An Open Letter to the Battalion

To

The Officers, Non-commissioned Officers and Men of the Duke of Connaught's Own, 158th (Overseas) Battalion.

Gentlemen:—

With this souvenir issue of The Reveille, it gives me extreme pleasure to have the opportunity of expressing to all ranks of the 158th (Overseas) Battalion, The Duke of Connaught's Own, my hearty appreciation of the splendid devotion you have shown to the work in hand.

Fresh from the varied walks of civil life, you have caught the true soldierly spirit. The transformation from civil to military life and discipline has been complete, and so far you have done your duty nobly.

The end of the first step—the drudgery of our training—has been reached. Your ready response and general desire for fitness and efficiency augurs well for success in the strenuous grind awaiting us at the Concentration Camp, where the second step of our journey to the Front must be completed.

Knowing the spirit and devotion of all ranks, I am convinced that when orders are received, all will be well qualified and prepared to assume the heavier and more exacting duties Overseas imposed by the standard of the British Army.

Ultimate success will depend entirely upon application and self-sacrifice in devotion to duty: qualities which so pre-eminently characterise the British Service, and which inevitably must give us rank in the estimation, not only of our Canadian officers, but also of the officers Overseas who have done so much already to glorify the British Service; and last, but not least, H. R. H. The Duke of Connaught, whose patronage gives us the distinction of being the Royal Battalion.

A Short History of The Duke of Connaught's Own

THE 6th Regiment "The Duke of Connaught's Own Rifles," the Parent Corps of the 158th Overseas Battalion, The Duke of Connaught's Own, can claim direct descent from the first local military corps established in British Columbia in Crown Colony days.

The first Corps of Militia raised on the Mainland of British Columbia was the Seymour Artillery. The exact date is in doubt, as owing to the fire at New Westminster in 1898 all records were lost, and the early history of the Corps is a matter of memory. The Seymour Artillery, which was formed about 1859 at New Westminster as a Half Battery of Field Artillery, was armed with two 24-pounder Bronze Howitzers, which are now adorning the grounds of Queen's Park. The Corps was named after the Governor of the Colony, and among its officers were members of the Governor's staff and the late Sir Henry Crease.

From 1859-60 to 1878 the history of the Corps is lost. In 1878 a Crimean veteran, Capt. George Pittendrigh, then late of the Buffs, took command, with Lieut. Norman Bole as his subaltern. During Capt. Pittendrigh's tenure of command the old Seymour Artillery became No. 1 Battery of the newly formed British Columbia Brigade of Garrison Artillery, No. 2 Battery being in Victoria. In 1884, on Capt. Pittendrigh's retirement, Capt. W. Norman Bole assumed command, which he held until his elevation to the Bench in 1889, when the command devolved upon Capt. Charles McNaughton.

The Battery was always maintained in a high state of efficiency, and was complimented on several occasions by inspecting officers, notably by His Excellency the Marquis of Lorne and General Laurie. The uniform was the same as worn by the Royal Artillery, including the Busby as headdress.

In 1894 the British Columbia Brigade of Garrison Artillery was composed as follows: Nos. 1, 2 and 3 Companies were in Victoria, No. 4 Company at New Westminster, and authority was given to raise a Company in Vancouver to be known as No. 5. Major T. O. Townley, who, when he resided in New Westminster, had commanded No. 4 Company, was placed in Command. The other officers were Lieutenants C. A. Worsnop, Lacey R. Johnson, F. W. Boulthbee, and C. Gardiner Johnson. Lieut.-Col. E. G. Prior, of Victoria, was in command of the Brigade. On January 17th, 1894, in the old theatre on Pender Street, near Abbott, the oath of allegiance was administered to the men who had signed the roll, uniforms were issued and drill commenced the following day.

The first official inspection took place in the old Drill Hall on June 9th, 1894, the inspecting officer being Lieut.-Col. J. Peters, D. A. G. of the District, and in November No. 5 Company furnished a Guard of Honor to the Governor-General, Lord Stanley.

On May 24th of the following year, No. 5 Company took part in the Queen's Birthday celebrations in Victoria, and were complimented by Rear-Admiral Stephenson, Commander-in-Chief of the Forces. Lieut.-Col. Peters inspected the Company on October 19th, 1895, and in the same month a gun-shed was erected opposite the Drill Hall for gun drill. Authority was also received for the organization of another Company to be known as No. 6. Up to December, 1895, the weapon with which No. 5 was armed was the short Snider, but during that month these were called in and Martini-Henrys issued.

