MILITARY ORDERS.

Ottawa, Ont., May 15.—A militia order has been issued prescribing the military ceremonies to be observed on the day of the funeral of King Edward. Minute' guns will be fired (the number to be specified later) at noon on Friday at 25 points from Victoria to Halifax, including Woodstock Moneton, Newcastle, St. John, Sydney, Antigonish, Halifax, and Charlottetown.

At each of these places where a unit of the permanent force is stationed every available officer and man is to be present on parade at the place where the salute is to be fired, and dress review order. When the first and last guns are being fired, troops will present arms. During the firing of the salute they will be stationed with arms reversed. 


