LUMBER DEALERS SETTLE DISPUTES.

Restigouche Embroglio Threshed Out In The Legislature.

SOME HOT WORDS

But Interested Parties Decide at Length to come to an Agreement.

The Corporations Committee met in the legislative chamber on Tuesday evening to further consider the Restigouche Boom Company's bill. The intense interest taken in this measure was shown by the large attendance of spectators and members, who filled the floors of the House and a large part of the galleries.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie, said he thought that while it was within the right of the legislature to take away the charter of a company which had been incorporated by the legislature yet the present proceedings were not the usual method. The applicants come here and make certain statements which are desired by the parties interested.

The practice in England is to have an investigating committee by the Royal Commission and if the company is violating the terms of its charter then the legislature which granted the charter might be appealed to to take away that charter. Another phase of this matter is that the parties who claim to have a grievance have taken their case into the Equity Court, and now before the case is settled in the Court the plaintiffs come and ask this House for this legislation.

SPIES CAPTURED. New York April 11.—A dispatch from Vladivostok reports that five Japanese officers, disguised as natives, were caught photographing the defences of Vladivostok.

SERIOUS FIRE. Huntington W. Va. Apr 11.—Fire which broke out here early today raged fiercely for three hours completely destroying the five story wholesale grocery of Clarke Bros. & Co. and the seven story building occupied by the American Storage Co.

Toronto, April 11.—At 1.15 o'clock this morning Right Rev. Arthur Sweetman, D. D., bishop of the diocese of Toronto for the church of England in Canada was taken to the general hospital for a speedy operation.

A telegraphic message from Ottawa announces the fact that the governor in council has granted a poll for or against the Scott Act in Restigouche, says Events.

Wednesday, the 28th of April has been fixed as the date. This will mean a short quick campaign and already the temperance people are on the move. A meeting for organization will be held on Tuesday evening and the campaign started in earnest.

Of course it was not generally thought that the vote would be brought on so early, and whether or not it would effect the applications for next year to be considered at the meeting of the liquor license commissioners on the 28th inst., should the Scott Act be carried, is a question on which opinions differ.

In any event we would like to see a good vote polled so that the real strength of the temperance sentiment may be shown.

A Newcastle writer in the Chatham World makes the following very sensible observations—Several of the members of the present Council, it is said, will not seek reelection. Among the number is Alderman Armstrong. From all reports Mr. Armstrong is one of the most capable men at the Council Board; and if he withdraws at the end of the present term his retirement will be a distinct loss to the town.

He has, during the past year devoted considerable time to the work of the board; he is persevering in what he undertakes and watchful of the interests of the people and his presence in the Council means economical and progressive government. It is to be hoped that Mr. Armstrong will be induced to again place himself in the hands of the ratepayers.

The regular monthly meeting of the W. F. M. S. of St. James' Church, was held in St. James' Hall on Thursday afternoon, April 6th. In addition to the members a large number of visitors including members of the Mission Band were present.

After the regular routine of business had been transacted the Rev. Mr. Arnott gave a most interesting and instructive lecture on "Tibet and showed a number of Photographs of the Country and Natives, which were very interesting. The lecture was excellent, and thoroughly appreciated, by those who had the pleasure of listening to it. Rev. Mr. Arnott was tendered a hearty vote of thanks for his kindness in preparing the lecture for the benefit of the Society.

A DREAD MALADY ENTERS CHATHAM.

More than Seven Cases of Smallpox Reported in Sister Town.

CAME FROM MAINE.

Some Say, However, That It is Only a Little Chickenpox.

There are now seven cases of smallpox in Chatham. The disease is said to have been brought there by a man who came from a lumber camp in Maine. He did not say that he had come from an infected camp and entered the hospital for treatment for a sore foot. It was later discovered that the man was suffering from smallpox.

Dr. E. B. Fisher, Secretary of the Provincial Board of Health visited Chatham, on Saturday to diagnose suspected cases and to take steps to prevent the spread of the disease. The malady is said to be of mild type. Dr. McDonald is in charge of the patients. All churches and school have been closed and all public gatherings prohibited. The houses containing the disease besides those who have come in contact with the patients have been quarantined and several have been fumigated. There are some who claim the disease is only Chickenpox.

