Won't Believe It.

Statement From the For. The Alleged Backdown of the British Government

> In Regard to Talien-Wan Discredited -Statement of the Foreign Office.

London, Feb. 3.-The afternoon newspapers yesterday comment in the most severe terms upon the alleged withdrawal of Great Britain's demand for the opening of the port of Talien Wan. Some of them refuse to credit the report. The Globe says: "No wonder if the opponents of the ministry regard it as a national humiliation, when its supporters are unable to find a reasonable excuse for it."

An official statement on the subject, just issued, is as follows: "No communication can at present be published concerning the Times' Talien Wan report, or the negotiations as a whole. The negotiations, thus far, are absolutely confidential. Many telegrams from China contain statements not only going beyond the government's information, but, in some instances, quite at variance with known facts." Terrace on Fire.

About Twenty People Turned

Hastily Out. While the Thermometer Was Six Degrees Below Zero-Blaze at the Corner of Pegler Street and Ham-

ilton Road - Damage

Slight.

At 5:15 this morning the fire department was called out to attend a blaze in a terrace in which four families reside, at the corner of Pegler street and the Hamilton road. A defective chimney, it is supposed, in the residence occupied by Mr. Chas. Warren, the second from the east end of the terrace, was the cause of the trouble. The fire burned slowly and was confined to the one residence, but the firemen had two hours and twenty minutes' work before they could leave. All the residents of the terrace were greatly alarmed, and the four families, those of Mr. Chas. Warren, Mr. Thos. Roberts, Mrs. Blundell and Mrs. Geddes, turned hastily out in the frosty ir. They were not long in getting shelter, for the thermometer registered six degrees below zero. Mr. Warren's furniture was nearly all taken out, but vas considerably damaged by water. The fire burned inside the partitions and up through the roof, damaging the building to the extent of about \$300. Foreman McMurchie said it was the coldest run his department has had for several winters. Once the water was turned on the stream had to be kept going, or it would have frozen in the nose. The alarm was sent in from box 514, the first of the new boxes to be pulled. It registered perfectly, contrasting greatly with the old boxes.

FED FROM PRISON SUPPLIES, for which he had not paid. The prison engineer was paid generously for placing orders with certain dealers in prison supplies. The storekeeper was shown to have received on four different occasions presents of \$85 for placing an order with a certain firm. The steward was equally open to receive favors from the parties with whom he placed orders for supplies. As a consequence of all this mismanagement and waste and loss in the placing of orders for supplies, the expense maintaining the prisoners at the Kingston Penitentiary is greatly in excess of the cost of maintenance at the Central Prison. The commissioners furnish a table giving the average for five years at each institution. At the Central Prison the average was \$172 70 per prisoner, and at the Kingston Penitentiary the average was \$219 18. At the Central Prison, however, prisoners are employed at such productive industries as materially reduce the cost of maintenance, so that if the revenue from prison labor is deducted in both cases the cost per prisoner at the Central Prison will be found to be \$97 27 against the sum of \$196 60 per prisoner at the Kingston Penitentiary. Taking the management of these institutions respectively as a sample of how the Liberal government conducts the public business of the country as compared with the methods which prevailed in Ottawa under the former administration, the electors of Ontario can judge for themselves whether a change from

a Liberal to a Conservative govern-ment is desirable. (Cheers.) THE PATRONS.

Parliament Opened Today.

Dominion Legislators Welcomed by the Governor-General.

What Was Said in the Speech From the Throne.

[C. P. R. Special Telegram to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Feb. 3.-At 3 o'clock this afternoon, Lord Aberdeen, governor-general, formally opened the Domin-ion Parliament. Though the weather was cold, large crowds had assembled in and about the parliament buildings to witness the arrival of his excellency, who came from Rideau Hall in his special carriage, under a mounted escort. A few minutes before 3 o'clock, the booming of cannon at Nepean Point announced the coming of his excellency, and when he entered the senate chamber its floor was crowded with privy councilors, senators and ladies. The costumes worn by the ladies were handsome, and many of them were striking. Among those in attendance were Hon. David and Mrs. Mills and Mrs. Macfie, of London. The galleries were, as usual, crowded to the doors. His excellency, being seated on the

throne, read the following SPEECH FROM THE THRONE: Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate, Gentlemen of the House of Commons: I have observed with great pleasure the remarkable advance in the political importance and material prosperity of Canada during the year which has just closed. The loan recently effected has shown that the credit of Canada has never stood so high in European markets, and affords reasonable ground for expecting that the burthens of the people will, in the near future, be materially reduced by the substitution of a much lower rate of interest on our indebtedness than that which now exists. The Story of Britain's "Backdown" Positively Denied.

Her Warships Enter and Leave Port Arthur at Will.

London, Feb. 3.—On incontrovertible authority, the Associated Press learns that Great Britain has not backed down on the question of making Talien Wan a free port. The Marquis of Salisbury, Mr. George N. Curzon (the parliamentary secretary of the foreign office), the Russian ambassador and the Chinese minister each remarked that they had not heard of any backdown.

According to a special dispatch from Shanghai, two British warships entered Port Arthur yesterday and left without anchoring. The China Gazette says the British Indian, Australian and Pacific squadrons have been ordered to be ready to reinforce the fleet in the far east, thus giving the British admiral a fleet capable of coping with "any combination opposing".

British policy. In the event of Bussia's British policy. In the event of Russia's hoisting her flag over the forts of Port Arthur, the British admiral has been ordered to hoist the English flag over Chusan and the Japanese fleet will ascend the Yang Tse Kiang."

The absence of the Russian and Gernan ambassadors from the Marquis of Salisbury's regular Wednesday reception of the diplomatic corps is spoken of as being a disquieting portent. Incoming vessels report terrific weather during the last few days. The British steamer Glendower (Capt. Honeyman), from Baltimore, was almost helpless from running out of coal. The cargo was broken into and part of the maize was used for fuel in getting to port.



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
