CLOSE TO FOUR MILLION CASUALTIES OF THE ENEMY SINCE BEGINNING OF WAR

Official List Places Total Losses at 3,755,693 Officers and Men of Which 910,234 Were Killed.

(Canadian Press.)

London, Nov. 10 .- German casualties since the beginning of the war reported in German official lists total 3,755,693 officers and men, according to an official British compilation made public today. Of this total 910,234 were killed.

The figures do not include casualties among the naval forces or the colonial troops.

The German casualties reported by the same source for the month of October total 199,675 officers and men, including dead 34,321.



ADDRESS BY N. W. ROWELL

Ontario Liberal Leader Tells of War Activities to Queen's University Alumni.

KINGSTON, Nov. 9 .- "Britain's Efort," was the subject of N. W. Rowaddress here on Thursday evening, before the alumni conference at Grant Hall, Queen's University. In comprehensive speech, including early all Britain's war activities, the eader of the Ontario Liberal party rought out an astonishing array of acts, showing in the most illuminat-ig way the marvellous achievements organization and finance of the

ritish people during the war. He compared what they had ac-omplished with what was expected of them at first by the allies, and showed that any limited liability plan such as had been theoretically contemplated was impossible. It was even more impossible today, and this applied to Canada as well as to Great

Mr. Rowell reviewed the developnent since the opening of the war, of he army and navy, munitions, finance air service, transport, army medical service and other branches of activity. As a sample of the interesting inermation he brought out there, is
