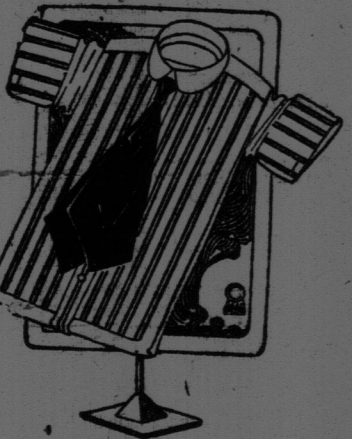

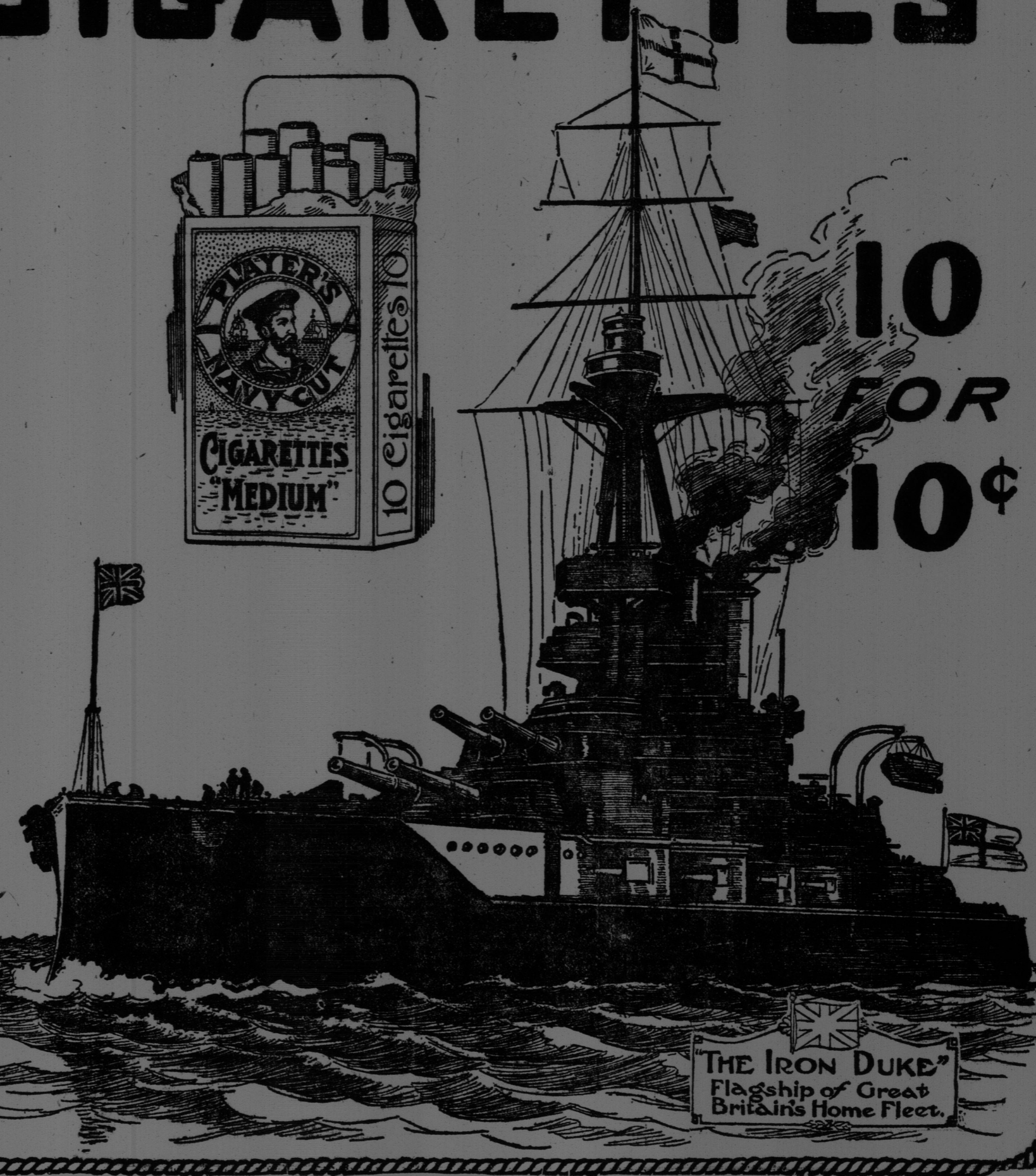

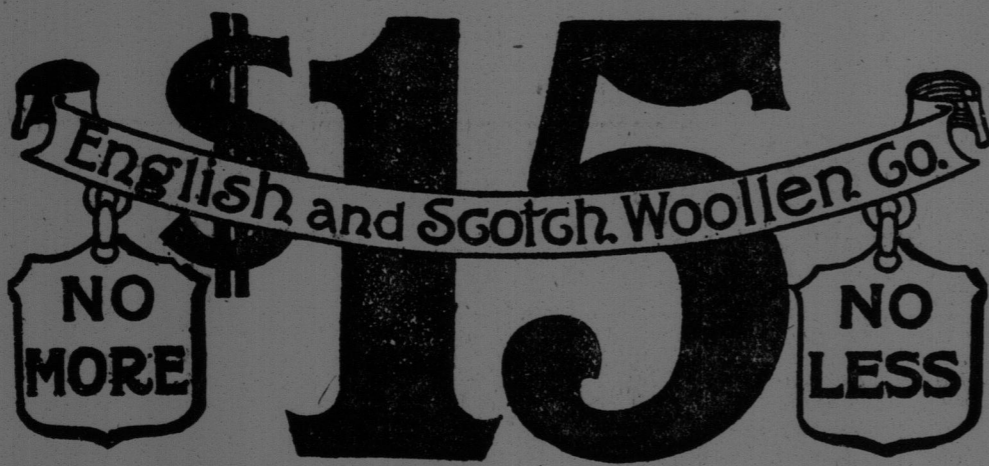

BARNARDO HOMES APPEAL

Editor Times:—
Sir—Never was the work of Dr. Barnardo's Homes more fraught with difficulty than it is today. War is hanging like a cloud over us. Our family of nearly 8,000 boys and girls looks to us for food and clothing; and the army of destitute children is daily increasing. How many fathers have marched away in the defence of their country never to return? How many orphans will be stretching out helpless hands and crying with little hungry lips? That follows in the train of a terrible war.

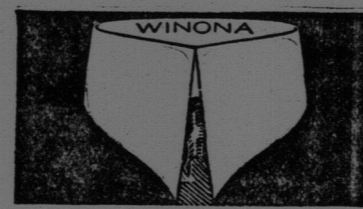

C.P.R. CONSTABLE PUT ON DEFENCE

A New Turn Given Case in Which He Arrested Denis Keleher, a City Employee

Another side to the story of the arrest of Denis Keleher by C. P. R. Constable Dryden on a charge of refusing to move from C. P. R. property near No. 1 elevator and resisting the policeman, was brought out in evidence in the police court this morning, and Dryden is being held at central police station on a charge of assaulting Keleher.

The evidence of some of the witnesses this morning in the charge against Keleher was also taken as evidence in a preliminary examination in the charge against Dryden. The prosecution in the charges against Keleher is being conducted by E. C. Weyman, while J. M. Baxter appeared to defend Keleher and also to conduct the prosecution against Dryden.

Dryden said that he saw Keleher on the C. P. R. property, he asked him what he was doing there and said Keleher replied by calling him a bushman and asking him what authority he had to stop him. He said he showed his badge and Keleher told him if it was authority he wanted he could show his, and reached his right hand back towards his hip pocket. Dryden then said he struck him to protect himself.

