Clachan's Sensation.

The Inquest on Mrs. Stewart's Body

Begun. General Condition of the Body That of a Well-Preserved Woman.

Chatham, Ont., Nov. 9.—The mystery

surrounding the death of Mrs. A. C

Stewart, near Clachan village, deepens rather than otherwise. The inquest disclosed no cause of death apparent to the medical men who performed the autopsy. The organs were found to be normal, and the general condition of the body that of a healthy, well-preserved woman. The doctors are puzzled to account for her demise under the circumstances which accompanied it, namely, violent pains and vomiting, followed by coma, which lasted a whole day. Evidences of the woman having recently been in a delicate condition were not present. Poison could have caused the death, Dr. Fleming says, without leaving traces discoverable on superficial examination, for certain forms of poison do not disclose any pathological condition. "But what was the motive for poisoning?" he asks. The intimacy tween the deceased and a young man was not regarded by the doctor as solving the mystery, unless the woman had got into trouble thereby. Nor has it been shown that she was despondent prior to the illness which carried her off. The young man, Mc-Carter, was sent for by the coroner, but failed to put in an appearance. CUTIVATION OF WHEAT.

To the Editor of The Advertiser: With the hope that some of your readers will try to rival the wheat-growers in the old country, I again ask you to give space to extracts from the annual report of Sir J. B. Lawes' experimental farm, on which wheat has been grown every year for 53 years. On one piece no manure has been used for 56 years, and the crop this year is 16 3-4 bushels per acre, weighing 61 3-8 pounds to the bushel. One piece has been well manured each year, with farmyard manure, and the crop is 44 bushels, of 69 pounds. Three plots, manured with artificial manures, gave an average of 39 3-4 bushels, of 63 7-8 pounds to the bushel. The average yield of all, including the unmanured piece, is 33 1-2 bushels, of 63 1-8 pounds, of 35 1-4 bushels of 60 pounds. All the figures are much above the averages of 10, 34 or 44 years, and there is no former record of 64 pounds to a bushel. 



I ask the favor of an opportunity to correct a few mistakes that occur in his letter. In the first place, it appears to be much out of place for any milkman to cast slurs upon Mr. Wilson, the Presbyterian minister, who so notey stood up for the rights of milkmen by assisting them to throw off the chains of slav-ery with which the Sunday delivery of milk fast has them bound. If more of our ministers would more prominently advocate the rights of the Sabbath it would help to scatter the dark cloud that rests upon the nations for their desecration of the Lord's Day.
Mr. Learn takes exception to Mr. Wilson's proposal with regard to supplying milk for invalids and children. Mr. Wilson undoubtedly gave the best idea he had, and along with his suggestion I should fike to give my experience. I have supplied milk for invalids and babies, and though I have never delivered it on Sunday, it never falled to give satisfaction and prove successful. In proof of this assertion, I am prepared to give to any individual instances where such has been the case.

Mr. Learn asserts that because the cows give milk on Sunday it is right to deliver it on Sunday. He might as well argue that because the wheat grows on Sunday it is right to take it to market on Sunday. It becomes necessary to prove that it is practicable to keep milk palatable and wholesome from Saturday evening until after tea on Sunday, as customers can be supplied before breakfast on day morning. This I have done in my previous letters. It has also been argued by some



Wreck Near Port Stanley.

The Schooner Senora of Wiarton

A Woman and Four Men Probably Lost

St. Thomas Nov. 9 .- The schooner Senora, of Wiarton, was wrecked on Lake Erie during Thursday night's gale, and out of a crew of five men and one woman, only one survivor remand of Capt. Buckley, of Sarnia, and the crew consisted of Mate W. M. Duquett, of Bay City, Mich.; Seamen Daniel Russell and James Morrison, Glasgow, Scotland; Malcolm McLeod, Toronto, and the cook, whose name is not known, but who is called "Dumping Maid."

The only survivor, so far as is known, was Mate Duquett, who said: The schooner Senora was owned by Chamberlain & Co., of Detroit, Mich., and-was in command of Capt. Buckley, of Sarnia, with a crew of four men and one woman. We were bound for Tonawanda, N. Y., with a load of heavy lumber. During Thursday afternoon we were making good headway, and although a storm could be seen approaching, we thought it would be nothing more than ordinary, until the wind struck us. The schooner was tossed about on the huge waves as if


it was a piece of cork.


"The schooner was finally struck by a huge wave when midway between Port Stanley and Cleveland, and the canvas and deck-load were carried away. This made her much lighter, and she was tossed about from that time until she struck the reef, and soon after went to pieces. We were then near Port Colborne. The balance of the crew took to the small boat, but Mr. Duquett remained on boad, until the boat began to show signs of breaking up. He then lashed himself to a hatch door and left the schooner, and a few minutes thereafter she went to pieces. This was about 4 o'clock on Friday morning. He was tossed about on the waves for a considerable time, until he was seen from the life-saving station at Point Abenew. The life-saving crew, whom Mr. Duquett cannot praise too highly, lost no time in going to the rescue. He was taken to a farmhouse near by in an exhausted condition, but soon rallied, and after remaining upon the beach for a time to see if any of his mates had been saved, he started for Port Stanley. Arriving there, he wired Mr. Chamberlain, of Detroit, about the disaster, and then came here and left

DIED FROM HIS INJURIES. Hamilton, Ont., Nov. 9.-John Houghton, the G. T. R. section boss who was so severely injured at Mimico on Thursday, died from his injuries on Saturday. He was an old resident of Hamilton, and had been employed on the G. T. R. for many years. He was 55 years of age and leaves a widow and one son.

LOST. Quebec, Nov. 9.—A private cablegram received here announces the loss at sea of the German bark George Linck (Capt. Vanseloo), which sailed from Quebec Oct. 2 for Grimsby, with a cargo of timber and deals, shipped by Messrs. W. & J. Sharples. The crew were rescued and are on the ship General Gordon, bound to London.

COWARDLY. St. Johns, Nfld., Nov. 9 .- Further dis closures concerning the marine tragedy today indicate that after the steamer Tiber abandoned all efforts to save the victims of the collision with the schooner Maggie Just, beyond the entrance of the harbor, she continued her voyage, and within half an hour nearly ran down another vessel, which escaped only by the merest chance. The police have been dragging for the bodies of the persons who went down with the schooner Maggie, but so far without success. Inquiry is now being held before the city magistate to learn if the evidence warrants the arrest of the captain of the steamer Tiber.