Early in January, 1896, the Artillery School commenced in Vancouver, a three months' course under the O. C. Royal Marine Artillery, Esquimalt. This was followed in the summer by another school at Esquimalt known as the "A" grade course, which enabled officers to qualify for promotion. The name of the regiment was changed to the 5th Canadian Artillery, and was formed into two battalions. The Victoria Companies were made the 1st Battalion, and the Mainland Companies the 2nd Battalion. Lieut.-Col. T. O. Townley was placed in command of the latter. The other Vancouver officers were: Majors, C. A. Worsnop and Lacey R. Johnson; Adjutant, Lieut. C. C. Bennett; Surgeon-Major, A. M. Robertson; Quartermaster, Hon. Capt. J. F. Garden; Captains, F. W. Boulthbee and C. Gardiner Johnson; Lieutenants, J. Reynolds Tite, J. Duff Stuart, H. C. Akroyd, Forin and Burnett.

In February, 1897, Major C. A. Worsnop assumed command of the Battalion during Lieut.-Col. Townley's absence on leave, and Capt. C. C. Bennett took over No. 4 Company of New Westminster, being gazetted Major in March. Lieut.-Col. Peters, D. O. C., inspected the Companies in May, and in the same month the Vancouver Companies furnished a Guard of Honor to the Marquis Ito, who was en route to the Queen's Jubilee celebration as Envoy Extraordinary from Japan.

In June the 2nd Battalion proceeded to Victoria and took part in the Jubilee celebrations on Macaulay Plains with the Royal Navy, Royal Marines, Esquimalt Garrison and the 1st Battalion 5th Regiment C. A., the largest number of troops ever brigaded in British Columbia.

On June 5th, 1897, Lieut.-Col. Prior was gazetted to be in command of the 5th Regiment, both battalions, and on the 19th of the same month Lieut.-Col. Townley was transferred to the Reserve of Officers with the rank of Major, and Major C. A. Worsnop gazetted Lieut.-Col. in command of the 2nd Battalion. In October Major Bennett took command of No. 6 Company in Vancouver, Lieut. DeWolf Smith taking No. 4 Company in New Westminster, and Lieut. J. Reynolds Tite was appointed Adjutant.

In the spring of 1898 an Artillery School was held in New Westminster, which was attended by all the New

