Mrs. Cornelia Dawburn Peck, went to him and brought him to her cottage at Sound Beach near here. Through the summer she nursed him, and in the fall he had so far recovered mental strength and bodily vigor as to be able to resume literary work.

During the winter Professor Peck had lived at Sound Beach Riverside, and had taken rooms in this city in Bell street. It was at the last named place that he killed himself. Persons in the house heard a pistol report, and they found the body, a revolver in one hand.

OAK POINT AS ST. JOHN AUXILIARY FOR WINTER PORT

(Continued from page 1.)

"From the official returns it appears that the St. Croix river is very much less affected by thick weather than other parts of the coast on the Bay of Fundy, and apparently there is little or no fog during the five winter months, November, December, January, February and March, inclusive."

The report here gives a brief description of the town of St. Andrews, St. Stephens, Millville, Woodville, Me., and Calais, Me. It refers to hydro-electric power in the vicinity of St. Stephens, and to other power privileges further up the river. Present railway connections are also referred to. The report then goes on to say:

"In considering the St. Croix River for shipping purposes, and of a possible auxiliary to St. John, upon particularly for the extensive traffic during the winter months, it seems to have many attractions, such as: It is some fifty miles nearer the mouth of the Bay of Fundy than is St. John. The distance from Montreal to St. John by C. P. R. is 488 miles. The distance from Montreal to Oak Bay, St. Stephens by the C. P. R., is 488 miles or thereabout, and in the future a branch line is constructed from Millville to the Bay. This would shorten the distance from Montreal to Oak Bay to 410 miles.

"The River St. Croix, between Bassam's quoddy Bay is composed of well sheltered water, never closed by ice and protected from the swell of the Bay of Fundy by numerous islands near the mouth, and as there is deep water right up to the shore to the side of the river and bay practically no dredging whatever would be necessary to form a shipping channel. Leading lights for the guidance of shipping by night would, of course, have to be provided—probably some joint agreement regarding cost of same could be made with the United States.

Oak Point Terminal

"Assuming therefore, that the river offers reasonably attractive facilities for shipping, the question arises as to what part of the river should be developed first; whether St. Andrews ought to be the terminal or some point further inland, and have no hesitation whatever in recommending that, because of its geographical position as being the furthest point inland suitable for deep water navigation, Oak Point, overlooking Oak Bay, should be selected as the terminal. Oak Bay is a magnificent stretch of river nine miles further inland than St. Andrews with ample room for swinging and excellent accommodation for the construction of terminal facilities, in addition to which there is already the town of St. Stephens a short distance off, with numerous industries moderately large, and rapidly increasing population, and varied commercial activity, affording an absolutely certain considerable amount of traffic the whole year round the moment accommodation is provided. WILL ADVOCATE FEDERAL AID

Board of Trade Committee For Ottawa

PROVISION FOR BRIDGES

Eastern Approach to St. John Insisted Upon and Board Would Deny Further Bond Guarantees Until the Southern Section is Provided For

That St. John is not content to passively await whatever developments that time and political exigency may bring in the matter of the St. John Valley railway, was amply demonstrated at a conference of the board of trade council with the mayor and commissioners yesterday afternoon, when it was announced that a committee would go to Ottawa to urge further federal aid for the bridges across the St. John and Kennebecasis rivers, and decided expressions of opinion were offered that no further guarantee of bonds should be made by the provincial government until provision was also made that the railway should cross the St. John river at the Mistake and reach St. John by the east side.

It seemed to be the feeling of those present that the Valley railway if extended to St. John, should come by the proposed route, through Robbsey in order to provide an outlet for the Grand Trunk Pacific, although P. W. Thomson held out that the main issue was to get the Valley Railway to St. John, whether it came by the east or west side.

Differences of opinion cropped up as to the provision of the connection with the Grand Trunk Pacific. W. F. Hatheway favored the abandonment of the route that the Valley railway is to have the extra money for the bridges and to open up negotiations regarding the connecting link between Napadogan and Fredericton, while D. F. Pidgeon said the Grand Falls connection was the only chance to tap the Grand Trunk Pacific and that grades above Fredericton were not any more pronounced than those on the main line of the N. T. R. between Grand Falls and Napadogan.