LATER. It is now said there are nine cases.

Magistrate Jones has given his decision in favor of the plaintiff in the suit of the Town vs The County. The amount involved in the suit was \$535 and the County must also pay the costs. Magistrate Jones stated in giving his decision that he never had a case before him where the merits were so one sided. He felt that the County should have paid the Town without questioning the accounts. It is understood that Mr. Lawlor, will appeal the case on behalf of the County.

# When Greek Met Greek. A Tale of the Good old Days When Life Physical Culture Went Hand in Hand.

(From Physical Culture)  
(The author of this clever little romance is Cyrus Williston son of F. S. Williston of Philipsburg, N. J. and a grandson of the late Judge Williston of Newcastle. The story is well handled and shows the author to possess marked ability as a writer)

All Greece was aroused, for scarce two months away were the Olympic games where representatives from the whole of Greece would compete. Corinth, Sparta, and Athens would battle for the laurel crown. Heralds had proclaimed through all the land truce of the gods, which ended all warfare and gave safe conduct to strangers till after the games. On every hand the people prepared for a week of enjoyment, for the dogs of war had long howled in Greece and internal dissensions had torn her asunder. Thus it was that for a brief space war was laid aside and Greece was in gala costume.

Far back in the mountains of Greece lived a youth named Atlas. For many months he had been training for the Olympic games. From sunrise to sunset he had run, boxed and wrestled, seeking to get that perfect machine-like power which would enable him to win the stadium, or twenty-four-lap race, against Athens and Corinth. It was to be a race for honor and for love. Long had Atlas loved a daughter of Iphitus, Nerva by name. His love was returned by Nerva, but Iphitus had sworn that Nerva should never marry unless her choice be a winner of the stadium. Thus it was that Atlas had trained faithfully for the past ten months in order that he might win the fairest maid in all Greece.

From a child he had loved her, and had watched, from day to day, the girl growing and expanding like a beautiful flower beneath the sunny skies of summer. Yes he loved her with all the strength of a nature made strong by plenty of exercise under the canopy of the sky, and as he thought of the morning his heart almost failed him, for he knew it would be a heart-breaking test of endurance, and Nerva would be the bride of the victor, for Iphitus was a stern man, and although he loved the boy, would do as he had spoken.

It was the night before the race when Atlas walked slowly to the home of Nerva. All through the week the games had been on. Athens, Sparta, and Corinth had led by turns and the excitement was at fever heat. On the day before the last the three leaders were tied for first place; and, if they continued even, the stadium would decide

it. As a participator in the games, Atlas had been vitally interested, but to-night, perhaps to be his last happy one, he threw off the cloud of gloom that had been hanging over him, and turned his steps towards the home of Nerva. He found her alone waiting for him, and in the gloaming he kissed her sweet face, seated himself by her side, and told her again of the coming struggle and of his hope to win the race—and her.

Silently she listened; then, with one arm around his neck, she sweetly said: "Atlas, nothing can destroy my faith in you. Such a brave youth cannot drink from the bitter cup of defeat. I have consulted the gods and the omens are favorable. Only this day, as I offered sacrifice to Zeus, a dove hovered over my head. You will return to me a victor, but in the first great joy of your triumph do not forget that Nerva prayed to the gods for your success."

Looking fondly into the grey eyes, and stroking gently the dusky hair, Atlas swore, by the Father of the Gods, to win the race or to perish in the attempt. Thus they parted, with many lingering caresses and soft good-nights, while in their hearts undefined fears for the events of the coming day formed themselves. But a close observer of the skies would have seen that Venus, in the Eastern sky, shone with unusual brilliancy, while Mars hid his burning body behind the flitting clouds.

