What the Boys Brought to Colonel Call.

When the first contingent men were leaving Newcastle for South Africa, Lt. Colonel Call presented Messrs. Gifford, Kitchin, Ansell, Harris and Mitchevich with a five dollar gold coin each. They prized the gift very much, coming as it did from the organizer and first commander of the Newcastle Field Battery, to which they belonged, and instead of spending the money, they each kept it as a souvenir. In South Africa, they consulted together on the subject of bringing a gift home to the colorist as a memento of the campaign, and determined that, if possible, it should be something that could not be duplicated in New Brunswick. Their opportunity came when they got into Crozier's lager at Pearsberg, where they secured a pan-pan shell, from which they had the oarite and barite

returned South African crosses.

About 11:30 o'clock on Friday morning the arrival at Newcastle of the members of the first Canadian contingent who left Cape Town a month or so ago. It told the people of the Miramichi of the arrival of the South Africa heroes, and was the key-note sounded in the general and enthusiastic welcome they received.

At Chatham everything possible was being done in decorating the streets and buildings, and preparations made for the arrival of the Chatham members. The Citizens' Band officers of the 73rd Battalion and others went to Newcastle to be on time for the arrival of the train from the South.

The returning veterans were given a great reception at the wharf, after which Messrs. Monroe and Doyle were taken to the Waverly Hotel and dined by their Chatham friends. A half holiday was proclaimed by Mayor Loggie and Chatham was an fête. Crowds had gathered on the public wharf at six o'clock, the regular scheduled time of the steamer.

After the cheering, little Liza M. presented a bouquet of chrysanthemums, tied with red, white and blue ribbon.

The procession was re-formed and marched to Hill street, down Hill street to Pleasant street, down Pleasant street where it joins Water street, up upper Water street and around to Duke street and on to the public square, where an address of welcome was read by Mayor Loggie, on behalf of the citizens.

Pie Monroe thanked the people for the reception they had accorded him, and was warmly thanked by it.

Pie Doyle said it was a great surprise to him to have such a reception tendered him as he was a total stranger, and was known for only a few years in Nelson. He could not give them any of his experience at this time, but he hoped to be able, some time, to relate what were his experiences.

Premier Tweedie followed in a patriotic speech, referring to the enthusiasm which was manifested at the time of the departure of the Canadian contingent to do battle for the Empire, but there was more enthusiasm to-day on the safe return of our men. Happily some of those from Northumberland had fallen on the field and he was very glad to be told of the whole of New Brunswick. There were others from Chatham yet at the front, and these also had been fortunate. His mentioned Pie Ward, whom he said was always at the bat, and had escaped and was never a day sick. He noted the enthusiasm that prevailed all over the world over the return of the Canadians in the war, and which has brought them into such prominence. They have done well, and being, for the most part, only raw recruits, have stood equal to the well-known regiments, the Highlanders. Great Britain has placed them among the front ranks of the army. Some had objected to the giving of a holiday for these occasions, but he thought there was no objection to it. He hoped the Province would do something to perpetuate the memory of the great part enacted by the heroes of New Brunswick.

We stand today with active and able as any in the British Empire. He acceded to both cheers a hearty welcome.

Three cheers were given for Premier Tweedie and the boys, after which Premier Tweedie called for a cheer for the Newcastle boys who returned, which were given heartily, and also for Private Ward, who had volunteered to continue his services in South Africa.

The crowd then dispersed, to meet again in a hall in the evening, when a military procession was formed at 7:30 in front of the Town Hall. The 73rd Band led the procession, followed by 20 Co. in order. Capt. Mackenzie and Lieut. Meston. The returned soldiers, the officers of the 73rd, the mayor and aldermen, the fire brigade, and many others participated. After marching through the principal streets of the town the procession drew up at the Town Hall, and a reception was held in the council chamber, where a large crowd had assembled. Major Murray made a speech from the balcony to the crowd below. He was being made for the boys to show themselves, they also appeared on the balcony and again thanked the people for their kindness. Cheers were again given for the heroes, God Save the Queen was sung and the crowd broke up.

The Advocate, which gives a full report of the Newcastle reception, says:—"In the spacious Town Hall, the Mayor and members of the Board of Aldermen gave the khaki lads a dinner, Saturday night. About fifty were present. Mayor Morrison sat at one end of the table and on his right and left were the guests of honor. Honorary members sat at the other end, and on his right and left were the members of the council, officers, dignitaries, and Mayor Morrison was toast master.

The following was the toast list—"The Queen," responded to by all singing the "National Anthem," "The Army and Navy," responded to by Major Malby and Captain Sergeant; "The Canadian Contingent," responded to by Mr. Brown; "Our Guests," responded to by Sgt. Ansell, and Private Aitken, Moore and Harris; "Municipality of Northumberland," responded to by Councilor Campbell; "The Town of Newcastle," responded to by Mr. Hennessey, Hickson and Williston; "The Bench and Bar," responded to by Judge Wilkinson and Samuel Thompson; "The Clergy," responded to by Rev. Messrs. Snow and Prieles; "The Ladies," responded to by Rev. Mr. Aitken and W. A. Park; "The Press," responded to by H. B. Ansell. All Hennessey proposed the toast of Mayor Morrison. The Mayor replied, Judge Wilkinson proposed the orchestra, Mr. T. M. Stewart responded.

Mr. Henry Wye did the catering and it is safe to say those present never sat down to a better cooked or more enjoyable repast.
