The report continues: "Searcy, of Alabama, in 1907 described an epidemic of pellagra occurring in the Mount Vernon Insane Hospital (for the colored insane of Alabama). There were Se cases and 57 desths. He states that a few cases of such a disease had been noted there as long ago as 1901, but that their real nature was unrecognized. He also states that after attention was called to the disease some cases were recognized in the hospital for the insane at Tusca loosa. His case generally ran a more or less acute course and the mortality was very high (about 64 per cent.).