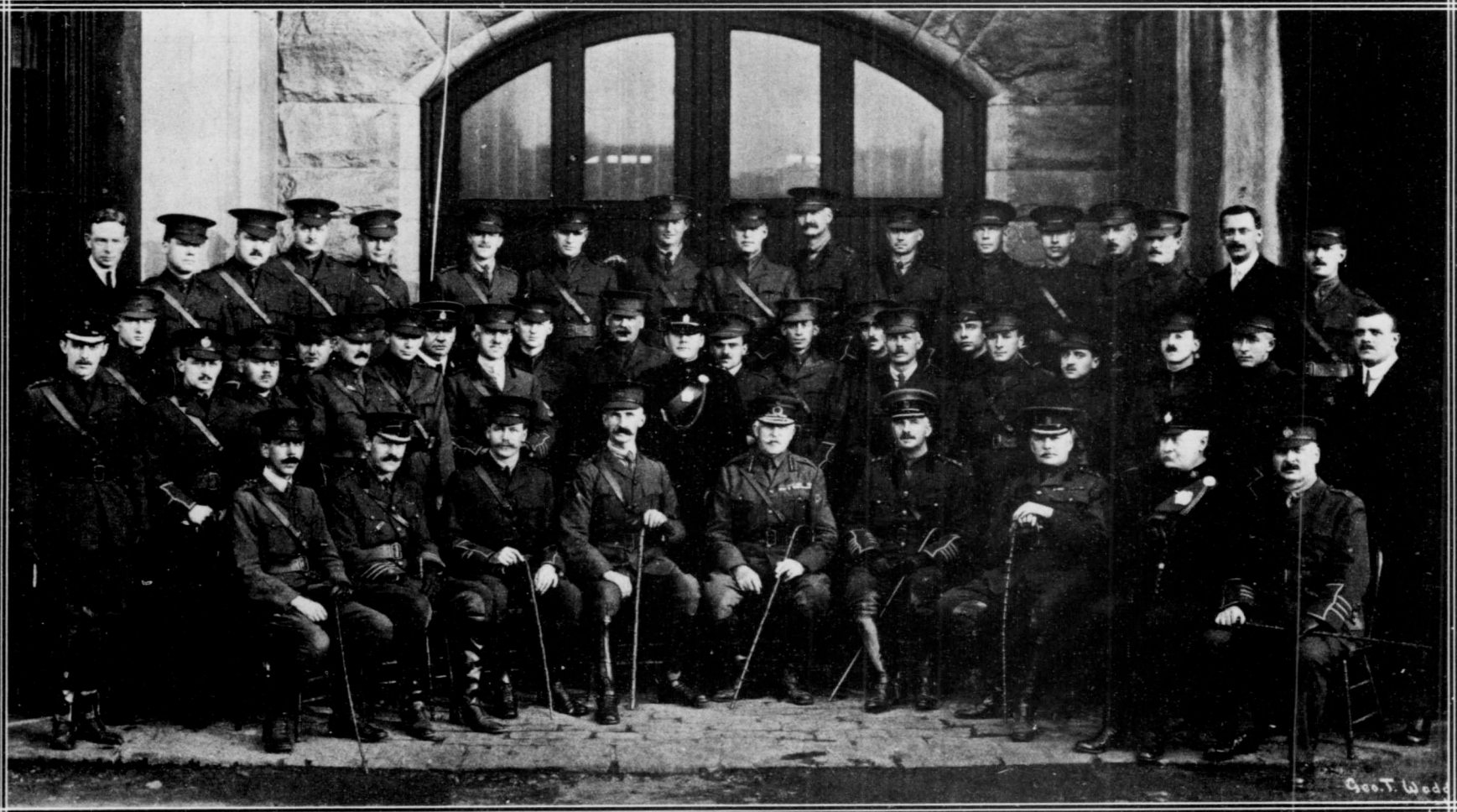

Taken September 18th, 1915.

