He was a very pious and useful minister of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, in connection with our Church. In this Province, our beloved Brother Baily, united with us at an early period of our history, and having discharged the arduous duties connected with his office, much to the satisfaction of the church with which he was connected: doing honour to the cause of God, and much to the credit of himself. We hesitate not to say that the church of Christ, and the world generally have lost a friend indeed. As a minister of the gospel of Christ, it may be well to say that he was "apt to teach." A man of God, full of faith, and of the Holy Ghost. In his public teachings he was both practical and powerful. The subject matter of his discourses was generally of that character, more likely to affect the hearts of his hearers than to please their fancy; and being generally suffused in tears himself, his hearers could scarce resist the force of his pathetic appeals. Courting no flattery, and fearing no frowns, his sole object appeared to be to set forth that truth which makes the sinner free, in its most plain and simple style; so that while the most illiterate, was peculiarly profited, the most learned was not less edified. His deportment did honour to his profession, whether in the desk or by the fireside, satisfied if Christ was preached, God glorified, and souls saved. The families with whom he lodged, young and old profited by his visits. He parted with few who were not desirous to see him again and re-visit their habitations. In adversity, he was steadfast

in prosperity, humble. Notwithstanding his 'oft infirmities' of body, and frequent suggestions made by his friends, touching the impropriety of exposing himself any longer to the hazards of an itinerant life; these suggestions only seemed to invigorate rather than to damp his zeal, in the cause he had espoused; hence he gave himself again into the hands of the Conference but a few weeks previous to his last illness, which terminated his mortal career. Armed with the panoply of God, he was enabled to war a good warfare; his weapons were not carnal, but mighty, through God, to the pulling down of the strong holds of Satan. Thus qualified, he became a blessing to many precious souls, and though conquered, was a conquerer! Such real merit developed in the character of our worthy brother, in steadfastness, perseverance, and love for the promotion of religious liberty, will not soon be effaced from our minds, and we trust that an impetus may hereby be given to the surviving few who yet remain unto this day, to thank God and take courage, especially when we compare our present prospects, with the inauspicious circumstances under which we laboured at the time when our deceased brother first united with us. When according to the judgment of many, our prospects were of the most unenviable and gloomy character, possessing no inviting charms but the Gospel, no banner, but the Cross of Christ, no tempting offers, but the promises of God, no magic wand to wave over the heads of spellbound admirers but the bible; the man who could cheerfully submit to the endurance of such a cross, and despise such a shame, forsaking all for the glory that should follow, is worthy; such a man God will love, and God will save—such we have reason to believe was our much lamented Brother Baily, a man of more than common honour, faithful to his God, and courteous to mankind; consequently when he came to gather up his feet in death, he was enabled to place his utmost confidence in that God in whom he had hitherto trusted, and commended to others, giving the most perfect satisfaction, to all his surviving friends, that their loss would prove his everlasting gain, and in hope of a glorious resurrection gave up the ghost. The funeral services were performed by the Rev. T. Read, from Revelations, 14th chap. and 13 verse.

RESOLUTIONS OF CONFERENCE.

1. That Raleigh and East Tilbury be added to the Western Mission; and that Orford, Howard and Harwich be set off as a Circuit, and called the Howard Circuit.
2. That Crosby and Elizabethtown Circuits be divided—Elizabethtown to include the following appointments:—Beache's, Stewart's, Maitland's, Marshall's, Bissell's, Maud's, Gowan's, Middle Branch, and Widow Bell's.
3. That the Christian Messenger be published weekly after the close of the present volume, provided a sufficient number of subscribers be obtained.
4. That the Rev. T. T. Howard be the Editor of the Christian Messenger from the time it commences weekly, till the next Annual Conference.
5. That the Christian Messenger be the size of the Christian Advocate, and be charged ten shillings in advance; twelve and sixpence at the end of six months, and fifteen shillings at the close of the year.
6. That every agent who shall obtain ten subscribers for the Christian Messenger shall be entitled to a copy gratis, and have a discount of six per cent on all subscriptions above ten.
7. That Ministers of all denominations be charged seven and sixpence for the Christian Messenger, if paid in advance.
8. That the Preachers in Toronto with J. Doel, Esq., R. H. Brett, Esq., and Messrs. J. Tyner, J. Foster, and J. Good, be the Printing Committee, who shall have the management of the finances of the paper.
9. That the Editor shall submit to the Printing Committee all doubtful articles before finally rejecting them.
10. That all political discussions be excluded from its columns.
11. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the present Editor of the Christian Messenger, for his valuable services during the past year, and that he be requested to continue his services during the publication of the Messenger in its present form.