It is the last day of the Olympic games. Those white tents yonder, standing in sharp outline against the background of olive trees, are the tents of the ten judges upon whose word many a man will find himself a victor or bowed by defeat. Most of the athletes have already arrived, for they had been training in the gymnasium of Altis. Huge men with cestus on hands, in company with fleet runners, passing to the arena. To-day is their day, and the honor of Greece rests in their hands. Early in the morning they presented themselves to the presidents and they proved by witnesses that they were of pure Hellenic descent, and had no stain upon their lives. With hands upon the sacrifice to the gods, they swore that they had trained for the past ten months and would use no guile in the contest to come. From here they proceeded to their dressing rooms, where they prepared for the events in which they were to take part, while outside the seats were being rapidly filled with pleasure seekers. Conspicuous for their white robes of office are the deputies who bring with them offerings to the shrine of the gods. There is no lack of distinguished visitors. Alcibiades, who has entered ten chariots; Hippas, the man who boasts he is self-made; Socrates, the man who believed in a philosophy both of body and soul, and a host of distinguished Greeks who have come from far and near to see the games. Last, but not least are the scores of young girls who have come to smile upon their friends and to frown upon their rivals.

So, with confusion and laughter, they find seats around the arena, waiting impatiently for the struggle to begin. Now the heralds step to the front and announce the different events which follow one after the other in rapid succession. The victor in each case appearing before the judges, the herald proclaims his name and parentage; the crown of victory is placed upon his brow, and palm in hand he is marched to the temple of Zeus, while admiring friends shower flowers in his pathway, singing the old Greek song of victory.

Poets sang about him and sculptors carved his stature, for the Greek was an ardent admirer of the physical man and honored him with highest honors. The contest is in full swing. Sparta won the boxing and wrestling contests, Athens the chariot

race and Corinth the discus. This left these three deadly rivals tied for first honors, and the only remaining contest is the stadium, or long-distance foot race.

At last the time has come. The heralds announce the stadium. With one accord the people raise to their feet and gaze towards the entrance through which the competitors must enter the arena. At the word of the heralds, "Runners to the line," three figures pass through the entrance and move quickly to the starting line. The first is a Corinthian, dark and strong looking at whose well-built form the spectators look with approval while from the men of Corinth, come shouts of defiance to their foes, and cries of encouragement to their runner. Looking neither to the right nor left, he steps forward and takes his place upon the line.

The second to enter is an Athenian short and stockily built. Haughtily he steps towards the line, looking with derision upon his Corinthian opponent. The third and last to enter is a Spartan, young and slender, but straight as a mountain pine, and with limbs of muscle that gleam white like marble in the sunlight. His face was pale.

But Atlas, for it was he, knew no fear. Never was there a Spartan who lacked courage. His long physical training from a boy until now had hardened his body and instilled courage into his soul; and now, while recognizing the odds against him, he was not dismayed. It was youth and life-long training against brute strength and experience, but the memory of a pair of grey eyes and a fair young face carried sweet peace to his troubled heart. Eagerly he looked for the starting signal, while impatiently the crowd howled its approval of the trio.

At last all is ready. With bodies straining in the standing position they bend forward, waiting for the trumpet blast which will send them off. All is silent, the great sea of humanity has grown strangely still. It is the calm before the storm, the calm that is broken suddenly by the starting trumpet, and the race is on, the Athenian in the lead, running in superb form, the Corinthian a close second, followed by Atlas. They are running very slowly, for there are many laps to go, and each is saving his strength for the final effort. Cries of encouragement fill the air—the long-drawn cry of Sparta "Spar-ta" the shorter cry of Corinth and swelling all, comes the heavy, rumbling cry of Athens, Athens.

Far up in the topmost tier of seats is an old man, and by his side is seated a young Grecian girl, with grey eyes and dusky hair. With eager gaze she follows the runners as they race madly around the arena. Now a look of joy is on her face as one named Atlas takes the lead, but ever and anon a shadow falls upon her sunny face as Atlas drops behind. It is a pretty sight, this young girl clinging to her gray-haired father, watching the fleeting figures with earnest gaze, as if the very years of her life were being run into the circle at her feet. Men turned and looked at her, but she, unconscious of it all, saw only Atlas as he bravely ran for love and honor.

It was the lap before the last. The race had reached that stage when the body protests against the unnatural strain put upon it, the will only keeping it to its work. It was the beginning of the end; the supreme moment had arrived. Athens was in the lead, while from the tiers his supporters cheered him on. The men from Corinth voiced their cry as the dark man from the sea fought grimly for the vantage. Close upon their heels followed Atlas. He was holding his own. The pace was terrific and Atlas felt that he was struggling against hopeless odds.