Dryden smiled when asked a question and Mr. Baxter said to him: "You have nearly killed one of the dearest men on the West Side of the harbor. Take off that grin and answer my questions." Keleher was in court, but sat near an open window with his head bandaged. He said he had been working for the water and sewerage department for seventeen years, that he was coming from a water meter near the elevator when he was stopped by Dryden and that at the time he was struck over the head he was reaching towards his hip pocket to show the constable his keys. He was chased by the blow and was brought over to the police station.

CLARENCE KENNEY WRITES OF VISIT TO LONDON

Interesting Account Sent to Mother by St. John Corporal in First Contingent

Mrs. Kenney, wife of John Kenney, factory inspector, has received another letter from her son, Clarence, who is at Salisbury Plain with the first Canadian contingent. He writes that he is well, and asks to be remembered to his friends in St. John. He tells of a trip he and some of his chums made to London and of the good time they had seeing the sights of the big city, and tells of having seen several wounded soldiers who were back from the firing line in France.

The majority of the men, he said, were in the hospital, and some of the legs or arms. In his talk with them he had been told that the Germans did not seem like expert shots, and also that they were afraid of the bayonet charge of the British, as when it was sounded they invariably retreated. In his London visit, he tells of seeing Westminster Abbey, the Tower, the War Office, Hyde Park and Madame Tussaud's wax works show. A shave in London, he says, costs three cents, a cup of tea two cents, but these are about the only things cheap.
