## LUMBER DEALERS SETTLE DISPUTES.

Restigouche Embroglio Thrashed Out In The Legislature.

## SOME HOT WORDS

But Interested Parties Decide at Length to come to an Agreement.

The Corporations Committee met in the legislative chamber on Tuesday evening to further consider the Restigouche Boom Company's bill. The intense interest taken in this measure was shown by the large attendance of spectators and members, who filled the floor of the House and a large part of the galleries. All the prominent lumbermen of the city and many from other places were present.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie, said he thought that while it was within the right of the legislature to take away the charter of a company which had been incorporated by the legislature yet the present proceedings were not the usual method. The applicants come here and make certain statements which are desired by the parties interested. The practice in England is to have an investigation by the Royal Commission and if the company is violating the terms of its charter then the legislature which granted the charter might be appealed to take away that charter. Another phase of this matter is that the parties who claim to have a grievance have taken their case into the Equity Court, and now before the case is settled in the Court the plaintiffs come and ask this House for this legislation. He was opposed to passing the bill in its present form and he might add that should the bill pass the House it might be his duty as leader of the Government and of the House to advise the Lieutenant Governor to withhold his assent to the Act. Not every bill which passes the House is assented to by the Governor.

Mr. McLatchy, expressed surprise at what seemed to him the threat of the Premier that should the House pass the bill he would advise His Honor to disallow it. Such a threat carried no weight with him. Hon. Mr. Tweedie, stands on the floor of the House in this matter as a paid counsel. He has been retained by the opponents of this legislation and as such counsel his opinion is worth only as much as any other counsel. Mr. McLatchy claimed that the passage of this bill would not be taking away the charter of the company. The bill was carefully gone over section by section by the Attorney General, the chief law officer of the Government, and in his opinion the bill was constitutional. Mr. McLatchy, read a letter from F. B. Blackall in substantiation of the statement that the plan to oust the old Board of Directors and replace them by nominees of the Richards Company was on foot previous to the death of the late William Richards, and had his approval. Mr. McLatchy, urged that the applicants for this bill most certainly have a grievance or they would not be here at the present time and under considerable personal expense and in addition to that they know that ultimately they will have to pay for opposing the bill, too, as the expenses of this opposition will be charged to the Restigouche Boom Co.

Mr. Mott, stated in connection with the alleged great loss of logs upon the Restigouche that similar losses take place upon other rivers. In the South West Miramichi boom the William Richards Company lost in 1902, 7,901 pieces; in 1903, 7,140 pieces; in 1904, 5,967 pieces. Another fact worthy of the consideration of the committee is the experience of Jacob Hazleton, formerly a large operator on the Restigouche, but who retired a few years ago. Mr. Hazleton, states that in two successive years after he ceased operations on the Restigouche his logs continued to come into the boom and both years he received cheques from the Richards Co. for such lumber. Another operator, Mr. Montgomery, claimed

## JAPAN ALERT.

## A NEW YORK SUBURB.

New York April 11.—When both platforms of the Franklin St. Station of the Sixth Avenue elevated railway, jammed with the home going throng last night George Bover, Mgr., at the Signal Dept. of Arbutus Bros. threw himself under a train and was instantly killed.

## SERIOUS FIRE.

Huntington W. Va. Apr 11.—Fire which broke out here early today raged fiercely for three hours completely destroying the five story wholesale grocery of Clarke Bros. & Co. and the seven story building occupied by the American Store Co. Several smaller buildings were damaged by falling walls; the loss will not exceed \$130,000 of which Clarke Bros. & Co. suffered \$70,000 and the American Store Co. \$45,000.

Toronto, April 11.—At 1.15 o'clock this morning Right Rev. Arthur Sweetman, D. D., bishop of the diocese of Toronto for the church of England in Canada was taken to the general hospital for a speedy operation.

A telegraphic message from Ottawa announces the fact that the governor in council has granted a poll for or against the Scott Act in Restigouche, says Evids. Wednesday, the 26th of April has been fixed as the date. This will mean a short quick campaign and already the temperance people are on the move. A meeting for organization will be held on Tuesday evening and the campaign started in earnest. Of course it was not generally thought that the vote would be brought on so early, and whether or not it would effect the applications for next year to be considered at the meeting of the liquor license commissioners on the 28th inst., should the Scott Act be carried, is a question on which opinions differ. In any event we would like to see a good vote polled so that the real strength of the temperance sentiment may be shown.

A Newcastle writer in the Chatham World makes the following very sensible observations—Several of the members of the present Council, it is said, will not seek reelection. Among the number is Alderman Armstrong. From all reports Mr. Armstrong is one of the most capable men at the Council Board; and if he withdraws at the end of the present term his retirement will be a distinct loss to the town. He has, during the past year devoted considerable time to the work of the board; he is persevering in what he undertakes and watchful of the interests of the people and his presence in the Council means economical and progressive government. It is to be hoped that Mr. Armstrong will be induced to again place himself in the hands of the ratepayers.