Fire flashed before his eyes, and the seconds seemed ages long. But hark! what is that cry that comes, as from a great distance to his ears? The long drawn "Spar-ta Spar-ta" sounded like the bay of a famished wolf, and a feeling of dull anger rose in his throbbing heart. They were calling on him, but they did not know of the numbness that had seized upon his legs, nor could they hear his sobbing

breath, which he drew with increased effort at every stride. Hark! Still they cried, Sparta, on Sparta! Would these men not let him be? Had they no hearts? Were their bodies not like his?

Peace, ye raving multitudes, and let him be! One more lap, and only one, but can he last it? Suddenly the Athenian stumbles, throws up his hands and drops exhausted. Only the Corinthian remains, and he, with unseen eyes and swaying body, is staggering ever onward towards the goal.

Bedlam has broken loose. Men shriek with the intensity of their feelings. "Sparta! Corinth! is the cry. Atlas makes one agonizing spurt and draws even with the Corinthian. Foot with foot and arm with arm they stride together. It is a magnificent spectacle, but one not without a touch of horror. The dead Athenian, the distorted faces of the survivors, and the maddened multitude all throw a touch of the supernatural upon the scene. Atlas is holding his own, when suddenly he sees, as through a mist, a beautiful tear stained face and hears dimly the man by her side shout: "Come home boy come home!"

And he did come home—to her. With his last effort he gathered his failing strength and came home—the victor.

Why tell you how they placed the crown of olives on his brow, and how they feasted him and threw flowers in his pathway? Poets sang of him and artists painted his victory. But sweeter far than all this was his meeting with Nerva—Nerva the little girl with dusky hair and dreamy eyes, who had comforted him in the hour of trial.

Let us draw the veil over their meeting; what they did and what they said, we may not seek to know, but I am sure that the gods smiled as they looked down upon the two.

**THE MAYORALTY CONTEST.**

On April 18th the citizens of this town will be called upon to elect a mayor and eight alderman. There is a very good selection to choose from and it is to be hoped the citizens will choose judiciously. Last year Mr. Miller was pressed by a number of citizens to offer himself as a candidate for the mayoralty but emphatically declined to do so. But he stated on the hustings at that time that he would be a candidate this year. He has kept his word. What this town wants is bright, energetic young men such as Mr. Miller. We are just now at a critical stage in our career and anyone with retrogressive ideas won't fit. Mr. Miller has been energetically engaged during the past year in behalf of the town. His arguments in favor of making Newcastle a divisional point on the I. C. R. have proven more effective with the management of the railway than any yet offered and as a consequence we are in a fair way to get the short run. If Mr. Miller is elected mayor he will be in a better position to accomplish what he has so patriotically worked for. Give the young man a chance.

**LET US AWAKE**

A few days ago a prominent citizen of Toronto made this observation:—New Brunswick is almost depopulated through people going to the North-west. We can scarcely blame the gentleman for making such a remark although it is not strictly true. Yet to climb down to common parlance there is more truth than poetry in it or will be pretty soon. New Brunswick is today fighting for its bare existence. Speaking for ourselves here in Northumberland County we may say that since Confederation we have sent representatives to the Dominion parliament. With all due respect to our representatives past and present we have nothing to show today that we ever had a franchise. We think the same thing is true of other constituencies in the Maritime Provinces. We would be as well off without representatives in the Dominion House. The Maritime Provinces it must be acknowledged has contributed more than its share of brilliant parliamentarians yet it gives one a shudder to think of it. It seems our politicians have no more love for us than our women who buy out of a Toronto departmental store catalogue. We have grave doubts about the industrial and commercial future of New Brunswick and are inclined to the belief that this spasmodic development is a sham and a delusion. Yes New Brunswick is fast becoming depopulated and our bright young men are going daily to other places where capital means development and not merely a bank account. Three of Newcastle's brightest young men will leave for the North West next week. We cannot blame our young men for going away. There is nothing here for an ambitious man beyond a crooked deal at Fredericton or Ottawa. The only decent positions we can boast of are in the hands of a few and an existence for the majority represents drudgery of the worst kind. Our men of capital seem to steadfastly refuse to develop our resources, if indeed we have any to develop. But let us demonstrate the truth! If our hope in the future is a mere bubble and our country valueless, the quicker we know it the better. New Brunswick is not keeping pace with the other provinces of Canada not excepting the other two which go to make up the Maritime group. The Maritime Provinces were once regarded as a part of Canada's great body. The west has opened up a new Canada. To-day we are merely the tail. If we had been a part of the United States we might to-day be in a position to keep pace at least with Quebec and Ontario. Why did we not oppose the selfish and one sided Grand Trunk Pacific scheme and fight for our own existence. The G. T. P. idea may benefit Canada as a whole but we must remember that we are New Brunswickers first and Canadians and North Americans afterwards. The Trans Continental road will run through a New Brunswick wilderness. We want a road through the centres of trade between Newcastle and Tracadie; also between Newcastle and Red

