THREE MORE NEW YORK BANKS HAVE SUSPENDED PAYMENT He Will Likely Remain in Jail Until December.

Run on the Trust Company of America Continues judges' criminal court held during the But the General Situation Has Improved.

New York, Oct. 24.-The Twelfth Ward Bank today suspended payment to depositors. A state bank examiner will be placed in charge.

New York, Oct. 24 .- The Empire City Savings Bank, located at 231 West One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, posted a notice this morning, announcing its suspension for 30 days under the banking laws. The officials of the bank say the institution is entirely solvent, but they decided to avail themselves of the 30 days' notice of withdrawal under the state law, because they feared a run owing to the suspension of payment by the Hamilton Bank and Twelfth Ward Bank in the same neighborhood. The Empire City Savings Bank according to recent statements owed its depositors about \$3,300,-

New York, Oct. 24.-The Hamilton Bank in West One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street suspended payment today to depositors. A notice posted on the doors says the bank is solvent, but in justice to the depositors payment has been suspended until public feeling in banking institutions was re-

The Hamilton Bank is not one of the large institutions in the city. Its location, in Harlem, gave it quite a good neighborhood, but it never was in any way a rich New York bank. Following the announcement of the suspension of the bank, news came of the suspension of the Twelfth Ward Bank, lo-

cated at One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Lexington avenue. The Twelfth Ward Bank is a state institution, and a state bank exam-Iner will be placed in charge of its affairs. According to a recent statement, the institution owed depositors about \$3,000,000.

The run on the Dollar Savings Bank in the Bronx, which began Tues-May, continued today. Nearly 300 depositors were lined up outside the bank building at daylight. Many of them were women who stood all night in the line. A large percentage of the Dollar Savings Bank's depositors are

For draught ale and porter the price has been advanced to 33 cents per imperial gallon, with a discount of 5 per cent, if paid within 30 days. The advance is ten cents a dozen on quarts and pints for bottled ale, porter and lager, and three cents per gallon on







The Hawks in Ontario. To the Editor of The Advertiser:

For the sake of the sportsmen who are afield at this time of the year and who are more or less interested in other kinds of birds than the object of their pursuits, I would be obliged if you would publish a few notes on the hawks, which are perhaps the most interesting birds outside of game, to be found at this season of the year. The small hawks have practically all

left and need not therefore be given any consideration, but the large ones are nearly all still here with us. Not by any means always the same individuals, as there is in the fall a constant movement of birds from the north to the south and consequently the birds that nested here are probably hundreds of miles away, preached too much, and certainly no gen- the hawks in lower Ontario today are probably some of those who nested in the far north

The observer will note two species in excess of all others at this time of the year, namely the red tail and the marsh. The latter is a bird of varying coloration, but may always be recognized on the wing by the large patch of pure white feathers immediately above the tail. No other hawk shows white on the back, but the marsh hawk in all plumages has this distinguishing mark. In general color the males are a light slatey blue, with black tips on the wings; females and Fallen leaves are being driven by the young are brown of varying intensity. This bird is further to be recognized by its habits. It is the only hawk that is often seen flying slowly along over the fields, beating up against the wind This it does at a distance of three to eight feet and the least motion of bird or mouse on the ground below is quickly noted.

The other common hawk, red-tailed, if seen flying will be either soaring in majestic circles above the tree tops or traveling from place to place. His hunting is done from a stationary position. The adults may always be recognized by the rufus red tail, but the young birds for a year or two do not acquire this feature. One is therefore compelled to depend on the cofor of the under parts which in the case of this hawk is a clear and often bright white. Along the sides are a varying number of dark marks, but the center of the breast invariably shows a circle of pure white, and this alone is sufficient to distinguish this hawk from others.

Probably the next hawk in abunlance is the rough leg, so-called because his legs are feathered to the toes, and this feature identifies him quickly enough in the hand, but not on the wing. The general color varies much, but is composed entirely of brownish black and light buff, usually to be seen in large patches underneath, but when the bird is looked at from beneath when flying, one can always see a dark patch, nearly black, from the elbow joint (half way out on the wing) and extending not along the wing, but parallel with the feathers. 