12. That in future the state of each Circuit be brought before the April Quarterly Meetings, and that the returns to the Conference be sent officially from those Meetings.

13. That a course of study be prepared for our young Ministers, and that the following brethren be a Committee to prepare the same:—Revds. H. O. Crofts, T. T. Howard, J. Brennan, J. Caswell, with Messrs. R. H. Brett, J. Foster, and J. Tyner.

14. That each Superintendent at the first Quarterly Meeting of his Circuit, recommend that the small sum of £5 10 0 be raised during the year, which will liquidate the demand on the Conference occasioned by the Connexional debt.

15. That in order to increase the funds of our Auxiliary Missionary Society, this Conference recommends that Sermons be preached in all our preaching places at which Collections shall be made, and that one or more public Missionary Meetings be held on each Station.

16. That the following brethren be the Missionary Committee for the ensuing year:—Rev. H. O. Crofts, President; T. T. Howard, Secretary; J. Hughson, Esq., Treasurer; Committee, Revds. J. Brennan, J. Caswell, with R. H. Brett, J. Tyner, and J. Good.

17. That in order more efficiently to carry out our Missionary operations, the Missionary Committee is requested to make arrangements to hold the Missionary Meetings on all our Stations between Christmas and the first of March.

18. That those Superintendents of Circuits who neglect the public Collections for the Support of our Paternal Fund, be required to pay the sum of one pound for every year which they omit this duty.

19. That the District Meeting for Canada East be held in Bolton chapel, Eastern Townships, on the first Wednesday in May, 1848.

20. That the President of the Conference, T. T. Howard, J. Foster, P. Lottridge, and J. Cummings, form the Annual Committee for the ensuing year; Rev. H. O. Crofts, Corresponding Member.

21. That the thanks of the Conference be given to James Hughson, Esq., for his valuable services as Treasurer of the Connexion during the year, and that he be requested to continue his services the ensuing year.

22. That the increase of married Preachers salaries from £50 to £70 be laid before the Quarterly Meetings during the year, and the result sent to the next Conference.

ADDRESS

Of the Nineteenth Annual Conference to the Members of the Canadian Wesleyan Methodist New Connexion Church.

DEAR BRETHREN,—Grace to you, and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. Through the kindness of the God of all grace, we have been permitted again to assemble at our Annual Meeting in Conference, to transact the business connected with the interests, as well spiritual as temporal of our beloved Zion. And deeply do we regret having to record, that since our last Session, death has entered our ranks, and removed from amongst us one of the eldest, most useful, and most esteemed Ministers of our Body, The Rev. E. Bailey. His end was that of the perfect man and the upright, peaceful, triumphant, happy.

We have unmingled satisfaction in informing you, that our present Session has been pre-eminently distinguished for cordiality of feeling and unanimity of sentiment among the members of Conference. In all their deliberations and discussions both Ministers and Delegates seemed to have but one object before them, the glory of God in the promotion of the vital interests of the Church.

From several departments of our widely extended and interesting field of Missionary exertion, very encouraging reports have been received. The God of missions has been with his faithful servants, and owned their humble efforts to further the accomplishment of his great design in the institution and promulgation of the Gospel, the salvation of a fallen and ruined world. The divine Spirit has descended on many of our Congregations, and believers have been quickened and incited to aim at more elevated attainments in piety; and numbers who had lived in impenitency and sin hitherto, have been savingly converted to God. On other sections of our

work those delightful visitations of revival influence have not been so fully enjoyed, yet even in those Circuits the members have remained firm and unflinching in their attachment to religious truth, and in their adherence to those sound and just principles which form the basis of our ecclesiastical polity.