### LUMBER DEALERS SETTLE DISPUTE.

(Continued from page one) ed that 11,000 pieces of his lumber was not accounted for by the Boom Co., and he started an investigation and found over half the lumber stranded on the uplands, along the river.

Mr. Osman—I would like to ask Mr. Shives, if he considers his business interests safe in the hands of the present Board of Directors of the Boom Company. Mr. Shives—No, I do not. Mr. Smith,—Do the operators have the privilege of putting their own men on the boom to watch operations? Mr. Shives—They do and the Dalhousie Lumber Company keeps one or two of their men there the whole season, and other operators the same. The Committee then retired to consider the bill in private.

The Corporations Committee had a pretty interesting session after their return to their room last evening to consider the Restigouche Boom Company bill in private, says Thursday's Gleaner. Most of the members of the committee were in attendance. Hon. Mr. Tweedie, nor Hon. Mr. Pugsley, did not attend or take any part in the deliberations, both having started previously that they were interested parties. The motion to go into consideration of the bill was carried by a very narrow majority of one or two so that the bill came very near to being thrown out.

Section one, which provides that the tariff of dues and charges shall be first approved by the Governor-in-Council, provoked an animated discussion, and was finally carried by a majority of one. The section that provides that the bye-laws of the company shall have no further force was thrown out and a provision substituted that the present bye-laws heretofore enacted shall be submitted to the Governor-in-Council for approval before coming into force. A provision of the bill upon which considerable stress had been laid was that which provided that an owner of five millions or more of lumber coming down the river should be represented upon the Board of Directors, notwithstanding that such owners may not be holders of a majority of

### ALD. RUSSELL GETS BURNED.

Connection of Steamer's Boiler Blows Out and Badly Scalds Him.

### CONFINED TO THE HOUSE

Ald Russell's many friends will be pleased to learn that he escaped most serious injuries on Saturday evening. As it was he met with extremely painful ones. Mr. Russell visited his steamer the Rustler at 8.30 o'clock. While at work around the boiler the connection through which hot water was being blown off reversed and scalded him severely. It was caused by back action from the escaping steam. Mr. Russell is still confined to his bed and is under the care of Dr. Nicholson.

### A FAST "HOODOO"

Locomotive No. 239 Kills Many But Runs Fast.

Old 239, which has been designated as the "hoodoo engine" on account of the bad accidents in which she was concerned, is reported to have reeled off some very fast miles between Moncton and Newcastle recently. The running ability of No. 239 is well known to engineers, and she has the reputation among some of the railway men at least, of being the best engine on the Intercolonial today. During the winter months, when every other engine on the road was losing time with the bad reputation for accidents, had no difficulty in making running time and doing a little better. Frequently she has been called upon to make up time with the Maritime since being transferred to the northern division, and she has seldom failed to respond to the driver's call. When the special train with the Allan party passed over the road from St. John to Montreal the other day, it was desirable that as good a run as possible be made with the spring condition of the roadbed, should be made. No. 239 was consequently taken off her run and put on the Allan special from Moncton to Newcastle. It was on this run that the "hoodoo engine" is said to have established her great record. 