The regular monthly meeting of the W. F. M. S. of St. James' Church, was held in St. James' Hall on Thursday afternoon, April 6th. In addition to the members a large number of visitors including members of the Mission Band were present. After the regular routine of business had been transacted the Rev. Mr. Arnott gave a most interesting and instructive lecture on "Tibet and showed a number of Photographs of the Country and Natives, which were very interesting. The lecture was excellent, and thoroughly appreciated, by those who had the pleasure of listening to it. Rev. Mr. Arnott was tendered a hearty vote of thanks for his kindness in preparing the lecture for the benefit of the Society.

## A DREAD MALADY ENTERS CHATHAM.

More than Seven Cases of Smallpox Reported in Sister Town.

## CAME FROM MAINE.

Some Say, 'However, That It is Only a Little Chickenpox.

There are now seven cases of smallpox in Chatham. The disease is said to have been brought there by a man who came from a lumber camp in Maine. He did not say that he had come from an infected camp and entered the hospital for treatment for a sore foot. It was later discovered that the man was suffering from smallpox.

Dr. E. B. Fisher, Secretary of the Provincial Board of Health visited Chatham, on Saturday to diagnose suspected cases and to take steps to prevent the spread of the disease. The malady is said to be of mildest type. Dr. McDonald is in charge of the patients. All churches and school have been closed and all public gatherings prohibited. The houses containing the disease besides those who have come in contact with the patients have been quarantined and several stores fumigated. There are some who claim the disease is only Chickenpox.

## THE MAYORALTY CONTEST.

On April 18th the citizens of this town will be called upon to elect a mayor and eight aldermen. There is a very good selection to choose from and it is to be hoped the citizens will choose judiciously. Last year Mr. Miller was pressed by a number of citizens to offer himself as a candidate for the mayoralty but emphatically declined to do so. But he stated on the hustings at that time that he would be a candidate this year. He has kept his word. What this town wants is bright, energetic young men such as Mr. Miller. We are just now at a critical stage in our career and anyone with retrogressive ideas won't fit. Mr. Miller has been energetically engaged during the past year in behalf of the town. His arguments in favor of making Newcastle a divisional point on the I. C. R. have proven more effective with the management of the railway than any yet offered and as a consequence we are in a fair way to get the short run. If Mr. Miller is elected mayor he will be in a better position to accomplish what he has so patriotically worked for. Give the young man a chance.

## LET US AWAKE

A few days ago a prominent citizen of Toronto made this observation:—New Brunswick is almost depopulated through people going to the North-west. We can scarcely blame the gentleman for making such a remark although it is not strictly true. Yet to climb down to common parlance there is more truth than poetry in it or will be pretty soon. New Brunswick is today fighting for its bare existence. Speaking for ourselves here in Northumberland County we may say that since Confederation we have sent representatives to the Dominion parliament. With all due respect to our representatives past and present we have nothing to show today that we ever had a franchise. We think the same thing is true of other constituencies in the Maritime Provinces. We would be as well off without representatives in the Dominion House. The Maritime Provinces it must be acknowledged has contributed more than its share of brilliant parliamentarians yet it gives one a shudder to think of it. It seems our politicians have no more love for us than our women who buy out of a Toronto departmental store catalogue. We have grave doubts about the industrial and commercial future of New Brunswick and are inclined to the belief that this spasmodic development is a sham and a delusion. Yes New Brunswick is fast becoming depopulated and our bright young men are going daily to other places where capital means development and not merely a bank account. Three of Newcastle's brightest young men will leave for the North West next week. We cannot blame our young men for going away. There is nothing here for an ambitious man beyond a crooked deal at Fredericton or Ottawa. The only decent positions we can boast of are in the hands of a few and an existence for the majority represents drudgery of the worst kind. Our men of capital seem to steadfastly refuse to develop our resources, if indeed we have any to develop. But let us demonstrate the truth! If our hope in the future is a mere bubble and our country valueless, the quicker we know it the better. New Brunswick is not keeping pace with the other provinces of Canada not excepting the other two which go to make up the Maritime group. The Maritime Provinces were once regarded as a part of Canada's great body. The west has opened up a new Canada. To-day we are merely the tail. If we had been a part of the United States we might to-day be in a position to keep pace at least with Quebec and Ontario. Why did we not oppose the selfish and one sided Grand Trunk Pacific scheme and fight for our own existence. The G. T. P. idea may benefit Canada as a whole but we must remember that we are New Brunswickers first and Canadians and North Americans afterwards. The Trans Continental road will run through a New Brunswick wilderness. We want a road through the centres of trade between Newcastle and Tracadie; also between Newcastle and Red

We, in New Brunswick have vast tracts of timber lands in the hands of a few who haven't the inclination to develop them. Our capitalists would sooner squander their wealth on Wall street than endeavor to put us in a state of prosperity, or if not that to definite our limitations. It is up to us to find out where we are at, and either leave our descendants an empty cupboard or a full one.

ed that 11,000 pieces of his lumber was not accounted for by the Boom Co., and he started an investigation and found over half the lumber stranded on the uplands, along the river.

