Clubs Are Being Organized in All Parts of the Province.

## L. AND P. S. MEN MAY GO OUT ON STRIKE SHORTLY

**Board of Conciliation Will Try** To Avert Trouble.

UP TO COMMISSION

Board of Arbitration Being Considered by Railway Authorities.

Possibility of a strike on the London Possibility of a strike on the London and Port Stanley Railway before the end of the week is looming up, but may be averted by the appointment of a board of conciliation.

Increases asked by the employees were refused at the last meeting of the railway commission. Since then the men have made application to the Dominion

have made application to the Dominion railway board for a board of arbitra-tion, and appointed Burley W. Bennett, conductor on the Pere Marquette Railway, St. Thomas, as their representa-tive. The minister of labor, in reply to this application, stated that he could this application, stated that he could not take any such action, as the road was under the jurisdiction of the provincial and municipal government. Application for a board of arbitration would have to be made jointly by the employers and employees.

Representative Here.

John M. Parker, international representative of the railwaymen, was in the city today. He could not state definitely whether the men would strike or nitely whether the men would strike or not, but declared that they had done all they were going to do to avert trouble. Any further move would have to come from the commission.

Commissioner W. A. Martin stated to The Advertiser that the railway commission would move to avert trouble.

"The commission is quite willing to co-operate with the men in obtaining a board of arbitration," he said. "The men have appointed a representative and we have a man in view whom we intend to have a man in view whom we intend to have a man in view whom we intend to ask to represent us. He is not a Londoner, and has a reputation of having handled several matters of this kind to the satisfaction of all concerned. If this man will accept the appointment the two representatives can then get together and appoint a third member of the board or if they cannot agree on one, then the Dominion Government will be asked to make an appointment.

# CIVIC GUARDS, COMPLIES WITH ALLIED DEMAND, BUT PROTESTS

Berlin Government, in Note to General Nollett, Declares There Was No Intention of Using Guards for Military Purposes-Action Is Tak en Only Under Strong Pressure From Allied Nations.

Berlin, April 20.-Disbandment of German civic guards, demanded in the Allied note of March 12, has been decided upon by the Berlin Government. In a note to Gen. Nollett, head of the Allied commission of control here, the Government states it is taking this step "under pressure exercised by those who ignore actual facts." Assertion is also made that there was no idea of using the civic guards for military purposes. Every precaution had been taken to avoid employing them in this way, the note says,

"The Government," it continues, "cannot but recognize that the stipulations of the peace treaty compel it to deny to the population every possibility of protection which, in the present extraordinary circumstances, is essential for the maintenance of Germany's internal security and the fulfillment of the terms of the treaty."

Both choir and solo numbers were unusually fine, resulting altogether in a recital of great

Millicent Maginley has a soprand voice of clear, pure and resonant quality especially adapted to church music. She sings without restraint, pouring out her songs of praise like a bird. The recitation and Arla from Costa's "Eli," "I Will Extol Thee, O Lord," was her first number, and with desire for more, so excellently was it rendered. This was followed by Tschaikowsky's "Legend," a weird and beautiful air which keeps falling back upon one note and which she sang with skill and atristic finish, while "Father Eternal," her Bach-Gounod number, was perhaps one of the finest on the

was perhaps one of the finest on the program.

"Sound an Alarm," the mangnificent tenor solo from Handel's "Judas Maccabaeus," was the number in which Gladstone Brown was first heard. This English tenor has a voice with the characteristic soft quality of the old land, and yet a power which is rarely heard except in operatic singing. At the time of the Glpsy Smith campaign he was heard here in simple sacred airs. Last night his voice was shown off to advantage in such big numbers as "How Many Hired Servants." from Sullivan's "The Prodigal Son," "Requiem of the Sea" (Steppen), "The Lord Shall Wipe Away All Tears" (Bloye), and "Ave Maria" (Kahn), the latter number being sung with a dramatic force and religious feeling, which made it perhaps the rarest treat of the evening.

The tenor and soprano duet, sung by both artists, bringing a magnificent program to a close, was Mendelssohn's "My Song Shall Always Be of Thy Mercy," and was rendered in a manner which will not soon be forgotten.

The choir itself was in fine trim, responding readlly to the mood of the director, and some very fine effects in shading were obtained, especially in the negro spiritual number "Weeping Mary." (R. N. Dett) an exquisitely beautiful thing. A festive anthem. "The Strain Upraise." by H. E. Nichol, was a number which gave scope for some excellent choir work with its double quartette, chorus and soprano solo by Miss Ula Kennedy. Mr. Curry's answer was non-committal on the point.

Premier Drury asked and received the special consent for second reading of the bill dealing with the Kapuskasing situation. It was given second reading and put through committee of the whole this afternoon. The legislation provided for adjustment of the soldier-settlers' claims as recommended by the newly-appointed board of adjustment.

## FREIGHT ARRIVING FROM UNITED STATES

The first freight to move in any quantities since the borders were closed as the result of the switchmen's strike started to cross the frontier during the past 24 hours. Aiready the conditions there, which have been badly congested since the strike was proclaimed, are already assuming normal appearance.

While no shipments are leaving this city for any point in the States, considerable goods have been received in the city by way of Niagara Falls. All danger of factories closing down and a serious coal shortage in Western Ontario is practically past, as considerable fuel is maving at Fort Erie.

It is not expected that the embargoes on any frontier will be lifted until the congestion at the points of entry have entirely been cleared away. All the roads seemingly are desirous of getting free of their piled-up freight before any is accepted from other roads.