You will undoubtedly be as much gratified to hear as we are to be able to announce that in several locations, the important matter of erecting suitable places of worship and comfortable houses for the accommodation of our Ministers and their families, is engaging the attention of our members and friends to an extent unprecedented in the annals of our history. Several commodious Chapels and Parsonage houses have been completed during the year, and others are in course of building. To God be the praise for stirring up our people to embark, and assisting them to proceed in this benevolent work!

In view of that great truth, "the priest's lips should keep knowledge," and convinced that an intelligent and pious ministry is essential alike to the prosperity and respectability of any church, especially in this country, advancing as it is in intellectuality, wealth and refinement, your Ministers and representatives have adopted measures which when brought into operation will secure to our Connexion this grand desideratum.

During the year now closed several of our most active and efficient Ministers have been the subjects of severe bodily afflictions, and for months set aside from the duties of their office; however, through the firmness of our people and the activity of local brethren, our means have been kept up, and our general interests sustained; and we are enabled to report an increase to our numerical force of 173 members.— Small as is this accession to our numbers, yet it affords us grateful evidence of the Divine approbation, and furnishes us strong encouragement to go forward in the high and holy work to which we have been called in humble reliance on him who has said, "Lo! I am with you *always*, even unto the end." And dear Brethren, you scarcely need to be informed that your active co-operation will also assist the Ministry among you to a great extent. Encouraged by your sympathy, supported by your prayers, assisted by your efforts, they will preach the word with a spirit, a wisdom, and an energy that will overthrow the opposition of the world, the flesh, and Satan, and secure to the Gospel a complete victory over multitudes who are alienated from God through the igno-

 help of your Ministers, you have no valid reason to expect
 that the word, though faithfully and ably administered, will

 person has something to do in this great matter, has a talent,
 or more to improve, a work assigned him which he cannot
 fail to perform without incurring the guilt of unfaithfulness
 to his God, to the church and to the world. Personal piety,
 purity of heart and life are of paramount importance ; and
 individual happiness and usefulness will be in the exact pro-
 portion to our personal improvement in this duty. " To him
 that hath shall be given." Add to your faith virtue, and to virtue
 knowledge ; and to knowledge temperance ; and to temper-
 ance patience ; and to patience godliness ; and to godliness
 brotherly-kindness ; and to brotherly-kindness charity. For
 if these things be in you, and abound, they make you that ye
 shall be neither barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our
 Lord Jesus Christ. Diligent and regular attendance on
 those means of grace which are peculiar to Methodism, are
 indispensable to the maintainence of spirituality of mind and
 growth in grace. We then as workers together with you,
 beseech you that while you cordially co-operate with your
 ministerial brethren and representatives in carrying into
 effect all measures adopted by them in Conference for the
 more successful working of our system throughout the Con-
 nexion you do earnestly contend for the faith once delivered
 to the Saints, nor give over the contest till you shall have at-
 tained that holiness without which no man shall see the Lord.

We earnestly recommend you to cultivate those frater-
 nal feelings towards your fellow-Christians of other denomi-

ADDRESS

Of the Nineteenth Annual Conference of the Canadian Wesleyan Methodist New Connexion Church, to the Methodist New Connexion Conference in England.

DEAR BRETHREN ;—The ever rolling stream of time has borne us onward twelve months nearer a vast eternity, and through the kind dealings of a gracious providence has brought us together in our nineteenth annual conference. We now pause awhile, to reflect upon the past, and to contemplate the future.

Amidst the various duties which devolve upon us at the present time, no one appears more interesting or pleasurable, than that of expressing to you our continued respect and increasing affection.