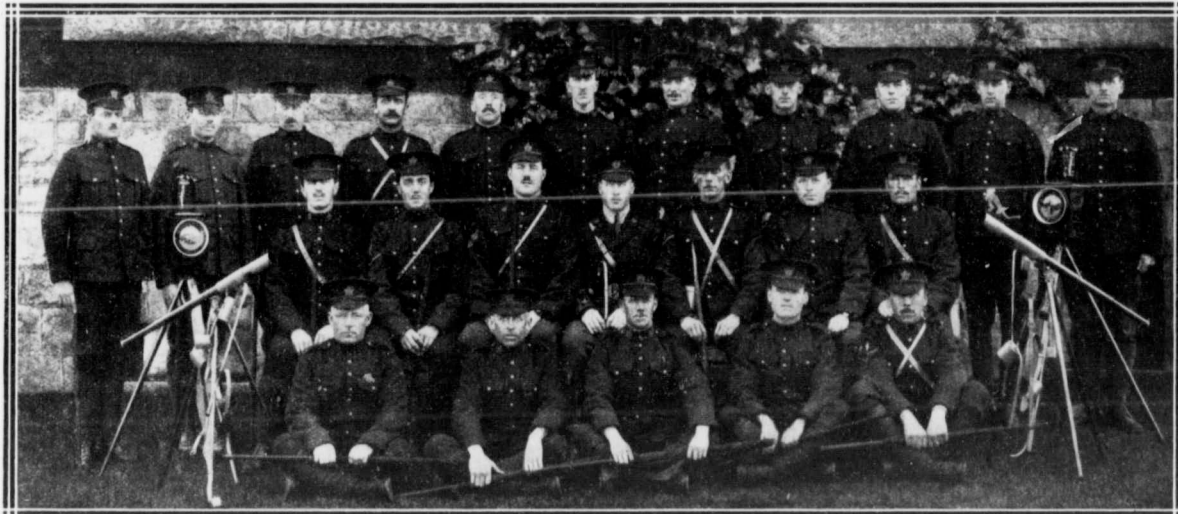

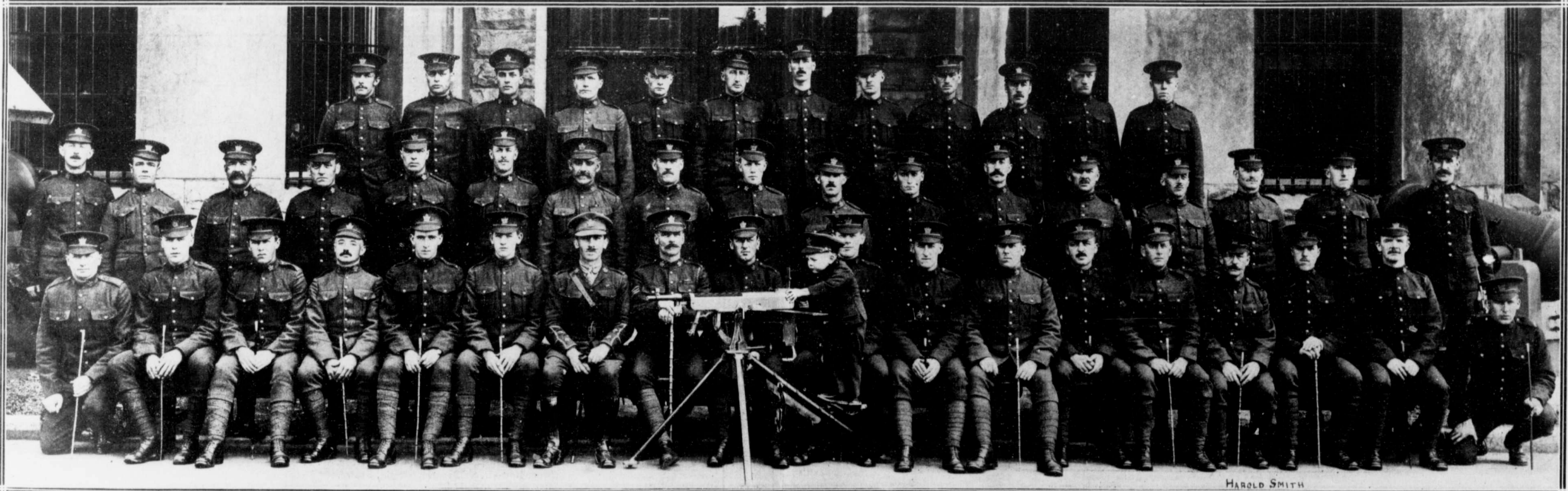

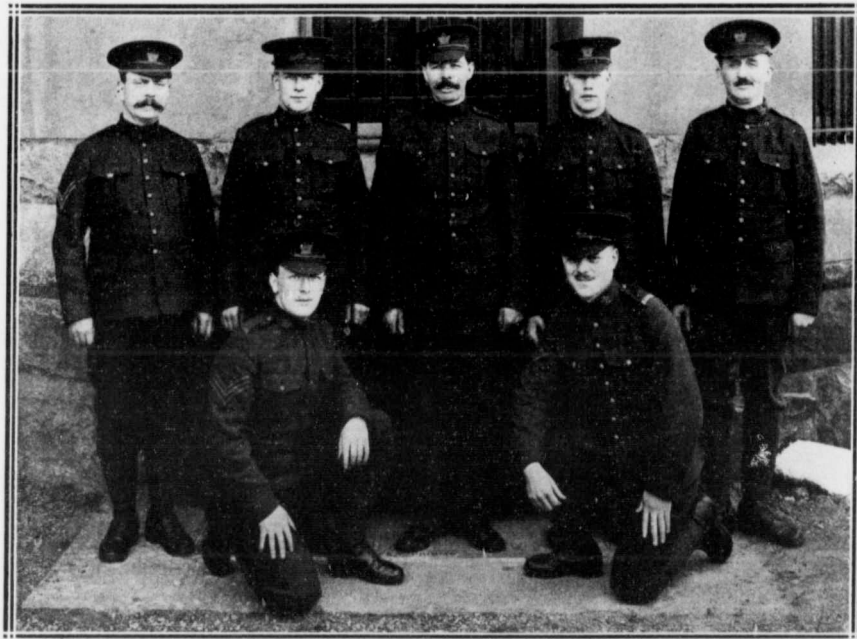

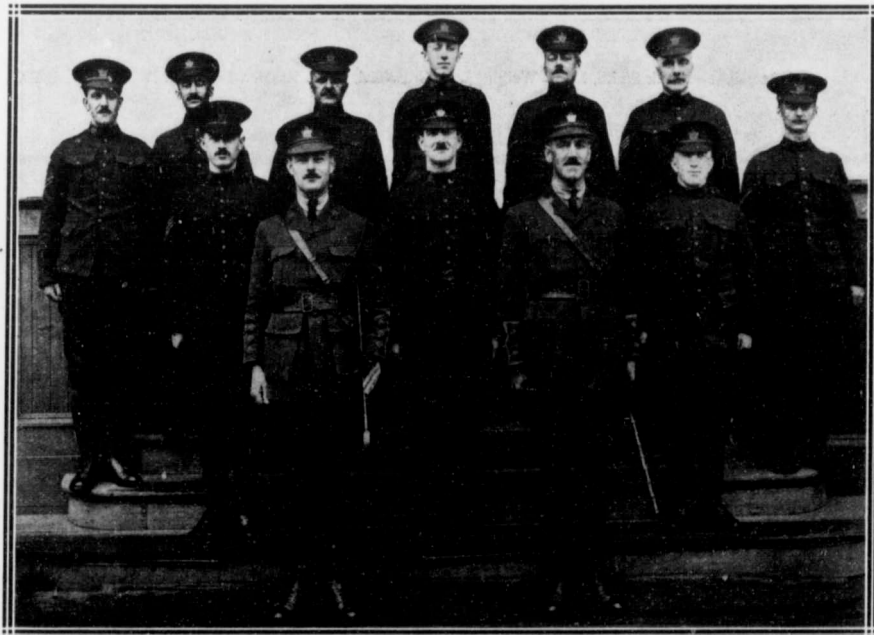

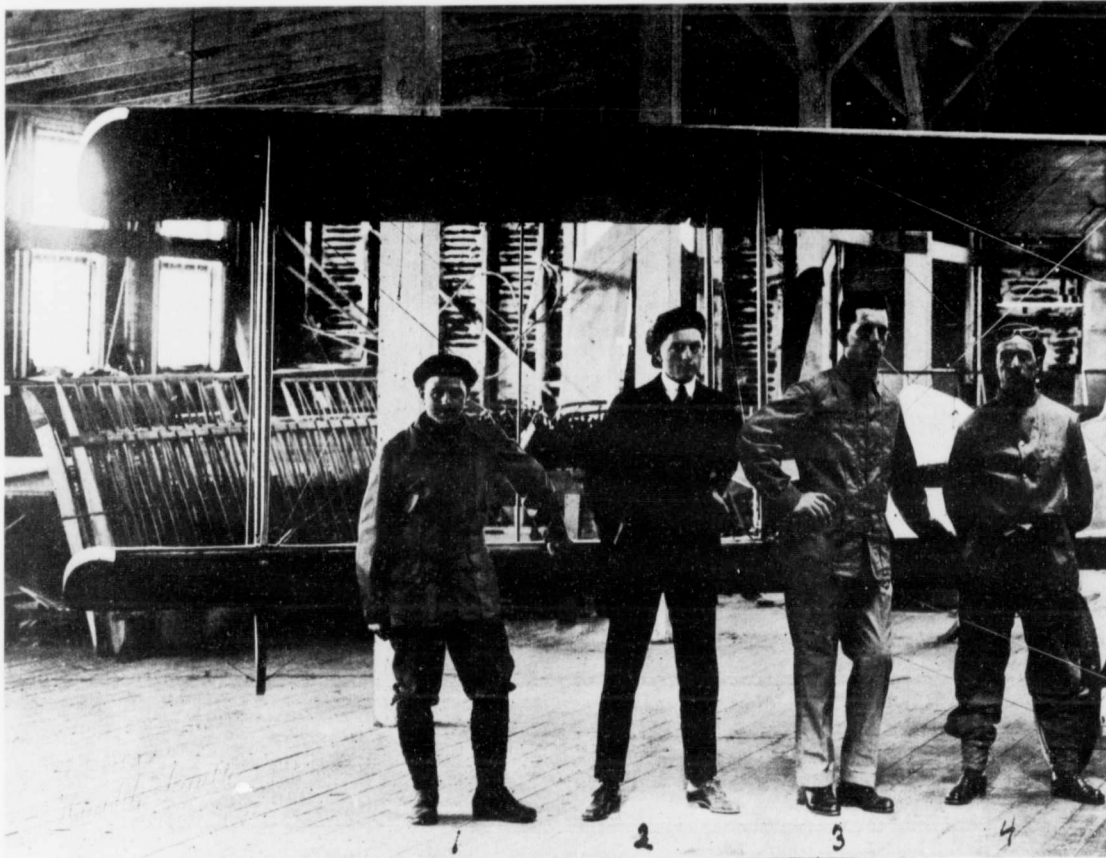

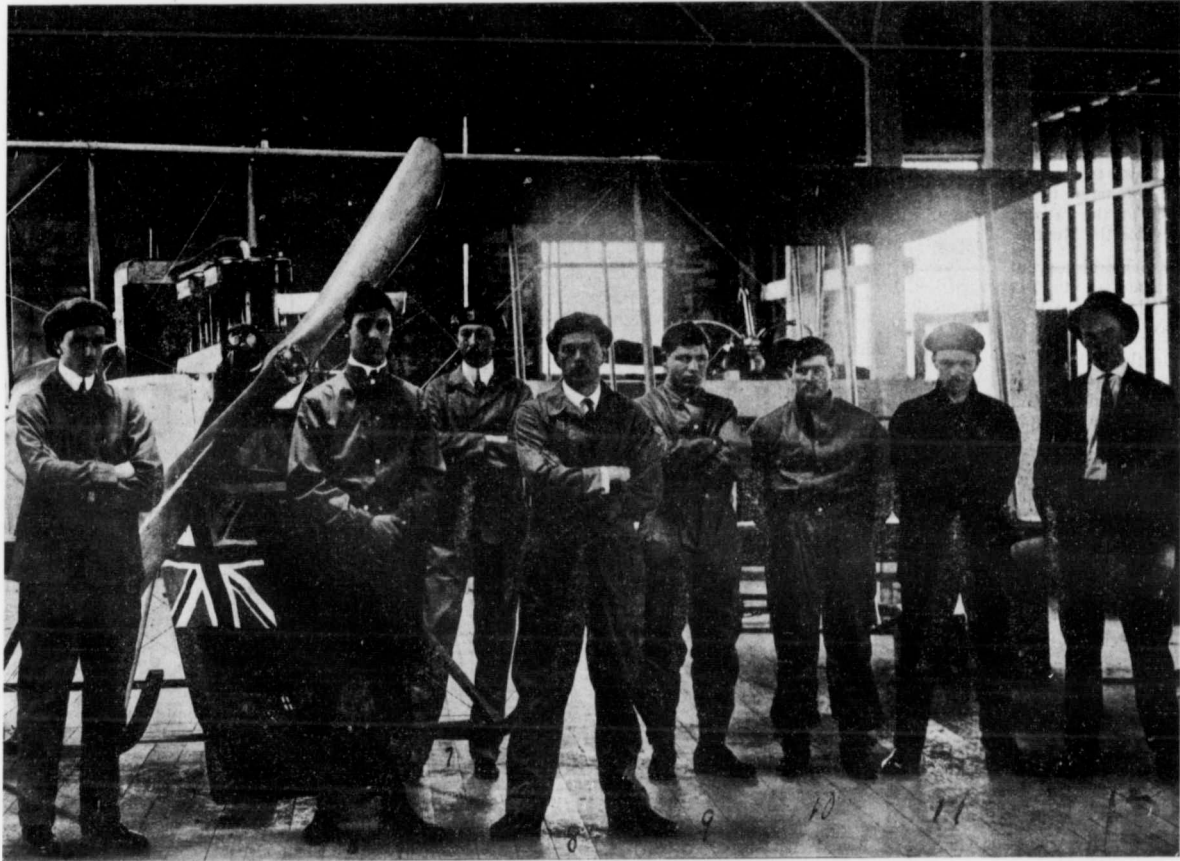

A Short History of the Duke of Connaught's Own

Westminster and several Vancouver officers. This school was under the Royal Marine Artillery officers from Esquimalt, and was followed by the "A" grade course in the Esquimalt forts.

The annual inspection in April was followed by a parade on May 11th to meet the Yukon Field Force at the railway station, en route for the North.

A memorable event in this year was the visit to Seattle of both Battalions of the Regiment on the 4th of July.

On the 23rd of July the Governor-General, Lord Aberdeen, was received by a Guard of Honor furnished by the 2nd Battalion.

