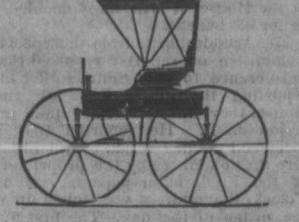

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cases, your worship appoint a committee, or order the Town Clerk to call the different parishes to examine, and report to your worship whether the parties asking for license have the necessary accommodation.

They also notice the names of a number of Magistrates as having been granted license. Your worship must know that it is contrary to law for any person holding a magistrate's commission to be a tax collector; and it is the opinion of the Grand Jury that those who make laws should not be the ones to break them.

The Grand Jury recommend that the petition of the Chatham Fireworks, asking for an assessment of \$200, be complied with, and also recommend that an assessment of \$400 for ordinary expenses be granted.

They also recommend that the petition of the Newcastle Fireworks, asking for an assessment of \$400, be complied with.

The Grand Jury have examined the Chatham Police accounts, and would call your attention to the report attached to them. They have also examined the Newcastle Police accounts, and find them correct, and a model of neatness. They find a list of fines amounting to \$65, which have not been collected, and recommend that steps be taken to have them collected at once.

The Grand Jury have examined the gas, and find it clean and in good order. They have also examined the out buildings, and find them very much out of repair, and recommend that the necessary repairs be done during the summer.

They would also recommend that a Pound be built in each of the Parishes of Newcastle and Chatham, also in Douglastown, as there is ground owned by the public in each place, which can be used for this purpose.

They would also recommend your worship to take into consideration the question of a paid fire department for the town of Newcastle, as they are of opinion that it would be much better than the present system. They also endorse the recommendation of the Grand Jury of 1873, that a meeting of ratepayers be called at an early day, to consider the practicability of bringing a supply of water from Cruden's Brook.

The Grand Jury would recommend an assessment in the County for \$1,600 besides deficiencies uncollected, to meet the debts and contingencies of the County.

As the Alms House accounts have not been laid before us we cannot make any report thereon.

The Grand Jury would respectfully request your worship to call both the presentment on accounts and the general presentment, in the *Gleaner and Advocate* newspapers for the information of the public.