While the repeated proofs we have had of your expansive benevolence kindle emotions of unfeigned gratitude in our hearts, the intelligence of your prosperity, popularity, and increasing facilities for the spread of truth, causes us to feel more honoured than ever in our identification with you, and to adore most devoutly that divine being whose arms have been underneath and round about you.

From various circumstances which have transpired in this Province during the past year, we are led more highly to appreciate those great principles which distinguish us as scriptural and liberal in our system of church government ; and we are most happy to inform you that the mists of prejudice are dispersing around us, and that a brighter day is dawning upon our beloved connexion.

We have amongst us a few veterans who have long and ardently toiled amidst innumerable discouragements to disseminate our principles, and save immortal souls, you will readily imagine their delight in witnessing the prosperity of our cause ; indeed, we all feel that the darkness and dreariness of night are past ; that the sun of our prosperity is hastening to its meridian splendour, brightening our path and cheering our hearts ; and we pray that it may never set until Canada, yea, the world, shall be brought to the feet of the Redeemer.

It will doubtless afford you much pleasure to learn that our present conference has been peculiarly distinguished as one of harmony, order and love—that the discussion of the various topics which came before us has been evidently conducted with a single eye to the glory of God, and under the

influence of that brotherly kindness enjoined by our blessed Saviour.

The reports received from our different circuits are, with a few exceptions, of a cheering nature. Our statistics will show an increase in number, which, though not so extensive as we could wish, is nevertheless a proof that God hath not forgotten us, and we pray that during the ensuing year his Holy Spirit may be more abundantly poured out.

Our excellent discipline has been generally and strictly enforced; and though under its pruning operations some unfruitful branches have been lopped off, still we believe this will promote the growth and stability of our church.

The financial department of our operations does not present so pleasing an aspect as we desire it should do, nevertheless, the deficiency is not, we believe, to be attributed to less liberality in our people, or a want of activity on the part of our ministers or collectors, but to the many untoward circumstances which, during the past year, have militated against it, namely, the erection of parsonages and chapels; the impossibility of holding all our Missionary meetings, at the right season and the many claims upon the public, for the relief of the famishing thousands of Ireland and Scotland. Taking these into consideration, we feel safe in stating, that our friends are cooperating with you in generously sustaining and extending the interests of the redeemer's kingdom in this interesting and important field of Missionary labour. Indeed, this is not the time to relax our efforts or grow languid in our exertions; for the mystery of iniquity is vigorously at work—error, with a brazen front, is stalking abroad—vices in varied, disgusting, and awfully dangerous forms are existing around us; emigrants are pouring in by thousands upon our shores; thousands of the Indians are perishing for the lack of knowledge, and we feel called upon by hundreds, on the brink of perdition, to double our finances, our exertions, and our prayers. We rejoice, dear brethren, to witness your continued and increased desire for the evangelization of this province. Of this you are giving sufficient and most pleasing proof, by enlarging our Missionary grant, and the promise of an increase of labourers, and we do hope that nothing but an absolute want of funds will ever induce you to withdraw your support, until our infant cause attains the dimension and strength of manhood.

It is our painful duty to record the decease of our much respected and beloved brother, Rev. E. Bailey, but we ba-

lieve the deathless spirit has reached the climes of bliss, and is now shining in the celestial hemisphere, a star of considerable magnitude. Arduous and untiring were his labours on earth, sweet, and eternal is his rest in heaven.

But though one has been called to lay down his armour and take up his crown, by the same divine providence several have been brought into our ranks, equipped for the fight, and, with our face to the foe, we are determined to give no quarter, till the kingdoms of this world shall become the kingdoms of our God and his Christ.

The labours of our much beloved superintendent, Brother Crofts have been of the most arduous nature, and he must have been more than man could he have performed the amount of labour devolving upon him without a reduction of his physical strength. Grieved were we to witness his changed appearance, and the return of his affliction which has prevented him from attending the whole of the sittings of our conference. We trust that in your wisdom and kindness, you will devise some way to relieve him, that he may be restored to health without removing him from amongst us.

