Ottawa, April 12. - The justice department says that it has not pardoned the wrong Riley. The man recently released from Kingston was Thomas Riley of Hamilton, sentenced on April 3, 1913, for seven years for killing his wife. He served two years. An examination of the record shows extenuating circumstances and pardon was given. Apparently there has been some confusion between this Riley and one from London. The latter is still behind the stone walls at Kingston.

A report was current in the city Saturday that a blunder had been committed in the releasing of Tom Riley, the young railroader, who shot and killed George Blackburn, bartender at the Cecil Hotel, last winter, and who was sentenced to serve fifteen years for manslaughter. 

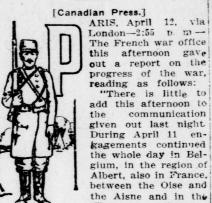



I am a driver. We have three teams on each wagon, and have to go up the guns with ammunition as soon as they need it.

I must tell you something of when we were in England. We had lots of inspections by the King, also Lord Roberts before he died, and general French. We had the whole of the brigade firing for practice on Salisbury Plain, and our battery commanded by Major Leonard. London, took first prize. We beat all the rest by quite a few points. Finest of Officers.



The torpedo, which brings death and destruction to almost everything it hits, as has been proven in this war, is nothing more than a miniature submarine in itself. A torpedo has its own power plant, its own rudders and propellers, and costs between \$2,500 and \$4,000. Its delicate engines, which are operated by the compressed air tanks amidships, are sufficiently powerful to propel the torpedo accurately up to a distance of 2,500 yards. The gyroscope insures the machine keeping its course, regardless of the condition of the water through which it travels. Forward is the charge of high explosive, capped by a long, spike-shaped striker. When the torpedo hits the side of a ship, the impact drives back the striker with force e ough to explode the charge and blast a hole through the armor plate. The whole machine, which is launched through a tube, weighs close to 1,000 pounds.



ESSEX, April 11.—Bugler William Souray, who is seated at the left in the companying illustration, writes an interesting letter home. France, March 14. He says: "I received your letter the other day, but had to wait till I got out of the trenches to answer. You must not grow impatient abroad 101,560 men are on the payfor an answer from me. It takes a long time to get from one end to the other.

"Well, we have had it a little excitable, but our casualties were few. I cannot expose too much news, but I was just off sentry duty in the trenches and lying down in a dugout when a shell burst on the parapet and blew the Britain' all top off. But I was not hurt. I don't recollect much, but some of the boys started to swear. I expect we will get something good and lively in a day or two. I would like to send you a picture of myself after a spell in the trenches. If I come through I will tell you all about it. I do not know when the war I do not know when the war will be over, but I am beginning to long for Canada again. It is beginning to get a little warmer and look like spring, and I suppose you see we are making

**BORDEN'S ANNOUNCEMENT** 

Cheers Great News Given To House of Commons By Premier.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, April 11.-Kitchener has called on Canada for a second expeditionary force. The news was given Parliament Saturday night by Premier Robt. Borden. He said that the call had been expected for some time.

Three months ago Kitchener was informed that the force was ready in Canada to board troopships and sail for Europe. Premier Borden said that since that time the war office had been kept fully informed on its training and has from time to time made suggestions which had been followed with absolute precision by the Canadian authorities. Now that the summons had come the second expeditionary force would go forward at an unre-vealed date in the near future to join the first expeditionary Canadian force now at the front. The Canadian second expeditionary force had not been summoned sooner "for reasons which commend themselves to the head of the war office and reasons which are generally recognized." He noted the fact that with an enormous number of men under training in Britain it was PTE. J. The announcement of Kitchener's call was received with cheers by both parties in the House of Commons.

BASLE, Switzerland, April 11, - The Germans are transporting typhus pa-tients from the east in specially equiped hospital trains. Each train consists of twelve hospital cars and one disinfecting car, the latter marked "Infectious' in huge letters.
