

London Times Man Says Peace Is Unlikely-Japanese Envoys Maintain Absolute Secrecy.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 10. - The Japanese have handed the Russians he conditions of peace in writing.

The following official statement was nade by Mr. Korostovetz, on behalf of the Russian plenipotentiaries:

"In the meeting of Aug. 10 the question of full powers has been regulated. so that there will be no difficulty on that subject. After this the Japanese plenipotentiaries handed to the Russian plenipotentiaries the conditions of peace in writing. It has been decided that the Russian plenipotentiaries will study the question and will as soon as pos-