SHOWS FALSENESS OF G. T. P. REPORT

Both Statements and Conclusions Disapproved

HON. MR. GRAHAM'S SPEECH

Keen Analysis of Document Reveals Its Object—To Injure Road For Benefit of Rivals and to Secure Political Capital at Expense of Truth

Ottawa, March 24.—It was not a defenceless attack. By the time Hon. George P. Graham got through, shortly before midnight tonight, with a report that was not lumped against the G. T. P., there was not a finding of the partisan investigators that had not been ridiculed, not a criticism of the late government or of the National Transcontinental railway, which had not been shown to be unjust, and scarcely a point in the whole report that was not lashed against its own authors and against the government which had inspired it.

A Severe Indictment. Two notes, he said, ran all through the report. One was to discredit the whole undertaking, thus playing the game of rival railway interests. The other was to injure the Liberal party. The former motive, Mr. Gutelius, the partisan lawyer, ever remembered. Between the two it was really a criminal attack on the G. T. P.

Both in point of law, in point of fact, and in point of accepted railway practice, Mr. Graham convicted the commissioners and the government out of their own mouths. Even the government, as Mr. Graham put it, "disowned its own offspring."

Time and again Mr. Graham specifically challenged Premier Borden and the other ministers to say whether certain parts of the commissioners' findings were true to the facts. Each time he paused for a reply, and each time silence from the government benches gave assent to his criticism.

His speech throughout was punctuated with Liberal cheers, while every interruption from the government benches was turned by Mr. Graham to the discomfiture of the interrupter. The commissioner of railways was never in better form, and at midnight when he asked leave to finish his criticism tomorrow, he received a great ovation from the Liberal members.

Mr. Graham will conclude tomorrow.

WHAT ABOUT THIS?

St. John is still to be regarded as a small town on a branch line, and passengers coming this way are to be given plenty of time to study the scenery at Moncton.

IS WARMLY GREETED
George Scott, who has been in the home mission field for the Presbyterian church in Scotch Settlement, Westmorland county, during the winter, and living at Lewisville, is in the city today and is warmly greeted by many friends. Mr. Scott will continue in field work until next fall, when he will take a course at Pine Hill College. He will return to Lewisville tomorrow. Mrs. Scott expects to spend the spring and summer in St. John. She is now visiting at Apohaig.

A GREAT GUNNER
A correspondent writes: "Frederick Story, B. A., brother of R. F. Story of this city, has won the world's record for heavy gun shooting in the Australian navy battleship, Australia and will receive the first medal of its kind, which is being specially struck. Mr. Story left the imperial service and joined the Australian navy less than six months ago. He intends joining the Canadian service after his three years are up in Australia. His record for shooting was six rounds, six hits, five balls, in thirty-five seconds, in rough sea practice."

MRS. W. GLOVER BELL DEAD
Mrs. Alexander MacMurray of 7 Spruce street received this morning the sad news of the death of her sister, Mrs. W. Glover Bell, which occurred yesterday at her home in Vancouver. Mrs. Bell is survived by her husband, three sons, three daughters and two sisters, Mrs. MacMurray and Mrs. James H. Dunlop of Moncton, N. B. Until three years ago, when she removed with her family to Vancouver, Mrs. Bell was a resident visitor to this city and had here many friends who will learn of her death with regret.

THEY ALL SMOKED
It was a merry party of Scotch lads and lassies that landed from the steamer Saturnia on the West Side this morning. They seemed to be in the best of spirits, and the residents of West St. John who happened to be in the streets got a decided shock. There were five in the party, three lasses and two coves, and when the lasses produced cigarettes, their companions were not loath in helping themselves and "lighting up." In this way they passed along Union street, attracting considerable attention and causing expressions of surprise and, in some cases, amusement.

GETS WORD THAT C.M.B.A. RATES FOR NEW MEMBERS ARE NOT TO BE INCREASED

A letter received from J. J. Behan, grand secretary, by George Harper, grand organizer for the C. M. B. A., who was in the city today, says that the rates for new members are not to be increased although a report to this effect had been circulated. Mr. Behan wrote that there would be a government guarantee that the rates would not be further increased. The rates would be the same for new members as they now are. The only possibility of there being an increase would be a small one in the case of members of more than ten years' standing. Mr. Harper said today, but yet it seemed difficult how this could be in view of the financial standing of the organization. The membership was not quite 25,000, but was steadily increasing.

