Man Closely Guarded.

When it became generally known about the city this morning that Taylor had confessed, and that he felt absolutely no remorse for his terrible crime, there were ominous threats and talk of lynching the prisoner. As a result the police brought him to the police station before 8 o'clock, and there in a strong cell a double guard t at first, but later on the permission has been placed to watch him. 

#### A SOLDIER OF STEEL.

Iron has always been considered a necessary ingredient in the make-up of a soldier. Military men in all ages have admired "iron dukes" as generals, and "men of blood and iron" for soldiers.
