FINISHING ROOM ABLAZE.

A DESPERATE STRUGGLE.

The engine was slow in getting started, fully fifteen minutes elapsing before a stream of water was turned into the building.

For nearly an hour the firemen waged an unequal struggle gainst the flames in that section. There was a strong wind blowing from the northeast at the time, and it appeared as if the firefighters would soon lose control of the blaze.

THE BUILDING DOOMED.

It was then that the building was doomed. Struggle as they might the firemen could not control the flames. The building, especially the west half of it, was filled with inflammable material, light lumber, oils and varnishes.

What Is Necessary on the Part of Applicants for Pensions.

The postmasters throughout the western istrict have received a circular from the Government annuities branch at Ottawa,

Forms and cards have been forwarded to the postmasters, and may be obtained on application. As an illustration of the working of these annuities, it may be nentioned that if an applicant at 20 years of age pays 25 cents a week until 60 years of age, \$130 per year will be paid as long as the applicant lives. The payments may be made in almost any way preferred by the applicant, ranging from \$50 to \$600 a