And now, in conclusion, dear brethren, we entreat an extensive interest in your prayers, and whilst the divine being is inspiring you with courage, zeal and love to preach the words of life in your cities, towns, and villages, oh pray that we may possess the same spirit to carry the glad tidings of salvation to the humblest settler of the forest. And when the great day of accounts shall arrive, may, you, and we, with a goodly number who through our humble instrumentality, have been brought to the knowledge of the truth, meet before our father's throne, exclaiming here we are, Lord, and the children thou hast given us.

Of the Canadian Wesleyan Methodist New Connection Missionary Society Auxiliary to the Methodist New Connection Missionary Society in England, read at the General Missionary Meeting of the Connection, held at the Annual Conference, at Mallory-town, June 18th, 1847.

Than the history of Missions, nothing is more diversified. The field of Missionary enterprise, the chequered career of the Missionary, and the ever varying result attending his efforts

furnish illustrations combining the pleasing and pathetic, with the difficult and melancholy. Such the missionary band has experienced, as its lot in all ages of the world;— and such has been our lot during the past year. A sufficient amount of trial and disappointment has been experienced to convince us of the necessity of resting our cause in implicit faith upon the immutable word of Divine truth, and putting forth benevolent effort independently of external things; and an amount of encouragement which cannot fail to awaken emotions of gratitude to God, stimulate to increase effort and to reduce to the quiescence of oblivion every rising fear respecting our future prosperity. Among the events connected with our history during the past year, is the death of our venerable, laborious, and lamented brother, Edward Baily. Several considerations enjoin upon us, the necessity of denying ourselves the privilege of enlarging upon his faith, zeal, piety, self-denial and usefulness. Should it however appear to any that a monument should here be raised to his honor and the glory of the grace that saved and rendered him such an able minister of the gospel, we would refer such friends not to the marble that too often demands fame and honor for the vicious but to the bloodless and glorious conquests secured by his agency over the prejudices, the unbelief and wickedness of human hearts to the living seals of his ministry;— which we doubt not may be found in most parts of our missionary field. We need only add his personal triumph when brought in contact with the vanquished King of Terrors was complete. He died in the Lord.

While, nevertheless, the relentless hand of Death has severed from us, one, whose name stands associated with the infancy of our existance as a body, we record with gratitude the fact that the Lord of the harvest has furnished not only one to supply the vacant place of our departed Brother, but several more to enable us to supply at least some of the increased demands for ministerial labourers, which emanate from nearly all parts of our work. Such have been the multiplied mercies of God towards us, in placing in our ranks an increased amount of labourers, that we are enabled the ensuing year to disperse almost throughout the length and breadth of this growing and important colony nearly forty who with God's blessing are determined to preach Christ Jesus, and him crucified to perishing sinners. But although this is a much larger number than has been em-

ployed in the work at any previous period of our history, yet the difficulty experienced by the stationing committee of our annual conference this year, to meet the greatly increased number of applications was perhaps never before so great. Taking into account in connection with the above statements the fact that we have in the prospective, a reasonable ground to expect during the conference year upon which we are about to enter, a still greater accession to our Missionary ranks:—Some from the mother country, and some from among us in Canada:—may we not take courage, assured that God has heard our prayer for the increase of labourers, to meet the demands of an enlarged and still enlarging harvest.

Your Committee would nevertheless urge friends and supporters of our cause generally, to persevere with one consent, in prayer to God, to enlarge our borders and multiply greatly the number of those who point men to the Lamb of God "which taketh away the sin of the world." There remains much Land to be possessed:—and in proportion to the extent to which the operation of our system of Church Government is developed, its scriptural character vindicated and established, we believe the body destined to secure popular esteem. Of this it is not foreign to the scope of a missionary report to furnish illustration. Added to the noble band of the admirers of Gospel liberality in Church Government, who in Toronto a short time previous to our last Annual Conference, avowed their determination to avail themselves of the privileges of a thorough lay representation in the Church; our beloved Brethren at Whitchurch, during the past year, in the avowal of similar views, have united with us—forming an interesting station in that section of the Province. While therefore the cause of religious freedom seems destined to progress and triumph, your Committee feels deeply the importance of corresponding effort and prayer, in order to meet the increasing claims for men and means.

