HOW SNAILS ARE COLLECTED. HOW SNAILS ARE COLLECTED. Snails are collected in the French provinces all day long by meb, wo-men, and children, who with iron hooks search for them at the foot of thorn hedges and under ivy, and in winter in old walls. If lucky, a good searcher will collect from 1,000 to 1,500 snails. These are paid for according to their weight, about a thousand snails averaging ten kilo-grammes, and the payment varies grammes, and the payment with the prices current in the Paris market, but it usually ranges from 4 to 8 cents per kilo. The work, therefore, cannot be said to be well paid.