From a gunner's point of view, the most important event of the year was the gun practice in the Forts at Esquimalt. One gun detachment from each Company went down, and, after one day's drill, manned and fired the 6-inch guns at a moving target, making sixty per cent. of direct hits and a ricochet.

Rifle shots will also remember 1898, as the Martini-Henry rifles were replaced on November 11th by Lee-Enfields.

The 2nd Battalion Companies were renumbered in December; No. 4 of New Westminster becoming No. 1, and Nos. 5 and 6 of Vancouver Nos. 2 and 3 respectively, of the 2nd Battalion, 5th Regiment C. A.

On the 24th of May, 1899, Nanaimo was visited to assist in the local celebration of the Queen's Birthday.

In June the old Valise equipment was called in and the Oliver equipment issued. In July a Militia Order authorized the change from Artillery to Rifles, and in spite of a very strong feeling against the proposed change it was carried out in December. In October Major-General Hutton, commanding the Canadian Militia, inspected the 2nd Battalion, and announced that he considered it necessary to have some infantry in British Columbia, and as the 1st Battalion had the opportunity of drilling on modern guns, it fell to the 2nd Battalion to change their uniforms and methods of training.

Regimental Order of December 23rd, 1899, gives the officers of the 6th Battalion Rifles, as it was then called, as follows:

Lieut.-Col. C. A. Worsnop, in command; Major Lacey R. Johnson, second in command; Major J. C. Whyte, Junior Major; Major C. C. Bennett, Adjutant; Surgeon-Major A. M. Robertson, Surgeon, "A" Co. (New Westminster)—Capt. A. Henderson; Lieut. W. A.