Your Committee cannot deny itself the pleasure of stating that taken as a whole the scene of our missionary operations presents an aspect the most encouraging and prosperous—Although the increase of members is not large, yet we rejoice that a goodly number of souls have we trust been converted to God and added to the church. The wilderness and the solitary places have been made glad, and the desert already buds and blossoms as the rose by the

nouncement of salvation to the destitute. That our numerical account does not present a greater increase, may be accounted for by the fact, that more than usual care has been taken during the past year to avoid returning any but those who have proved themselves worthy of a name in a religious community. It appears, however, from the statistical account of Connexion furnished during the present session of the Conference, that several parsonages have been erected, several chapels built, finished or secured to the Connexion—furnishing satisfactory assurances that the foundation is being laid for future comfort and stability and prosperity.

Indicative of the favour of the Head of the church, your committee cannot retire without recording with gratitude to God and our friends in England, the unsparing liberality with which the latter have acted in furnishing us with the means of extending and supporting our Missionary operations. During the past year their promises have been verified, and by the mercy of God the liberality of our esteemed Brethren in England, and the co-operation of our friends in Canada, the Agents of the Society have been enabled to live in circumstances comparatively comfortable while labouring to save souls:—*to live*, we say, and that, in some parts of the work where were it not for the benevolence of our English Brethren we could by no means maintain our ground. To their benevolence we are debtors, and to them we present our warmest thanks.

The pleasure experienced by your Committee, in presenting a Report so encouraging with regard to the past year and our future prospects, is somewhat diminished by the fact, that amid the increasing liberality of beloved transatlantic Brethren, and the multiplied tokens of good furnished by the Author of our salvation, the amount of subscriptions to this Auxiliary Society in this country is almost forty pounds less than those of the preceding year. This, however, we think is attributable principally to the fact that the work of holding Missionary Meetings resting almost exclusively with our General Superintendent—precluded the possibility of holding all the Missionary Meetings in the winter—the season at which the best attendance and largest subscriptions may be expected.

Seeing, however, that the cause of discouragement is wholly accidental, and not likely to recur, let us take cour-

to carry on the Mission, let the the efforts of the ensuing year confirm our present conviction, that the decrease during the past was not owing to the diminution of benevolent feeling.

With regard to the operations of the Parent Society, we rejoice to know that in putting forth benevolent effort, they abound more and more. Not content with what has been attempted, they labour in every respect to extend their efforts and improve their extensive field. In Ireland, with evangelical zeal and activity, they are prosecuting their benevolent undertakings. In Australia, the Parent Society maintains an Agency; and is anxious greatly to extend the scene of its operations.

In Canada we are the objects of unsparing liberality.—The General Superintendent is supported without any expense to the connexion in this country—the Benificent Society and Paternal fund receive each an annual grant of thirty pounds:—and besides all this, one hundred pounds above the amount granted last year for the support of the Ministers labouring amongst us are appropriated for the ensuing year—and to assist our brethren in Toronto in defraying the expences incurred by the erection of a commodious chapel in that city during the past year, two hundred pounds are promised.

Your Committee, in presenting their Annual Report, cannot omit the pleasing duty of presenting their thanks, and the thanks of Conference, to the Ministers and collectors and friends whose efforts and donations and prayers have been enlisted for the carrying out of the great Commission of the Redeemer to his Apostles and the church. In your several capacities we rejoice to behold evidences of life and zeal and activity. In your labour of love endeavour to abound more and more, and amidst the discouragements and obstacles with which you may meet, never forget though these may diminish your success they will not deprive you of the promised reward.

While approaching the conclusion of this Report, your Committee discovers abundant cause of courage and confidence and enlarged expectation with regard to the future. We are prompted to thank God devoutly that we are united among ourselves; the hearts of our beloved Brethren in England are with us; and to a good extent the hearts of a generous public. But what we esteem more highly than