The bulk of the latter was roduced from excess profits and in produced from excess profits and income, which contributed nearly double the amount secured the year before. It is interesting to note that while Sir Thomas White estimated the loss in revenues from the customs tariff. due to the reductions which he made in his last budget, at fifteen millions, there was actually an increase of twenty millions in customs receipts during the year. vear.

In spite of the record revenues during the period, a surplus of revenues over ordinary expenditures of only fiften millions is recorded, while capital expenditures, pald out of loans, amounted to the formidable sum of \$388,000,000, of which \$343,000,000 was for war. The of which \$343,000,000 was for war. The total ordinary expenditures for the year were in excess of those for the preceding year by the considerable amount of \$75,000,000. The net debt of the Dominion when the war broke out was \$337,000,000. At the end of the fiscal year just passed it was trembling at the \$2,000,000,000 mark, and has reached a total of \$1,935,000,000.

Not Gross Debt.

And this does not really represent the debt of the Dominion. The gross debt would better represent it, inasmuch as a very large proportion of the so-called assets of the Dominion are of little value so far as revenue is concerned, and might just as well be written off. The gross debt is three billions. Probably a better idea of the Dominion's overhead charges on which annual interest must, be paid, may be annual interest must, be paid, may be gained from an examination of the figures regarding the funded debt. At the end of the fiscal year the total funded debt of the Dominion was \$2.54.826.547, of which \$2,047.952,127 represented borrowings in Canada, bearing interest at 5½ per cent. The total expenditures on war up to the end of the last fiscal year were \$1,-667,337,371.

If the funded debt when the way from the funded debt when the war broke out is deducted from the funded debt at the end of the last fiscal year it will be shown that the Government during the war actually borrowed a state of the short of the sho during the war actually borrowed a sum totalling \$2,177,826,547, or half a billion dollars in excess of the actual cost of the war. Just where the extra money went to is not clear from the financial statements of the de-partment of finance. Collected in Revenues.

Assuming that the 106 millions collected in revenues last year and listed as "miscellaneous." largely represents income and excess profits taxation, then the Dominion during the war secured only the insignificant amount of 200 million dellars from her new war taxes. only the insignificant amount of 200 million dollars from her new war taxes. It would, therefore, appear that borrowings and war taxes were in excess of the actual cost of the war to an amount of about 700 millions. It is possible that these figures are capable of satisfactory explanation, it certainly will be one of the tasks of the finance minister to explain them in his budget.

Much Speculation.

Naturally there is much speculation as to the probable new sources of revenue which the minister will propose. Retrenchment is not evident in the estimates which have already been brought down, though there are many considerable, but inevitable reductions. The customs tariff cannot be expected to bring more, if as much, revenue as it did during the past fiscal year. The excess profits tax, it is rumored, is to be dropped, and not again revived. The income tax so far has not been as productive of results as might have been expected, but there are indications of a tightening up in the methods of collection. As compared with New Zealand, Australia, the United States and Great Britain, the collections in Canada from this source have been highly disappointing.

Levy Upon Capital.

Speculation regarding new sources is varied. A levy upon capital is suggested by some as a proper method by which the present anomalous situation of a wealthy country and an almost bankrupt treasury may be adjusted. A land tax has its advocates, as has also the imposition of succession duties, both these taxes being in force in Australia and New Zealand. It is pointed out, however, that in Canada many of the provinces have adopted such imposts.

While no reductions in the tariff worth considering are anticipated, there are rumors that an internal excise duty may be imposed upon Canadian-made goods, so that the treasury may benefit and the Canadian manufacturer may pay for the protection which he enjoys. In the meantime the secrets of the budget are locked in the breast of the finance minister, though certain facts as set forth above are known. And the task before the minister is to cut his coat according to his cloth.

A man may at any moment sacrifice the initial payments \* he has made. He would thus leave the civic

nade. He would thus leave the civic nome he has in all probability mussed up so that it has all the characteristics of a very second-hand appearance. Be-ause of this the commission will have much unforeseen overhead expense. This will not be covered by the 10 per cent deposit and such installments as may happen to have been paid. Few people have noted the injury which system will work on the commun this system will work on the community in which it operates. Capital, that might have drifted from the fools into the building of more houses for the wise men has been badly frightened. Nay, more. Who is to say that it will not affect the sale of future debenture issues to the money sources from whom we are obliged to borrow? A far better plan than that of the covernment would plan than that of the government would

plan than that of the government would have been to have given proper protection to the individual building dwellings to rent, so that the delinquent tenant and those who would cause unnecessary damage would have to make good or go to jail. Then there would be some encouragement to invest. When the question came before the council of Louisville, Ky., they appointed a shrewd committee of businessmen to look up the question. After some months of careful investigation they advised the the question. After some months of careful investigation they advised the council to keep out. Labor and material, the two principal factors, were practically prohibitive. Immediately resident builders announced the building of hundreds of houses.

We have the same type of men here who are making a business of building homes for sale, but who cannot herrow

who are making a business of building homes for sale, but who cannot borrow money for the rate offered by the government. At the same time they can give better value to the buyer in the saving of overhead charges that a commission cannot avoid. It may well be asked if it is fair to local builders to thus compromise their interests. On the same principle the government should enter the sugar business. the flour milling business, the making of clothing, and all of the many other necessities that are just as requisite as essities that are just as requisite as