Johnson. "B" Co. (New Westminster)—Lieut. G. O. M. Dockrill, Lieut. J. R. Grant. "C" Co. (Vancouver)—Capt. F. W. Boulbee. "D" Co. (Vancouver)—Capt. J. Reynolds Tite, Lieut. J. S. Tait. "E" Co. (Vancouver)—Capt. J.

From "A" and "B" Companies, New Westminster—Corporals G. B. Corbould and W. A. Wallace; Privates A. S. Battson, C. T. Leamy, J. Porter Smith, W. H. Brooking, A. Lohman, Otway Wilkie.

At Paardeberg Private Jackson was killed and Privates Lohman, Thompson and Niebergall were wounded.

In January, 1900, Sergt. A. C. Bundy, who had just completed twelve years service in the R. M. R., joined the 6th Battalion as Sergeant-Major.

In April the Battalion was called upon to supply twenty men for six months' service in the 3rd Special Service Battalion R. C. R., and this draft went into garrison at Victoria a week later. Lieut. H. C. Akroyd also was appointed for duty with the Battalion.

In May the designation of the Corps was changed to the 6th Regiment "The Duke of Connaught's Own Rifles," His Royal Highness having accepted the Honorary Colonelcy and permitted the use of his name.

In July the Regiment was called out in aid of the Civil Power to prevent anticipated riots in Steveston. The call came after 11 p. m. on July 23rd and the Regiment left by boat at 2 a. m., July 24th, remaining in Steveston until July 30th, and arriving in Vancouver in time to receive the new Governor-General of the Dominion, Lord Minto, at the railway station.

The annual mobilization took place at Esquimalt on Sept. 2nd. It was not until November, 1900, that the Rifle uniforms were received and issued and the old Artillery tunics and serges returned to Stores.

On the last day in the year the Regiment turned out with the citizens to welcome home those of the First Contingent who were returning from South Africa.

In March, 1901, Major C. C. Bennett was seconded for service in the South African Constabulary.

On the occasion of His Royal Highness the Duke of York's visit the Regiment furnished Guards of Honor on September 30th and October 3rd, 1901. His Royal Highness opened the new Drill Hall on Beatty Street, which had just been completed.

In May, 1902, Lieut. C. B. Worsnop received an appointment in the 5th Regiment, C. M. R., and left for South Africa.

In the following month Major-General Sir Charles Parsons, C-in-C. Troops in British North America, inspected the 6th Regiment and detachments of native troops from Hong Kong and Singapore on their way to the Coronation ceremonies.

