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

Besides this they know that their party is in ill-odor at Washington. In fact their newspapers have spared no pains by their constant attacks on the States to render

constant attacks on the States to render it so.

What then is to be done? Had it been possible they would of course have negotiated a treaty with the States, and then, having done so, they could easily have gone to an election here with the treaty as a trump card in their hand. There would then have been no attempt to being on the elections till next year. All would have been plain sailing.

But the straightforward fact is that they know they can negotiate no such treaty as Canada wants with the States. What next? What can be done? Why dissolve Parliament and propose that the electors

Parliament and propose that the electors shall return them again on the promise of securing such a treaty with the States as shall benefit Canada.

I do not think that in all the annals of

I do not think that in all the annals of Parliamentary government for at least 100 years back a demand of such remarkable coolness has been made. I ask my fellow-electors to look for themselves and consider what has been done. The days of Walpole, the days of the First and Second Charles afforded no parallel. A schedule is made, all the possible points of agreement or disagreement with the United States are enumerated, and it is actually demanded of the people of Canada that they shall indorse—indorse in advance, and without knowing in the least what they are indorsing—any action our Government may take or any treaty they may frame with the States on these important matters.

The fact is plain before us. We are certain, owing to the American regulations, to undergo a long period of "hard times."

Business will languish, cities contract, emilyment fell compares degay. The gov Business will languish, cities contract, employment fail, commerce decay. The government of Sir John Macdonald cannot save us. Their own injudicious course has placed it beyond their power. But if we return the Opposition, there is no difficulty whatever in the way of their obtaining the terms from the States which we need. I wish my countrymen could understand how many avenues to advancement would be opened by a cordial agreement with the United States—which need not mean annexation. AS SEEN BY ENGLISH EYES.

Canadian Reciprocity Prospects and the Standing of the Two Great Parties. [Christian World, of London.] Sir John Macdonald, Prime Minister of

Canada, has dissolved the Dominion Parliament a year before its time, and has issued a manifesto to the people, appealing to them as "loyal British subjects" to reject them as "loyal British subjects" to reject the Opposition policy of Unrestricted Reciprocity. The Opposition leaders, while theoretically in tavor of free trade, have given up hope of persuading the voters to accept a complete measure of that sort, and are at present concentrating their energies on an attempt to get free trade between Canada and the United States. By this sort of commercial union they hope to obviate the necessity for political union, or annexation, though Sir John misrepresents them as treacherously working for the latter end. Sir John's loyalty, as even those admit who now "back" him against Mr. Laurier, is not above suspicion. The protective tariff which he created and which he has kept up for thirteen years has told far more against the mother-country than against any other; and as a politician of the "practical" kind, he would not scruple at throwing the British connection overboard, if the voters demanded that action as the price of his continuance in power. Even now he proposes to partially break down the protective barrier between Canada and the United States, by establishing "reciprocity in natural products." As such an agreement would be altogether one-sided, the American Government will almost certainly reject it as soon as made. the Opposition policy of Unrestricted Rec

"Canada and England are separated by the Atlantic; Canada and the United States are distinguished rather than separated by a bridged and navigable river or by an imaginary line. Trade between England and Canada has to overcome natural difficulties; trade between Canada and the United States would be unchecked but for artificial difficulties. Even now the Canadian trade with the United States increases more rapidly than her trade with the United Kingdom. The people of Canada and of the United States are similar in race, in language, and in habits, and are becoming more so daily. Temporary and accidental circumstances have made Canada and the United States assume a hostile commercial attitude; but their disputes are the quarrels of lovers, and it is pretty certain that sooner or later the people of the two countries will desire to trade freely with one another, to the infinite advantage of both. It has happened before, and it will happen again. Dear Sir,—Referring to our conversation to-day, I beg to say that I am constantly shipping to nearly every foreign country, and now have several large orders to hand from England, France, Germany, Constantinople, Cape of Good Hope, Natal, New Zealand, Mexico, Panama, Peru, Brazil, Demerara, Jamaica, Trinidad, Barbadoes, etc.

The securing and maintaining of this trade mainly depends upon our getting the raw materials which enter so largely into the manufacture of our machines and stands at the lowest possible price.
