The bridge to be one span one hundred feet long from pin to pin, with roadway sixteen feet wide in the clear, steel joist and 5 inch cedar covering with wheel and hub-guards.

The bridge to carry a moving load of 125 pounds, at least, to each square foot of floor area.

WIARTON, ONT.—By-laws will be submitted to the ratepayers to raise \$25,000 to assist the Beet Sugar Co. and \$18,000 for waterworks improvements.—A. Hackett proposes to construct what is termed a marine railway in connection with his boat building business; estimated cost, \$5,000.

HAMILTON, ONT.—Five acres of land adjoining the old R. C. cemetery have been purchased as a site for an isolation hospital.—A. W. Peene, architect, has prepared plans for a two-story brick dwelling on Robinson street to cost \$3,000.—Alfred S. Rogers has purchased three acres of land at the head of Victoria avenue on which he will establish a coal handling plant.

LONDON, ONT.—Herbert Matthews, architect, is preparing plans for new residence for John Livingstone at Forest and is taking tenders on alterations to residence on Talbot street for Geo. T. Brown.—H. C. McBride, architect, is preparing plans for a residence to be built in Thamesford.—Plans have been completed for the curling rink to be built by the Thistle Club, one storey, 110 x 65 feet.

The improvements include enlargement and renewal of filter beds, \$2,000; head-gates, \$2,500; rebuilding timber cribs in concrete, \$2,500, general work at reservoir, \$11,130; general work in city, \$13,127.

FORT WILLIAM, ONT.—Tenders will shortly be invited for waterworks system, on plans by Willis Chipman, C. E., Toronto.—At a meeting of the Board of Health a resolution was passed authorizing the town to install a sewerage system.—Tenders are being taken up to 30th inst. for foundation of new boiler house at electric light station.—Wesley Methodist church congregation purpose disposing of their property on Syndicate avenue and building a new parsonage on Brodie street.

OWEN SOUND, ONT.—The application of the Huron, Bruce and Grey Electric Railway Co., for extensions of charter from Duquannon to Walkerton and Wingham, and from the boundary line between Huron and Middlesex to Sarnia, has been granted. Wood, of the Stand Hotel, will erect a handsome residence at corner of Beach avenue and Thurlow street.—Plans have been prepared for extensive alterations and additions to St. Paul's hospital.—It is understood that plans are under way for a theatre costing \$30,000 to be erected on Hastings street, between Carrall street and Columbia avenue, although the name of the promotor has not yet been disclosed.