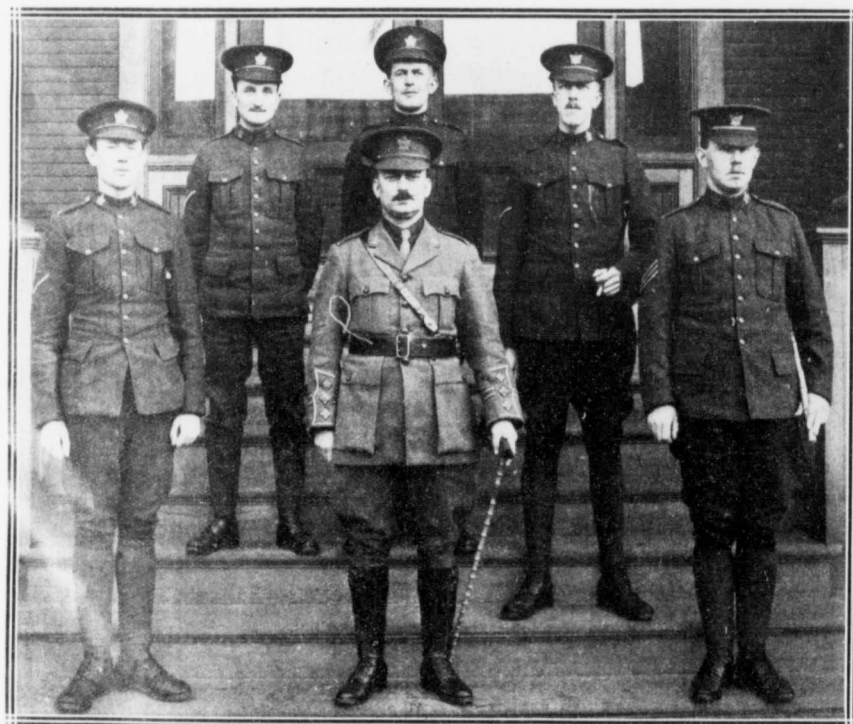

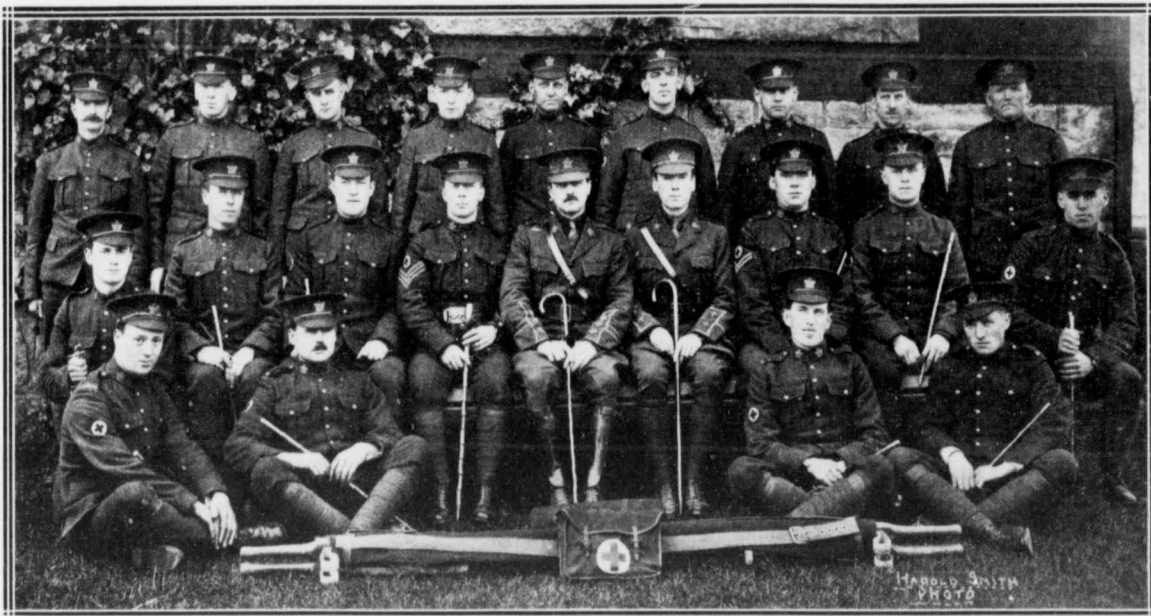

A Short History of the Duke of Connaught's Own

(Continued from Page 14)

In November Lieut.-Col. C. A. Worsnop, who had commanded the Regiment for his full term, was placed on the Reserve of Officers, and the command devolved upon Major J. C. Whyte.

During Lieut.-Col. Worsnop's tenure of command the local companies had each won the special prizes given by the Governor-General, Lord Lansdowne, to the best Garrison Artillery Company in Canada, and the Regiment had reached a high standard in discipline and efficiency.

Early in 1903 two new Companies, "G" and "H," were added to the Regiment, and the officers at that time were:

Lieut.-Col. Whyte in command; Major F. W. Boulbee, second in command; Major A. Henderson, Junior Major; Capt. J. Duff Stuart, Adjutant; Surg.-Major A. M. Robertson, Surgeon; Capt. C. Gardiner Johnson, Quartermaster.

The Company officers were: Capts. J. Reynolds Tite, W. A. Johnson, J. R. Grant, John Boyd, J. S. Tait, C. B. Worsnop, W. Hart-McHarg and Roy Macgowan.

In December of the same year the Regiment was inspected and highly complimented by Lord Dundonald, General Officer Commanding.

The year 1904 was marked by the winning of His Majesty the King's prize at Bisley, by Pte. S. J. Perry, the first native-born Canadian to win this coveted trophy.

In September, 1905, the Minister of Militia, Sir Frederick Borden, K.C.M.G., in the presence of the Regiment and a large con-

course of citizens, unveiled the handsome brass tablet which now adorns the east wall of the Drill Hall. The inscription on the tablet is as follows:

To the Memory of Those Members of the 6th Regiment The Duke of Connaught's Own Rifles who lost their lives in the Service of the Empire in the War in South Africa, 1899-1902:

In all, this famous Corps has furnished more than 2,500 men, all ranks, since August, 1914, including the 62nd Battalion, C. E. F., commanded by Lieut.-Col. H. D. Hulme, former officer commanding the 6th Regiment; the D. C. O. R. and the 158th (Overseas) Battalion, commanded by Lieut.-Col. Charles Milne, who succeeded Lieut.-Col. Hulme as O. C. the 6th Regiment, the D. C. O. R.
