Gun Was Not Turned Directly On Rioters.

Quebec, April 10.—Major G. B. Rogers, Toronto, who had charge of the militia in St. Rochs on the night of the riot, Monday, April 1, was the main witness today at the coroner's inquest into the death of the four civilians killed during

He explained that he had 1,180 men under his command that night, with ten machine guns stationed here and there throughout the riot zone.

He said only one of the machine guns was fired, and that was in St. Sauveur, near Bagot street, where the four civilians were killed. He says it worked barely a few seconds, and that about thirty-six bullets were fired from its muzzle.

Rlot Act Was Read.

Witness also stated that the rlot act was read about nine that night near the Jacques Cartler Market Place by Capt. Haigtins. He says Capt. Haigtins read the riot act by heart, both in French and English.

AMERICAN HONOR-GUARD FOR THEIR MAJESTIES FATHER DIES AS SON

PRESS THE BRITISH BACK IN FURIOUS FLANDERS FIGHT Desperate Struggle Which Broke Out Yester-

POWERFUL TEUTON FORCES

London, April 10.—American reinforcements have appeared in the British battle zone, says a dispatch from British headquarters in France to Reuter's, Limited. Their presence in the fighting line, the correspondent adds, should soon be felt.

THE WAR SITUATION

New German attacks today have carried the fighting in the great battle on the western front into Flanders, and extended the battlefront to a stretch of approximately 130 miles, from near the Belgian town of Ypres, in the north, to the vicinity of Coucy-le-Chateau, on the extreme French right.

Deep Salient Driven.

The fresh German blow, struck yesterday between La Bassee and Armentieres, has already driven a deep sallent into the British lines between Armentieres, and the Armentieres region itself, was reported under attack this morning. The infantry fighting is spreading to the northward, following a heavy bombardment by the German guns which extended as far as the pres-Comines Canal, just to the southeast of Ypres.

Armentieres Pocketed.

Armentieres, already near the tip of a sharp bend in the line, has now been further pocketed and seems in serious peril from converging attacks north and south. The British however, are holding the line of the River Lys, to the southwest of the town, and at the latest reports had prevented an attempted crossing by the Germans at tempted crossing by the Germans at Bac St. Maur, four miles southwest of Armentieres, and another at Estaires, still further to the southwest.

The British Line.

From the vicinity of Estaires the British are holding the line of the River

Eritish are holding the line of the River Lawe southward for a short distance, the front then curving in a southeasterly direction, and coupling up with the original line at or near Givenchy. The maximum depth of the German penetration was apparently about 4½ miles at Esta!res. Givenchy, at one time in German hands during the attack, was retaken by the British in a counter

The German effort on this new front, if it succeeds to no further extent than it apparently has so far, does not seem likely to have any greater effect than to compel modifications in the British line north of La Bassee Canal. If the British can continue to hold Givenchy. British well Placed.

There remains the possibility of the attack north of Armentieres developing further importance with relation to the Flanders line as a whole. The British are well placed on high ground at the salient points in this region, however, which they were not in the region south of Armentieres, the Germans holding the advantage of terrain there. The Germans seem to be concentrating their effort on the new Flanders operating the fighting along the line of their great drive to the southward, which was halted before Amiens, having largely died down. Only local fighting, which had no appreciable effect on the situation, is reported along the British part of this front.

The French were more hotly engaged at one point, giving some ground in a heavy attack by the Germans near hangard en Canterre, but pre-establishing their position in a counter-attack. No serious attempts appear to have been made by the Germans to advance at other points on the French front.

With the British Forces in France, April 10 .--The Germans this morning extended the sector of vesterday's attack to the northward by launching a drive against the British between Armentieres and Messines.

800 GERMANS TAKEN.

Once yesterday and again last evening the Ger mans gained ground at Givenchy, but each time the British threw themselves so fiercely on the invaders that the latter were forced to withdraw, the last time leaving upwards of 800 prisoners behind them.

"We have now entered the most critical period of the war. There is a lull in the storm, but the hurricane is not yet over. The fate of the Empire, of Europe and of liberty, may depend upon the success with which the last German attack is arrested and countered," he said.