THE PLUMBERS' BILL

As before announced, there is much interest in the bill before the house at Fredericton with respect to the changes proposed in plumbing regulations, and though those in the city whom it will benefit are in favor of it, there are quite a number strongly opposed to the measure or some of its clauses. Even dealers themselves are not unanimous in favor of the measure which is being put through under the guise of a board of health bill.

Some of the local men have written to the city representatives in the house in opposition to provisions of an improvement in sanitary conditions, but because they feel that the present regulations effecting plumbers are sufficient if enforced properly. It is argued by some that the proposed measure is of no advantage to the man running a shop. There is a scarcity of plumbers now, and if it becomes necessary for all to have a license, several who perform the ordinary repair duties would be barred. The belief is current that the bill will increase the cost of plumbing and mean another item in the higher cost of living. Some real estate dealers are opposed to the bill, as they feel there is a concerted effort being made to make it necessary that plumbing supplies be purchased from a member of the association, and they are also of the opinion that it is not necessary for all who do plumbing work to be licensed, as there are some little repair jobs which even an apprentice can do well.

On the other hand practically all the Master Plumbers' Association are declared heavily in favor of the bill, as they say that much plumbing work is done in the city which would not be contemplated in places where there was a better system of inspection. They feel that all plumbers should be licensed for the benefit of the sanitary conditions, and the improvement of plumbing work in buildings. They do not feel that the proposed measure provides for any such movement, as is said to be threatened in the matter of monopolies of purchase of stock and supplies.

It is said by those in favor of the measure that there are now in use in the city plumbing installations which should not be, and that until there is stricter supervision and more rigid enforcement of the regulations with a board appointed to examine into the efficiency of those working as plumbers, this will continue. Action on the measure will be awaited with interest.

WILL CONTROL RATES AND EFFICIENCY OF THE FERRY SERVICE

Hon. Mr. Morrissey's Answers to Mr. Dugall's Queries About the Maggie Miller

Hon. Mr. Morrissey, in answer to Mr. Dugall's inquiry in the legislature yesterday, said:

Q.—1. What assistance is to be given the owners of the S. S. Maggie Miller, a steamer plying between Millidgeville and Baywater, for rebuilding and repairing?

A.—No assistance for rebuilding and repairing.

Q.—2. Will the usual subsidy of \$1,000 be given to the assistance to rebuild?

A.—Subsidy of \$2,000 for three years will be given.

Q.—3. Is the department aware that the passengers and other traffic by this route have increased remarkably within a few years, and that the owners of the boat have found it a very profitable investment?

A.—No. The following sworn statement for 1911-12-13 leads the department to believe the contrary.

SATURNIA IN PORT

Joseph R. Clarkson a Passenger on the Glasgow Steamer

With nearly 300 passengers, all in the best of health after their trip across the Atlantic, the Donaldson Line steamer Saturnia, under the command of Captain David Taylor, arrived in port last evening and docked early this morning at No. 4 berth. With the exception of the first two days, the steamer had a fair passage.

The Saturnia left Glasgow on March 14, and for the first two days ran into a series of stiff gales and high head seas. On the third day the wind dropped, and from that until the steamer anchored off Partridge Island, good time was made.

Ninety-four cabin and ninety steerage passengers, nearly all Scotch settlers for the west, came on the Saturnia. Among the cabin passengers was Joseph R. Clarkson, formerly manager of the Partridge Pulp and Paper Co. of this city, who is paying a visit to his son, David P. Clarkson, head bookkeeper for the Canadian Fabrics-More Co's branch here. He will also visit another son who is with the Bank of Nova Scotia in Cuba. Mr. Clarkson, while here, made many friends among the business people of the city, who will welcome his return.

The Saturnia brought a full cargo of general freight, including six thorough-bred horses. This is the Saturnia's last trip to St. John this season.

A COINCIDENCE

A Montreal paper prints the following: "Home wanted by a baby." The city is at present faced with the task of finding the home of, or a home for, John Yank, three years of age, who is at present occupying a bed in the Alexandra Hospital, having been cured of a contagious disease.

The child was brought from the General Hospital on February 26, and was supposed to be a resident of 841 Grubert Lane. When he was cured, a letter was sent to this address asking that the child be taken away, but the postal authorities returned it "No such address."

The police have searched for the parents without success, the hospital is embarrassed by the presence of the young man, and the health department is faced with the problem of placing the child with the parents if they can be found.

This is almost an exact parallel of a case the public in the Times last week, that of a baby in the General Public Hospital here.
