Miramichi Advance. OCTOBER 8, 1903. They've Gone It Blind. The bill committing the Dominion to the transcontinental railway has passed the House of Commons.

Had it not been for the absurd railway scheme proposed by the leader of the opposition as a substitute for that of the government, it is possible that a more unbiased consideration would have been given to the latter.

We observe that appeals are being made to the Senate not to pass the bill. It is useless, however, to do this. The measure is a party one, and while the form of debating it will be gone through in the upper house, political influence will prevail.

Let it be remembered that objection is not made to the increase of railway facilities for the transportation of the products of the west to the Atlantic seaboard at St. John and Halifax.

When we are told by so eminent an authority as Sir Stanford Fleming that the excess of grades and curves on any railway to be built through the country proposed for the new line between Quebec and Montreal will quite offset the 70 miles less distance than by the I. C. R. for heavy freight haulage, we may well believe that parliament should have hesitated before committing the country to the construction of at least that part of the proposed road.

A number of newspapers have stated that Hon. A. G. Blair moved an amendment to the Grand Trunk Pacific Company's bill on the day it passed its final reading in the House of Commons.
