

Ask Premier Whitney to Declare Population Over 50,000, So That People May Vote.

THE RESOLUTION

1. Whereas, three full weeks have elapsed since the passing of the resolution of Nov. 1, 1969. 2. And Whereas, there is not now sufficient time to permit of the taking of a census, and the passing of a bylaw by Dec. 1, 1909, for the a bylaw by Dec. 1, 1909, for the submission of the Sunday car question to the people,

3. And, whereas, any money expended on taking of a census would therefore be useless, and this council does not desire to incur the ex. pense of a census at the present

4. And, whereas, the assessment commissioner, by his enumeration taken between 1st of April and 31st of August, 1809, certified the population to be forty-nine thousand, five hundred and seven, and has since obtained certificates from the principals of several educational institutions and others showing the number of persons who have come to the city since the date of his census to be more than sufficient in number to make the population of the city of London more than fifty thousand,

5. And, whereas, the council of the corporation of the city of London believe the population of the city of London to be in excess of fifty thousand at the present time, as shown by the said certificates,

6. And, whereas, the Sunday car question has been agitating the citizens of London for some years past, and a plebiscite taken at the time of the last municipal elections showed a majority of three hundred and seventy of those entitled to vote in favor of Sunday cars, and this council believes it to be in the best interests of the city that the question should be definitely settled one way or another by a vote of the citizens at the coming municipal elections,

7. Be it resolved that the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council be requested for the purpose of allowing a vote to be taken on Sunday cars at the coming municipal election, to declare that the population of city of London is in excess of

Premier Must Decide.

The above resolution was passed at the special meeting of the council, and Whitney and the Ontario Cabinet to pass upon the population of the city of London and a vote on Sunday cars In brief, it means that the council are convinced that the figures, as submitted to the Ontario Government, correctly state the facts so far as the population of the city is concerned, and that they desire to have the official seal of Sir James Whitney placed uron them in order that the citizens of London may again express their pinion on Sunday cars.

B., Nov. 23.—Private detectives and other officers of the law all over Eastern Canada have been engaged for some weeks past on a gigantic fraud case, in which a compination of Syrians worked, with Grand Falls, N. B., as their headquarters. One arrest has been made in the case, several thousand dollars' worth of goods have been seized, and detectives are scouring Boston, New York, and other American cities in an endeavor to locate those who are concerned with Wm. J. Ayoup, the man under arrest, in the perpetration of the alleged fraud.

Those alleged to be connected are all New Brunswick and Maine men. The firms defrauded include William Croft & Sons, of Toronto; Roy & Barbeau, of Quebec; Mitchell Woollen Mills, Mitchell, Ont.; White, Limited, Ottawa; J. Evergh & Co., Montreal; J. J. Murphy, Halifax; Kaplan, Shane & Co., St. John, and many others, making a total of between 30 and 40 creditors in all.

### DR. GANDIER'S ADDRESS

Mass Meeting Last Night in St. An drew's Church - Rev. Robert Johnston Also Speaks.

The urgency of the need for the evangelization of the world in this generation was the dominant note of the addresses in the mass meeting of men in connection with the Pan-Presbyterian Missionary Demonstration in St. Andrew's Church last evening. A very large audience was present and listened intently to the impassioned words of the speakers as they urged the need of devoted, consecrated work on the part of the church to take the story of Christ to those who

sit in darkness.
"There are three points that I would like to dwell on tonight," said Rev. Principal Gandier, in addressing the gathering, "the motive of the missionary propaganda, the urgency at the present time, and the methods leading to its consummation. Our motive is to crown our Jesus Lord of all-to put the crown upon his brow to uplift him. That is the great motive and impelling power of every Christian. Jesus is my king, I have enthrened him in my heart and having done so I desire to crown him Lord of all. He is the only rightful king; it is his by right pur-chased by his blood, and we long in-tensely to make it his in fact. And how can we rest till in every land they worship Christ and bow the knee to

him who died. Christian Imperialism.

"I think what we need today is : great Christian imperialism. Surely we been done about the matter, and I do citizens, cradled and trained in that outreaching spirit of the Briton, should such a project or not. The matter has have worthy visions of the empire that is to be the Christ's. I am afraid sometimes that we have not looked on missions as a great war of conquest but a sentimental thing, that could well be left for the women and children.
