FRENCH TORPEDO BOAT DESTROYERS CAPTURED GERMAN SHIPS

[Canadian Press.]

Washington, D. C., Aug. 5.—President Wilson has offered his good offices to all the European powers involved in the war.

The President has sent the following message to King George, Emperor William, Em-Nicholas, Emperor Francis Joseph, and President Poincare:

"As offical head of one of the powers signatory to The Hague Convention, I feel it to be my privilege and my duty, under Article 3 of that convention, to say to you, in a spirit of most earnest friendship, that I should welcome an opportunity to act in the interest of European peace, either now or any other time, that might be thought more suitable, as an occasion to serve you and all concerned in a way that would afford me lasting cause for graititude and happiness.

Secretary Bryan has called a conference of all representatives of the European powers for late today, when it is believed messages will be delivered supplementary to those of President Wilson,, urging an acceptance of the tender of good offices.

Most of the diplomats are away at summer embassies, but are all expected back soon. Rudland, assistant provost marshal, and Mr. Bryan sent out his invitation, however, as some are in Washington and others are expected to return in response to the call.





British People Astonished at Completeness of Organization.

PRICES ARE INCREASING

First Effects of the War Are on Necessities of Life.

THOUSANDS VOLUNTEERS

Much Anxiety Felt for Large Parties of Summer Tourists Now Abroad.

[Canadian Press.]

LONDON, Aug. 4. - A few hundred excited and clamorous youths marching through that area of London, which corresponds to the Broadway district of New York, may cause American visitors to carry home reports that England is embarking upon war with a light heart and boastfully. Those who know this country know that the extreme opposite is the truth.

Faces Were Serlous. Crowds gathered about the Government offices throughout the day, cheered the ministers whenever they appeared, and pressed around their motor cars; the railway depots were filled with army reserves and territorials in khaki, but there were no flags flying on the buildings, and the great mass of the people went about their ordinary occupations with serious faces.

The first effects of the war are found in the increased prices of the necessaries of life, but the people expected this, and are reconciled to it. Opposition to the war has been almost dissipated by the events of the past 24 hours, except from a section of organized labor.

Papers Come in Line. The Committee of Imperial Defence has labored on the plan for more than a year, he said. Its aim was that in case of war British commerce should not be interrupted by the inability to secure war risks, and to insure that insurance rates should not go so high as to cause any considerable rises in prices. "We are perfectly convinced,"

continued, "that with the protection of the British navy, we can make certain of that vital condition." Task For Insurance Office,

The work is to be undertaken by the state insurance office, with a flat rate premium capable of variation from time to time. The Government, he said, was insuring eighty per cent of the hulls of vessels. In respect to voyages, current on the outbreak of the war, no premium would be charged, but it would after-
