Even Conservative Papers
Say That Attorney Gen-
eral is O. K.

BELONGS TO BATHURST

Somehow or other Mr. Turgeon the Attorney General has a nice way about him. We have always admired him, despite the company into which he has been thrown by the turn of the political wheel.

The Standard never intentionally misrepresents anyone but by other day we inadvertently misrepresented the Attorney General. In connection with the debate on the subject of sending copies of the printed voters lists Mr. Turgeon was quoted as having agreed that under the act no government members could get copies of the printed lists until within ten days before an election, when all members could get them. The misrepresentation arose during the cross fire between the Government and Opposition members. Mr. Wyllie said that "apparently members could not get copies until within ten days of an election" and Mr. Turgeon admitted that under the act this was so, although he saw in the discussion a possibility for an acceptable amendment of the law.

Now Mr. Turgeon recognizes the difficulty under which the members of the press are laboring by reason of the acoustic properties of the room in which the Legislature meets. When he noticed the error he didn't rise in his place on the floor of the House and demand "with great justice" a superfluous pounding of an already over-punished desk, that the House exclude the press from its sessions. He didn't suggest the adoption of a chamber method, nor the appointment of a press censor. What did he do? He invited the representatives of the Standard into his private office—that modestly furnished room which is emblem of government and of politics are connected—and there he pointed out the error. With the bluntness of his very blunt pen he assured the newspaper man that he fully understood how the mistake might occur. He didn't even suggest that an explanation be published.

But the Standard doesn't want to misrepresent to its readers anyone, much less the genial Attorney General and so this explanation is freely given.

How Mr. Turgeon's manner stands out in contrast to the attitude some of his colleagues would have adopted in such a case. Truly, Mr. Turgeon we like your ways and we hope you do, too.—Regina Standard.

For the weary traveler after pastures new, for the man or woman to whom summer resorts have become mere bromides, fat stale and unprofitable, a word to you on the charms of Ray Chaleur. The old darling of railway magnates, the lusty of fulsome guide books, in fact, its history has been a checked one in which progress and enterprise have suffered to no small extent. Here, however, is no cheap counterfeit, but the real thing.

Leaving the main line of the Intercolonial at Dalhousie Junction, one takes a grotesque branch line consisting of a diminutive engine, a primitive coach of nondescript class and a baggage car, and a baggage car, spooling its way through the white spruce and birch woods of the coast. MR. M. J. BUTLER LEAVES THE I. C. R.

Has Been Appointed Manager of New Coal and Steel Merger.

A CAPABLE MAN

MONTREAL, Jan. 12.—Mr. J. Butler, deputy minister of railways and canals and chairman of the board of management of the government, has been appointed manager of the new coal and steel merger. Mr. Butler, who recently resigned his position in order to take the management of the cement corporation.

The appointment of Mr. Butler was made at a meeting of the steel company held at the Bank of Commerce under the presidency of J. H. Plummer. The meeting lasted barely forty minutes and apart from the appointment there was no important business transacted.

President Plummer at the close intimated that the accounts will at work on the verification of the figures in connection with the steel company claim against the coal company, but their labors are not drawing towards an end. Until they are completed no announcement can be made regarding the deferred dividend, nor can further action be taken concerning the amalgamation of the Dominion Steel and Coal Companies. So far as the accounts has gone it is understood to be favorable to the steel company's position.

MATTER NOT SO BAD AS STATED, SAYS THE CAMPBELLTON CHIEF

Chief of Police Crawford of Campbellton, who was suspended several days ago pending an enquiry into his conduct on New Years Eve, told the Telegraph over the long distance phone that the matter was all settled and that he has now resumed his position as chief again. Chief Crawford wished to state that the matter was not half so bad as represented in some of the St. John papers at the time of his suspension and most of the comment was, he said, entirely unwarranted. He said he would act as prosecutor in five liquor violations which will come before the court at Campbellton today.

The Graphic regrets that Chief Crawford is endeavoring to make light of the serious offence of which he was guilty. We were in hopes that he would see the seriousness of his actions and that it would be so impressed on his mind that in future he would be a model officer. The facts as given in the Graphic and reported in certain St. John papers were only meagre ones we deemed it unwise to publish all particulars of the encounter but that the chief of police would as far forget himself as to become intoxicated and then to this serious offence add that of assaulting a private citizen—should not be passed over lightly. 