Mr. Osman—I would like to ask Mr. Shives, if he considers his business interests safe in the hands of the present Board of Directors of the Boom Company.

Mr. Shives—No, I do not.

Mr. Smith—Do the operators have the privilege of putting their own men on the boom to watch operations?

Mr. Smith—They do and the Dalhousie Lumber Company keeps one or two of their men there the whole season, and other operators to the same.

The Committee then retired to consider the bill in private.

The Corporations Committee had a pretty interesting session after they retired to their room last evening to consider the Restigouche Boom Company bill in private, says Thursday's Gleaner. Most of the members of the committee were in attendance. Hon. Mr. Tweedie, nor Hon. Mr. Pugsley, did not attend or take any part in the deliberations, both having stated previously that they were interested parties.

The motion to go into consideration of the bill was carried by a very narrow majority of one or two so that the bill came very near to being thrown out.

Section one, which provides that the tariff of dues and charges shall be first approved by the Governor-in-Council, provoked an animated discussion, and was finally carried by a majority of one.

The section that provides that the bye-laws of the company shall have no further force was thrown out and a provision substituted that the present bye-laws hereafter enacted shall be submitted to the Governor-in-Council for approval before coming into force.

A provision of the bill upon which considerable stress had been laid was that which provided that an owner of five millions or more of lumber coming down the river should be represented upon the Board of Directors, notwithstanding that such owners may not be holders of a majority of

Him.

## A FAST "HOODOO"

Locomotive No. 239 Kills Many  
But Runs Fast.

Old 239, which has been designated as the "hoodoo engine" on account of the bad accidents in which she was concerned, is reported to have reeled off some very fast miles between Moncton and Newcastle recently. The running ability of No. 239 is well known to engineers, and she has the reputation among some of the railway men at least, of being the best engine on the Intercolonial today. During the winter months, when every other engine on the road was losing time the engine with the bad reputation for accidents, had no difficulty in making running time and doing a little better. Frequently she has been called upon to make up time with the Maritime since being transferred to the northern division, and she has seldom failed to respond to the driver's call.

When the special train with the Allan party passed over the road from St. John to Montreal the other day, it was desirable that as good a run as possible, consistent with the spring condition of the roadbed, should be made. No. 239 was consequently taken off her run and put on the Allan special from Moncton to Newcastle. It was on this run that the "hoodoo engine" is said to have established her great record some miles, it is reported, were run in 44 seconds. The performance, however, was a revelation to some of the railway men aboard and the locomotive was an object of interest when opportunity offered. One gentleman pronounced her the finest locomotive in Canada. Since this notable effort No. 239 has been permitted to return to her staid ways of making running time, and no more, on the Maritime express.

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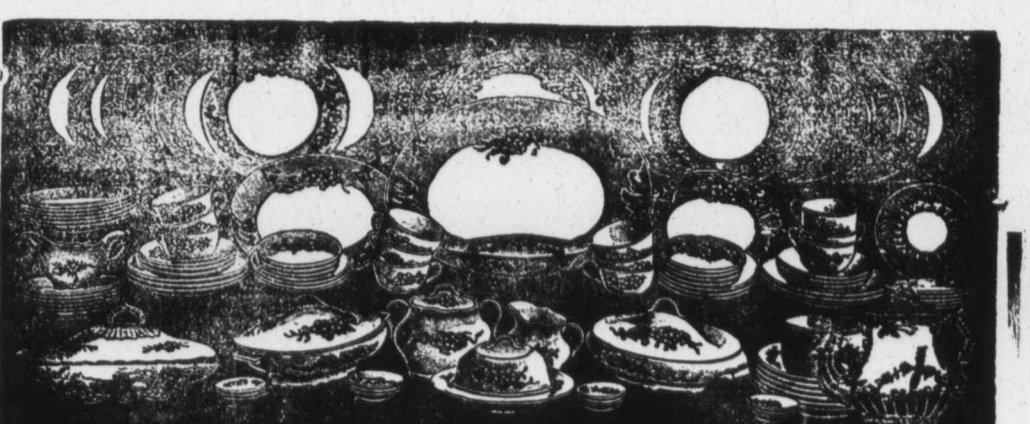
